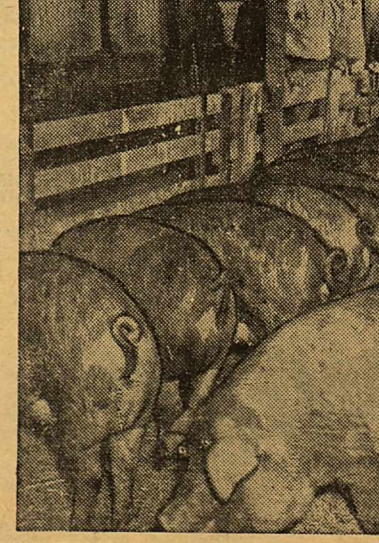

2 1/2 TONS OF PORK FROM ONE PIG IN 6 MONTHS—This litter of 18 Farmer's Hybrid pigs recently set a new world record for six months weight—a total of 4,992 pounds. Owned by Lawrence Meyer of Spring Grove, Minn., (left) the champion litter was raised on Terralac, synthetic sow's milk, and terramycin-fortified dry feed. Prof. H. G. Zavoral of the University of Minnesota (far right) was on hand to make the 180-day weight official. The heaviest pig weighed 342 pounds, the lightest 226 pounds. This is the first year synthetic milk has been available. Meyer says the pigs might have been largely lost by starvation if farrowed a year ago.

The move to cash is not unusual. In the past few months the J. D. Varga warehouse in Rocksprings, the Western Wool and Mohair Company in Menard, and the Junction Wool and Mohair Company, have gone on a cash basis. Most Oklahoma feed stores have done the same and the trend is spreading rapidly in West Texas.

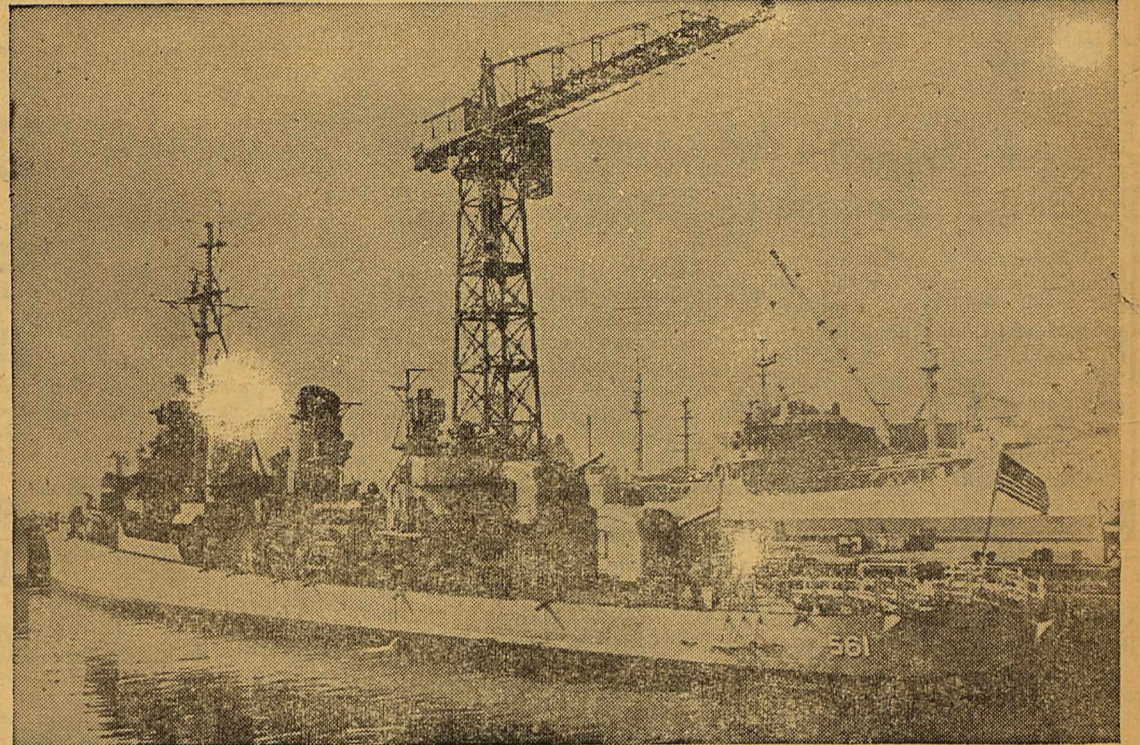

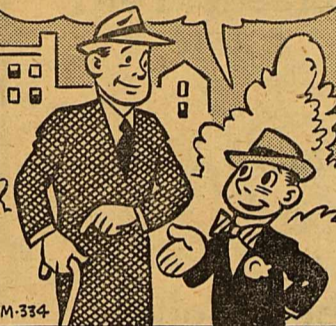
Banbury Tarts  
Plain Pastry (1½ cups flour)  
1 cup raisins chopped  
1 cup sugar  
3 tablespoons fine craker crumbs  
1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine  
1 egg slightly beaten  
3 tablespoons lemon juice  
1-8 teaspoon salt

