**THE MONTH** of August may turn out to be a vital one for Parmer County taxpayers, since officials are holding meetings regarding their taxes at all levels—county, state and federal.

The Parmer County Tax Appraisal Board is winding up its third week of hearings for those who filed a letter of protest with the board.

Members of the board have indicated that after hearing county taxpayers, they are considering making an economic hardship reduction on the values of homes and improvements, but not the farmland.

The amount of such a reduction in values has not been established, but from visiting with taxpayers all across the county, we feel that they will welcome any relief possible. Our county definitely has been in an economic vacuum, and placing values considerably higher than they were in 1982 was completely wrong, in our opinion.

Meanwhile, the special session of the state legislature is addressing the tax situation, and with the state facing a several billion dollar deficit, all we can do is hold our breath and hope that whatever the legislature comes up with will be something we as taxpayers can live with.

The governor has already proposed a hike in the sales tax, which to most people's way of thinking is the fairest tax we pay. No one likes to have a tax increase, but if we're going to have one, we might as well have one that will affect all taxpayers on an equal basis.

Also, while all this is going on, the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives are working on the so-called tax reform bill.

Again, most taxpayers, especially those who consider themselves in the "middle class" bracket, are apprehensive as to what the two houses of congress may come up with on this re-vamping of the tax structure.

Don't know about you, but this is one taxpayer who is always a little squeamish when the elected officials begin to mess with our tax system.

## School Presents Schedule

Students in the Bovina School District will begin school on Tuesday, September 2.

The following is a time schedule for students in grades pre-kindergarten through the eighth grade: pre-kindergarten, 8:30 a.m.-11:30 a.m.; kindergarten, 8:30 a.m.-2:55 p.m.; and grades two-eight, 8:30 a.m.-3:41 p.m.

Grades pre-kindergarten, kindergarten and grade one will attend school at Ridgelea. Grade two has been moved to Bovina Elementary School and students should report there for class.

To be eligible for enrollment in a pre-kindergarten class a child must be at least four years of age and must be:

1. Unable to speak and comprehend the English language; or
2. From a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level.

Pre-kindergarten students should have a birth certificate and immunization records to enroll.

Kindergarten students must be at least five years of age on or before September 1, 1986 to be eligible for enrollment. Birth certificates and a record of immunizations should be presented at the time of enrollment.

Students through the eighth grade will register the first day of school during the first period.

## County To Join Health Coalition

Parmer County Commissioners voted to join the Panhandle Health Care Coalition at its regular session on Monday, August 11.

Cost of being a member of the coalition will be one per cent of the county's general revenue tax levy, or approximately \$6,632.94.

The regional coalition is to take care of indigents. The court also adopted a definition of indigency, and set out guidelines as stated in the Texas Department of Human Services handbook on the County Indigent Health Care Program.

Mrs. Pearl Cervantez of Bovina was appointed as County Health Care coordinator for the program.

Beelee Goodwin, city manager of the City of Friona, and Roger Field, ambulance driver for the City of Friona, met with the court and presented figures on ambulance trips for the past two and one-half years and asked to be considered for more subsidy for the ambulance service. A motion was passed to put the request on the list of things to be considered when considering the proposed budget for 1987.

A bill was approved from Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home of Friona for the use of their facilities in performing four autopsies. The bill amount was \$400.

Kim Hanks of Midland met with the court, asking about the possibility of leasing some minerals from the Parmer County School lands in Gaines and Andrews counties. A motion was passed to find out that the land in question is clear, and then the county will advertise for bids according to law, the bids to be opened on the next court day, August 28.

Accountant Bernie Gowens met with the court to discuss the proposed budget and to get additions and deletions which the court had in mind.

After considering the proposed budget and noting changes, a motion was passed that the proposed budget be presented at a hearing for comment from the public. This public hearing is to be held in the County Courtroom at the courthouse in Farwell on August 28, starting at 5 p.m.

Soil work was approved for two farms in Precinct 2. The work is to be performed by county machinery when not otherwise needed, and costs are paid by the benefitting farmers.

Due to a conflict, the next commissioner's meeting will be held on Friday, August 28 at 10 a.m., rather than Monday as is generally the case.

## School Term To Begin September 2

Bovina School will begin the 1986-87 school term on Tuesday, September 2. Teachers will begin their in-service workdays on Friday, August 22.

