The Importance Of Your Vote

Reprinted from July, 1952, Farm and Ranch Magazine

Dr. George Benson, president of Harding College, Searcy, Arkansas, tells a true story illustrative of the power of a single vote. According to Dr. Benson, on an election day in Indiana in 1844 a miller decided that he did not have time to vote. However, some friends persuaded him to go to the polls. He cast his vote for a man running for the legislature and that man won by one vote. Later, the legislature or general assembly as it is called in the Hoosier State, was voting for a United States Senator. The man who won his seat in the general assembly by one vote cast the deciding vote which sent Edwin Allen Hannegan to the United States Senate. When the Senate was voting on the question of whether or not Texas should be admitted to the Union, Senator Hannegan was president pro tem and was presiding. The vote in the Senate was a tie, and Senator Hannegan was called upon to cast the deciding vote. He voted in favor of admitting Texas to the Union. Thus the miller's vote which he almost failed to cast was responsible for Texas becoming an important part of the United States. It can be truthfully said that this one vote changed the course of





By observing the following simple suggestions, the juror may be sure he is maintaining the highest of ethics, in which no possible fault may be found by others:

Hold yourself aloof from all persons (except other jurors) in any way connected with the trial of the case. That means that you should not mingle with nor talk to the lawyers, witnesses, parties, nor the judge, even though the discussion is wholly unrelated to the trial.

Do not discuss the case nor permit others to mention it to you or in your presence during the trial. anyone insists upon talking about the case after you have explained to him that you are a juror and must not listen, report the matter to the judge immediate-

Do not commence your deliberations until you have heard all the evidence from both sides, the argument of the lawyers, and the court's charge. You should not mention the case except in the jury room when all other jurors are present

Do not become a private investigator. All properly admissible evidence will be brought before you. Do not try to search out additional facts you believe to have been omit

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controvesial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out of the law.

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)





An undulant fever patient suffers from chilly sensations, or severe shaking chills, sweats, and high fever. The patient loses weight and becomes weak. If the illness is of mild type, the patient may find it hard to remain in bed, but if he tries to keep on with his work he finds he has not sufficient energy.

Symptoms often continue for a number of weeks before recovery occurs. Fortunately undulant fever has a low death rate. Body temperature may reach a higher mark each day than the day before for some time, and then gradually return to normal over a period of several days. Fever may be absent for some days and come back again in the same way as before, registering higher each day and then gradually going lower. The patient's temperature chart will resemble smooth waves or undulations. The appearance of the temperature cure in typical cases has given this disease the name undulant fever.

Undulant fever is one of the infections diseases known to be transmitted from animals to human beings. In hogs and cows, the germ produces a great economic loss because it causes contagious abortion. When this same germ invades the human body, the resulting disease is undulant fever. Prevention is dependent upon (1) eradication of the disease in farm animals, (2) careful pasteurization of dairy products, and (3) avoidance, in so far as possible, of direct contact with infected animals.



HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE

STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Contitution of the State of Texas be amended y adding thereto a new Section to be nown as Section 50a which shall read as, sillows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State as an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment pro-

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall tissue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

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





AUSTIN, July 17—Dr. Herbert T. Wagner, Director of Hospital Services and Dr. Louis G. Llewelyn, Regional Medical Consultant of the Nationaal Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, are presently visiting various treatment centers for polio patients in the state.

Their itinerary includes Dallas, Abilene, Tyler, Austin, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Brownville, Harlingen, Gayveston, Beaumont and Houston, where they will consult with hospital administrators, physicians and health authorities on most effectively meeting the problems caused by the high incidence of polio within the state.

Dr. Wagner stated that as of July 5th, there had been 16 physical therapists and 47 nurses recruited for epidemic services, which reflects one of the problems we are facing.

Dr. Llewelyn and Dr. Wagner commended and heartily endorsed the trend toward treating milder forms of the disease at home. They added that such a course of treatment is often more beneficial for the patien
