YOUNG FOLKS (i.e.—my age and younger), or even older folks who are not history buffs may have wondered in recent weeks why the nation's big news media has focused so much attention on the national election in the Philippines, as our national leaders also made the issue one of major interest.

Some might interpret this as the United States meddling in a foreign nation's business, if they do not know the background and the fact that America has had a longtime interest (both financially and politically) in the islands.

The Philippines were at the root of the cause of the Spanish-American War, when the islands were attempting to free themselves from Spanish rule. The first major battle of the war took place in 1898 in Manila Bay, where a U.S. fleet led by Commodore George Dewey defeated a Spanish fleet.

Later, Spain gave up the islands to the United States in return for \$20,000,000. So, the Philippines became a U.S. possession, much like Hawaii and Alaska.

The United States wanted the Philippines to have their own government, but realized that their people needed much help before they would be ready for independence.

Our government spent millions of dollars more in the Philippines, building schools and roads, installing sewage systems, vaccinating the people to protect them from smallpox and cholera, and drilling deep wells to provide good drinking water.

The U.S. provided civil governors for the Philippines. The first of these was William Howard Taft, who served from 1900 to 1904. This served as a stepping-stone to Taft being elected as our nation's 26th president.

When World War II broke out, the Philippines were once again involved. Because of its proximity, and also because of the fact that it was American-held, Japan made the islands one of their main objectives.

Thousands of American servicemen were shipped to the islands, where they eventually helped Filipino guerrillas drive out the Japanese in 1945.

Two of the most famous battle-grounds of the Philippines in the war were Bataan and Corregidor. The Bataan Death March was the event in which thousands of American soldiers died, and a part of the war Japan likes to forget when complaining about America's "inhuman use" of the atomic bomb to end the war.

But America's famous World War II General Douglas MacArthur led a successful comeback, driving the Japanese out of the islands, and helping to end the conflict.

The United States gave the Philippines their Independence on July 4, 1946. Money was again given by the U.S. to help repair war damage on the islands. Our country has continued to pour millions of dollars into the islands to help such things as the nation's agricultural economy become self-sufficient.

The U.S. maintains military bases on the Philippines, which have served major roles in the peace-keeping efforts in Southeast Asia.

So America has invested countless millions of dollars, as well as the loss of thousands of American lives, in this Asian country. Many of the Filipino citizens speak English, as you may have noticed from the news reports.

The Philippines have been American territory. We still provide a lot of the capital to keep the islands going. You bet America has an interest in checking into how or whether the Filipinos have learned the Democratic process we so devotedly taught them.

Fillies Blow Past Paducah For Title

Bovina High School's Fillies overcame an early foul problem to defeat Paducah, 61-37 in their bi-district playoff game at Plainview last Friday night.

When the Fillies' Marie Pesch drew three fouls before the first quarter was over and Mindy Neal got her third early in the second quarter and went to the bench, Terisa and Peggy Shepherd took charge and led the team to the win.

Both Miss Pesch and the team's other post-girl, Mindy Neal, drew two fouls during the opening half of the first quarter. The teams had traded leads in the early going.

Paducah had taken an 11-9 lead when Miss Pesch received her third foul with 1:36 left to play in the quarter, and went to the bench. Then, two minutes into the second quarter, Miss Neal drew her third foul.

Donell Garner came in and scored a basket and a couple of free throws at critical points for the Fillies.

Robbie Stowers made a follow-shot to tie the game for Bovina, and Peggy Shepherd's steal and a basket by her sister Terisa with seven seconds left in the quarter gave Bovina a 13-11 lead.

Terisa Shepherd started the second quarter off with a pair of baskets. The second one gave Bovina a 17-15 lead, and the team was never headed after that.

Peggy Shepherd made a rebound shot, and then scored a layup for a 21-17 Fillies' lead at the 4:12 mark. The Shepherd sisters scored all of Bovina's 12 second-quarter points as Bovina took a 41-27 halftime lead.

The Fillies broke out to a 10-2 scoring edge over the Dragonettes to start the third quarter. The Shepherd sisters had two baskets each in the drive, and Miss Neal added four points. Bovina built a 41-27 third quarter lead.

Terisa Shepherd continued her hot hand, scoring two baskets and four of seven shots from the line, and Miss Neal added four more points, as the Fillies coasted to the win.

