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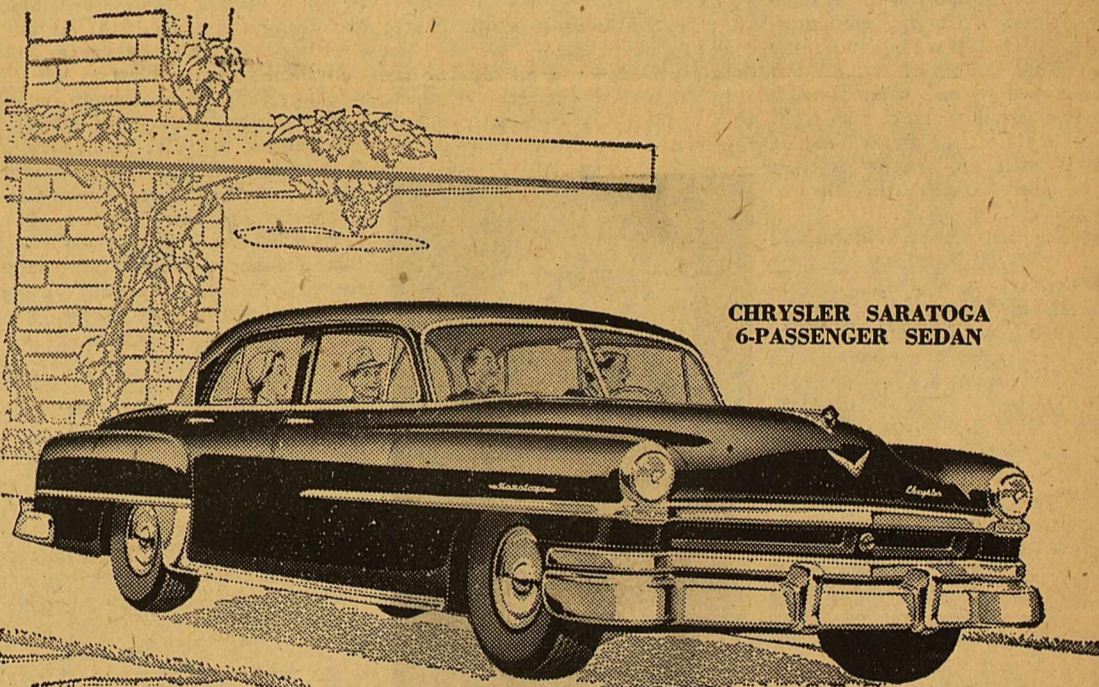

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NOTICE OF ROAD BOND ELECTION COUNTY OF SUTTON TO THE RESIDENT PROPERTY TAXPAYING QUALIFIED VOTERS OF SUTTON COUNTY, TEXAS: TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 12th day of July, 1952, at the places, in the manner, and on the proposition set forth in the attached copy of an ORDER FOR BOND ELECTION, duly entered by the Commissioners' Court of Sutton County, Texas, on the 9th day of June, 1952. Said attached ORDER FOR BOND ELECTION is made a part of this notice for all intents and purposes.

McKinney County Clerk, Sutton County, Texas ORDER FOR ROAD BOND ELECTION COUNTY OF SUTTON On this the 9th day of June, 1952, the Commissioners Court of Sutton County, Texas, convened in regular session at the regular meeting place thereof at the Courthouse in Sonora, Texas, with the following members of the Court present, to-wit:

and the following absent: None, constituting a quorum, and among other proceedings, passed the following order:

There came on to be considered the petition of Cleve Jones, Jr. and 55 other persons asking that an election be ordered upon the question of issuing bonds of Sutton County, Texas, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining, operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof in said County.

It appearing to the satisfaction of the Court that said petition is signed by more than 50 of the resident property taxpaying qualified voters of Sutton County, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation and is otherwise in conformity with law. It further appearing to the Court that the amount of the bonds to be issued not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of Sutton County, Texas.

It further appearing to the Court that it is advisable to issue said bonds and that said petition should be granted, and said election as prayed for shall be ordered: THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF SUTTON COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held in said County on the 12th day of July, 1952, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this Order, at which election, in accordance with said petition, the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident property taxpaying qualified voters of said County for their action thereupon:

PROPOSITION "Whether or not the bonds of said Sutton County shall be issued in the amount of \$75,000.00 bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 4% per annum, and maturing at such times as may be fixed by said Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed twenty years from date, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining, and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof; and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied and collected on all taxable property in said Sutton County for the current year and annually thereafter while said bonds or any of them are outstanding sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and to pay the principal thereof as the same becomes due."

That said election shall be held at the following places in said County and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

1. Election Precinct No. 1, at County Court House, in Sonora, Texas, with L. P. Bloodworth as Presiding Judge, and W. F. Berger and Clerks.
2. Election Precinct No. 2, at Sonora Wool Warehouse, in Sonora, Texas, with Collier Shurley as Presiding Judge, and Mrs. Mamie Awalt and Clerks.
3. Election Precinct No. 3, at Cedar Hill School House, in Sutton County, Texas, with Miss Carmen Warren as Presiding Judge, and Oscar Adams and Clerks.
4. Election Precinct No. 4, at the John Reiley ranch in the Owensville, Community, in Sutton County, Texas, with Melvin Shroyer as Presiding Judge, and Jo W. Hard-

graves and Clerks.

