

SOLDIERS' OUTDOOR CHAPEL **ON FRONT LINES IN KOREA**

High on a mountain in Korea, within 50 yards of front-line bunkers defended by the 7th Division, Baker Company of the 31st In-fantry Regiment has constructed a beautiful out-door chapel. The benches consist

The chapel is dedicated not only to Pvt. Cochran, but to the hundreds of other soldiers who like him only to Pvt. Cochran, but to the hundreds of other soldiers who like him have belonged to this company and who have fought and died that truth and freedom might be preserved. Baker Company participated in the Inchon Landing and fought a courageous rear guard action near the Choshin Reservoir when the First Marine Division was fighting its way out of an encirclement in that region. Two days after they dedicated Cochran Chapel the company withstood an intensive banzai attack by the Chinese.

banzai attack by the Chinese. The accompanying photograph was taken on the day that Cochran Chapel was dedicated. Chaplain Samuel R. Neel, Jr., Protestant minister from Tallahassee, Fla., conducted the dedication service. Each week Chaplain Kenny Lynch of Cincinnati, O., holds Catholic mass and Chaplain Neel conducts Protestant worship in the chapel. Frequently during the week, individuals will be seen threading their way down to the sanctuary for private meditation and worship.
