



Many manufactured products made in Texas also depend heavily on foreign outlets. Included on the list are aircraft and parts, oil field equipment, numerous chemicals, refined petroleum products, iron and steel foundry products.

The export market is of tremendous importance to Texas. Most opposition to extending the Reciprocal Trade Act comes from members of the President's own party. Democrats are almost solidly for the extension.

OIL IMPORTS: All Texas owes thanks to General Ernest O. Thompson and the State Railway Commission for their efforts to solve the problem of competitive oil imports. Due to their work, many large companies are voluntarily restricting imports. I hope they will continue and step up this cooperation with General Thompson and the Commission.

It seems to me the oil industry would not want Federal control because of a temporary maladustment. Federal control inevitably is imposed at the rice of some loss of State sovereignty and individual freedom. I hope we can real problem within the framework of this philosophy.
