Dorsey Hardeman Announces For State Senator

Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo has announced his candidacy for State Senator for the newly created 25th District of Texas. The district is composed of the following counties: Brewster, Coleman, Coke, Crane, Crockett, Edwards, Glasscock, Irion, Jeff Davis, Pecos, Presidio, Reagan, Runnels, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, Terrell, Tom

Hardeman was first elected Senator in 1946, following his return from Green, Upton and Val Verde. He was re-elected in 1950 without an opponent. Senator and Mrs. Hardeman reside in San Angelo with their two young sons, Mark and Bryan. Hardeman is a member of the San Angelo law firm of Runge, Hardeman & Steib. Senator Hardeman is well known throughout West Texas. He was Mayor of San Angelo for 2 years, and then elected to the House of Representatives without an opponent. He was re-elected in 1940 and again in 1942. Hardeman resigned from the Legislature and enlisted as a private in the Army. After several months enlisted service he was sent to Officer Candidate School and received a commission. He was honorably discharged with the rank of Captain.

In the Senate, Hardeman is the recognized leader for constitutional and economical government. He has held membership on all of the major standing committees of the Senate and has served as Chairman of various ones. In addition, he served on the General Investigating Committee and numerous special committees. His work thereon is considered outstanding. Hardeman also served as a member of the Legislative Budget Committee, which was created as the result of the bill he sponsored. Hardeman stated that he expected to make an active campaign, as has always been his custom, in an effort to visit with as many citizens of the district as possible. Incidentally, this is the largest Senatorial district in the State and covers almost one-sixth of the land area of Texas.

In his formal announcement, Senator Hardeman said: "It is with pleasure that I submit my candidacy for State Senator for the new 25th Senatorial District. For the help and support given me in prior campaigns, and subsequently, I am most grateful. "Naturally, any official ties are thus severed with several of the counties comprising the former 25th District, it is not without regret on my part, because of my sense of gratitude for the support they gave me. I could not have hoped for finer co-operation.

"With the reapportionment of the State, district lines were rearranged and different counties were grouped together. I think that no finer district exists than this which I am seeking to represent in the Senate of Texas. The new district unites a conservative, thrifty and self-reliant people, with common interests, into a single political subdivision of the State. "It shall by my purpose, as ever, to represent this fine district and the State within constitutional provisions and the principles of sound governmental practices. "I have sponsored or supported much constructive legislation. Likewise, I have opposed legislation designed to gain advantages for special interests and pressure-groups. My position has been often sustained by decisions of the Supreme Court when such matters have come before it for judicial review. "I have been conservative in the expenditure of public funds and have opposed discriminatory and unconstitutional appropriations. I have voted for the reduction of expenditures and have opposed increasing the already heavy tax burdens of our people.

"Limited space suggests that I not discuss my legislative record here. As I go about the district during the coming months, I shall discuss it, however, as opportunity and occasion arise. "I earnestly solicit your help and your vote in the primary election of next July 26."

TEXAS DERBY TO FEATURE SAN ANGELO RACE MEET

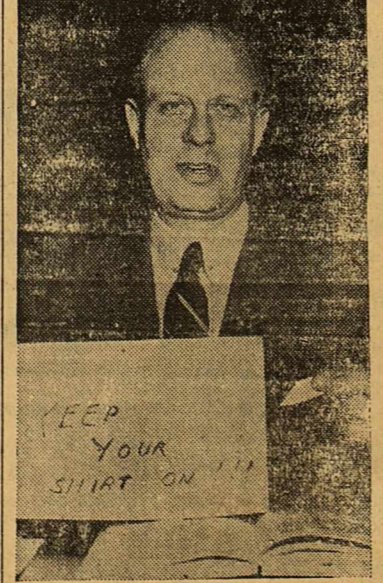
Re-inauguration of Texas' most famous race, the Texas Derby, has been announced by the Texas Horse Breeders Association. The Derby, planned on a modest scale, will be the feature race on the Friday May 16, program. The "Texas Futurity" meet which the Association sponsors will be held in San Angelo, May 10, 16 & 17.

During the racing heyday in Texas, as the Texas Derby was its most famous attraction, with the nation's top 3 year olds competing in it each year. The revised version has already attracted some of the best of the current crop of Texas 3-year olds and handicapping restrictions to limit the field will apparently be needed.

The event, written especially for the nominees to last year's Texas Futurities, gives them a 3lb weight advantage. Distance of 5 1/2 furlongs will be used to avoid starting on a turn. Trial heats will eliminate all but eight finalists in each of the 3 divisions of the "Texas Futurity" on May 10. The 2 year olds will then vie for purses expected to exceed \$14,000 in the Final Stakes on May 17. A total of 71 2-year olds have been nominated.

Rep. Burkett Asks Reelection To Legislature

State Representative, Joe Burkett, Jr., authorized the Devil's River News to announce his candidacy for re-election to the post of State Representative of the 78th Representative District, subject to action of the Democratic Primary.

Burkett was elected to the office last November 13 in a special election in connection with the Constitutional Amendments, after Rep. Callan Graham moved from the district. Burkett is a native Texan, born and raised in Eastland County. He attended public school at Eastland and graduated from the San Antonio schools. He earned his law degree from Cumberland University, Lebanon, Tennessee in 1933.

Burkett launched his public life in Kerr County where he served 2 terms as Justice of the Peace. His talents as a fair and energetic public servant were recognized and he was appointed Kerr County Attorney to fill an unexpired term. This was followed by 2 elected terms to the office, from which he resigned in 1949. His services were once again desired by the office of County Judge, January 1, 1950. Burkett retired to private law practice at the completion of that term of office.

