



Soften yeast in water. Scald milk. Add sugar, salt and short-ening. Cool to lukewarm. Add 1 cup flour. Mix well. Add softened yeast, egg and lemon rind. Beat well. Add enough more flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until smooth and satiny. Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise in warm place until doubled (about 1¹/₂ hours). When light, punch nown. Let rest 10 minutes. Pat or
