## BRONCOS SMOTHER OZONA LIONS 26-7 Gouty Gets Inch Rain Monday

### Decisive Win Puts Sonora In 3-Way Tie For Second

An aroused Sonora Bronco charged the Ozona Lion here Friday night and left him weak and disillusioned on the short end of a 26-7 defeat. The game was a game of rugged line play and vicious tackling and blocking which enabled George Wright and Bobby Scott to break away on four beautiful touchdown jaunts and put Sonora into a three-way tie with Menard and Ozona for second place in District 6-A.

Sonora got down to business in the second quarter when Scott ran back an Ozona punt from the 50 to the Ozona nine. Wright picked up three, then Scott ran through a tremendous hole in the middle of the Ozona line to score standing up. The Bronco line was clicking and opened another hole to enable Wright to go through the middle for the extra point.

The Lions could not move on the ground against linemen Griffin, Fuqua, Chalk and Turney, and safety man Minnick and took to the air for their only score of the game, late in the second quarter. Garlitz, Ozona quarterback threw two passes to halfback Tom Piner, the last of which carried to the Sonora 12. Ozona tried the line on first down and was stopped cold. Two passes were broken up, but on fourth down, Don Cooper made a fine catch barely inside the end zone for the score. Piner kicked the point. The half ended 7-7.

Sonora received at the start of the second half and it was here that the Broncos took complete charge. The ball came to Scott, who dropped it on the 4-yard line, picked it up and headed up and headed up the middle of the field to the 50. Here he was joined by eight blockers who gave him an open road to the sideline and a touchdown. Blocking on Scott's run was near-perfect and Jack Johnson arrived in time to cut down the safety man. Wright tried the line for the point, but was stopped.

Ozona made a bid to tie the score on the kickoff following Scott's run, when Pinner took the ball and raced 60 yards to the Sonora 20. He was tackled from behind by Ross, Minnick and Scott. The Broncos broke up the Ozona pass attack which followed and started an 80-yard drive with Wright and Scott alternating and with Wright charging over a hole at right tackle, courtesy of Sanchez, Ehrenburg and Smith, for the third touchdown for Sonora. Wright then plunged for the extra point. Score 20-7.

Ozona came back with more

passes and worked down to Sonora territory, but Joe David Ross intercepted a Galitz pass and Wright kicked out of danger. The Lions came back once more before giving up, this time on another pass attack which carried to the Sonora 20, where Jodie Minnick intercepted and ran 30 yards to midfield. From here Wright and Scott followed the Bronco line down to the five, where Wright plunged over. Point try failed and

the score remained 26-7. As the game ended Sonora was again threatening to score, this time on the Lions 2 yard line and fourth down. Coach Joe Turner said Monday the victory was made possible by cooperation and determination of the whole team, by powerful line play, and by the excellent scouting done by Coaches Jack Fry, Oliver Wuest and John Kenner. Coach Turner played a total of 20 boys in the game and had high praise for all of them. But he kept coming back to the linemen as making the real difference.

Coach Oliver Wuest killed a 15-point buck early Saturday morning on the Bryan Hunt ranch. The buck dressed 103 pounds.