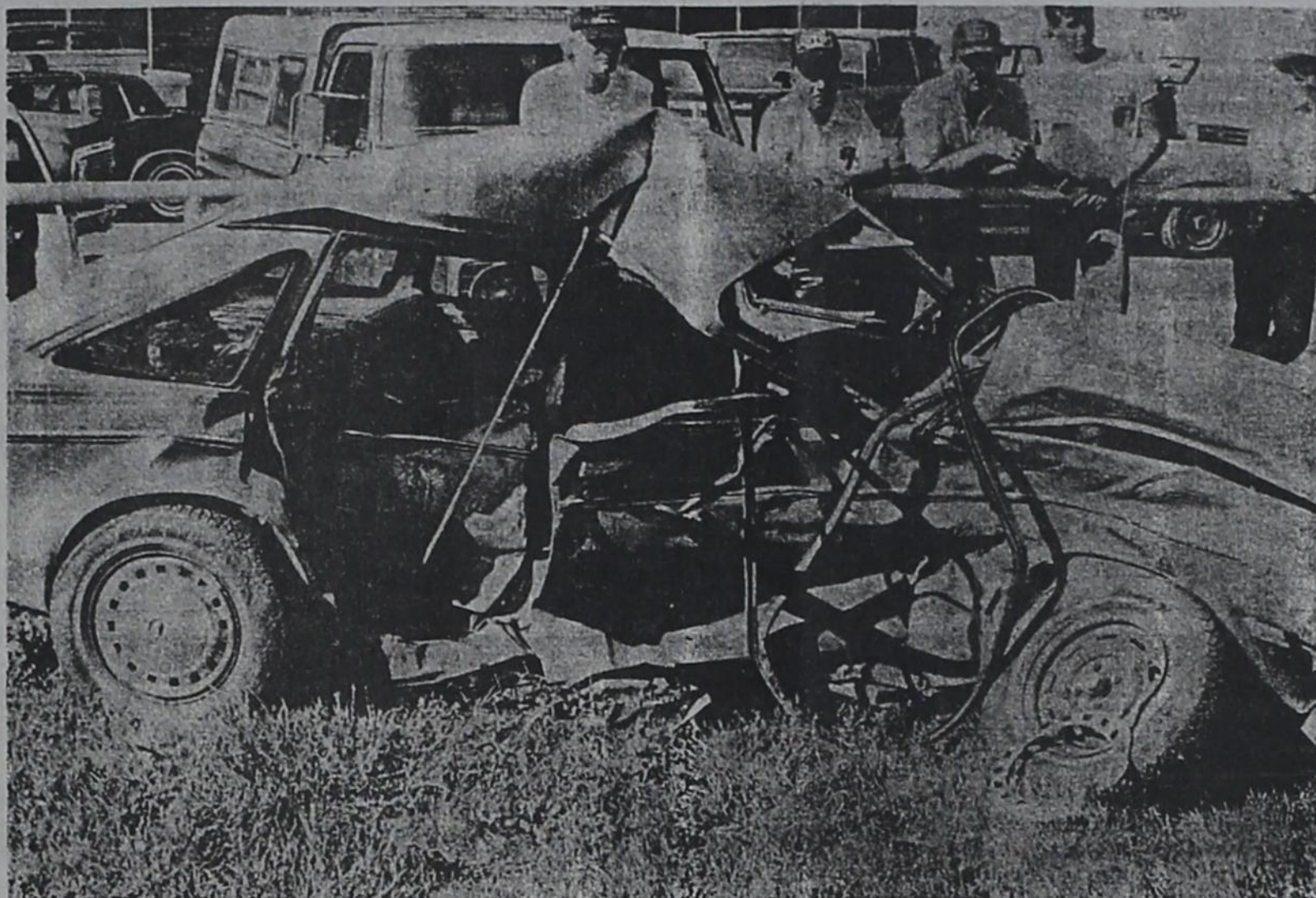

## Local Ladies Return From Alaskan Tour

Maesie Flynn and her sister, Grace Parr of Friona, drove to Amarillo where they met with twenty-four people at 6 p.m. from the First National Bank and Royal Roadrunners Club of Tucumcari, New Mexico for a get-acquainted evening at the Sheraton Hotel. Here they spent the night and left the next day on a trip to Anchorage, Alaska. The flight took five and one-half hours from Amarillo. They changed planes in Denver, Colorado and flew the remainder of their trip by United B767.