A sound believer in the principles of Democratic government, Burkett no less is a firm adherent to local self-government. He is convinced that state taxes should not be increased for any purpose except as the people of the state voluntarily authorize tax levies upon themselves for a specific purpose. He has lived in the Hill Country for 21 years, and feels that he can properly and sympathetically represent the people of the Hill Country and the entire district in an integrated legislative program.

Burkett is cognizant of and sympathetic to the needs and problems of the war veterans. He served 4 years as field artilleryman in World War II; eighteen months were spent overseas in the European Theatre of Operations under the late Gen George S. Patton, where he earned 2 major campaign ribbons: Battle of Central Germany and Battle of the Rhine.

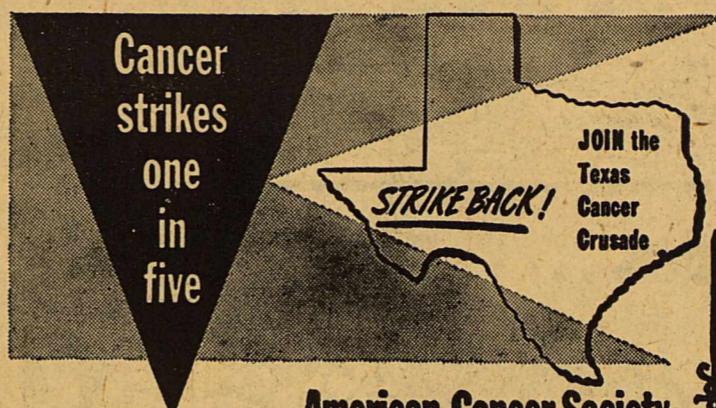

Funeral Services For Mrs. Davis Held Sunday

Mrs. J. L. Davis, 95, widow of a pioneer West Texas peace officer, and ranchman, died here Saturday at the Hudspeth Memorial Hospital.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock with the Rev. W. H. Marshall officiating. Burial was in Sonora Cemetery. Pallbearers were her grandsons, Howard Davis, David Davis, and

Jack R. Davis, of Pecos; Levelle Meckel of Eldorado; Aavon (Bill) Covington of Notrees, and Clifton L. Clark of Fort Worth.

Born Martha Savannah Howton in Fayette County, Ala., on Aug. 19, 1856, Mrs. Davis came to Texas with her family in 1867. The family settled at Lampasas at a time when the Comanche Indians were the terror of ranchmen.

She was married to J. L. Davis, a Texas Ranger, in 1877. They remained at Lampasas in the farming and ranching business until 1890, when they moved west to Sonora.

Mrs. Davis frequently recalled that at the time the city of Sonora was comprised of two stores, 25 families and one well.

Two years after their arrival in Sonora, Mr. Davis was elected the second sheriff of Sutton County. He served three terms, and later one term as a deputy for E. S. Bryant. Meanwhile, he invested in ranch properties, and operated his mine and a half section ranch six miles north of the city until his death in 1914.

During the war, Mrs. Davis spent much time knitting for the Red Cross, even when confined to bed with a broken collar bone. She made 40 sweaters in that project.

Mrs. Davis was a charter member of the First Baptist Church, and was an active worker in it as long as she was able. She turned the first spadeful of dirt for the new church building erected several years ago. Her home always was open to visiting ministers, regardless of their denomination.

Survivors include five daughters, Mrs. W. T. Covington and Mrs. Holly B. McGonigal of Dallas; Mrs. Mora C. Clarke of Fort Worth; Mrs. Ben F. Meckel and Mrs. Ruth Wallace of Sonora, and a son, J. R. Davis of El Paso.

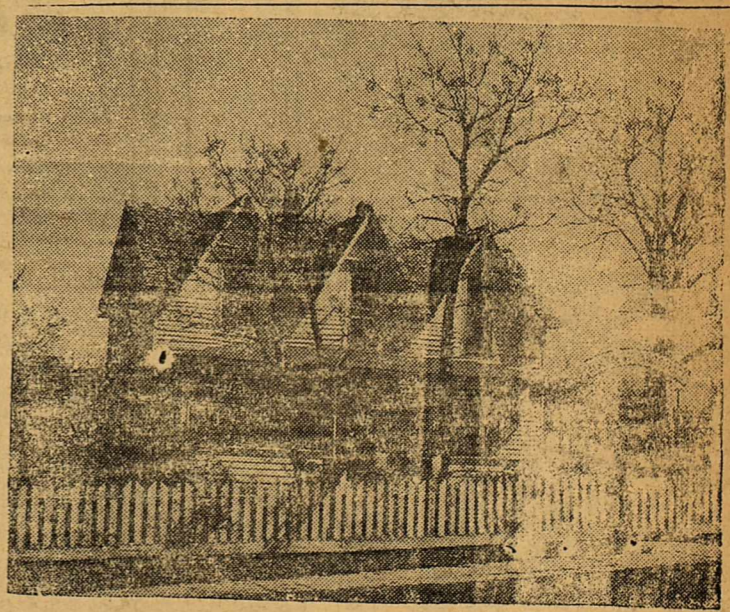
Also surviving are asister, Mrs. Will Perry of Uvalde, twelve grandchildren, 18 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