Roll pastry 1-8 inch thick. Cut into 3 inch squares. Mix remaining ingredients in order listed. Put 2 teaspoons mixture on each pastry square. Wet edges with cold water. Fold over to form triangle. Press edges together with a fork. Prick top several times. Bake in hot oven (425 D. F.) Makes 8 to 10 tarts.

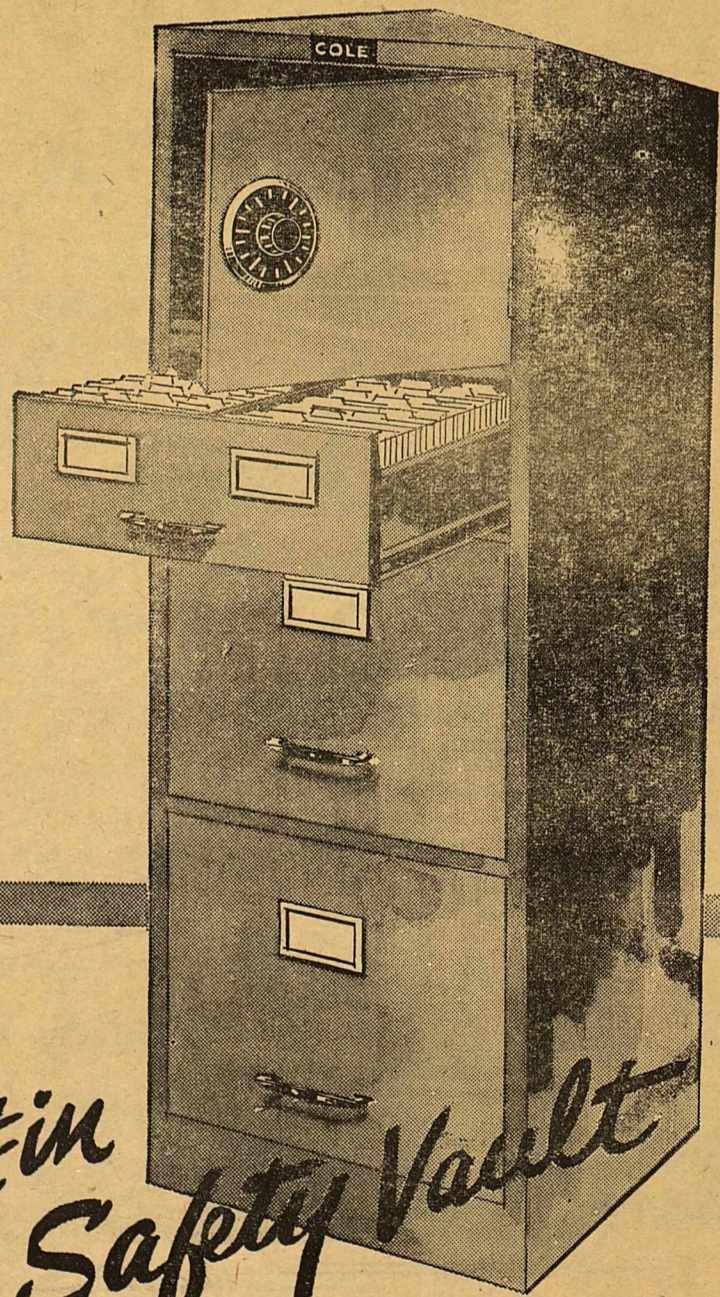

**QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM VETERANS ADMINISTRATION**

Q - I believe I am eligible for training under the new Korean GI Bill. Can you tell me how to apply?

A - You can obtain an application form at any VA office. Fill out the first five sections completely - be sure to include your program of training - and send the application, along with a photostat copy of your discharge, to your VA Regional Office. If VA approves the application, it will send you a "Certificate For Education and Training", which you present at your school when you enroll.

