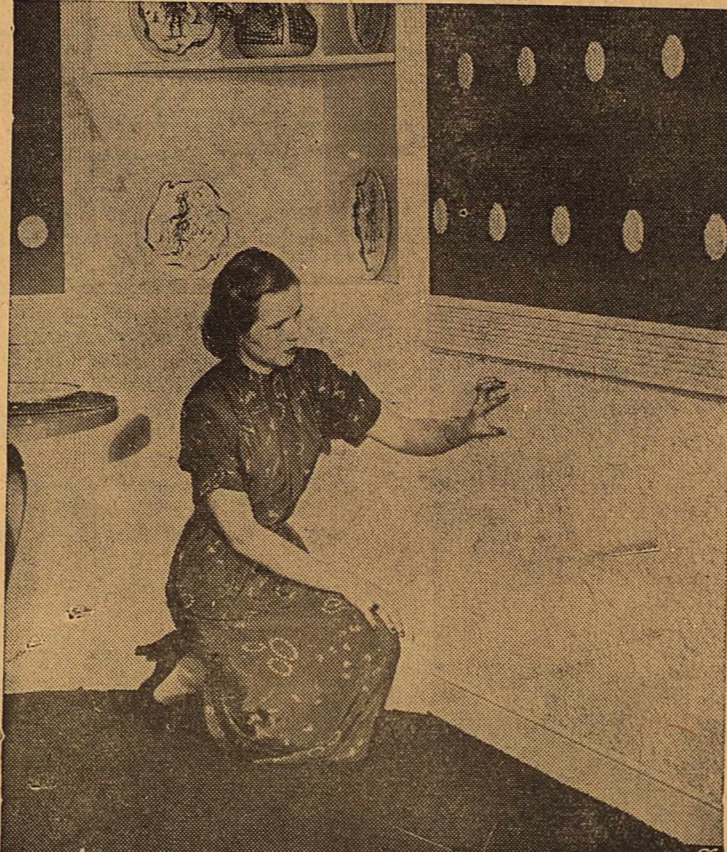

Annuals Fill A Needed Place Regardless Of Gardening Situation

Annuals fill a needed place regardless of your gardening situation. Long season bloomers, quick growers, low-growers, medium height and tall, annual flowers fit into many roles.

There is an annual flower for every need. When the bulb-bed is getting unsightly, you can tuck in annuals to hide dying foliage. After the iris season there may be a gap in the floral parade that annuals can fill. Annuals are the answer if you need cutflowers in abundance.

The specialist says annuals are flowers that grow from seed, bloom one season, and then die. They have served their purpose as soon as they have produced a crop of seed, so far this reason if they are to bloom they need to be kept cut more than perennials and biennials.

Selecting annuals for your flower garden should be relatively easy for there are more than fifty kinds available in most seed stores or catalogs. They are usually inexpensive, many kinds cost a nickel and seldom more than 25 cents a packet.

Seeds can be started indoors for early bloom, planted in a small

protected spot in the garden for transplanting to other areas, or you may sow seeds where flowers are to grow. Prepare seed beds well by adding humus and plant food to the soil.

Annuals are considered to be sun-lovers, but some like petunias and snapdragons thrive in light shade. But regardless of the location, be sure to give them space to grow and bloom in a flower bed of their own. Most annuals need six inches to a foot spacing, some as much as 18 to 24 inches for ease of cultivation, good air circulation and space for the roots to grow, without competing with shrubs. Mulching in the summer will take care of the weeds, keep the soil cool, and conserve moisture.

Among the ten most popular annuals are zinnia, marigold, bachelor's button, larkspur, annual phlox, snapdragon, petunia, gallardia, annual chrysanthemum and pansy. Others widely grown include verbena, sunflower, scabiosa, cosmos, China aster and pinks. Good edging annuals include ageratum, candy tuft, and annual phlox. Those with varieties of moderate height are zinnias, dwarf French marigolds, higella, larkspur, gal-