Terisa Shepherd scored 19 points and Peggy Shepherd had 15 for runner-up honors. Miss Pesch scored 10 points and had 13 rebounds. Misses Pesch, Neal and Donell Garner finished the game with four fouls each, with the bench time coming at the coach's (Continued on Page 7)

Fillies, Mustangs Both In Playoffs

Bovina basketball fans are getting a double dip of action this week with both the boys and girls teams in post-season play.

It's the second time in three years for both of Bovina's teams to make the playoffs. Both are coached by Marks Lanham.

The Fillies, 61-37 winners over Paducah in bi-district, were squaring off against one of the powers in class AA, the Stratford Elkettes, Tuesday night in Canyon.

The Mustangs, who claimed District 3-AA's runner-up spot, will likewise meet Paducah in their bi-district confrontation. This game is scheduled for 6 p.m. at the Hutcherson Center in Plainview.

Tuesday night, the Fillies were facing a Stratford team that had compiled a 22-1 season record, losing only to Dalhart. The Elkettes have 6-0 Sheila Cummings, averaging 28 points

and 12.5 rebounds per game, and Stacy Rolen, 6-1, averaging 12 points, 14 rebounds and eight blocked shots per game.

The Fillies are themselves 22-4, and were anxious to meet the challenge of facing the state-ranked (number nine) Stratford girls.

It doesn't get much easier for the Fillies. If they won on Tuesday, the team would then play the winner of the Morton (27-4) vs Clint (21-4) game in the first round of regional.

Other teams in the class AA playoffs are Spearman-Abernathy (who met in Tuesday's first game) and Haskell-Reagan County.

The Mustangs didn't get any favors in the playoff pairings,

either, drawing District 4-AA champion Paducah, which has compiled a 27-1 season record.

The Dragons have a front line that goes 6-6, 6-4 and 6-2, Coach Lanham says. "We will have to try to keep off the boards as much as possible, and hope we can be hot (shooting) from the outside," Lanham commented.

Meanwhile, the Mustangs are back in the playoffs after an absence of a year.

They have been led by 6-3 senior post Matt Howell, 6-2 freshman post Scott Scaff, 6-1 forward Blake Scaff, 6-2 senior Terry Moore and 5-10 freshman forward Denver Riddle.

Other players include senior Chet Hawkins, a guard, (Continued on Page 7)

Sherrill Awarded Remodelling Bid

The Parmer County Commissioners last week awarded the contract for repairing the district courtroom to Sherrill Lumber of Bovina.

Sherrill bid \$14,987. Other bidders were O.D. Cole and Jimmy Meeks, both of whom submitted lower bids than Sherrill. County Judge Porter Roberts said the commissioners felt that Sherrill's bid was the "best bid."

Repairs will include new ceiling tiles in front of the balcony plus matching tiles under the balcony (the part which collapsed in December), a new carpet for the floor, rearranging the judge's bench and raising it six inches, rearranging the courtroom, putting the jury box on the south side of the room instead of the present north side and closing the windows.

In other business, the commissioners agreed to rent its new voting booths to governmental units wanting to use them for \$50 per unit on a first-come, first-serve basis. Lazbuddie Schools have inquired into their possible use in their election.

The next commissioners' meeting was changed to February 20 because the commissioners will be attending a school at Texas A&M starting February 24. All the commissioners, except for Tommy Williams, and Roberts are expected to attend.

Two citizens asked for help on paying their gas bills. One was turned down; the other received \$181.81 from the commissioners.

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Mustangs Topple AHS For Playoffs

The Bovina Mustang basketball team clinched a spot in the state playoffs with a 64-61 pressure win over the Abernathy Antelopes in a game here last Thursday.

It was a come-from-behind performance by the Mustangs, who found themselves trailing the visiting 'Lopes, 19-13 in the first quarter, thanks to the hot shooting of Billy Cooper (number 23), who scored five quick baskets.

But the Mustangs made some adjustments in the second quarter, and outscored the Antelopes 19-10 to recapture the lead.

Blake Scaff and Matt Howell keyed the rally. Scaff scored three baskets and an equal number of free throws during the period. Howell had a pair of buckets and free throws. Scott Scaff added a pair from the field, as Bovina claimed a 32-29 halftime lead.

The second half turned out to be a trade-out in the points department. Scott Scaff warmed up with a trio of baskets for the Mustangs and Chet Hawkins came in to score a pair as Bovina held onto its three-point lead, 46-43, after three quarters.