Q - I know that I may change the beneficiaries of my National Service Life Insurance at any time, but may I also change the method of payment of the insurance?

A - Yes. You may change any previously selected optional beneficiary's knowledge or consent.

Q - When I went on active duty, I made arrangements to pay a smaller amount on my house, which I bought with a GI loan. Now that I've been released, I find that I am unable to resume my regular payments. In fact, I can't pay back the payments that accumulated during my service. Can anything be done to help me out?

A - Probably yes. It's possible that the payments may be reduced by extending the maturity of your loan. Talk the matter over with your lender.

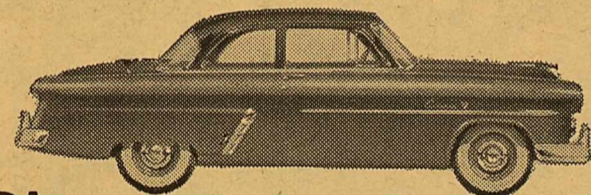

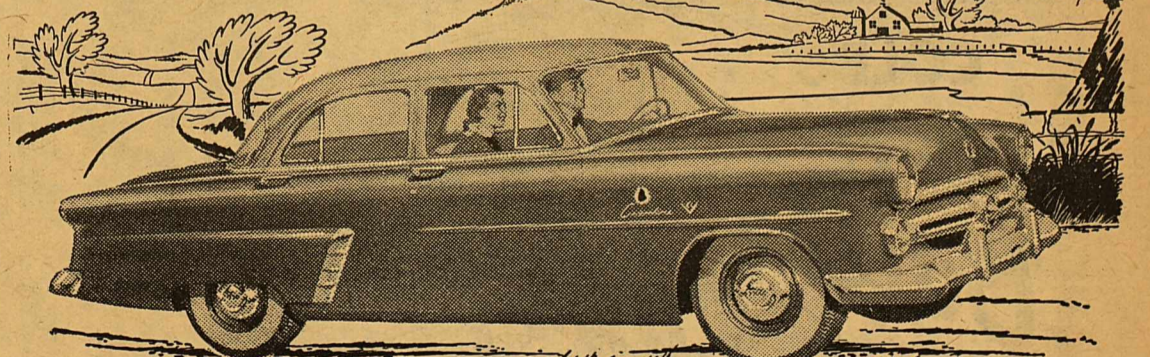

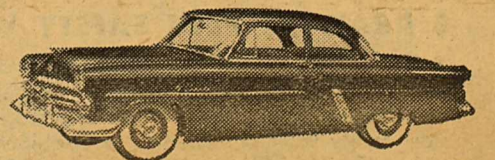

**CHECK LIST FOR MEN GOING INTO MILITARY SERVICE**

What about your civilian affairs you are called into military service? You may save yourself and your family a great deal of difficulty and worry by considering

right now some of the problems that may arise.

All during World War II and in the present Korean conflict, a special committee of the State Bar has handled literally thousands of disconcerting legal entanglements for servicemen. Members of the group say that many of these difficulties could have been avoided if the soldiers involved had taken a few simple precautions before leaving civilian life.

After you enter the service, keep in mind that this group, the State Bar committee on Legal Assistance to the Armed Forces, stands ready to help when necessary. Every county in the state has a Legal Assistance Chairman whose responsibility is to look into local matters when requested by a serviceman. The committee and the county chairman may be contacted through

State Bar of Texas, Austin, 15, Texas.

But before going into service, here is a partial list of things to do to protect yourself and your family:

Execute a power of attorney in recordable form if you want someone to be able to act for you in your absence.

Rent a safety deposit box, collect your important documents and store them in it.

Have a will prepared, or revised to suit any changed conditions.

Arrange for payment of outstanding bills or loans. The Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act, protects you against entry of judgment while in service.

Check your life insurance. Be sure the beneficiaries are correct; if the beneficiary is to be paid in monthly installments, is the amount now adequate in the light of the present deflated dollar? Arrange for premium payments.

If you have a lease on your business or residence arrange to cancel or sublet; provide for getting premises back when you return. If you give proper notice the Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act may save you from further liability under

leases after your departure.

Check your fire and personal property insurance policies for expiration dates, proper coverage and address. Get a rebate if you cancel.

Be sure your automobile license and insurance are available and in the name of the proper person. If your car won't be used for business purposes you may be entitled to a reduced premium.

Leave with some person, other than your wife, complete data as to yourself, where you are, how you are to be reached. Keep that person informed of changes while you are away, so he can reach you in an emergency.