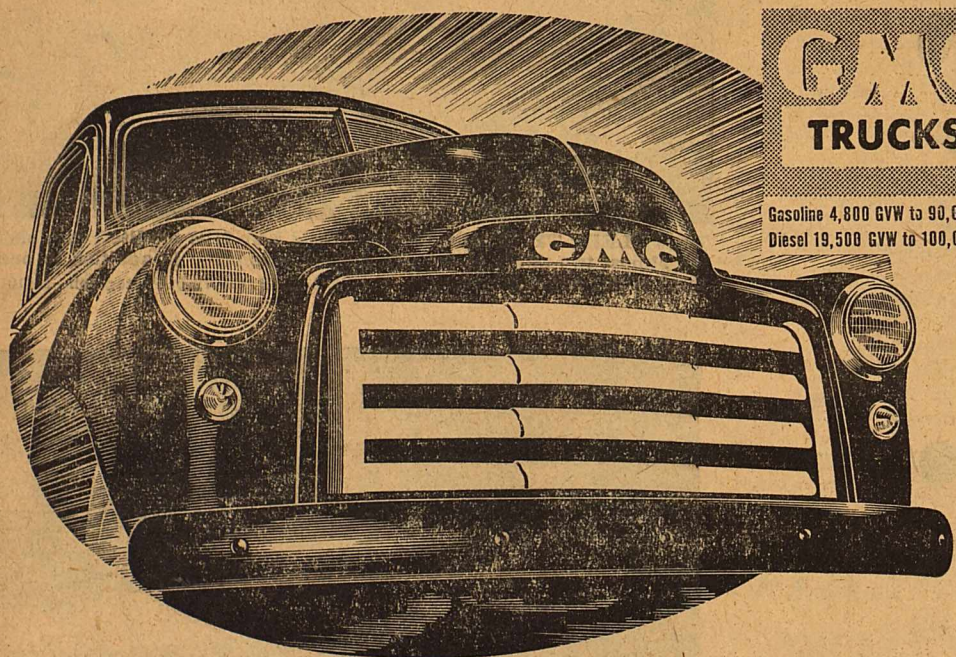

Fort Worth—Cattle sold at mostly steady prices at Fort Worth Monday. Trade was rather slow on fed beef cattle as large offerings were reported around the major marketing circle, Monday. Calves drew fully steady prices. Stocker trade was active, and firm prices were paid for replacement stock. Fat yearlings topped at \$23.

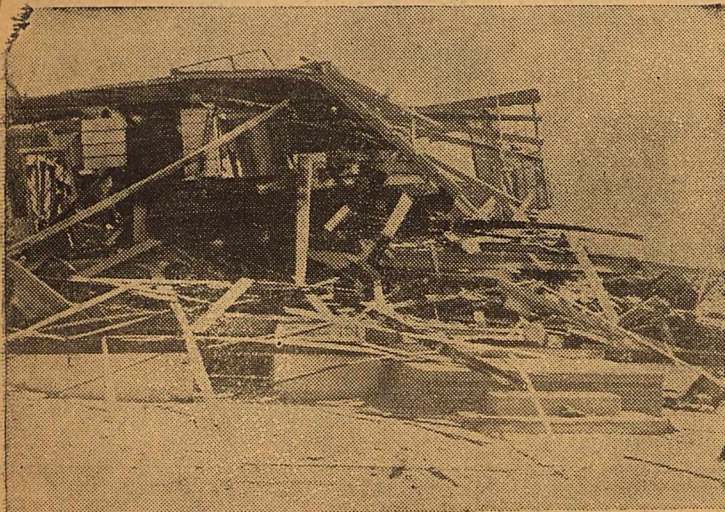
4-H and FFA boys and girls from Dickens and Keff Counties had stock on the market and provided top prices for cattle at \$23 per hundred and top prices for the

wooled lamb market at \$23. Butcher hogs sold steady to 25 cents higher and topped at \$21.75. Sows drew unchanged prices and pigs were steady.

Slaughter classes of sheep and lambs cleared at steady to 50 cents higher prices. Stocker and feeders sold at steady prices. Choice Spring lambs topped at \$24.50 and old crop woolled club lambs topped at \$23. Shorn old crop fat lambs topped at \$20.50.

Many people put off seeing their physician, when they suspect cancer, because they are afraid. And yet, this fear, resulting in delay, causes many deaths from cancer. One-half of the lives now being lost to cancer could be saved if sufferers would see their doctors in time, declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The sooner cancer is found the less likely it is to have spread to other parts of the body, making cure impossible.

Good and choice slaughter Spring lambs cashed at \$22 to \$24.50, and medium to good sorts sold from \$17 to \$22. Good and choice shorn fat lambs sold from \$19 to \$20.50, with some woolled club lambs up to \$23. Shorn yearlings and two's sold for \$16 to \$18. Slaughter ewes drew \$8 to \$11. Old wethers drew \$10 to \$12. Stocker and feeder lambs cashed at \$16 to \$18, choice kinds quotable higher.