5. Election Precinct No. 5, at Humble Pipeline Station B, in Sutton County, Texas, with Mrs. F. M. Ballard as Presiding Judge, and Mrs. J. D. Brodnax and Clerks.

The ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF" "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF" Each voter shall vote on the proposition hereby submitted by placing an X in the square beside said voter may scratch or mark the expression of his choice, or out one of said expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the General Election Laws of this State, except as modified by the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22, Vernon's Annotated Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, Revision of 1925, as amended and none but resident property taxpaying qualified voters of said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote at said election.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this Order in a newspaper published in said County for three successive weeks prior to said election. In addition thereto, a copy of this order shall be posted in four public places in said County, one of which shall be the courthouse door, at least three weeks prior to the date of said election.

The County Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to cause said notice to be published and posted as herein above directed and further orders are reserved until the returns of said election are made by the duly authorized election officials and received by this Court.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that same do pass. Thereupon, the ques-

tion being called for, the following members of the Court voted AYE: D. L. Locklin, Dan Cauthorn, Aldie Garrett, Dantes Reiley; and the following members voted NO: none.

### GETTYSBURG ADDRESS, 1952 VERSION—

One score and nineteen years ago our fathers brought forth upon this nation a new tax, conceived in desperation and dedicated to the proposition that all men are fair game. Now we are engaged in a great mass of calculations, testing whether this taxpayer or any taxpayer so confused and so impoverished can long endure.

We are met on Form 1940. We have come to dedicate a large portion of our income to a final resting place with those men who here spend their lives that they may spend our money. It is altogether anguish and torture that we do this. But in a large sense, we cannot evade, we cannot cheat, we cannot underestimate this tax. The collectors, clever and sly, who computed here, have gone far beyond our poor power to add and subtract.

Our creditors will little note nor long remember what we pay here, but the Bureau of Internal Revenue can never forget what we report here.

It is not for us, the taxpayers, to question the tax which the government has thus far so nobly spent. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these vanishing dollars we take increased devotion to the few remaining; that we here highly resolve that next year will not find us in a higher income bracket; that this taxpayer, underpaid, shall figure out more deductions; and that this tax of the people, by the Congress, for the government, shall not cause solvency to perish.

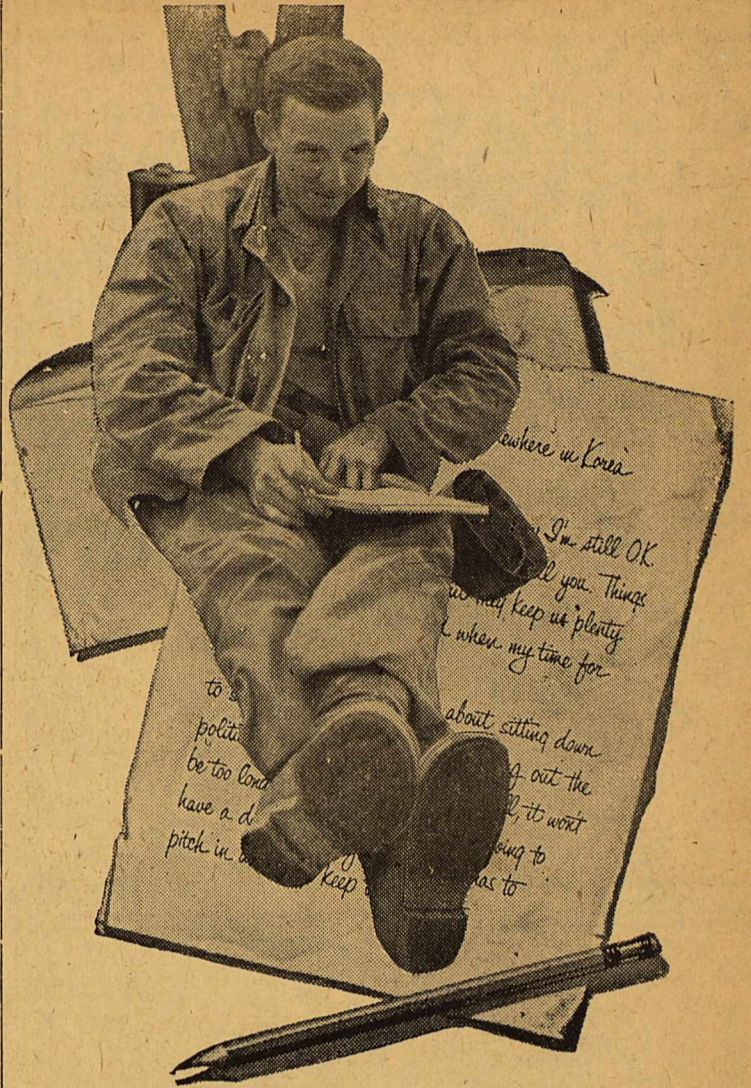
