Bovina Will Play Six-Man Football

Bovina High School has been placed in six-man football for the next two-year period, after requesting the UIL to move them into that category.

The Mustangs will compete in a football district composed of themselves along with Amherst, Cotton Center, Lazbuddie, Three Way and Texline.

"This was really a tough decision, but we felt that for the kids' sake we needed to go that route," said Superintendent of Schools Bob Owen. If a school's high school enrollment is under 95, they may play six-man football.

Owen said that Bovina's current high school enrollment was 81. However, the seventh and eighth grade classes are 40 or more apiece, so the two-years of six man may be Bovina's limit, since the current junior and senior classes are small.

The junior high will continue to play eleven-man football, with the idea that in 1990, the next realignment year, Bovina may have to go back to 11 man.

Coach Bill Talley pointed out that he would have 14 boys back from this year's high school squad, plus 13 eighth graders. "I feel we

could have competed, but some of the boys wanted to play six man, and they decided to go for it," said Coach Bill Talley.

The change will be drastic for Talley, who says he hasn't even seen a six-man football game, except on film.

For basketball purposes, Bovina will compete in an altogether different district alignment for the next two years. They will be in District 5-A, consisting of themselves, Springlake-Earth, Happy, Kress, Lazbuddie and Nazareth.

One thing for certain, the last year's record for the Mustangs in 11-man football can't be called shabby, being the best in the school's history at 8-3, including a playoff appearance.

"I feel real proud of our accomplishments, and hope we have achieved what they wanted us to when we came to Bovina," Talley said.

A non-district football schedule will be arranged as soon as games may be legally contracted. The Mustangs may have to do some travelling for non-district six-man games.

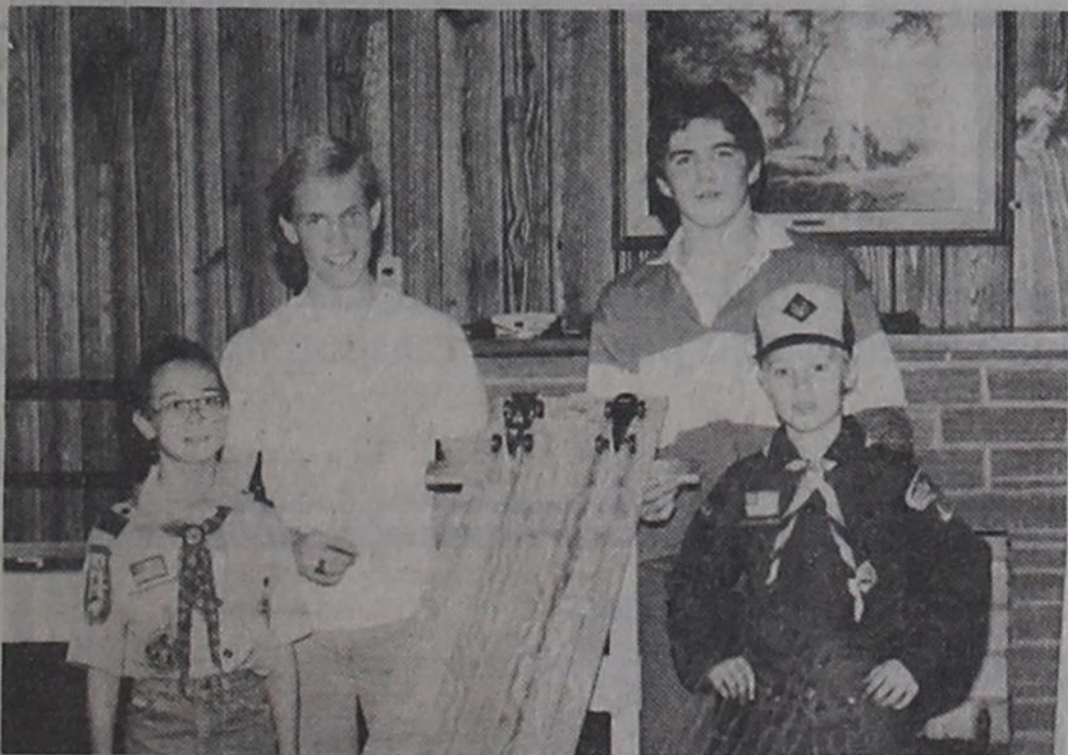

Howard Kelso underwent surgery for cataracts on one of his eyes. He had the surgery one morning and was able to go home soon after lunch. He is getting along real well.

