Hardeman Reviews Proposed Amendments

Once again Texans are called upon to pass upon proposals to change their basic law.

One of such proposals is an amendment to the Constitution creating a State Medical Education Board and establishing a fund out of which "grants, loans and scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State" may be made.

We are all interested in providing adequate medical care and facilities, at reasonable expense, for the people of Texas. While the worthy motives of this proposal are appreciated, still, it is fraught with some aspects which suggest its undesirability.

For one thing, it adds another board to the numerous boards, commissions and bureaus presently supported by the taxpayers, either by direct appropriations or from the proceeds of the sale of various and sundry licenses, permits or stickers for the privilege of simply engaging in legitimate business endeavors within the State to gain a livelihood.

The proposal would authorize "grants, loans or scholarships" out of the general revenue fund to "students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas." This would revoke and repeal, to that extent, a long standing constitutional provision which forbids appropriations of public funds for "private or individual purposes." (Art. 16, Sec. 6, Const. of Texas.) Also, its adoption would contravene the provision forbidding the "giving or lending of the credit of a State in aid of, or to any person," or the pledging of "the credit of the State in any manner whatsoever, for the payment of the liabilities, present

REMODELING COMPLETE FOR ELLIOTT SCHOOL

Opening day for this year's school has been set for Thursday, September 4, according to A. E. Brodhead, superintendent. Registration for high school students will be held before this date and the schedule will be announced next week.

The new teacherage, erected at a cost of about \$30,000, will be ready for occupancy soon. It is located next to the teacherage built about three years ago.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

Q - I'm a Korean veteran and I want to go to school this fall under the new Korean GI Bill. May I attend any school that was approved by my State for World War II veterans?

A - No. A school must be State approved for training under the new GI Bill, before you may enroll. Approval granted under the World War II GI Bill does not carry over, under the law, because in many cases schools are required to meet different standards than in the past.

Q - I'd like to take a single course in school this fall under the Korean GI Bill. It would be for less than half-time. How large an educational allowance would I get?

A - You would receive either (1) the established charges for tuition and fees which all students taking the same course must pay,

or (2) a prorated amount based on \$110 a month for a full-time course. You would be paid whichever amount is the lesser.

Q - I am a World War II veteran and I've recently gone back on active duty. I have never used any of my GI loan entitlement. Which GI loan deadline applies to me: July 25, 1957, under the World War II GI Bill, or 10 years after the present emergency, under the Korean GI Bill?

A - The Korean GI Bill deadline applies to you. You will have 10 years from the end of the current emergency to make use of your GI loan benefit.

Q - Are loans made under the Korean GI Bill subject to the down payment requirements of the Defense Production Act?

A - Yes. The down payment requirements of the Defense Production Act apply to GI loans made under the new Korean GI Bill in the same way that they apply to loans made under the

French Fried Rice

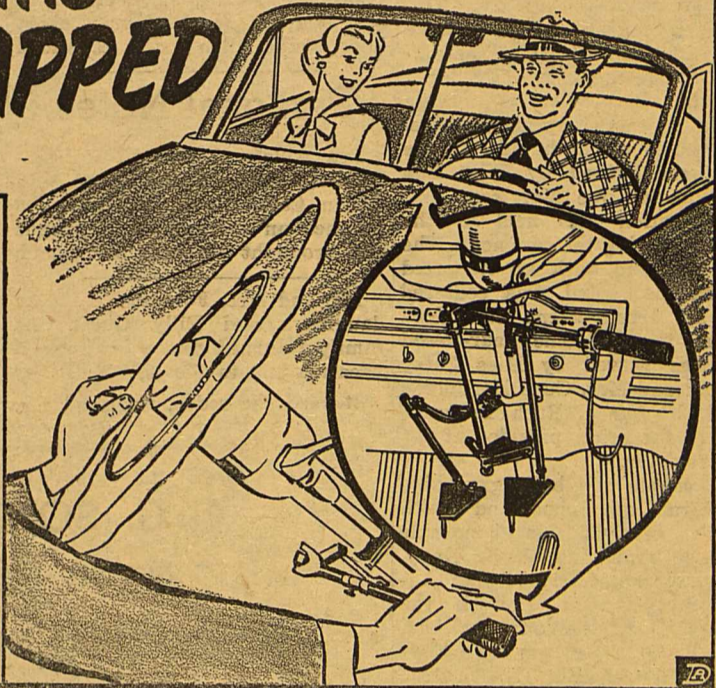
1 cup uncooked rice
1 teaspoon salt
2 cups cold water
For cooking rice—Place the ingredients in a 2 quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat low as possible. Cover saucepan with a tight fitting lid and leave over low heat for fourteen minutes. Do not remove lid nor stir rice while it is cooking. Turn off the heat, remove lid, and allow steam to escape as the rice cools.