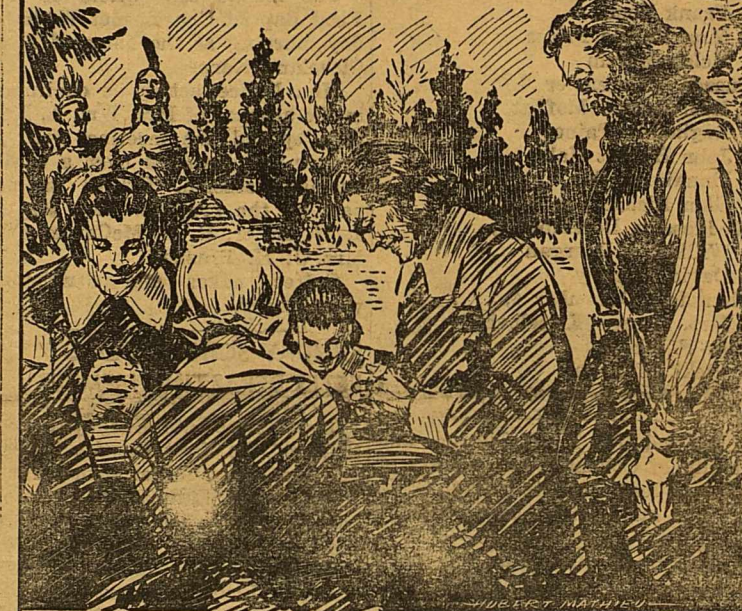

More than 5,000 teachers, including five from Sonora, are expected to attend the seventy-fourth annual meeting of the Texas State Teachers' Association in El Paso November 27-29.

Planning to attend from Sonora are: E. A. Brodhead, superintendent of schools, Rex Lowe, principal of the Elementary School, Mr. and Mrs. Buford Adams and Miss Jo Beth Taylor.

Miss Ruth Hillyer, President, has announced a three-day convention program that includes addresses by a number of distinguished educators.

It will open on the morning of November 27 with a special Thanksgiving Service and will be climaxed November 29 with a meeting of the 500-member House of Delegates. The closing session will include the installation of new officers for the 52,000-member organization.

Featured speakers include Dr. E. T. McSwain, of Northwestern University; Dr. John Bracken, of Clayton, Mo.; Judge Harold Hissinger, of Ridgewood, N. J.; and W. W. Jackson of San Antonio, member of the State Board of Education.

Nine discussion groups will thrash out professional problems, ranging from curriculum development to public relations, on the second day of the convention.

### BILLIE D. DRENNAN GETS PROMOTION TO SERGEANT

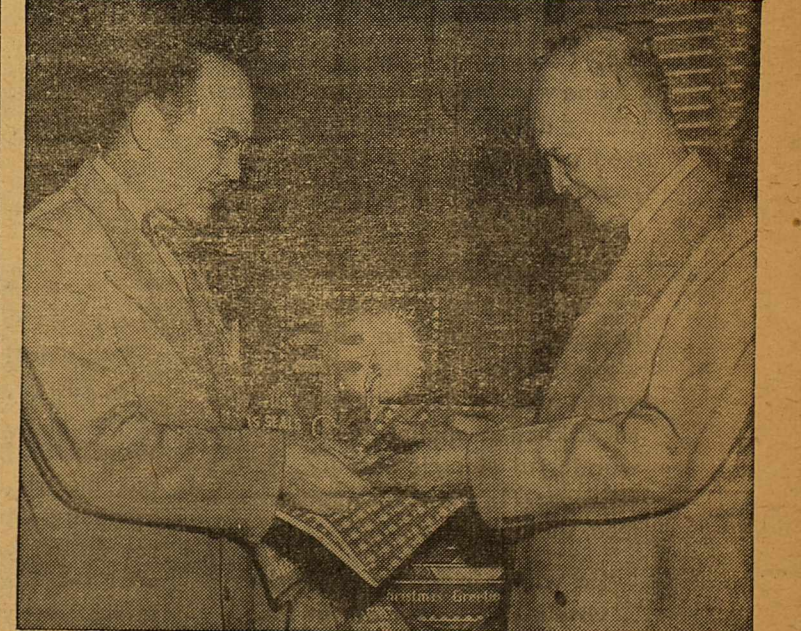

## YOUR HEALTH

It is an illogical fact that many  
people complain about the heat  
of Texas summers and yet sit in-

doors during the winter months  
in a temperature about as high as  
that about which they complained  
in the summer season, is the view  
of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health  
Officer.

"It the average person would  
realize the definite hazard in de-  
veloping and maintaining an in-  
door temperature about 70 degrees,  
or at most 72 degrees, when the  
outside thermometer registers around  
freezing," he said, "there would  
be fewer colds, less bronchial con-

ditions, and less pneumonia than  
there are today.