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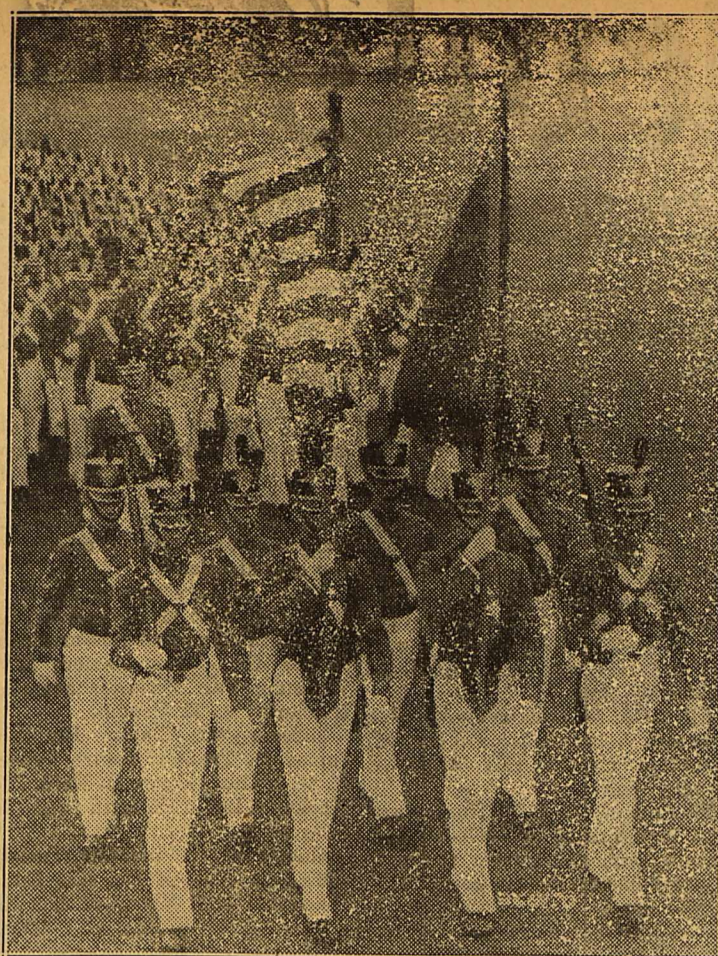

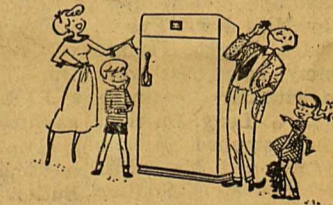

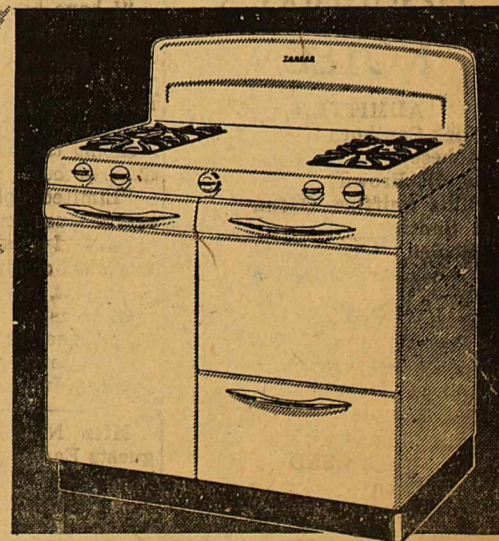

YOUR HEALTH

Pumping 2, 500 gallons of blood every 24 hours is the astonishing work done by the heart, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The heart is about the size of a man's fist and is rated at 1-240 of a horse power; it never sleeps, loafs or takes a vacation from the beginning of life to the end. The only rest it gets is between beats. Yet with all the work the heart has to do it does not give out suddenly unless it has been injured or ill-treated.

Under pressure of work the average person neglects his heart and unwittingly abuses it. The chief cause of heart trouble, aside from the deterioration of old age, are rheumatic fever, acute infectious diseases, chronic infections, syphilis, too abrupt return to activity after a serious illness, too strenuous exercise and overweight may be a factor.

Many of the signs which you may think mean heart trouble can be caused by some other disorder. Indigestion, lung trouble, or nervousness may cause pain near the heart, shortness of breath, fainting and irregularity of beat. If you have any of these symptoms, do not try to diagnose the condition yourself, but go to your doctor for an examination. He will be able to find out what is wrong and may

tell you that your heart is sound. Have a regular periodic examination and follow your doctor's advice.

Speaking of the susceptibility of children to tuberculosis, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said today that few people realize that babies and young children are very likely to become infected with tuberculosis if they are kept in rooms with persons who have the disease, use the same dishes, sleep in the same beds, or are handled and kissed by persons who have tuberculosis.

"Babies and young children pick up the germs of tuberculosis just as readily as they pick up germs of measles or whooping cough, or any other of the so-called children's diseases," Dr. Cox said. "But tuberculosis unlike most diseases, has more than one form. Babies who get tuberculosis may not show the symptoms we associate with the disease in older persons. But the disease in most cases develops rapidly and is likely to end fatally. Tuberculosis in babies and young children is a very serious matter, although recent studies have shown that if young children are removed promptly from contact with the disease and given the necessary care, many lives can be saved."