For frying rice—Place two tablespoons cooked rice (more if a large container is used) in a fine mesh basket or strainer. Fry in deep fat, 375 deg. F., until a light golden brown, about 2½ minutes. Drain the rice on absorbent paper.

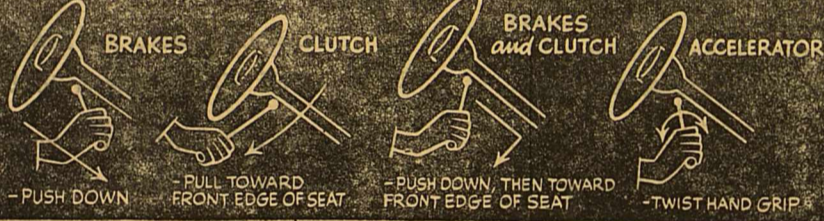

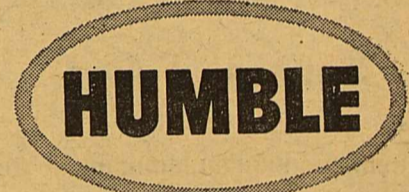

**ZONING ORDINANCES,
RESTRICTIVE COVENANTS
LIMIT USE OF PROPERTY**
Ownership of property does not carry with it the right of unlimited use of the premises. Certain restrictions upon the use of real estate have been handed down to us through the ages. These restrictions, relatively small in number, exist by reason of custom. The

prime example of such a restriction is that a person cannot maintain a nuisance upon his premises. With the growth of cities and the increasing importance and value of real estate, it became important to change and add to these age old restrictions. It was found necessary that certain operations on real estate that would be regarded as nuisances in a residential area must have a place in the city where they would not be nuisances. At the same time, they should be prohibited from existing in a locality where they would be not only a nuisance but where they would detract from the value of the other property in the neighborhood. This change and addition has been accomplished largely by two methods: (1) Zoning and other Statutes and Ordinances (2) Restrictive Covenants. The latter are usually placed upon a tract of land by the person who is subdividing

and developing it as an addition to the city. It is important for the house buyer to find out exactly how these two types of restrictions affect his property. What zoning ordinances are in effect upon his property and the property in the neighborhood? What restrictive covenants are in force in the subdivision of which his land is a part? If the buyer doesn't have the answer to these questions before he signs the contract of sale, the contract should contain a provision giving him the right to discover the answer and decide whether he wants the property in view of his discovery. An illustration may serve to emphasize the importance of zoning ordinances and restrictive covenants.

Jones moves into his new house and wants Uncle John to live with him. In order to persuade Uncle John, Jones commences building an addition to the house in the form of a bedroom and kitchenette. An enterprising neighbor soon informs Jones that he is violating the restrictive covenants of the subdivision by placing the addition too close to the property line. Jones ignores his neighbor and a city inspector soon appears, who not only verifies the neighbor's assertion but also tells Jones that his block is zoned for single residential dwellings. Also, the restrictive covenants have the same provision. Jones retreats until he sees a store building being erected on a corner lot almost directly across the street from his property. He proceeds to give the inspector a piece of his mind about commercial enterprises ruining a nice residential area. The Jones discovers that the lot in question is zoned for business. Furthermore, since it is not within the same subdivision as his house, it is not subject to the covenant restricting the land to single residential dwellings.

