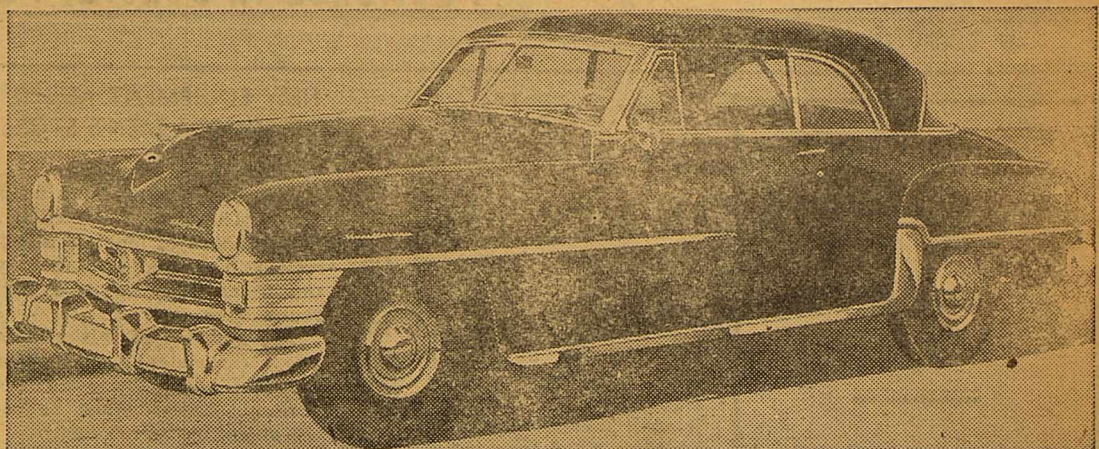

**Our WASHINGTON Letter**  
 By Congressman **O. C. FISHER**

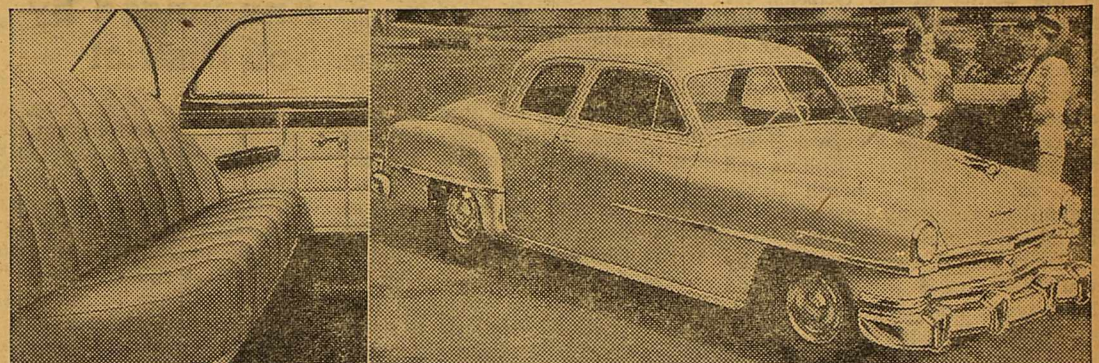
**PRESIDENT TRUMAN'S** General Eisenhower and Winston Churchill vied with each other for front page space in Washington last week, as Congress convened, politics buzzed, and Anglo-American problems were given a going over.  
 The President's annual State of the Union message, required by the

Constitution, was pretty much a rehash of the one a year ago. It reviewed world events, promised a liberal amount of welfare for most every one, but was more conciliatory in that it did not dwell so much upon civil rights and the Fair Deal program. With Mr. Churchill and Anthony Eden looking on from the gallery, Mr. Truman talked for 35 minutes to a packed gallery and House chamber. The Prime Minister is scheduled to make a formal address to the House and Senate on January 17.  
 Everywhere up here these days politics is in the air. It is strictly an election year atmosphere which is not given to much progress in constructive legislation. But the session will probably be a comparatively short one, with both sides girding themselves for the big political battles of the Summer and fall. Both House and Senate are due to get to work but little delay, and the "must" legislation will be taken up earlier than is usually the case.  
**GENERAL EISENHOWER'S** entrance into the Presidential campaign is claiming a lot of attention, as would be expected. In the cloak rooms, restaurants, in taxicabs and on Washington street corners, people are scenting a possible grassroots upsurge in public clamor for a change in the White House when the November election comes around. And they wonder if Eisenhower can withstand the hard knocks of political realism. Even President Truman jovially suggested that the General would find out a lot about himself that he never knew before.  
 Under Army regulations a soldier is not allowed to actively campaign for public office. He can run but he cannot issue political statements or make campaign speeches. That means that the Eisenhower race will be in the hands of friends, with about everything the General has ever said in print being pulled out, dissected and all sorts of interpretations placed upon them.  
 On the other side of the picture will be the choice of a Democrat to carry the torch for the Party that is being challenged. You can hear about everything on Capitol Hill, but there seems to be but few who think Mr. Truman will run. But he is the unpredictable type, and that cannot be overlooked.  
 The average dopester seems to think the President would welcome a contest with Senator Taft but doesn't cotton up to the idea of fighting it out with Eisenhower, if the Republicans nominate him. If he is nominated he would then be relieved of his Command in Europe and would return home for an active campaign.  
 That might happen even before the Conventions.  
 General Eisenhower is a Kansan, but by accident is a native Texan, having been born near Denison. In 1944 when a small group of Congressmen were on a mission in England, the General heard about it and invited the group to visit him at his then secret headquarters near Paris. That was in September. Bob Poage of Waco and I were in the group, and we had the privilege of talking with the Allied Commander for two or three hours. I recall that Poage called the General's attention to his Texas birth.  
 "That's true", replied Eisenhower, "but grasshoppers were to blame for it. You see, the grasshoppers ate my father's crop up over in Kansas and he moved temporarily down to Denison where he could get a job. While the family was living at Denison, I was born. And so I guess you can blame the Kansas grasshoppers for my being born in Texas!"  
 But he said he took pride in his Texas birth, and had high praise for the courage of Texas troops.