Dr. Cox said that if the presence of tuberculosis is recognized in its

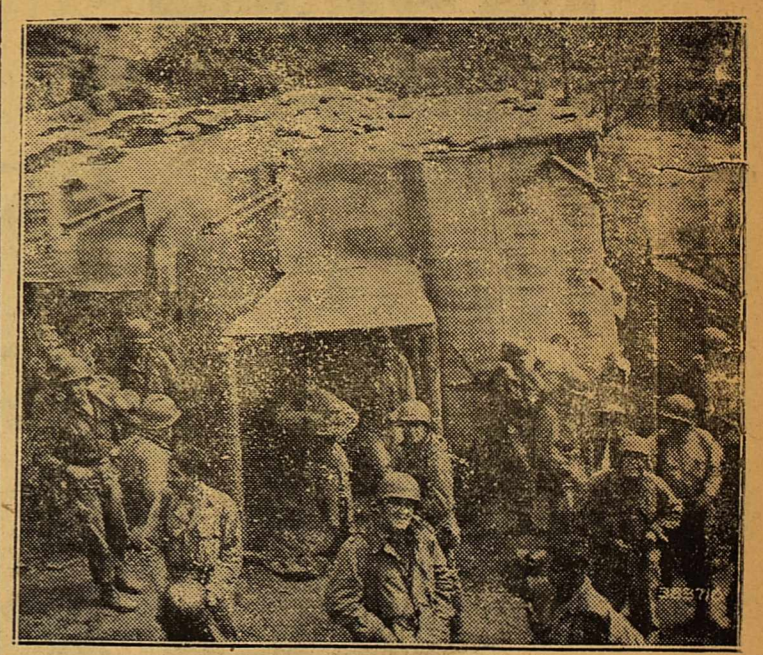

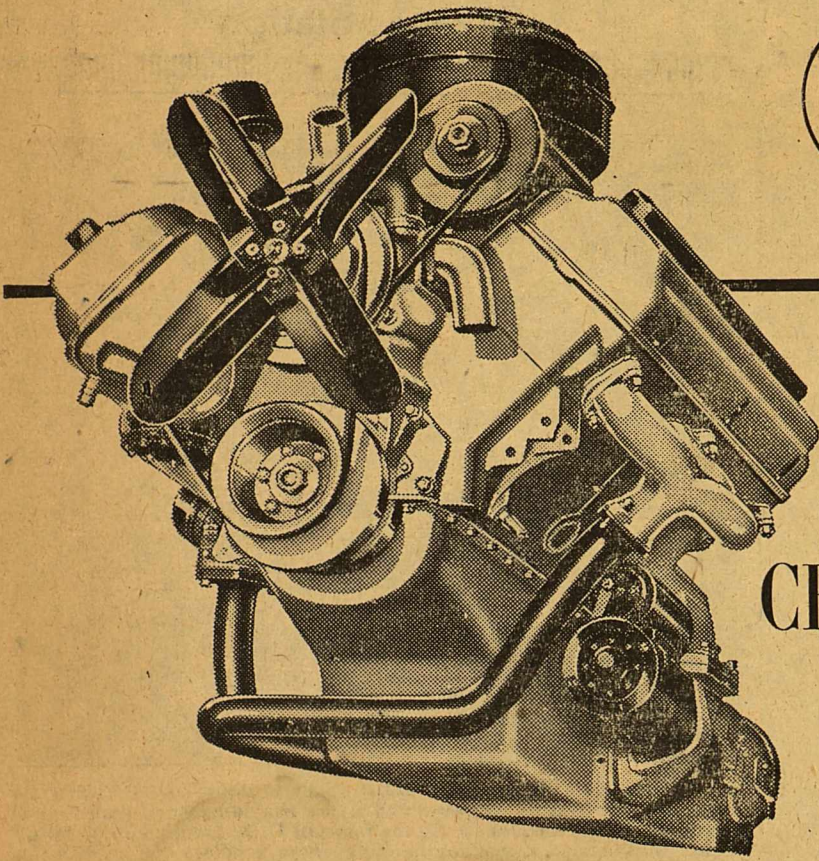

In the past a very small portion of Texas voters have had any direct influence with their individual votes upon the election of the President and Vice President of the United States.

They have voted in primary elections, and a few of them in general elections. But they voted for Presidential Elections—not the candidates themselves.

These candidates—the party nominees—had been selected three or four months before the general election itself.

And, even then, had not been selected by ballots of individual voters, cast in an election.

Their nominations originated way back there in May at party precinct conventions.

Here is how it works: The precinct convention names delegates to the party's county convention.

The county convention selects delegates to the state convention.

The state convention selects delegates to the national convention. The national convention nominates the presidential and vice-presidential candidates of the party.

It is, therefore, necessary that the individual voter take part in the precinct convention to most effectively make his own vote count in election of the President and Vice-President.

Because such a relatively few voters usually attend Precinct conventions, the vast majority have had little moral right to complain about any administration's policies.

Here are some questions and answers to point up fundamental facts about the Presidential Precinct Convention:

Q. When will it be held?
A. On Saturday, May 3, at the Courthouse.

Q. At what hour?
A. The law requires that it be held between 10 a. m. and 8 p. m. Outside the largest cities, it usually is opened at 2 p. m. The County Chairman of the party is required by law to file a list of times and places with the County Clerk at least ten days before the convention day. This list must be posted on the Court House bulletin board.

Q. Who can take part in the Precinct Convention?
A. All qualified voters who live within the voting precinct.

Q. Must each person show proof of his right to vote in the Precinct Convention?
A. Yes. He must bring with him to the convention, his Poll Tax receipt or his Exemption Certificate.

Three Fundamental Principles Of American Life

"First, that individual freedom is our most precious possession. It is to be guarded as the chief heritage of our people, the wellspring of our spiritual and material greatness, and the central target of all enemies—internal and external—who seek to weaken or destroy the American Republic.

"Second, that all our freedoms—personal, economic, social, political—freedom to buy, to work, to hire, to bargain, to save, to vote, to worship, to gather in a convention or join in mutual association; all these freedoms are a single bundle. Each is an indispensable part of a single whole. Destruction of any inevitably leads to the destruction of all.

"Third, that freedom to compete vigorously among ourselves, accompanied by a readiness to cooperate whole heartedly for the performance of community and national functions, together make our system the most productive on earth."

FOREIGN POLICY

"There was a time when an American could be, and generally was, utterly unconcerned with the outer world because the oceans set us safely apart from all other peoples. Those days are gone. Vast spaces of the earth once measured in months of travel have been reduced to daily schedules of hours and minutes. Every nation is neighbor to all mankind. The need for international teamwork is no less than for that among ourselves.

"In the world conflict, national neutrality is futile, if not impossible. Therefore, we must support those with whom our kinship and our friendship are clearly established by common devotion to the freedom of men. The cost of effective help is great and the risks are sometimes fearful. But the alternative is an enslaved world.