They arrived on Monday, July 14 and were transferred by motor coach to their hotel. They spent two nights at the Anchorage Westward Hilton. Maesie said Anchorage gets its name from being a good place for ships to anchor.

The next morning, the group toured to Portage Glacier and had lunch at Alyeska Ski Resort. The ride on the chair lift carried them on a mile long ride atop Mr. Alyeska, for a spectacular view. They had lunch there and Maesie said they paid \$8.50 for a small bowl of soup and homebaked dinner roll. Also served was a huge cinnamon roll that she ate on for two days. At this resort, they were told about the jade of Alaska and their Hematite, Black

Diamonds. That afternoon they took a four and one-half hour tour of Anchorage. The population there is 255,000 and the elevation is 92 feet. They visited the Cook Inlet, an arm of the Pacific, part of the tide in Cook Inlet varies forty feet a day. Anchorage is earthquake country. Minor tremors are frequent. A large scale destruction such as the one on Good Friday, March 27, 1964 took place when 70 per cent of the city was destroyed.

They passed near the U.S. Elmendorf Air Force Base built in 1940 and is the world's largest float plane base in the world. It is said that Alaskan teenagers get their flying licenses, along with their driving licenses. They visited Mantanuska Valley, forty miles northeast of Anchorage and it was settled in 1930 by drought stricken midwestern farmers. The growing season lasts only four months. The

long daylight hours produce record size vegetables. Turnips reach seven pounds, cabbage 70 pounds and the potatoes grow huge.

In this area they visited the Hilton Gift Shop which featured scrimshaw ivory, hand sewn parkas, walrus tusk carvings and skin masks.

Wednesday, July 16, the ladies enjoyed a conversation with Johnny Cash, who was in the lobby and checking out of the hotel. On the wall of the restaurant at the Hilton were these words: Alaska Food Call: Foods up! Soups on! Chow time! Come and get it! What's on the hook! Coming up in the next bucket! Take it or leave it, eat 'em up, chow down and let's eat! Dinner rrr!

On Thursday, July 17, they took their wildlife tour into Denali Park. Denali gets its name from

## Taxpayers Urged To Attend Hearings

Ron Procter, manager of the Parmer County Tax Appraisal District Office, this week stressed the importance for taxpayers to attend budget and rate hearings by the various taxing entities in the county.

The Parmer County Tax Appraisal Board has been busy meeting with taxpayers for the past three weeks, and Procter said most taxpayers have the idea that the central office in Bovina sets all of the tax rates.

"All we have control over is the value of the property. We can help people with the values, but there are two other steps involved—the budget hearings to decide what the entities are going to spend, and then later on, depending on my recommended tax rate, they (the entities) will meet to decide on whether to accept the rate or to increase it," Procter said.

"It is just as important for taxpayers to attend these other hearings as it is for them to see us on their property values. We're not trying to push the blame off on the

taxing entities, but many people have the misconception that our office controls what the tax rate will be," Procter said.

Procter said that after conducting the hearings for the past two weeks, the tax appraisal board is considering placing an economic factor on the recent appraisals, due to the slack condition of the economy in Parmer County.

"A pattern is developing from the taxpayers we have heard. I feel virtually certain that they will make an across the board adjustment, but just what percentage will be up to the board," Procter said.

## Local Man Sustains Injuries

A two-vehicle accident in front of Cook's Truck Stop Saturday resulted in the injury of seven Texas residents, one critically.

Calvin F. Cook, 81, of Bovina, was listed in critical condition Saturday from injuries he sustained when he apparently turned in front of another vehicle while turning into the truck stop.

Lisa Valasquez, 21, Muleshoe, the driver of the other vehicle, went into surgery shortly after the accident for a leg injury.

The other passengers in Ms. Valasquez' vehicle were also injured. They were: Theresa Coleman, 20; Jamie Hernandez, 20; Patty Hernandez, 19; a nine-year-old boy and a 19-month-old girl, all of Muleshoe.

Cloviss traffic officer Mike Reeves said Cook, driving a Chevrolet Chevette, was eastbound and apparently tried to turn from the center turning lane into the truck stop.

Ms. Valasquez, in a Chevrolet Citation, was driving west and according to witnesses tried to swerve and avoid the collision. Both vehicles came to a rest in a grassy patch on the north side of the highway.

Reeves said all of the injured were taken to Clovis High Plains Hospital for treatment.