"Fresh air is one of the body's  
basic needs and no amount of lux-  
ury or artificial pleasure can be  
substituted for it. It may be a com-  
fortable feeling to be warm, es-  
pecially with the consciousness of  
the tough weather outdoors, but it  
is quite another matter to achieve  
this comfort at the probable cost  
of health.

## QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

Q - I've been totally disabled  
for six months, and I applied to  
the VA for a waiver of my National  
Service Life Insurance prem-  
iums. Now that I've applied, may  
I stop paying my premiums?

A - No. You should continue  
to pay your premiums regularly,  
as they become due, until you have  
received word from VA that you  
are entitled to waiver. In that way,  
you'll avoid the possibility of your  
insurance lapsing, in case your  
claim is not granted.

Q - Does the \$310-a-month  
ceiling under the Korean GI Bill  
apply to all types of training?  
A - No. It applies only to veter-  
ans training on-the-job. It  
means that if a job trainee's month-  
ly allowance plus his earnings as a  
trainee exceed \$310 a month, VA  
will reduce the allowance accord-  
ingly.

Q - I was under age when I  
enlisted in the Army during World  
War II. I was in for six months  
before the Army found out and  
sent me home. Would that service  
entitle me to a GI loan?

A - Yes. A veteran whose en-  
listment was cancelled because he  
was under age is entitled to eligi-  
bility credit for GI loans.

Q - Are there any types of  
courses not permitted under the  
Korean GI Bill education and  
training program?

A - Yes. Courses in bartending,  
dancing and personality develop-  
ment are prohibited by law, and  
cannot be approved under any  
conditions.