From 4 Cylinders To Atom Engines Is Story Of 53 Years Of Subs

April 11 is the 53rd anniversary of the acceptance of the submarines Holland by the Navy Department.

John Phillip Holland built the first submarine for the Navy in 1900. It was a stubby cigar shaped craft powered by a four cylinder gasoline engine. The boat could submerge for short periods and was considered of slight military significance at the time.

Germany was the first to exploit the submarine as a major weapon of naval warfare. In the "under-seaboats", the Kaiser found the

one weapon that could challenge the might of the British Navy. In both World Wars of the 20th Century the Allies developed methods of combating the submarine menace before the German Navy completely strangled our war effort, but not before millions of tons of vital war materials and thousands of lives were lost. In the Pacific, our fleet type submarines virtually dominated the sea lanes. They sank two thirds of Japan's merchant tonnage, and one third of her naval losses.

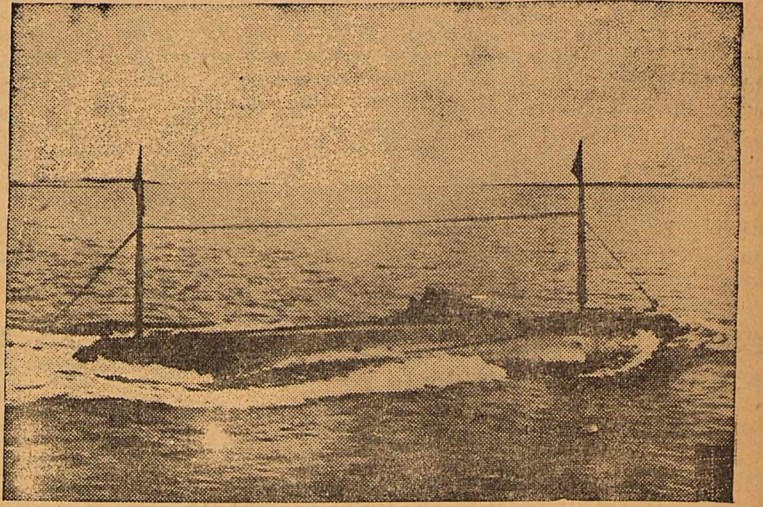

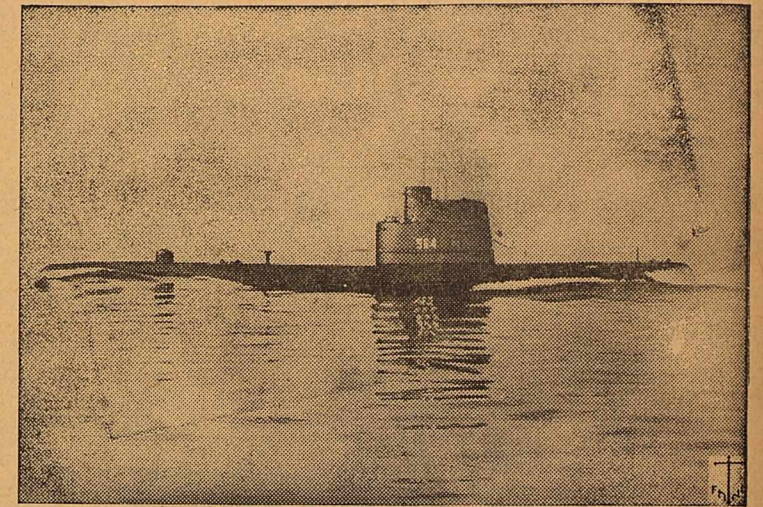

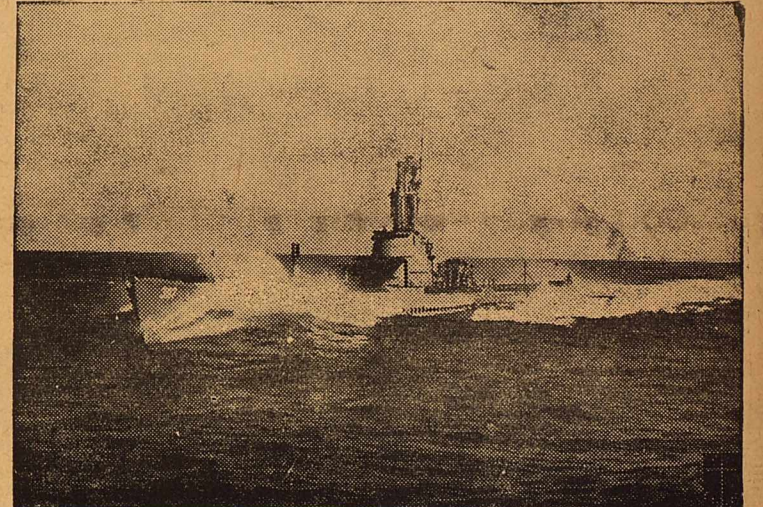

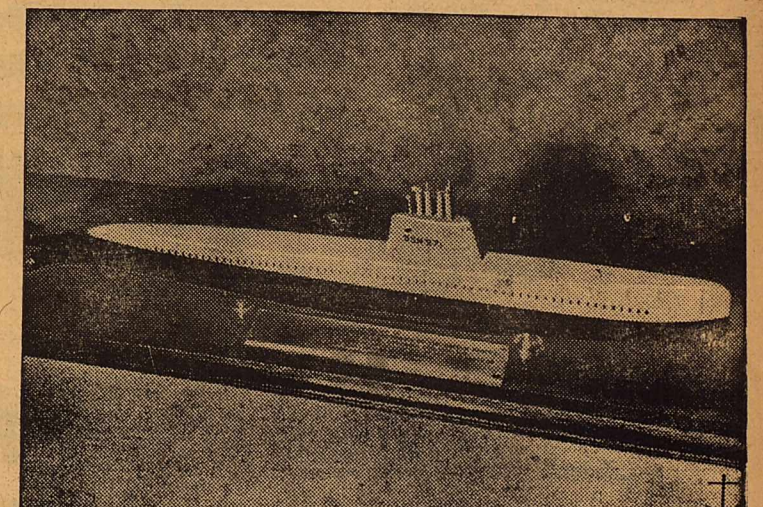

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

Q - I meet all the eligibility requirements for training under the Korean GI Bill. However, I've recently gone back on active duty. May I take a correspondence course under the program, even though I'm now in uniform?

A - No. Even though you meet all the eligibility requirements, the law requires that you be a civilian when you take your training. Veterans back on active duty may not train under the law.