He said Cook was wearing his seat belt. In the other vehicle, only the 19-month-old was definitely restrained in a child-seat. The rest of the passengers either did not have on seat belts or could not remember if they did or not.

Reeves said citations have not been issued yet.

Five players have been added, with the prospects of two or three others, to the Bovina Mustangs' football squad, making for some optimism in the Mustangs' camp this week.

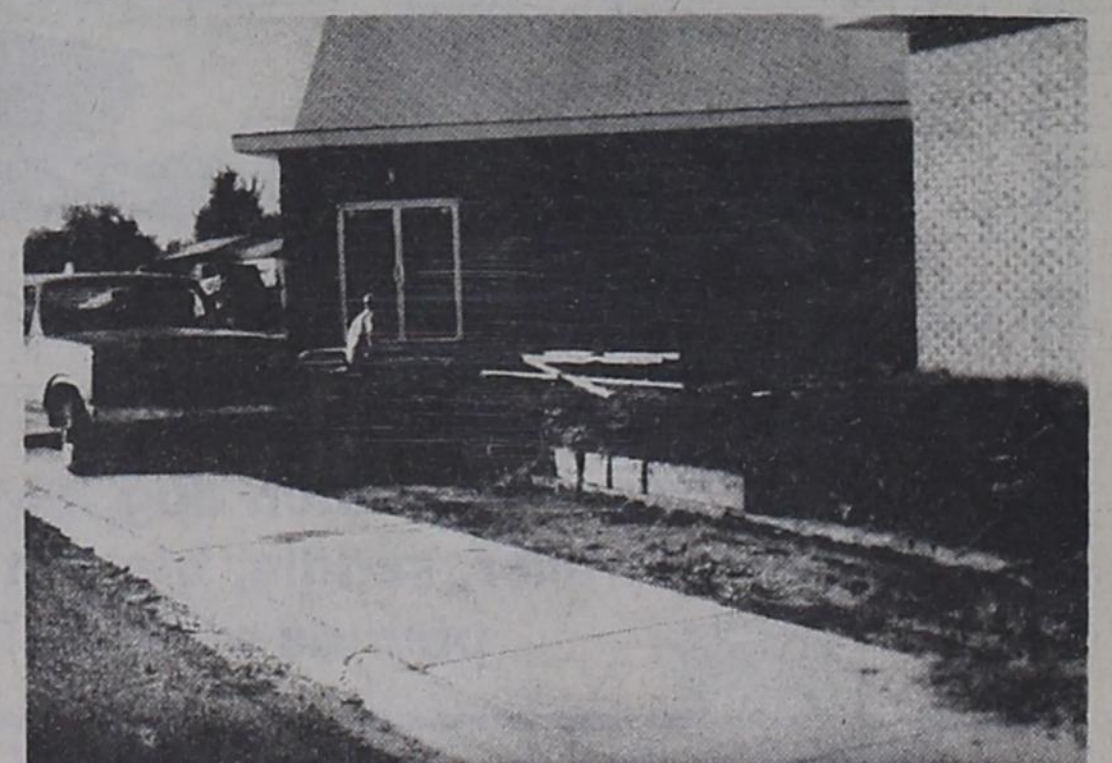

## 30 YEARS AGO--AUG. 8, 1956

Approximately \$4500 worth of remodeling is being done on a wooden frame building located at the south end of Bovina High School's football field. The improvements will change the former classroom building into a "nice" fieldhouse for athletic teams.

The much planned and discussed curbs and gutters for Highway 60 are being put in. Construction on the improvements for the main route through Bovina began the middle of last week.

Sixteen new barrels of storage space are being added to the Sherley Grain Company's storage space, Harry Johnson, employee of the elevator, announces. The barrels will be 24 feet across. The addition will increase the elevator's storage capacity by almost one-third, or one million bushels. Construction of 200,000 bushels of storage space for Bovina Wheat Growers is scheduled to begin the latter part of this week. The new building will be located between the present concrete structure and the office.