**STYLE AND POWER FEATURED IN 1952 CHRYSLERS**

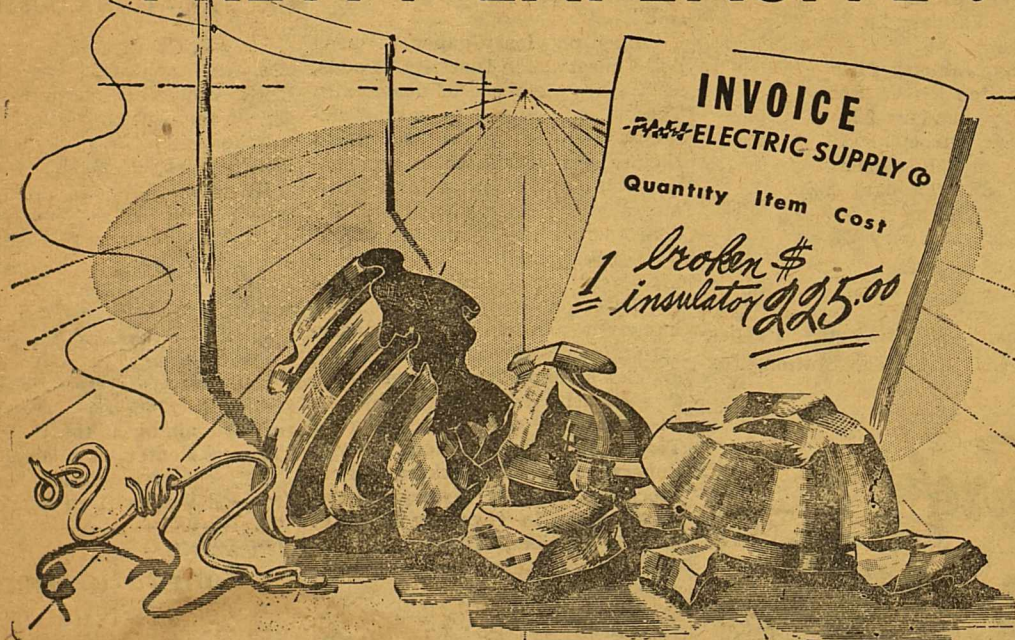


The interior of the 1952 New Yorker sedan features beautifully designed hardware and newly styled luxury upholstery and trim.

Refinements throughout the line, rather than revolutionary engineering innovations, characterize Chrysler's 1952 models.  
 Chrysler officials point out that the demands of the rearmament program have precluded the extensive tooling program necessary for drastic model changes. They add that Chrysler introduced more important new features in its 1951 line than ever before were offered by any manufacturer in a single year. These included the 180-horsepower V-8 FirePower engine, Hydramatic power steering, Oriflow shock absorbers and Fluid-Torque Drive torque converter.  
 Refinements contributing to performance, appearance, safety, economy and comfort have been incorporated in the 1952 line. Features formerly available only in certain models have been extended to cover the entire line.  
**1952 Line Features 18 Body Styles**  
 The number of body styles offered by Chrysler has been considerably reduced by eliminating those of smaller production and those that are approximated by others retained in the line. Despite this reduction, however, there remain 18 body styles.  
 All models save those in the Windsor and Windsor DeLuxe lines are powered by the 180-horsepower V-8 FirePower engine. The Windsor and Windsor DeLuxe have an improved version of the Chrysler six-cylinder "Spitfire" engine, higher power, and designed for improved performance and longer life. The torque available from this engine is higher at all speeds than that obtainable in the one it supersedes. The torque curve is much flatter at the peak and indicates an improved performance at normal driving speeds.  
 The bore remains unchanged at 3 7/16 inches but the stroke has been increased from 4 1/2 to 4 3/4, increasing cubic displacement from 250.6 to 264.5. The engine produces 119 horsepower with a compression ratio of 7 to 1.  
 Longer life, improved economy and greater scuff resistance result from the use of the new chromium-plated top piston rings and new wide-slot oil rings. Improved cooling in the six-cylinder models is accomplished by a seven pound pressure release vent radiator cap which lessens the possibility of coolant loss due to boiling.  
**Power Steering Available on All Models**  
 Hydramatic steering, which proved to be one of the most popular engineering advances ever offered by Chrysler, will be available also on the 1952 Windsor and Windsor DeLuxe lines, instead of only on the eight-cylinder models, as was the case in 1951. It will be optional at extra cost, except in the Crown Imperial where it remains standard.  
 Quieter operation of the Oriflow shock absorbers introduced as standard equipment on all models in 1951 is attained by refinement of the piston and base valve assemblies, permitting a more gradual change in the velocities of the fluids at the discharge ends of the orifices.  
 Smarter exterior appearance results from the use of new wheel covers and a new tail light. In all models except the Imperial and Crown Imperial the ornamentation of the wheel cover is limited to a beaded ring just inside the tire valve opening and a raised center hub incorporating three concentric stepped rings. The wheel cover is of stainless steel. In the Imperial and Crown Imperial models the centered crown is set in a depression three inches in diameter.  
 The new tail light used on all models save the Imperial and Crown Imperial projects from the fender and contains an integral back-up light, eliminating the separate back-up lights used on 1951 models.  
 Interior styling includes improvements in upholstery and trim with an unusually wide choice of materials that are the most luxurious and tasteful that Chrysler has ever offered.  
 Thirteen solid colors and six two-tone paint combinations are offered.