Scaff responded to the situation in the fourth quarter, making good on three shots from the field and three of four from the line. Howell hit four from the line, as the

Mustangs capitalized on Abernathy fouls. Bovina hit eight of their 18 fourth-quarter points from the foul line, to hold on for the important win.

Abernathy outscored the Ponies, 54-50 from the field, but Bovina's showing from the foul line 14 of 24, made the difference.

Scott Scaff scored 19, Howell 18 and Blake Scaff 12 to pace the point-makers.

To help reduce expenditures in the Commodity Program, distribution of commodities will be made very other month.

There will be a large distribution in February and then March will be skipped in order to get on the alternate monthly distribution.



LEARN SOMETHING NEW SALT is great for a lot of things. You can pour salt liberally on a dropped raw egg. Let set 10-15 minutes. Pick up with paper towel. Sprinkle a little salt into a frying pan to prevent spattering.

To brighten up a bathtub which has yellowed, rub with a solution of salt and turpentine. Sprinkle salt on damp mud spots on carpet. Give the salt at least 15 minutes to soak up the mud then vacuum up and away.

Fleas will "flee," if you place some fresh pine needles in his dog house or underneath his bed pad. Or, salt the crevices of his dog house and wash him periodically with salt and water.

There is less need to scrub the fireplace if you throw salt on the logs occasionally. This will reduce the soot by 2/3.

Trent Bradley has one sister, Genessa Lee, five years old.



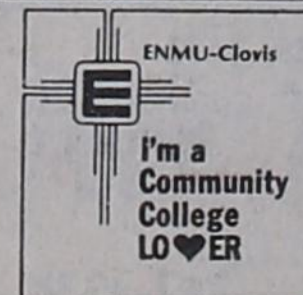
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C. Routon's Rites Are Held Monday

Excess Social Security Taxes May Be Paid

A person who works for more than one employer during the course of a year may pay more than the required amount in Social Security taxes, Carl Thompson, Social Security manager in Clovis, said recently.

A person may pay excess taxes if his or her total earnings for the year exceed the maximum amount on which Social Security taxes must be paid. If this occurs, the worker may claim a refund of the excess amount paid when he or she files an income tax return for the year. Earnings over the maximum for a given year cannot be considered in computing the benefit rate.

The situation is different if an overpayment of taxes is due to excess deductions made by an employer. In such cases, the worker should apply directly to the employer for a refund.

Any questions about refunds should be addressed to the Internal Revenue Service rather than to Social Security, Thompson said.

But, other questions about Social Security can be answered at the Clovis Social Security office, located at 912 Parkland. The telephone number is (505) 762-4595. The representative is in Friona on the fourth Wednesday of each month at City Hall.