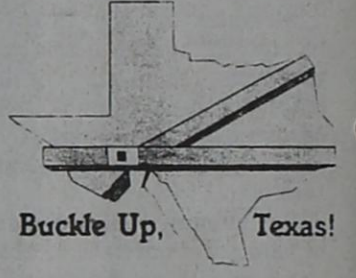
## Local Students Graduate At West Texas

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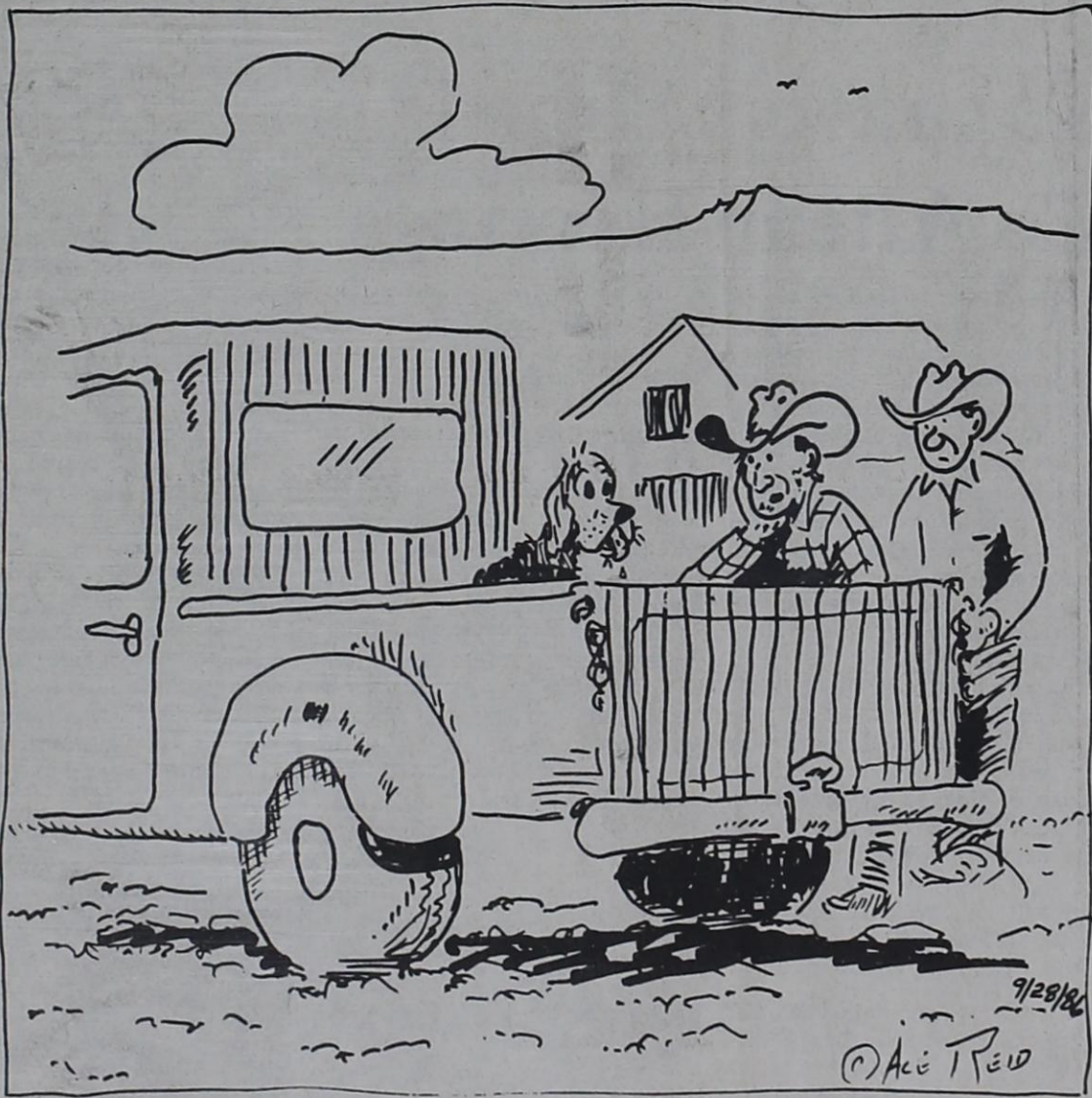

## Sesquicentennial Notes

Following is the history of St. Ann's Catholic Church in Bovina as taken from *Prairie Progress*, the history of Parmer County:

The Reverend James A. Campbell, pastor of St. Anthony's parish in Hereford in the course of his missionary travels, found a large group of Spanish speaking people at Bovina. The first record of Bovina in the church register is the baptism of Simon Morales, born at Bovina and baptized by Fr. David Dunn at Amarillo December 11, 1907.