"By no means do I believe we Americans can support the world militarily or economically. In our own interest, we must insist upon a working partnership with every nation making the common security its task of first priority. . . . I cannot conceive the United States ever consented to accept the responsibility for the command of western Europe except that they have the reservation their representatives would do their utmost to see we are all advancing together and the United States is not being made merely an Atlas to carry the load on its shoulders. . . ."

"Unless we look, with clear and understanding eyes, at the world situation confronting us, and meet with dynamic purposes the issues contained therein, then we will lose the American birthright. The system of government established by our forefathers will disappear. The American record, from Washington to the day of that disaster, will be only a blank page in history. . . ."

WARS

"... War is the least acceptable solution for our problems."

"Great tragedies do not spring out of logic and reason. We found in 1914 and again in 1939 that abuse of power, lack of restraint in its exercise, lust for its increase breed war. We learned that though the world's masses may recoil from the thought of war, wherever they are regimented, inarticulate or tragically misinformed, a mere miscalculation by a few officials of another's intent or strength can result in conflict. In many regions, local passions, misguided fanatics and age-old prejudices can all bring about crisis of the gravest kind."

"When people speak to you about preventive war, you tell them to go and fight it. After my experience, I have come to hate war. War settles nothing."

Formula For Peace

"First, justice, freedom and opportunity for all men; second, international understanding; third, disarmament; fourth, a respected United Nations."

National Crisis

"If the times demand a sudden and tremendous increase in the budget for defense, reckless extravagance, selfish grabbing, heedless spending of dollars we do not possess will make American citizenship in the future a mortgaged existence rather than a joyous privilege. If solvency and security are not synonymous, they are so closely related that the difference, if any, is scarcely discernible."

"It must be insured that, when the crisis has passed each of us will then possess every right, every privilege, every responsibility and every authority that now resides in an American citizen."

"It would do no good to defend our liberties against Communistic aggression and lose them to our own greed, blindness, or shiftless reliance on bureaucracy and the federal treasury."

SOCIALISM

"Danger still exists. It is found in peacetime budgetary deficits, in stifling federal taxes, in the piling up of governmental debt. Our money grows cheaper and cheaper; and the only cure that the 'planner' offers is more of the same, 'give me more power, let me, whether in peace or war, control prices of materials and of labor, let me control imports and exports, let me control production and sales, let me issue more money, let me allocate and apportion to each what I see fit to allocate and, I promise you (says the hardened bureaucrat) all will be well'."

"And the victim is not the wealthy man—one who could possibly, in any case, live out his ways, if he so chooses, in idle comfort. It is the workman, the mass of America, that is to pay the price; regimented labor is the inescapable basis of the socialized or planned economy."

Inflation

"Inflation has partially destroyed our savings and our insurance values."

PROPERTY RIGHTS

"How far can a government go in taxing away property rights and still not leave the government the master of the people instead of its servant."

"Government ownership or control of property . . . if carried to the logical extreme . . . gives to it (government) absolute power over our lives."

STATES RIGHTS

"Our courts have stated that 'the power to tax is the power to destroy.' A corollary would seem to be: the power to tax is not only the power to destroy the individual business or the corporation—it could also spell the destruction of the several states."

"If the federal government uses its taxing power to the point that there is no money left to the citizen for payment of taxes to his city and state—these local agencies of the people will become helpless—possibly even disappear."

"Whether or not this truth was perceived by some of the young, eager academicians swarming into Washington in the early 30's, they proceeded, through use of the unlimited taxing power, to reduce the income available to the states. Their obvious purpose was to extend the control of the federal government over the lives of citizens. But they covered their purpose, for palatability, with the cloak of emergency, internal and external emergency, and with the assertion that through their benevolent wisdom poverty would disappear, man would live and prosper without work, and Utopia would come to live among us forever."

"They began to make inroads upon our local rights and freedom. Today the 'grants-in-aid' policies of the federal government are defended on the allegation that the states are too poor to sustain themselves."

"Such specious reasoning is justified only by one of two supporting assumptions. The first is that the federal government will create some of the money it intends to give, since the federal government can have no source of revenue—no inventory of assets—except the total available to the 48 states. The other is that there was a deliberate purpose to dilute the solvency of the states, so that all are dependent upon the beneficence of the central authority. More than likely, both were counted upon to bring success to the doctrinaire Socialists responsible for such policies."

AGRICULTURE

"With regard to economy, your role is fundamental. Without high productivity on our farms, there can be no success. So, as a vital part of our national economies, the agriculturist contributes heavily to the production of defensive power to maintain the peace."

"When you put in the same outfit and make live together under the most intimate circumstances men of different races, we sometimes have trouble."

"Therefore, there has been a sort of compromise made with this problem right down through the years with the Army. I do not mean to say that I have any final answer to that problem, and I believe that the human race may finally grow up to the point where it will not be a problem."

"But I do believe that if we attempt merely by passing a lot of laws to force someone to like someone, we are just going to get into trouble."

COMMUNISM

"We face not only ruthless men, but also lies and misconceptions intended to rob us of our resolution and faith within, and of our friends throughout the world. . . ."

"The Communist leaders believe that, unless they destroy our system, their own subjects, gradually gaining an understanding of the blessings and opportunities of liberty, will repudiate Communism and tear its dictators from their positions of power."

"They know that, for the mass of humanity, America has come to symbolize freedom, opportunity, human happiness. They have a mortal fear that this knowledge will penetrate eventually to their own people and to all others in the world."

Free Enterprise

"A capitalist, far from being someone to condemn, in this county is one who by his own efforts in the past has made it possible for this county to be what it is today."