Q - Is there any time limit I have to meet, in starting training under the Korean GI Bill? I have just received my discharge.

A - You must begin your training within two years of the date of your discharge. Veterans discharged before August 20, 1952, however, must begin by August 20, 1954.

Q - I have quite a large number of bills. I'm trying to pay. One of my creditors is getting impatient, and has threatened to take over my disability compensation, until his bill is paid off. Can he do this?

A - No. Disability compensation payments, as well as all other VA benefit payments, are exempt from the claims of creditors, under the law.

Q - Is a service-connected disability, incurred since Korea, enough in itself to entitle me to vocational training under Public Law 16? I have an honorable discharge.

A - No. In addition, you must have a need for training to overcome the handicap of your disability.

Q - I'm a World War II veteran and I am going back on active duty. I plan to keep my National Service Life Insurance while I'm in uniform. Do I continue to pay my premiums to the VA as I did when I was a civilian?

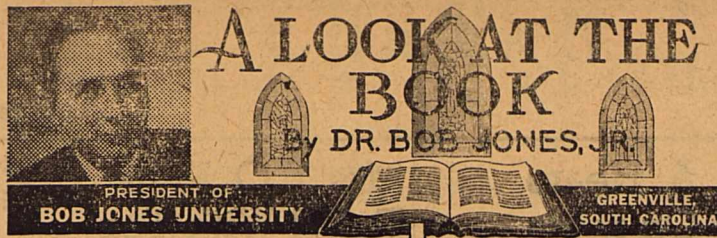

A - If you wish, you can continue to pay premiums directly to the VA. Or you can arrange with your branch of service to have the premiums paid by an allotment from your service pay. Or you may apply for waiver of premium under Public Law 23. See your Service unit's insurance officer for full details.

Q - I want to go to school under the Korean GI Bill, but I'm not sure what I want to study. Can VA give me counseling?

A - Yes. When you fill out your application blank, designate that you want counseling from VA. Sometime afterward, you will be called in for an appointment.