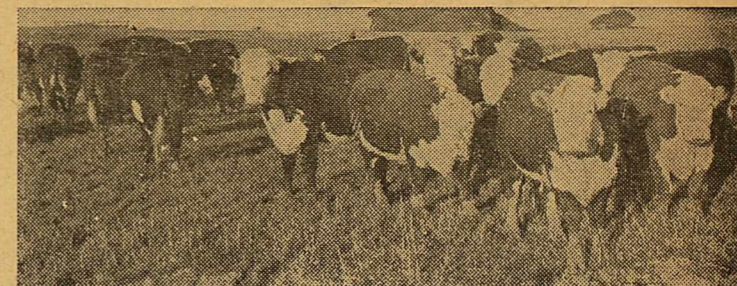

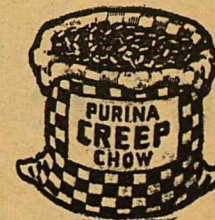

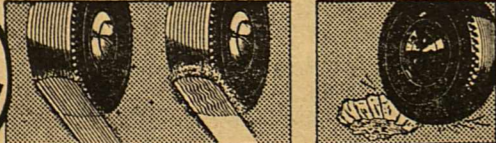

YOUR HEALTH

Dr. Geo W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges the parents of all children who will respond to the school bell for the first time in September to be sure the child is physically ready for school duties. "First and foremost is the need for vaccination against smallpox. Parents should see that children are vaccinated before they are one year of age; however if not done previously, at school age vaccination becomes absolutely necessary," Dr. Cox said. "If your child has not been vaccinated, have it done immediately for his own protection and that of others."

Immunization against diptheria is also highly important, Dr. Cox declares. This disease which causes serious illness and deaths among young children can be prevented with toxoid. The child who has never been protected should be given this safeguard against a dreaded killing disease. Even though he may have been immunized as a baby, doctors and health officers usually recommend an additional dose of toxoid to strengthen immunity before entrance into school.

"In addition, before you send your child to school you are urged to take him to your family physician and dentist for a thorough examination," Dr. Cox adds. "You will want to know that he is in good physical condition and can compete with the other children on equal terms. If the check-up reveals any weakness or defects they should be corrected at once. Don't let your child start his school with any avoidable handicap."

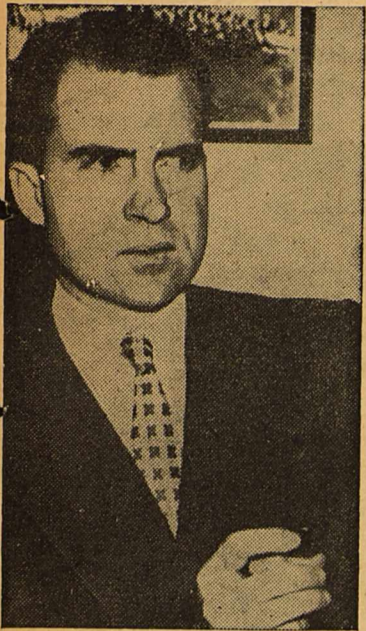

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows: "Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

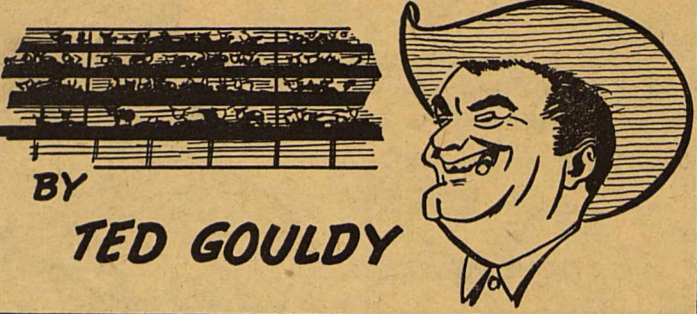
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK

Ft. Worth—Nearly 11,000 cattle and calves arrived at Fort Worth Monday, the largest number since June, 1947. Everyone held his breath to see whether the ruin the good gains made last week—but a surprising strong undertone prevailed and prices ranged from steady to 50 cents off most of the way. A few spots \$1 lower were noted on excessively full and on plain and medium kinds on the late rounds.

Hogs gained 25 cents, topping at \$22.50. Sows were steady.