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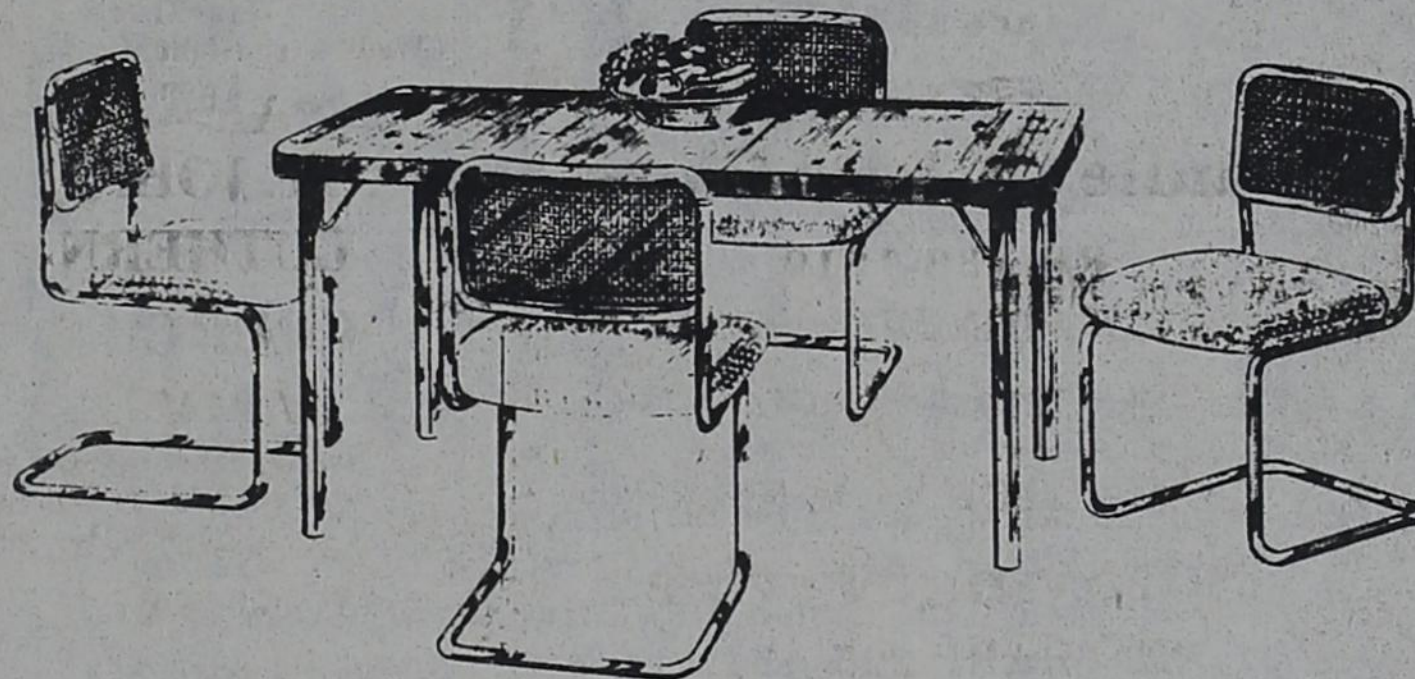
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