

I stop paying my premiums?

A - No. You should continue to pay your premiums regularly, as they become due, until you have received word from VA that you are entitled to waiver. In that way, you'll avoid the possibility of your insurance lapsing, in case your claim is not granted.

well-beaten egg cup milk

tablespoons shortening Heat pie filling in a 2-quart casserole in a hot oven (425 D F) until bubbly, about 10 minutes. Meanwhile sift flour, salt, baking cornmeal. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles texture of course cornmeal. Combine eggs and milk and add to dry ingredients; stir until just moistened. Pour cornbread batter over browned, 20 to 25 minutes. Serves 6.