Fear can become man's greatest enemy. Shakespeare said, "Cow-

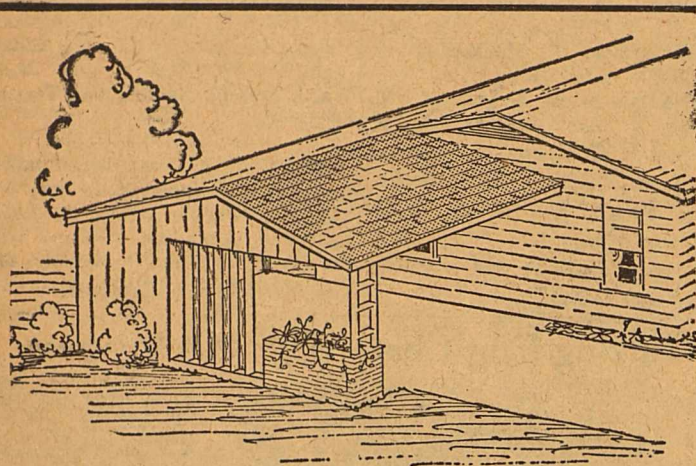

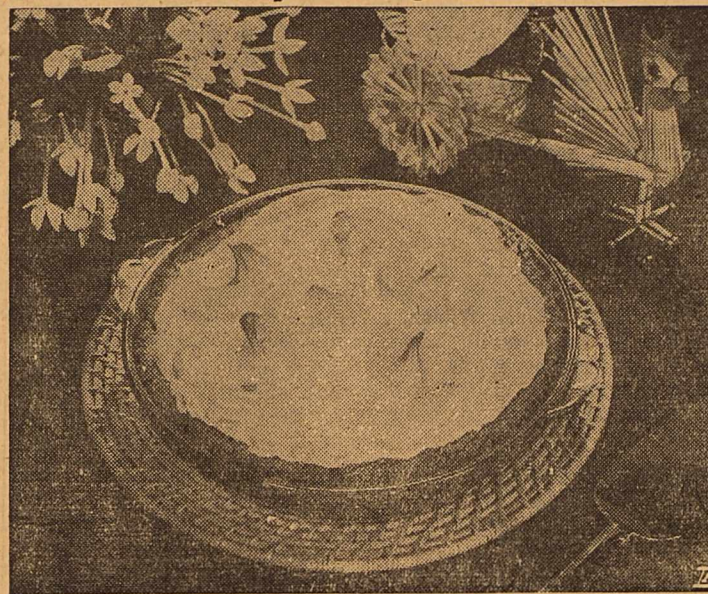

Pineapple Pie Wears A Fluffy Meringue Topping



A wedge of this delicious dessert will give a lift to a simple dinner menu.

Meringue pies look so festive they lift a simple budget dinner into a special occasion. This delicious dessert is guaranteed to do just that, for beneath the fluffy meringue topping is a cream filling combined with the always popular, delicate flavor of pineapple.

This recipe calls for crushed pineapple, but if you prefer larger pieces of fruit, substitute the same amount of undrained, plump pineapple tidbits.

You can make this dessert in a matter of minutes as the combination of ingredients is very simple. You'll find it a satisfying finale because it's not too sweet or too rich.

PINEAPPLE MERINGUE PIE

- 2 cups crushed pineapple, undrained
- 1 tsp. grated lemon peel
- 1 tsp. butter or margarine
- 2 eggs, separated
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup sugar

8-inch baked pie shell

Combine crushed, undrained pineapple, cornstarch, sugar and lemon peel in sauce pan and cook over very low heat until thick and clear. Add butter. Beat egg yolks slightly and add a little of the hot mixture to the egg yolks and blend well. Return to remainder of mixture in sauce pan and cook over low heat 1 minute longer. Cool thoroughly. Pour filling into baked pie shell. Beat egg whites until stiff and gradually beat in remaining 1/4 cup sugar. Continue beating until mixture will stand in peaks. Swirl meringue over filled pie. Bake in a moderately slow oven (325° F.) for 10 to 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Serves 6.