Most sheep and lambs moved along steady on the slaughter kinds, but steady to 50 cents lower on stockers. Lightweight stocker lambs were the kinds encountering trouble. The sheep run was 10,000 head, unusual because it came so late in the season.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electors; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952 at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

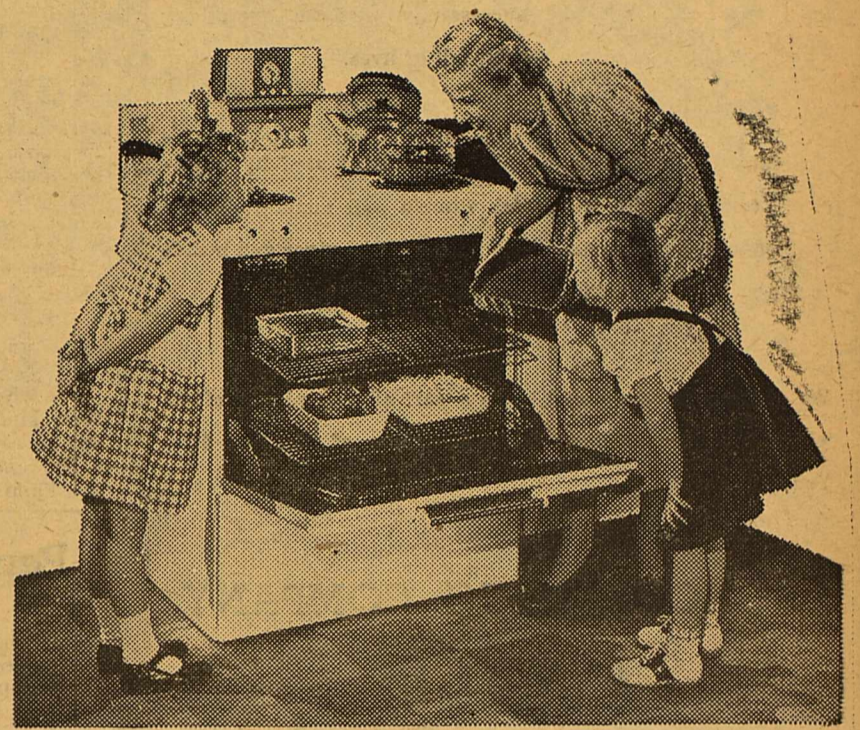

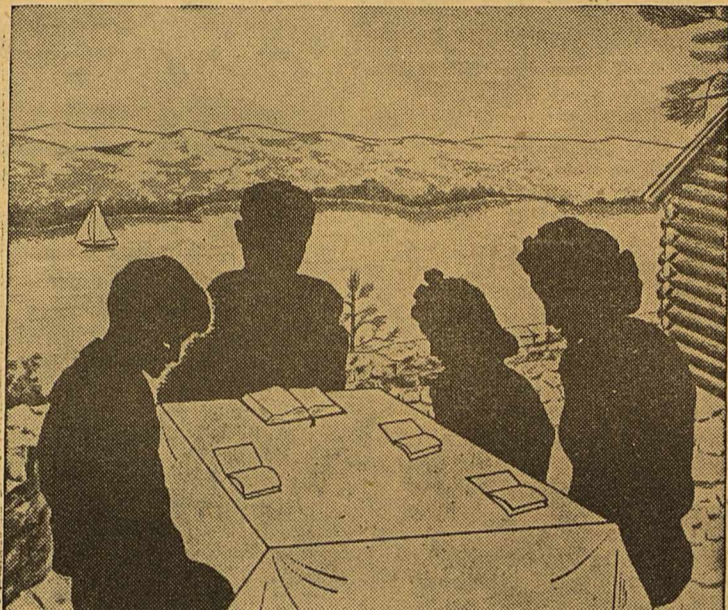

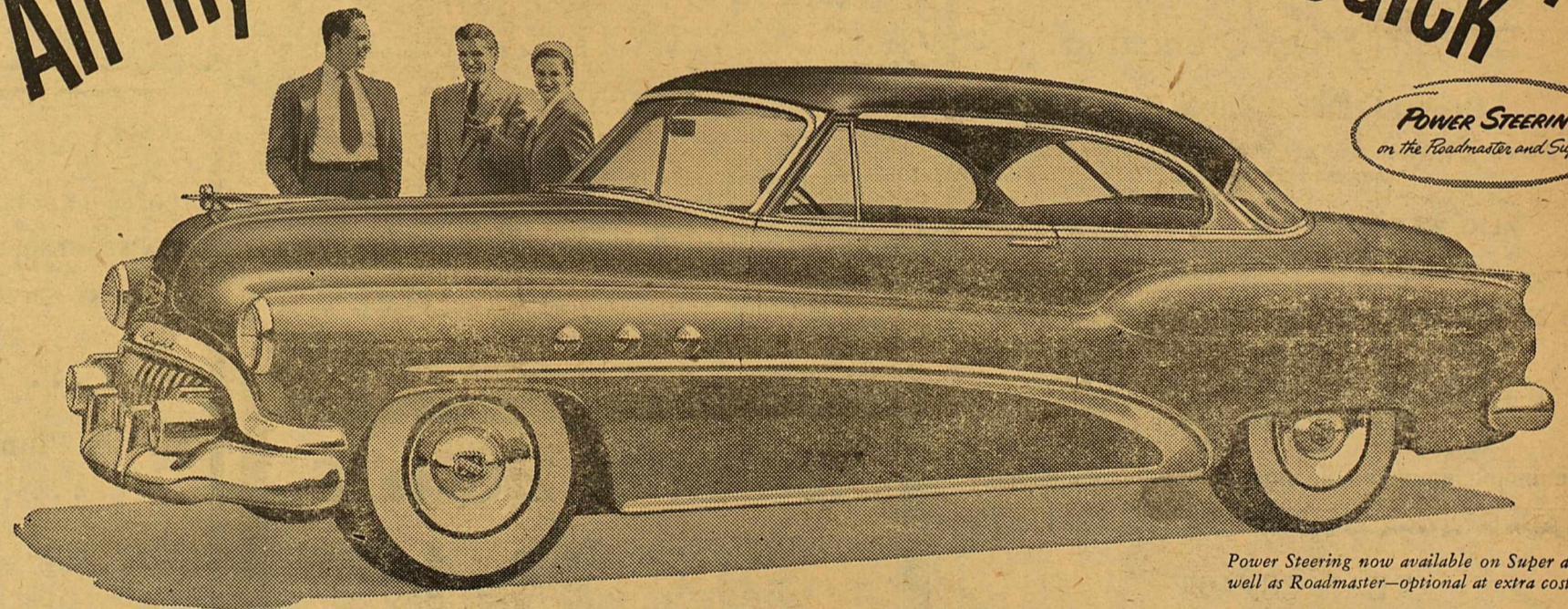


NASHVILLE, TENN.—"Don't take a vacation from God, you don't want Him to take a vacation from you."

policy and the benefits thereof to public employees of cities, towns and villages, and, at the same time, authorize such municipalities to provide for or set up its own insurance