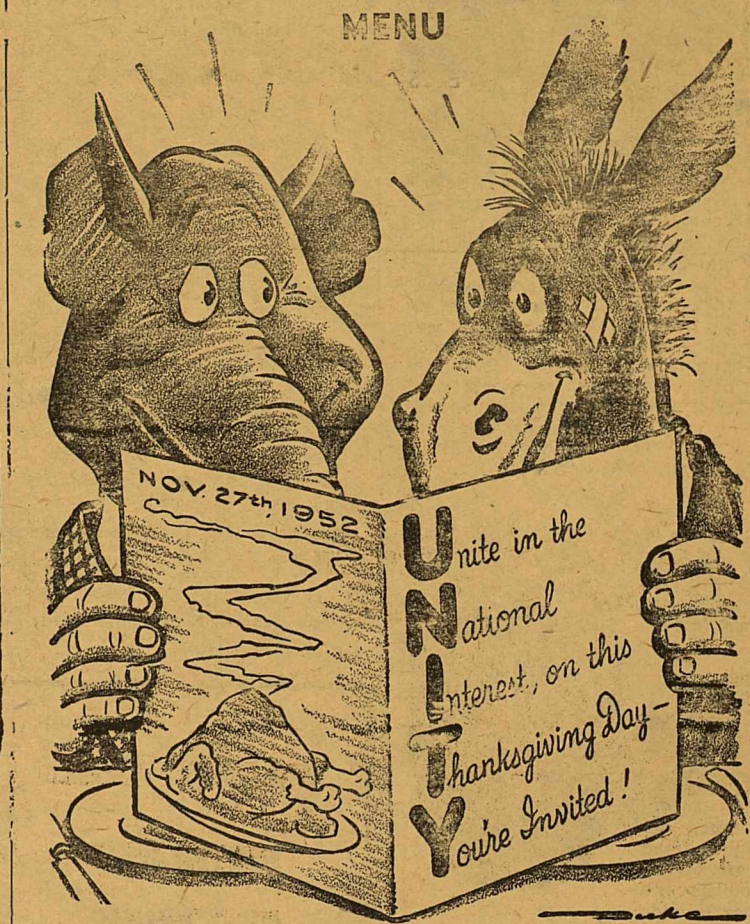

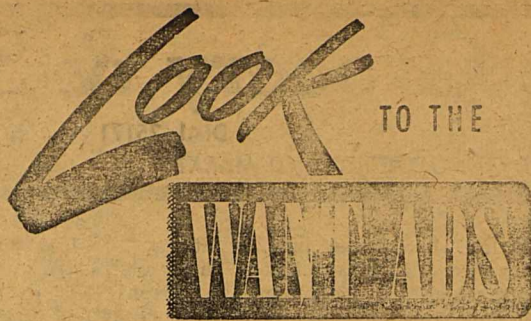

Turkey Pie with Cornbread Topping

3 tablespoons butter or margarine  
4 tablespoons flour  
1 1/2 cups turkey broth  
1/2 cup top milk or cream  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon paprika  
1/4 teaspoon onion salt or  
1 teaspoon finely grated onion  
1-8 teaspoon pepper  
2 cups sliced or diced cooked turkey

1 cup cooked vegetables (carrots, peas, onions, potatoes, celery, green beans or a combination of these)

Melt the fat, add flour and stir over low heat until blended. Add the cold broth, top milk and seasoning all at once. Cook, stirring constantly, until uniformly thickened. Stir in turkey and vegetables, then pour into baking dish.

Cornbread Top

1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
2 teaspoons sugar  
1/2 cup cornmeal  
1 well-beaten egg  
1/2 cup milk  
2 tablespoons shortening

Heat pie filling in a 2-quart casserole in a hot oven (425 D F) until bubbly, about 10 minutes. Meanwhile sift flour, salt, baking powder and sugar. Mix with the cornmeal. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles texture of course cornmeal. Combine eggs and milk and add to dry ingredients; stir until just moistened. Pour cornbread batter over browned, 20 to 25 minutes. Serves 6.

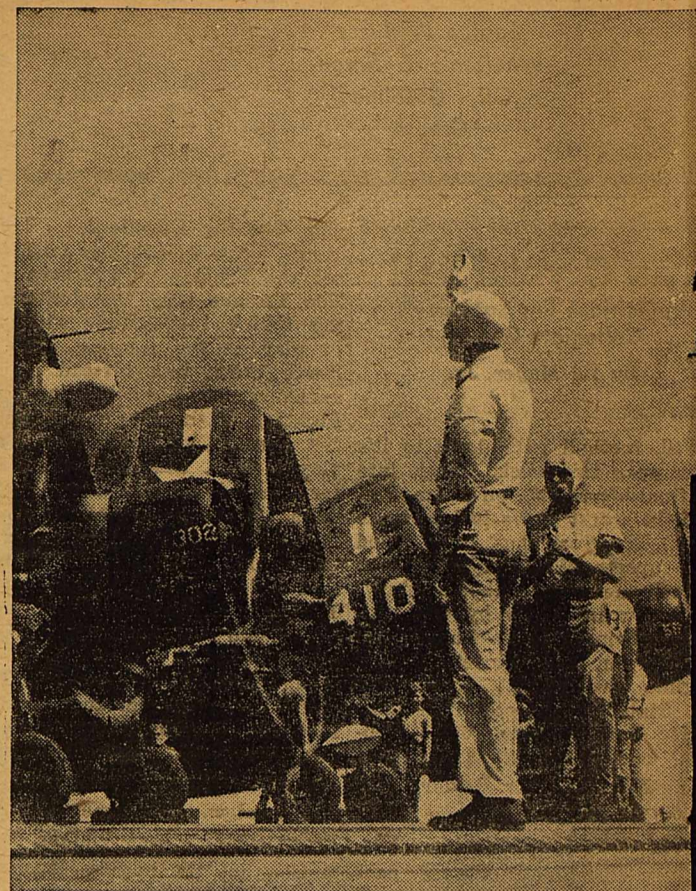

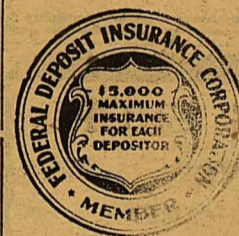