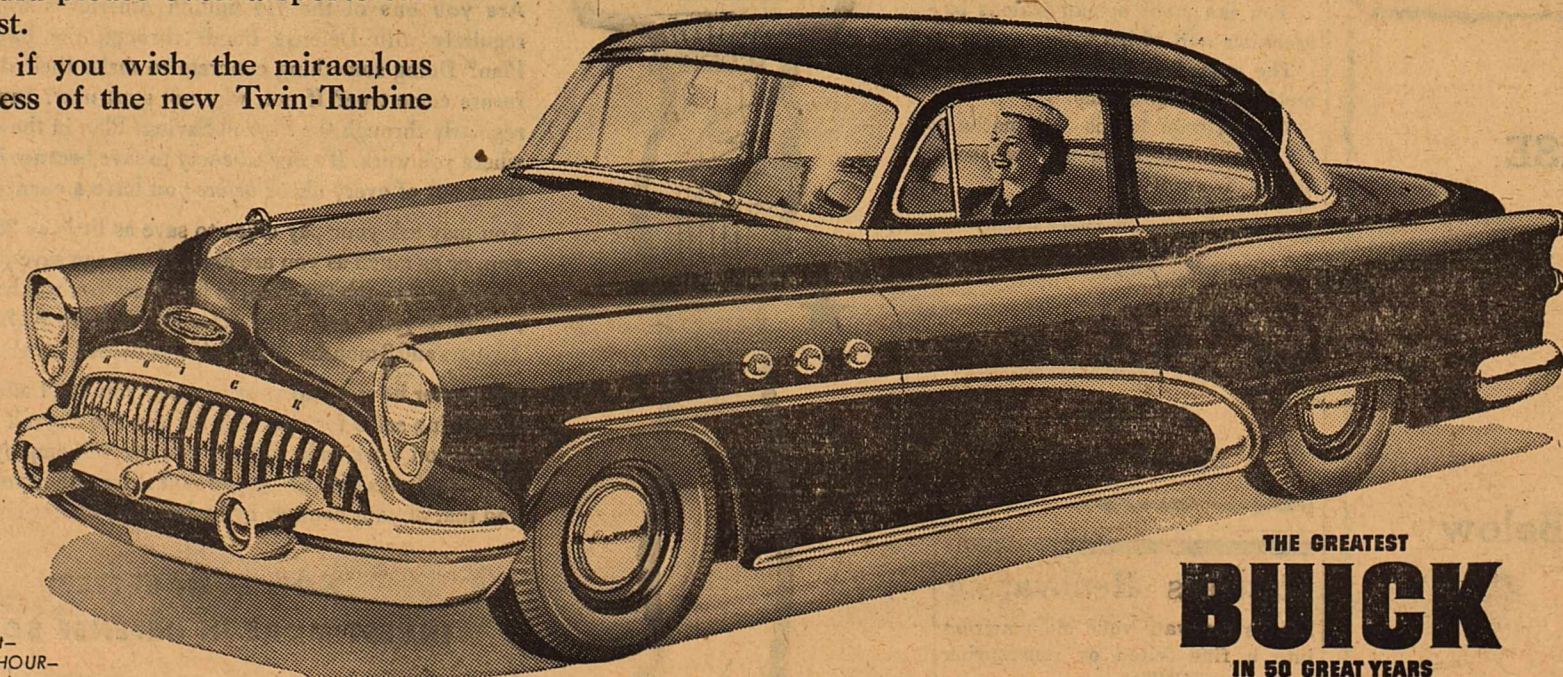

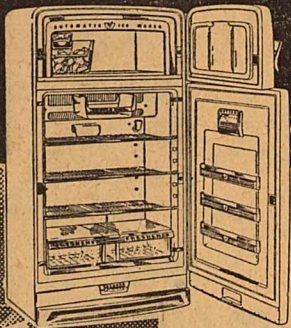

Our WASHINGTON Letter

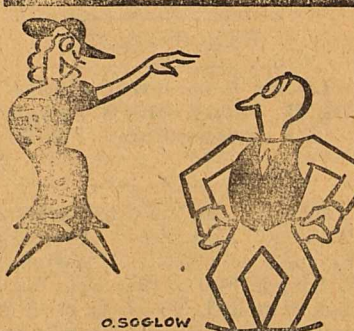


FOR THE FOURTH TIME in seven years I voted for a Tidelands bill last week. A tidal wave of public support swept the legislation through the House by a whopping 285-to-108 margin. And it looks like a certainty the Senate will follow suit, though with a closer ratio and a slightly different version.

Legislation to vacate the grab of the States' offshore lands was begun back in 1946, when the Federal Government was pressing its claim and shortly before the Supreme Court acted in the California case. The House then passed a bill by a vote of 186-to-67, with the Senate margin being 44-to-34. But President Truman vetoed it.