SECURITY

"If all that Americans want is security, then they can go to prison. They'll have enough to eat, a bed and a roof over their heads. But if an American wants to preserve his dignity and his equality as a human being, he must not bow his neck to any dictatorial government."

"IKE" Wants You To Know

Moreover, circumstances change particular applications—they do not change principles, basic character and purposes."

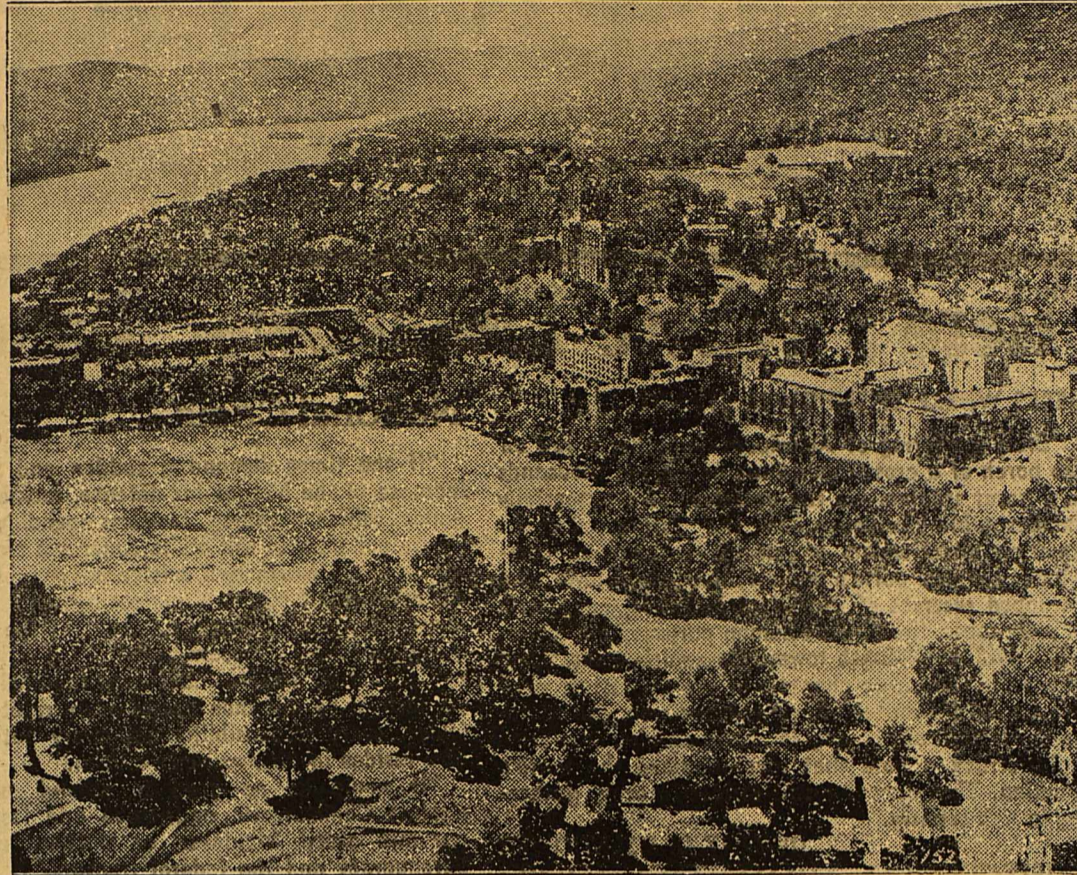

ON THESE HISTORIC HIGHLANDS AT WEST POINT-ON-HUDSON the U. S. Military Academy was founded 150 years ago. During the observance of the sesquicentennial visitors will be welcomed, and the military reservation, embracing some 15,000 acres, will be open to inspection. It includes Revolutionary forts, oldtime buildings and newer structures, the Museum, the Library and mementoes of scores of America's military leaders. The martial music and the cadets' parades will stir patriotic souls!

The Military Academy was authorized by Act of Congress March 16, 1802, and established at West Point, a key Hudson River fortress where General Washington with his patriot army held the British in check during the American Revolution. It was opened July 4, 1802, with five officers and 10 cadets. In 1950-51 the strength of the Corps was 2,496 cadets and a post garrison of more than 1,400 men and a military band.

Washington and his officers urged the establishment of a school for military training before American independence had been won, and, when the government was formed under the Constitution, President Washington aroused his countrymen to prompt action. The garrison site at West Point, consisting of 1,795 acres, was purchased in 1790. It has been occupied by the Army since 1778, and hence the barracks and other buildings, while inadequate, were available for the launching of the new institution. Major Johnathan Williams, grand-nephew of Benjamin Franklin, was appointed first superintendent. The threat of war with England in 1812 impelled Congress to increase the corps of cadets to 250, and the record shows that those early graduates served their country well—a quarter of more than 100 young officers who saw action in the War of 1812 were killed or wounded.

Col. Sylvanus Thayer, a graduate of the Academy in 1808 and a distinguished officer in the War of 1812, was superintendent from 1817 till 1833 and is known as the "Father of the Military Academy." His ideal was to produce trained men who would be worthy military leaders. A statute to his memory stands on the Academy grounds where his remains are interred.

Ham Stuffed Onions
4 large sweet onions
2 tablespoons ham drippings
1-3 cup celery, diced
1 tablespoon parsley, minced
1 cup cooked ham, ground
Salt and pepper
Vegetable stock (onion)

Peel onions and remove tops. Simmer in salted water until almost tender; drain. Remove the centers without disturbing outer layers. Chop centers. Melt 2 tablespoons drippings in skillet; add the minced onion, celery, and parsley. Cook a few minutes, add bread crumbs, ground ham, salt, pepper. Moisten with

vegetable stock-water in which onions cooked-mix well. Fill onion shells. Bake in covered pan in a moderate oven (350 Deg. F.) for 30 minutes. Remove the cover the last few minutes of baking so the onions will brown. Serves 4.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

G - I realize that, since the GI Bill cut-off date is past, I'm not allowed to change courses except for certain reasons. But does this restriction also apply to changing schools, where no course change is involved?