Consolidate your bank accounts and open a joint account. Arrange for statements, allotments, etc.

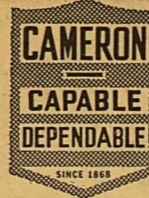

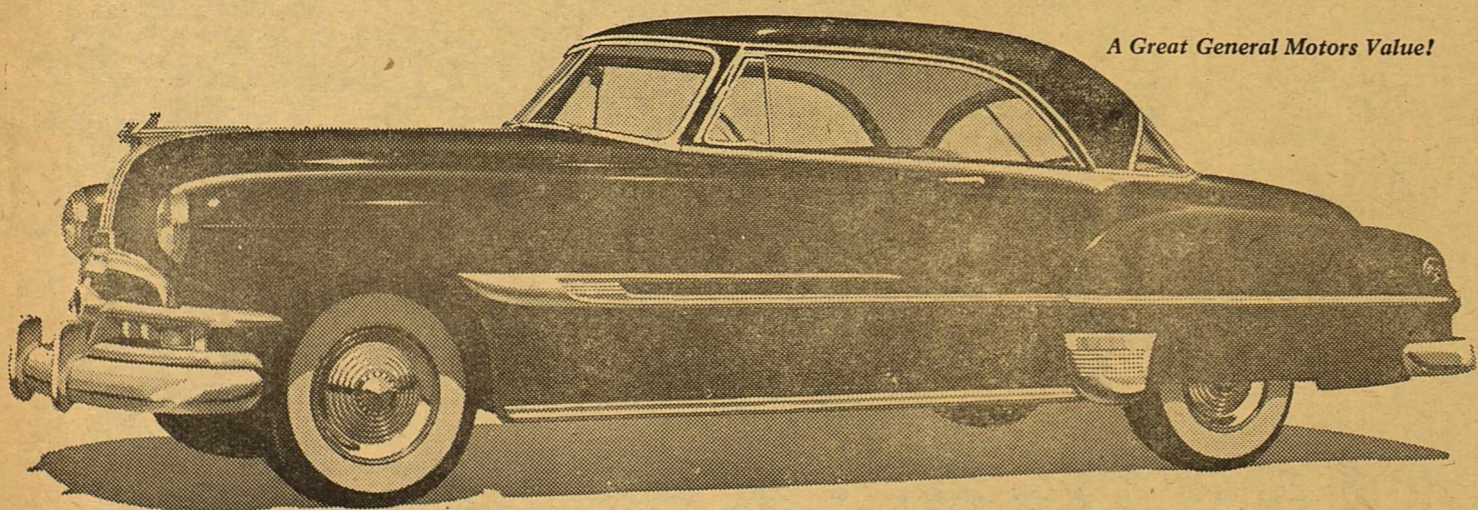

### WHEN A MAN LOOKS AT HIMSELF

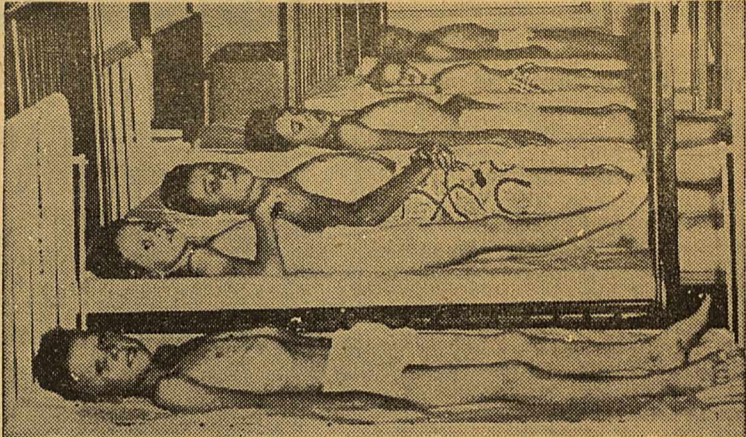
By W. H. Marshall

In a delightful short story, Stephen Vincent Benet tells of the people of Reno wanting to sin pleasantly and to be reminded of it as little as possible. This probably can be said of all of us. Even when we know that we deserve criticism, we frequently resent it. Don't do it. If you do, you might miss something of value to yourself. We consider it our prerogative to censure others, but to be censured by others we consider an impertinence and an invasion of our rights. When ever criticism is leveled against us we bristle and release our shafts of anger against those who make themselves our critics. No sooner

are we confronted with some weakness or failing on our part than we play a game of tit-for-tat and take our critic to task for some weakness of his own, as if that settled anything except that we are emotionally immature. Many a relationship, has come to grief because of such foolish behavior. It takes emotional maturity to accept criticism as a means of grace.