Then, in 1948 the House again acted, that time by a vote of 257-to-29. The Senate failed to act on that bill, and nothing more was done until 1951 when again the House took the initiative and passed a quit-claim bill by a vote of 235-to-109. But again the Senate failed to act.

Last year, by an overwhelming majority of 247-to-89, the House rammed through another bill, and the Senate concurred by a vote of 50-to-35. Again Truman vetoed, and a lot of people gloated over their claim that Tidelands legislation was forever dead. The left-wing ADA and the CIO were particularly vocal on the subject.

But a cause is never settled until it is settled right. And so last week the House again confirmed title to the States in their own

submerged lands, this time by the majority of 247-to-89, the Senate is now debating the issue, and it looks like a cinch that at last another bill will go to the White House, and this time will be approved by President Eisenhower.

It is hoped that this legislation will have some effect on the Supreme Court and cause that august body to confine itself in the future to the job of making judicial decisions rather than trying to invade the province of Congress and, in effect, legislating.

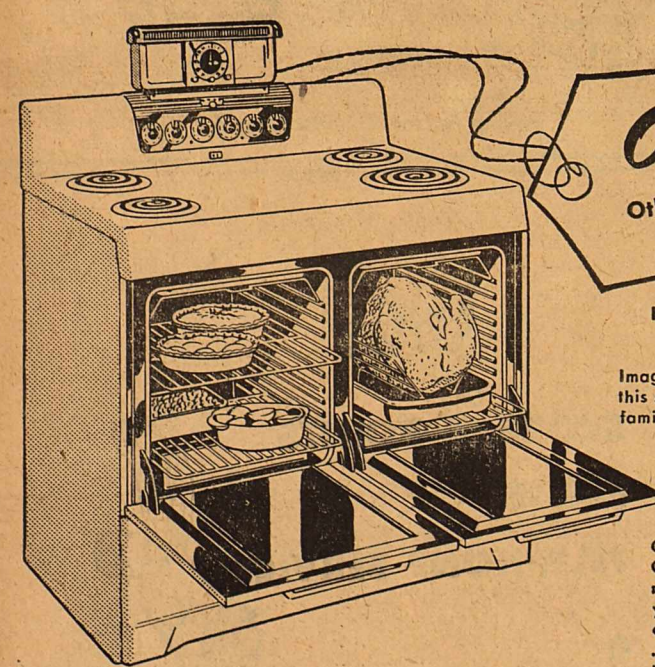

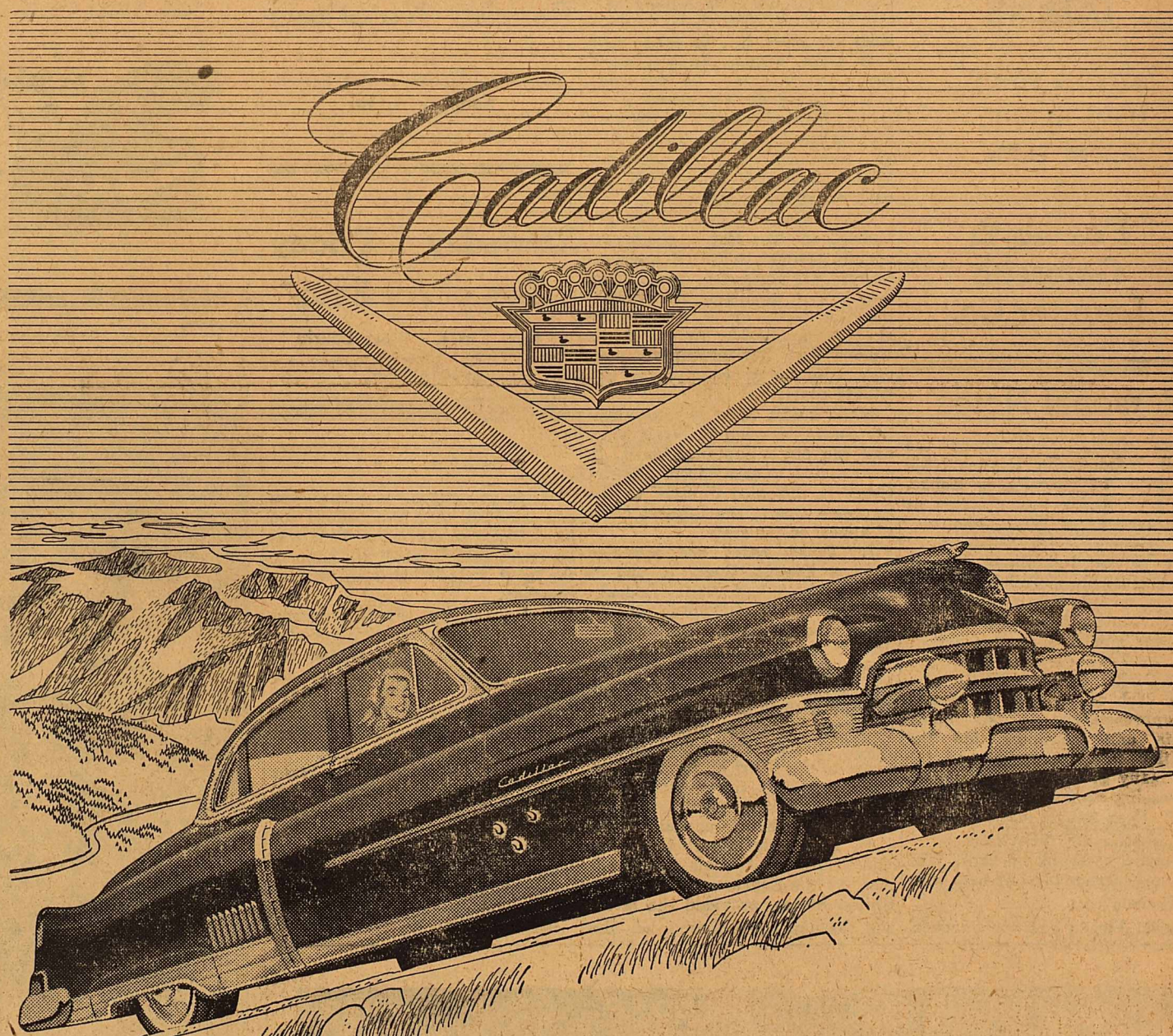

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

INDIVIDUAL RIGHTS PROTECTED BY COURTS OF APPEAL

The institution of appellate courts, of which the U. S. Supreme Court is the highest, illustrates how America has tackled the problem of attaining justice. Plato long ago showed the idea of justice is difficult to come by. It is perhaps even more difficult to translate into human conduct and apply in the settlement of individual cases.

How does a case come before an appellate court? If you and your neighbor have dispute over the property line between your two lots, you would be foolish to go to court for a settlement if you did not believe that right was on your side. Therefore, practically every civil action that comes before a trial court originates in an honest difference of opinion as to what the law or the facts of that case are.