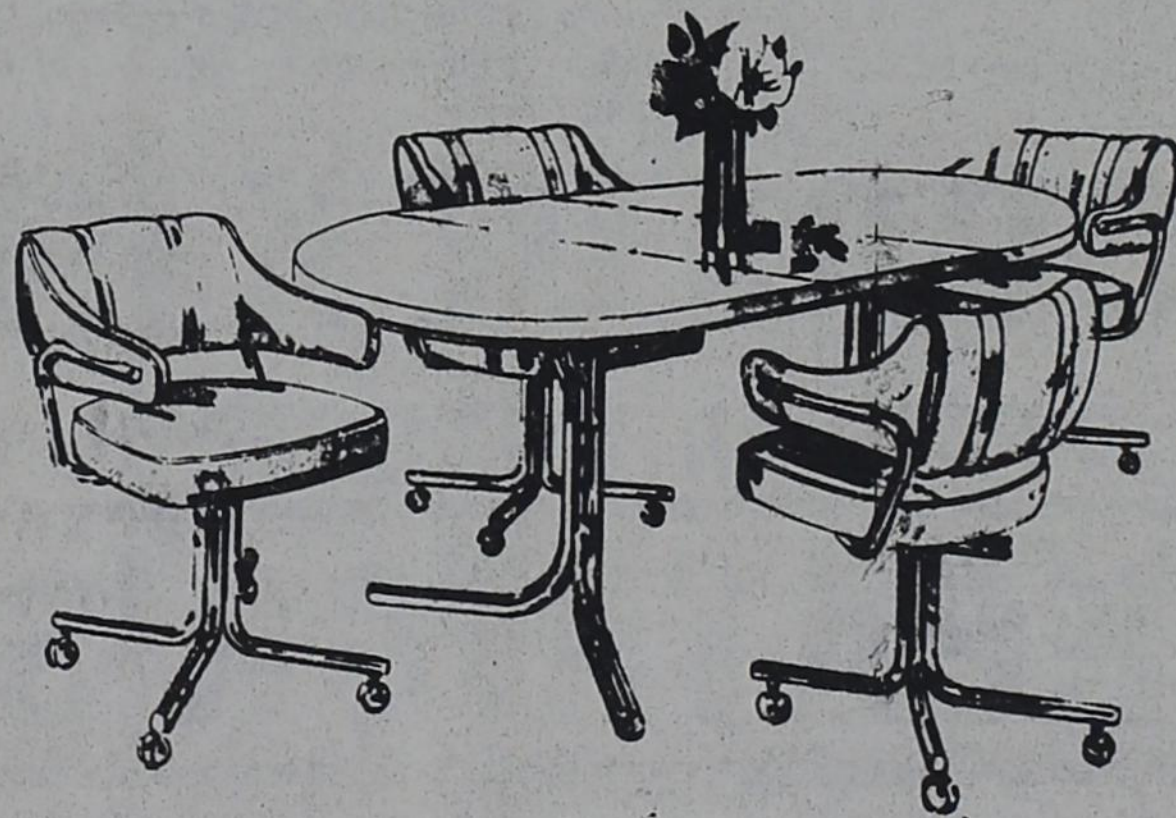
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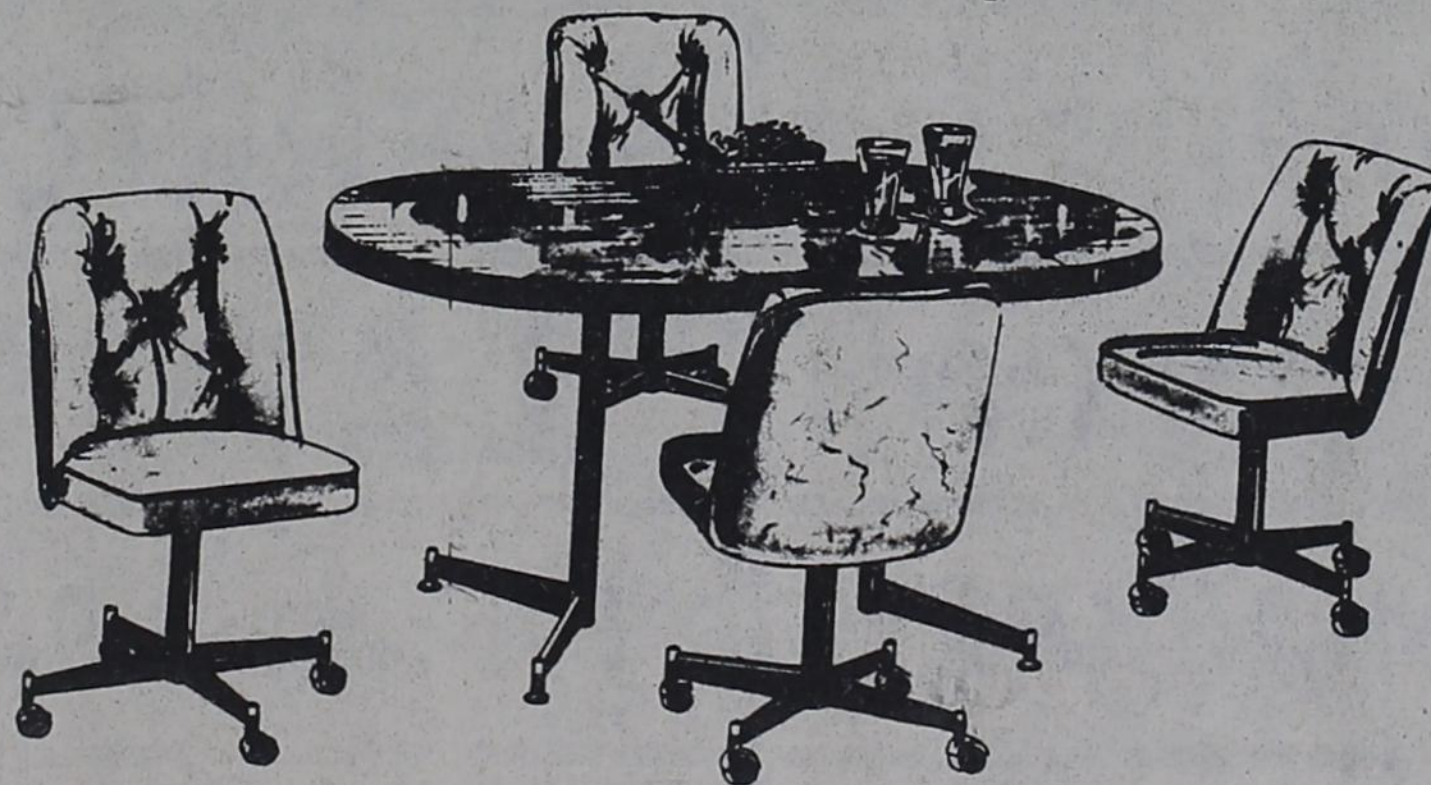