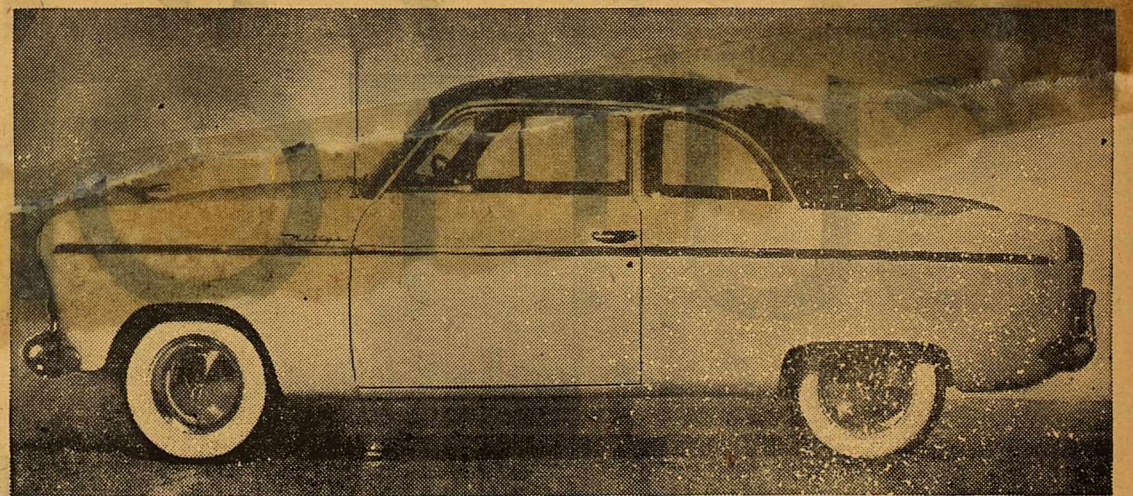

#### AIR, AUTO DESIGN WED IN NEW CAR



TOLEDO, O.—Here is the first picture released by Willys-Overland of its long-awaited passenger sedan, the first to be built by the company since it went into all-out production of Jeeps for war in 1942. This model, to be introduced by dealers early next year, is the "Aero Wing," so named because its construction and styling represent a "dramatic marriage of the most advanced principles of aeronautical and automotive engineering," according to company engineers. They described the car as "designed to meet the conditions of high-tax, high-cost living. #### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

Q - - Would I still be eligible to start training under the GI Bill? I entered service in 1941 and I have just been granted an honorable discharge.

A - - Yes, you may be eligible to begin GI Bill training. You have four years from your discharge date in which to start, but you may not train beyond July 25, 1956.

Q - - My husband died recently as a result of a service-connected disability for which he had been drawing 100 percent compensation pay.

After VA passes on my claim for death compensation, would my payments be based on his degree of disability?

A - - No. Death compensation payments to survivors of veterans are based on the number and type of dependents only, and not on the degree of compensation the veterans received while they were alive.

### Your Health

One of your valued assets is good eyes. Many people thoughtlessly abuse the eyes and think little about it until trouble comes, declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

What can you do to protect your eyes? Avoid unnecessary strain by reading in good positions and with sufficient light. If your eyes bother you, have them examined by a physician trained especially in diseases of the eye.

Eye strain begins when you need to use too much effort to focus clearly. If you have normal eyes, you do not need to use the focusing muscles to see clearly at a distance; and when you look at something close, like reading matter, you need to focus only a little. If you are farsighted, your eyes have to focus even when you look far away; and when you read, you have to focus a lot more than a person with normal eyes.

Children have strong focusing muscles, and their eyes do not tire easily or usually need glasses unless they have a large amount of far-sightedness. Then they need glasses to do the focusing and give their eyes a rest. Older people have weaker focusing muscles and usually need glasses for reading when they are about 45 years old. For other specific eye difficulties glasses may be needed.
