Funeral Services For Mrs. Dee Word Held Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. Dee Word, 62, Sutton County ranchwoman, were held here Tuesday afternoon from the First Methodist Church. Burial was in Sonora Cemetery. The Rev. W. H. Marshall officiated. Mrs. Word died at Hudsph Memorial Hospital Monday morning. She had been ill for the past four months.

Born Mary Sharp on November 6, 1889, in McCullough County, Mrs. Word first came to Sutton County with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Sharp in 1894, settling on what is now the L. P. Bloodworth ranch. The family's first home in Sonora was at the present site of the News office.

Though she lived most of her life here, Mrs. Word also lived for short periods of time in New Braunfels, Metzton and San Angelo. She made her home on the Word ranch 20 miles west of here 20 years ago.

A member of the Methodist Church since the age of 5, Mrs. Word taught Sunday School here many years and filled several offices in the Women's Society of Christian Service, of which she was a lifetime member and past president.

Survivors include her husband; a sister, Mrs. Bessie Campbell of Oklahoma City; three daughters, Mrs. Scott Roberts of Alpine, Mrs. C. W. Blaylock of Houston, and Mrs. M. M. Rutland of Houston; and five grandchildren.

Ozona Quarter Horse Show Slated May 31

A big downtown western parade in Ozona, Texas on May 30 at 4 o'clock will kick-off the Third Annual Ozona Registered Quarter Horse Show being held this year on May 31 at the Ozona Fairgrounds. Sponsored by the County Sheriff's Posse, the show will consist of seven halter classes and a cutting and reining contest.

Each of the champions in the performance classes will be awarded a \$250 saddle. Quarter horse trophies, rosettes, and ribbons will be awarded all winners of the show.

First-go-rounds in the cutting horse contest is scheduled for 10 o'clock on May 31. Halter classes will be judged beginning at 1 o'clock. The reining contest, halter class champions, and finals in the cutting horse contest will be judged at 8 o'clock.

Both matched and jackpot calf roping is scheduled for nights of May 30 and 31. Featured in the roping events is a twelve calf matched roping between John D. Holleyman of Ozona and Buddy Groff of Bandera. Each will rope six calves on the nights of May 30 and 31, with the winner taking home a nice purse in cash.

Ministers of all denominations throughout the South and Southwest have been invited to take part in the observance of Soil Stewardship Sunday, Local pastors extend a cordial invitation to members and friends to attend the services of the church of their choice Sunday, May 18.

The setting aside of one Sunday each year as a special day for remembering our God-given responsibility as steward of the soil was first observed in many sections of the Southwest several years ago. FARM AND RANCH-SOUTHERN AGRICULTURISTS, in cooperation with local pastures and soil conservation district supervisors, has been instrumental in establishing this observance, both through its editorial support and personal work done by members of its editorial staff.

This year a more widespread observance of Soil Stewardship Sunday has been planned, and Sunday, May 18, has been designated as the Sunday when pastors of churches will devote at least one sermon to the relation of our soil to the people and the church.

Through work of the Soil Conservation Districts, thousands of acres of range and farm land has been reclaimed and made to produce abundantly again. Good soil produces good crops, good food means a healthy, prosperous people. It is the duty of every person to encourage soil conservation. They every future of our country depends

upon how the soil is handled. Food crops produced on rich soil have more nutritive value in minerals and vitamins than do crops produced on worn-out land.

Our WASHINGTON Letter
By Congressman **O. C. FISHER**

THE TIDELANDS ISSUE was advanced one step further toward a show-down last week when the House and Senate conferees agreed upon a bill which compromised the differences between the House and Senate versions of the legislation. The House passed its bill a year ago by a vote of 265 to 109, and the Senate acted on a somewhat similar measure a month ago, by closer vote of 50 to 35.

Under terms of the conference agreement, Texas is given its full title to its off-shore lands for a distance of 10 1/2 miles along our entire seacoast. Other States which border the sea are given a quitclaim to the land that extend 3 miles seaward. The Texas case is different because of our boundary agreement when we entered the union.

This agreement is a major victory for Texas, although we are faced with a possible Presidential veto. If that occurs, the House will it is generally agreed, to able to override with the necessary two-thirds. In the Senate, however, the vote will be closer and the chances of getting the two thirds is in doubt but not necessarily hopeless.

There is some talk going round up here, wholly unconfirmed, that President Truman may not veto this bill, despite the fact that he vetoed one we passed three years ago. The gossip is that he may allow this one to become law and thereby avoid having Tidelands an issue in the Presidential election this Fall. It will be recalled that General Eisenhower has already come out in favor of confirming title in tidelands in the States, and it may be that the political leaders would like to avoid having this featured as a major issue in Texas,

Results Of Raam Progeny Tests To Be Given At Station Field Day

The fourth annual Sonora Experiment Station ram progeny test field day will be conducted Saturday. About 220 registered rams of five breeds and from 20 breeders have been fed out in this test to evaluate sires by the feedlot performance of some of their progeny.

The morning will be devoted to inspection of rams and their records by visitors. The 4-H Club will serve lunch, after which the program will begin.

Dr. J. C. Miller, head of the Texas A. & M. Animal Husbandry dept. will describe the work during the last four years, the overall objectives and results obtained so far. Later he will lead a panel discussion.

Breeds represented in this year's tests are Rambouillet, Delaine, Corriedale, Columbia and Suffolk. The rams were fed 224 days, during which time they were weighed each month. At the end of the period they were shorn and the fleeces scoured. Figures will be available on the clean wool production, staple length and weight gain of each animal in the test.

Soften yeast in water. Scald milk. Add sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Add 1 cup flour. Mix well. Add softened yeast, egg and lemon rind. Beat well. Add enough more flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until smooth and satiny. Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise in warm place until doubled (about 1 1/2 hours). When light, punch down. Let rest 10 minutes. Pat or roll out to a rectangular sheet

about 1/2-inch thick, and three times as long as it is wide. Brush with melted butter or margarine and spread with brown sugar and cinnamon. Roll up like jelly roll, sealing the ends. With scissors cut through ring almost to center, in slices about 1-inch thick. Turn each slice slightly, lifting every other one to the center of the ring. Let rise until doubled. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) about 25 minutes. When cool, frost with confectioners' sugar icing. Makes 1 French Coffee Ring.

One Spanking Should Be Enough

Great souls learn great lessons from small events. We lesser fry should reflect upon this fact, and endeavor to extract from our experience the lesson that it is certain to contain.

Nothing can happen to you unless it finds some kind of correspondence in your own mentality, and it follows from this that every seeming misfortune is but a signal of something wrong within.