A - No. So long as your progress and conduct are satisfactory and the new school will give you credit for the work you've already completed, you may change schools without changing the course.

Q - I intend to buy a house with a GI loan. Where do I get the necessary forms to fill out?

A - Lenders generally have the forms and other necessary papers, and will find them out for veterans. If your lender does not have the forms, you may obtain them from your nearest VA regional office.

Q - I've just been discharged from the Army with a service-connected disability. However, I never served outside the United States. Would I be eligible for Public Law 16 training, even though I was never actually in Korea?

A - Yes, provided you meet all the requirements of the law: a discharge other than dishonorable, a compensable service-connected disability, and a need for training to overcome your handicap. The disability may have incurred any place in the world; not necessarily

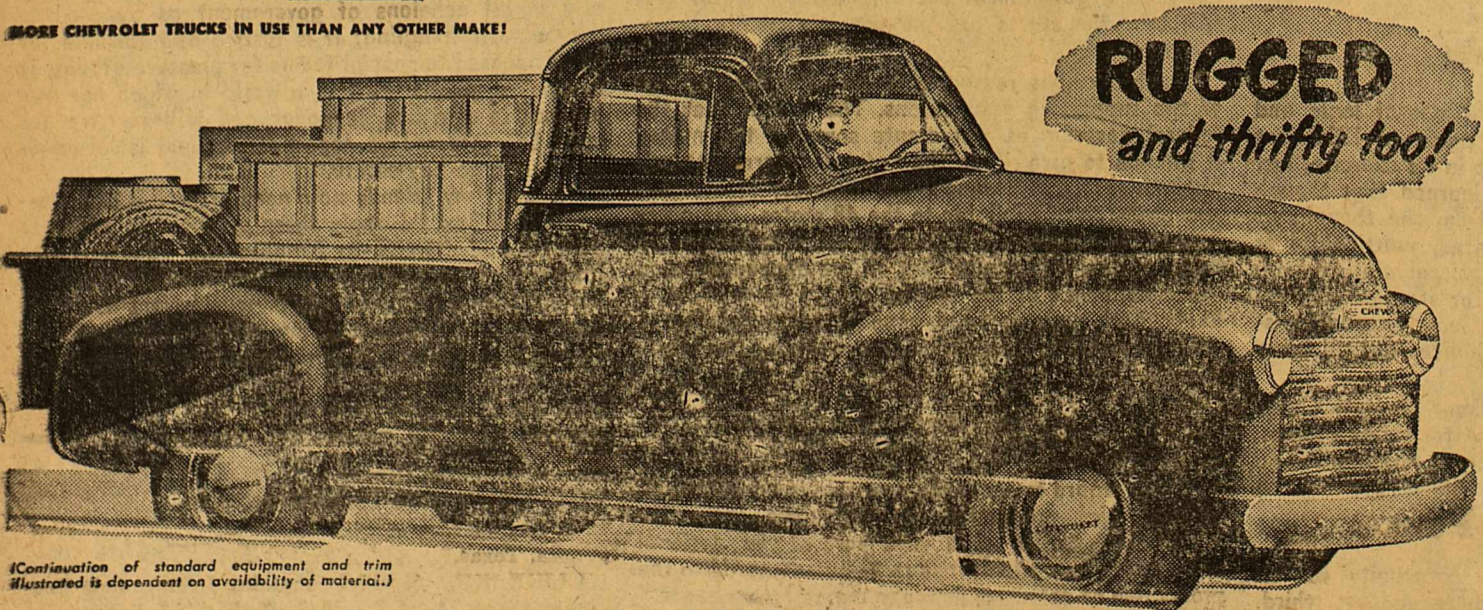

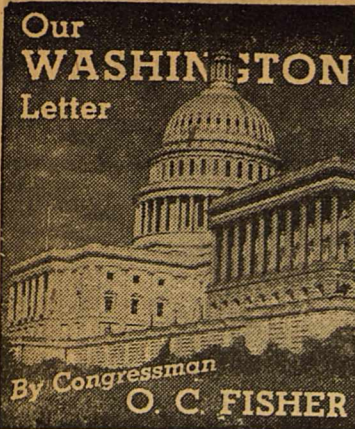

AN ECONOMY-MINDED house last week concluded action on another of the annual appropriation bills for the fiscal year which begins next July 1.

Thus far, a total of \$6 and one-half billion has been whacked from the President's requests. Three major money bills remain to be disposed of, including the one on mutual security and foreign aid. The latter will undoubtedly be whittled down in several respects.

Last year our economy bloc in the House fairly successful, but more cooperation is noticeable this year from Members who previously hesitated to lend a hand in our retrenchment program.

For some time I have been a member of this so-called Southern Economy Bloc. We hold weekly meetings, study budget estimates, appropriation bills, hearings, reports, etc., and then concentrate

on amendments which we think are sound and proper and to the best interests of the taxpayers.

Cuts were made last week which would knock out about 100,000 requested civilian jobs in the Defense Department. We are convinced there is a lot of belt-tightening that can be done in that as well as other Departments without adversely affecting our defense program.

Our group is made up of Southern Democrats who are willing to buck the Administration pressures when we are convinced a proposed expenditure is not justified. When amendments are offered on the Floor, to reduce costs, we appeal to all Members, whether Democrat or Republican, for support. We have been fairly successful in these concentrated efforts.