But right cannot be on both sides; so one or the other of the litigants must be mistaken. When you seek legal counsel on such a question, it frequently happens that your lawyer will advise you not to go to court. Only a relatively small percentage of cases reach trial. The law is clear enough so that among the millions of transactions taking place in the country only a relatively few ever result in lawsuit.

But suppose you and your lawyer have decided that your case has enough merit to warrant going to court. The facts on both sides are presented, the lawyers on both sides argue the merits of their clients' cases and the court is then called upon to render a decision. In some cases this decision will be based on findings of a jury. The vast majority of the cases are settled then and there with the decision of the trial judge.

But judges, like all of us, are human, and the law is complicated and subject to varied interpretation. At times the trial judge may err in admitting or evaluating the facts, or in interpreting the law applicable to the facts. Under such circumstances your case may be appealed to an appellate court.

Some states have no intermediate courts between the trial court and the state Supreme Court. In such states a case from District Court is appealed directly to the Supreme Court, the highest court of appeal in the state.

In Texas, cases are appealed from a District Court to one of eleven Courts of Civil Appeals. Sometimes the judgment of the latter court is final, as in ordinary divorce cases not involving property. But if the case meets certain requirements it may be further appealed to the Supreme Court of Texas. Criminal cases are appealed directly from the District Court to the Court of Criminal Appeals, which is the highest state court in criminal matters.

Federal cases are appealed from a U. S. District Court to a Circuit Court of Appeals and from there to the Supreme Court of the United States, provided the latter will assume jurisdiction of the

When you appeal your case, you ask that the error you believe you have found be corrected. If it was an error, that is what will happen. The trial judge's decision will be reversed.

Sometimes the courts are compelled to decide a question one way because the laws says so, but the results bring to light serious defects on the existing law. When such an injustice is discovered, the legislature may remedy the defect by passing laws to correct it.