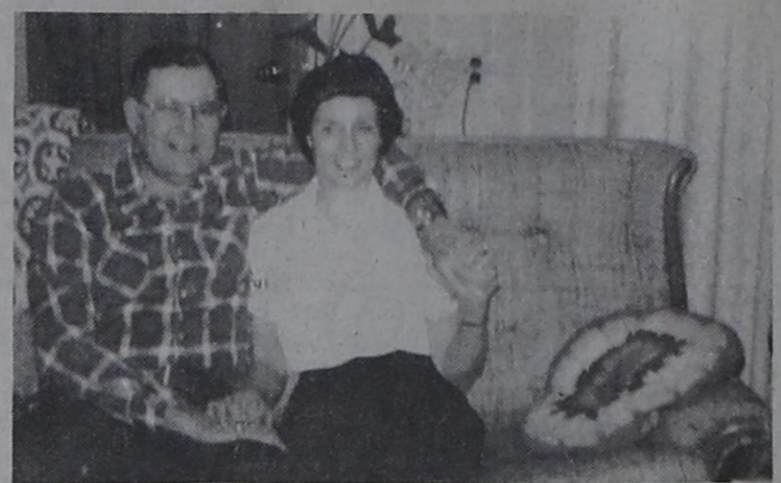

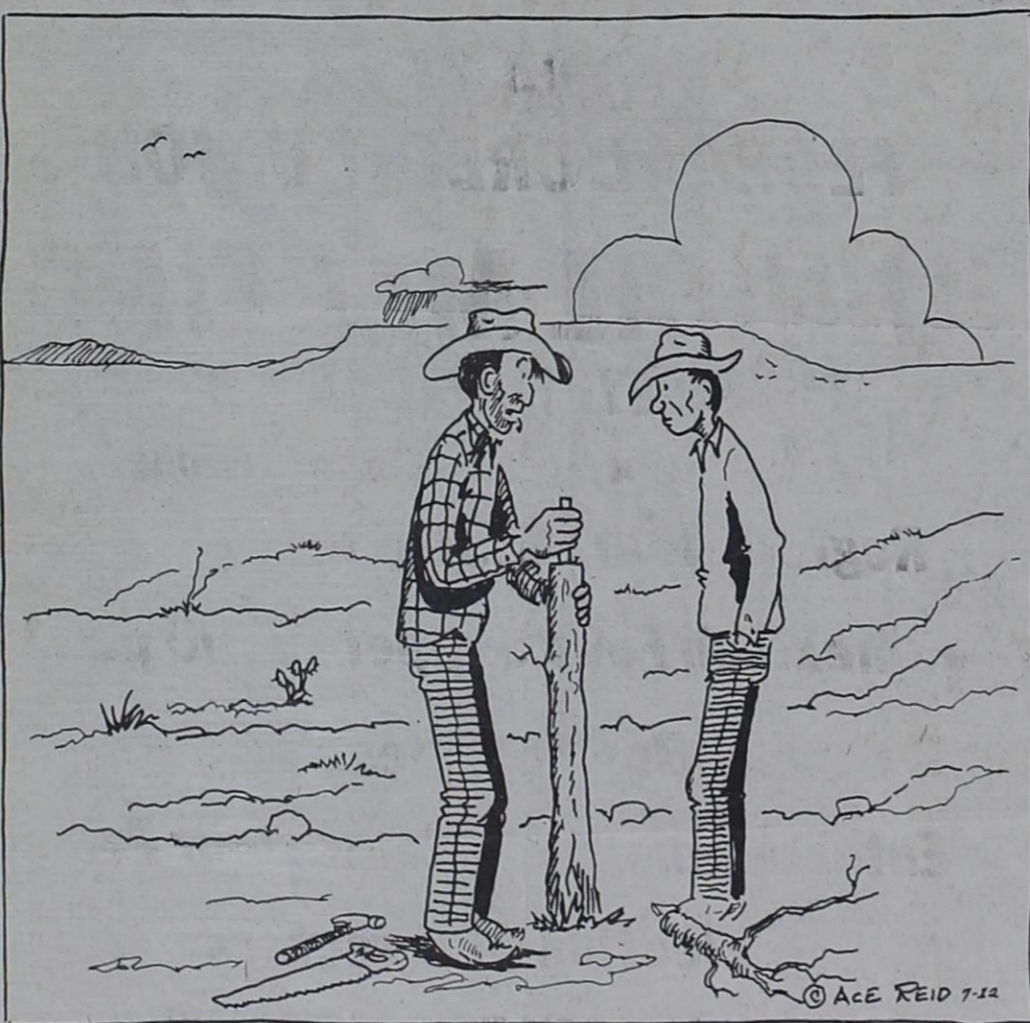

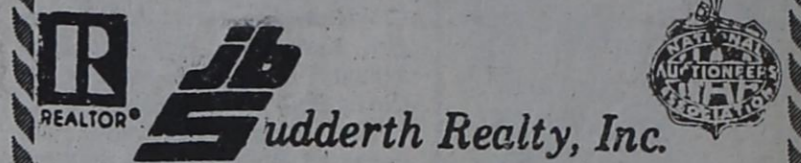
