





GENERAL EISENHOWER'S entrance into the Presidential campaign is claming a lot of attention, as would be expected. In the cloak rooms, restaurants, in taxicabs and on Washington street corners, people are scenting a possible grassroots upsurge in public clamor for a change in the White House when the November election comes around. And they wonder if Eisenhower can withstand the hard knocks of political realism. Even President Truman jovially suggested that the General would find out a lot about himell that he never knew before.

Under Army regulations a soldier is not allowed to actively campaign for public office. He can run but he cannot issue political statements or make campaign speeches That means that the Eisenhower race will be in the hands of friends with about everything the General has ever said in print being pulled out, dissected and all sorts of interpretations placed upon them.

On the other side of the picture will be the choice of a Democrat to carry the torch for the Party that s being challenged. You ran hear about everything on Capitil Hill, but there seems to be but few who thing Mr. Truman will run. But he is the unprediduable tppe, and that cannot be overlooked.

The average dopester seems to think the President would welcome a contest with Senator Taft but doesn't citton up to the idea of fighting it out with Eisenhower if the Republicans nominate him. If he is nominated he would then be relieved of his Command in Europe and would return home for an active campaign.


That might happen even before the Conventions.

General Eisenhower is a Kansan but by accident is a native Texan, having been born near Denison. In 1944 when a small group of Congressmen were on a mission in England, the General heard about it and invited the group to visit him at his then secret headquarterns near Paris. That was in September. Bob Poage of Waco and I were in the group, and we had the privilepe of talking with the Allied Commander for two or three honrs. I recall that Poage called the General's attention to his Texas birth.



TOLEDO, O .- Here is the first picture released by Willys-Overland of its long-awaited passenger sedan, the first to be built by the company since it went into all-out production of Jeeps for war in 1942. This model, to be introduced by dealers early next year, is the "Aero Wing," so named because its construction and styling represent a "dramatic marriage of the most advanced principles of aeronautical and automotive engineering," according to company engineers. They described the car as "designed to meet the conditions of high-tax, high-cost living. It is the first time that the ride and handling characteristics of expensive, long wheelbase cars have been secured in a car of external compactness and outstanding economy." Tests cited by the company indicate the Aero Wing will, speed for speed, go farther on less gas than any other full-size car. It is reported to deliver up to 35 miles to the gallon at a speed of 30 miles an hour with overdrive using regular gasoline.

Your Health

What can you do to protest your eyes? Avoid unnecessary strain by reading in good positions and with Junction were here Thursday. sufficient light. If your eyes bother you, have them examined by a eases of the eye.

Eye strain begins when you need to use too much effort to focus clearly. If you have normal eyes, you do not need to use the focusing muscles to see clearly at a distance; and when you look at something close, like reading matter, you need to focus only a little. If you are farsighted, your eyes have to focus even when you look far away; and when you read, you have to focus a lot more than a person with normal eyes.

Children have strong focusing muscles, and their eyes do not tire easily or usually need glasses unless they have a large amount of far-sightedness. Then they need glasses to do the focusing and give their eyes a rest. Older people have weaker focusing muscles and usually need glasses for reading when they are about 45 years old. For other specific eye difficulties glasses may be needed.