However, if it requires maturity to accept criticism profitably, it requires still more to look upon ourselves with honest eyes and say, "Here I have failed. Here I have lost a battle. Here I have deceived myself. Here I have grown." It is not a light assignment to be one's own censor. It is easier to be honest with others than to be honest with oneself. Nor is it easy to steer a true course between two fatal extremes: on the one hand, to be indifferent to one's own faults; and on the other hand, to be painfully introspective, to chastise ourselves and accuse ourselves of wrongs which are not of our making. In one instance, we prove ourselves to be stubborn and foolish; in the others, we belittle ourselves.

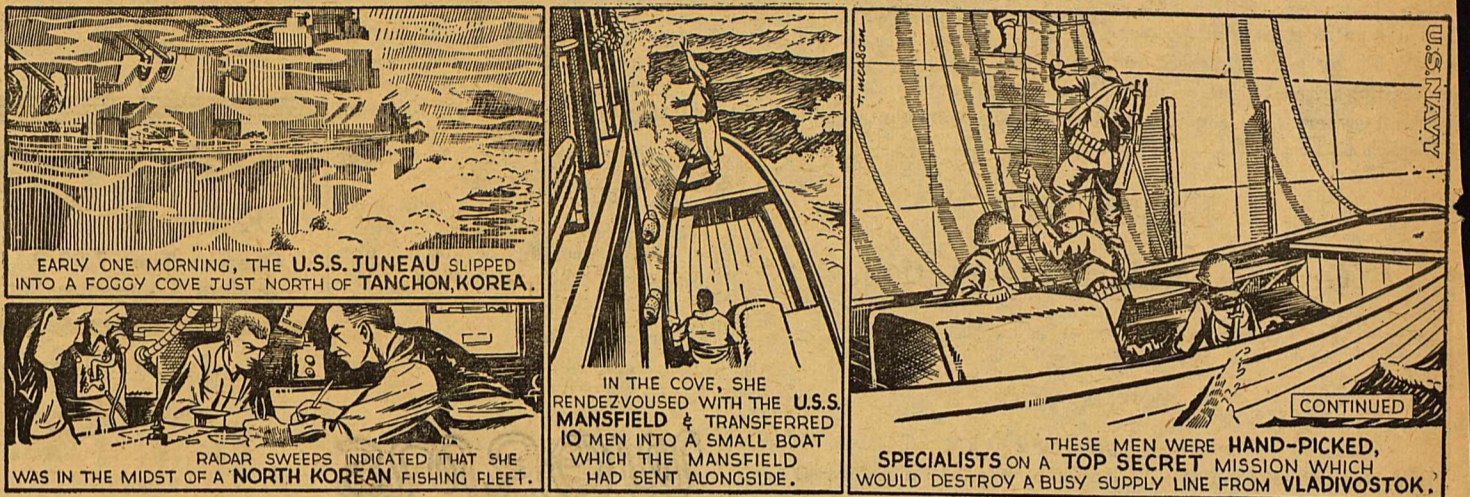

## LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Fort Worth- Heavy pressure continued on cattle and calf prices this week. Another excessive run of grassers and shortfeds appeared at the 12 major markets Monday when over 165,000 cattle and calves appeared and roughly 75 percent of these were grassers and stockers and feeders at many markets. This was over 23,000 over a week earlier and over 42,000 over the same day last year.

Most cattle and calves ruled 50c to \$1 or more lower at Fort Worth, with some spots \$1 to \$1.50 off on calves and yearlings and the plain and medium steers. Stocker demand remained narrow over the country and packers reported excessive supplies of meat other than strictly choice grain fed beef.

Deterioration of pastures in Kansas and Oklahoma increased the rush from those areas. Continued lack of moisture dampened prospects for wheat grazing over the Texas-Oklahoma-Kansas plains.

Hogs opened the week with 25 to 50 cents higher prices and a top of \$20.75 to \$21. Sows drew \$17.50 down. Sheep and lambs opened steady.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings sold for \$23 to \$30, odd club calves \$33 and \$34. Stocker steer yearlings bulked at \$14 to \$24 with a few choice lightweight's to \$25. Stocker heifers sold from \$22 down.