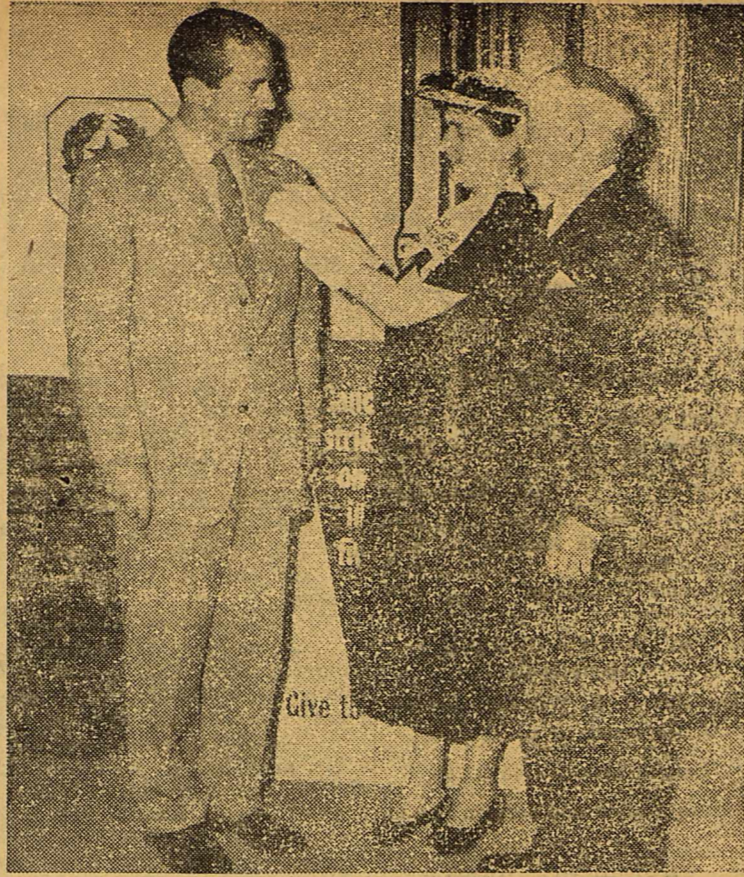
Our goal is a balanced budget. We may not achieve it this year but we are moving in that direction.

PRESIDENT'S SEIZURE

The President's action in seizing the steel mills has caused much concern with respect to its legality. It is widely feared that if a President has the authority under the Constitution to seize steel mills, he could seize any other business concern if from his viewpoint he thought it was the thing to do. It is conceivable that by the abuse of such alleged authority, a President could take over a good part of private business in America and completely change our free enterprise system.

it can legally be done in this instance, then it might be done with even less restraint at some time in the future.

Under the Taft-Hartley law, the President is given authority by the Congress to cope with national emergencies such as was presented in the steel dispute. He could appoint a fact-finding board, then follow with an injunction which would defer the strike for 80 additional days during which the mediation service already set up would go into action. He has, however, made use of the 80-day cooling off period provision on two prior occasions against John L. Lewis, and both time the disputes were settled during the 80-day period.

Another serious complaint about the President's recent action is that he undertakes in this way to force not only a 26c wage increase but also the union shop upon the workers and the steel industries over the country.

In other words, the effect of his action has tended to force all steel employees into unions and the acceptance of a union shop by each

steel industry without the employer, the unions, or the individual workers being consulted.

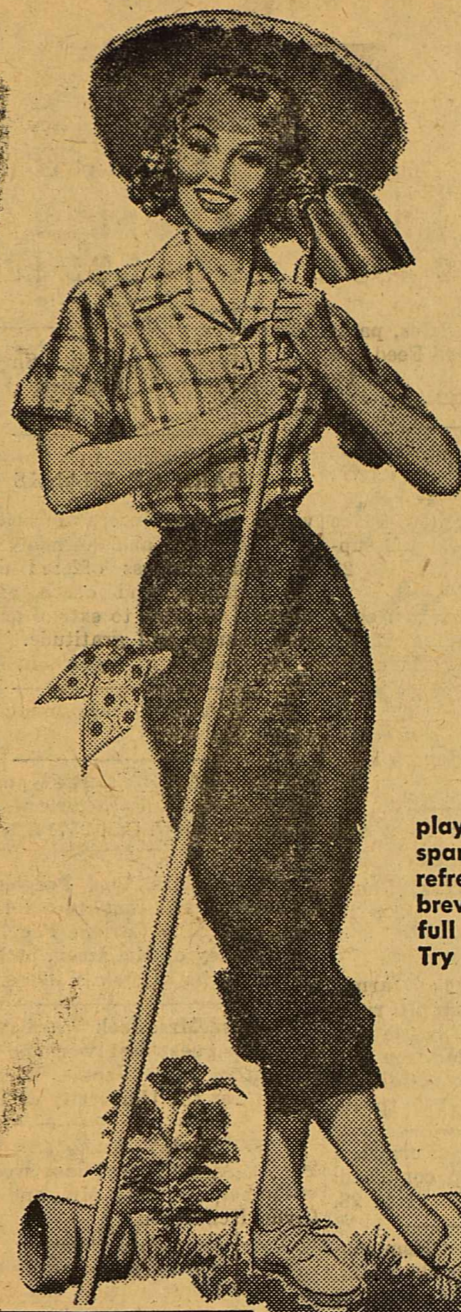
If the President had invoked the Taft-Hartley law - as he had a legal right to do - and had suspended and strike for the 80-day period, under the Taft-Hartley law each member of a union working for a particular company, would have had a right to vote for or against accepting the terms of an offer by the employer before a strike could be called. If a majority of the workers should, in that case, decide to accept the offer, the issue would be settled. But they would rarely get that chance unless the Taft-Hartley law is invoked. A steel worker in Pittsburg was quoted the other day as saying:

"If they would give us a chance to vote on a settlement, there would be some red faces in union headquarters."