risk for all such employees. Naturally, if this latter procedure is adopted, a new bureau or board for the administration thereof, will inevitably follow.

It would seem better, and in accord with our oft-expressed views of freedom of enterprise, that such insurance be obtained from private sources, in any event.

There is no sound reason for depriving this type public employees of such insurance protection. Workmen's Compensation Insurance is now authorized for State and County employees. (Art. III, Secs. 59, 69 Texas Const.) The source of such insurance, necessarily, would be determined by the duly authorized and elected officials of the various municipalities.

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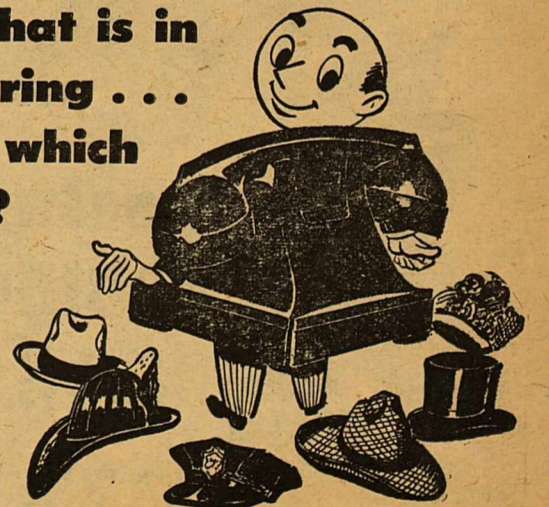
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