Fat cows cashed at \$13.50 to \$17, with canners and cutters at \$9 to \$13.50. Stocker cows sold from \$14 to \$18.50. Bulls sold from \$12 to \$19.

Good and choice slaughter calves cleared at \$20 to \$27 and plain and medium slaughter kinds sold from \$14 to \$19, with cull sorts from \$10 to \$14. Good and choice stocker calves sold mostly at \$20 to \$27, while plain and medium sorts sold from \$15 to \$19.

Good and choice fat lambs sold from \$18 to \$22 and stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$10 to \$17. Cull lambs, yearlings and two's sold from \$8 to \$10. Fresh shorn lambs and sheep usually sold \$1 to \$2 under wool shorn.

Yearlings wethers sold at \$17 down, and two-year-olds sold from \$12.50 down. Aged wethers cashed at \$10 down. Slaughter ewes sold from \$6.50 to \$7, and some solid mouthed ewes drew \$7 to \$8.50. Old bucks cashed at \$6 to \$6.50. Feeder yearlings sold from \$10 to \$12.

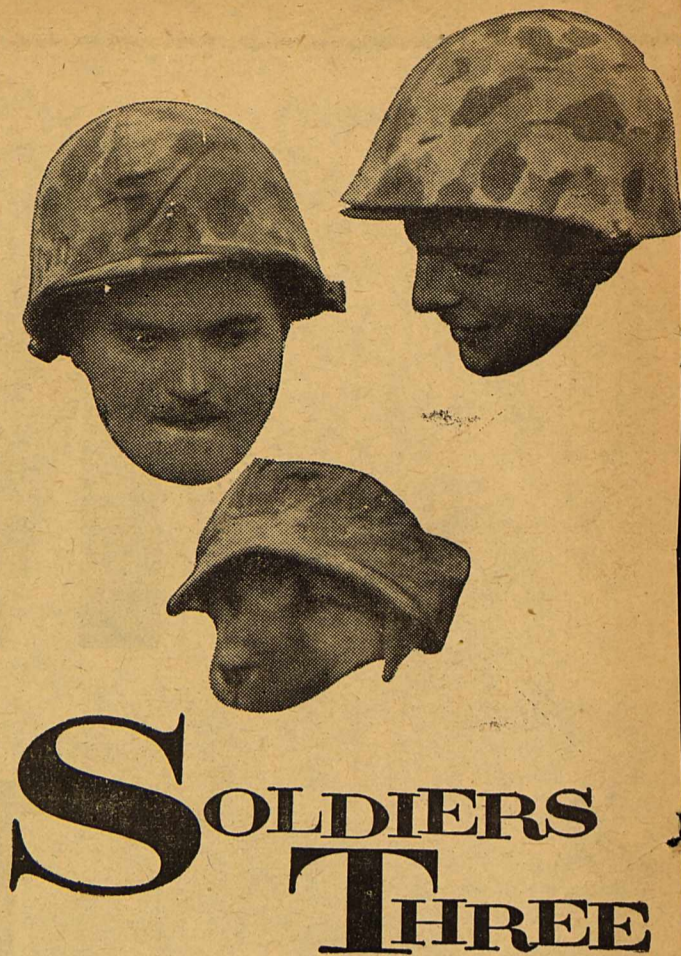

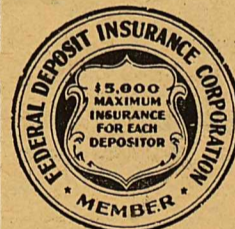

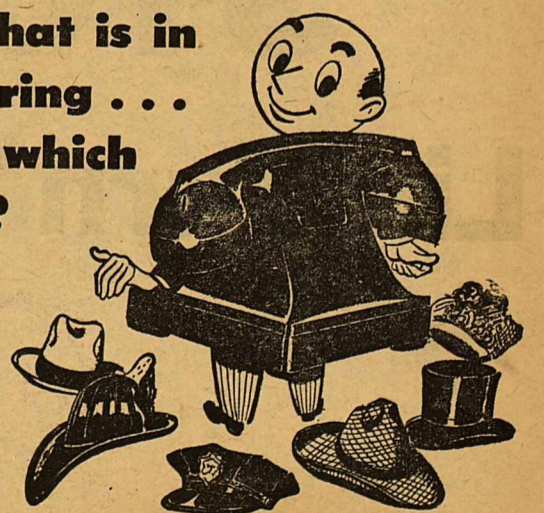