1908, the Stephen Jesko family came to the Panhandle from Indiana settling south of Friona in the following year. John E. Hermes of Cincinnati had bought land west of Bovina in 1909; his brothers Henry Ben and George Reisinger were living on this property. Mass was celebrated once a month in the Jesko and Reisinger homes alternately.

With the aid of Stephen Jesko, who at the time was serving as county commissioner for Parmer County, and a gift of \$500 from the Extension Society, Fr. Campbell obtained from the Capitol Land Syndicate, which was then developing the town sites of Bovina and Farwell and furthering the settlement of Parmer County, a schoolhouse at Bovina to be used as a church. It was named by him in honor of St. Ann, the Mother of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

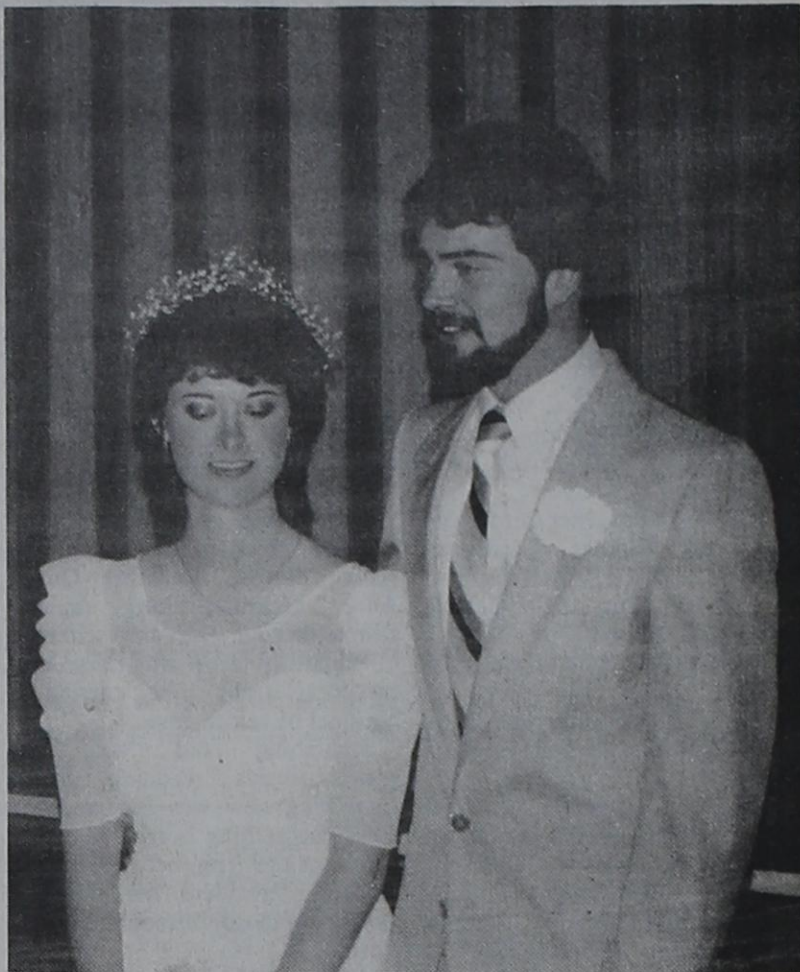
1913, Stephen Jesko purchased land from the syndicate at a reduced price with the stipulation that it would always be used for church purposes. Mr. Jesko

bought the first organ for the new church. The building was set up on blocks and had no heating. Bishop Walsh of Dallas dedicated the church in 1916 feeling the need of help in his work, Fr. Campbell began to correspond with Ft. Paul James Francis, the founder and first superior general of the Friars of the Atonement. It was truly providential for both. Fr. Campbell received the help he so badly needed and the Friars found in the work of this zealous Priest the call and opportunity to make their first missionary foundation. The Friars in the person of Fr. Salvator and Bro. James arrived in Hereford June, 1920.

Fr. Campbell's health began to fail and August, 1918, he was obligated to give up his work in Hereford. He returned to his native Canada where he remained for a few years, later returning to the Panhandle. He died in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo July 9, 1927, and is buried in Llano Cemetery.

After the departure of Fr. Campbell, Hereford, and consequently Bovina were without a resident priest for nearly two years. During this time Fr. J.J. Dolje, pastor of St. Mary's Church, Umbarger, came periodically to celebrate mass and to minister to the spiritual needs of the growing numbers of people in Bovina.

Adam and Kip Murphy were in Bovina visiting with their

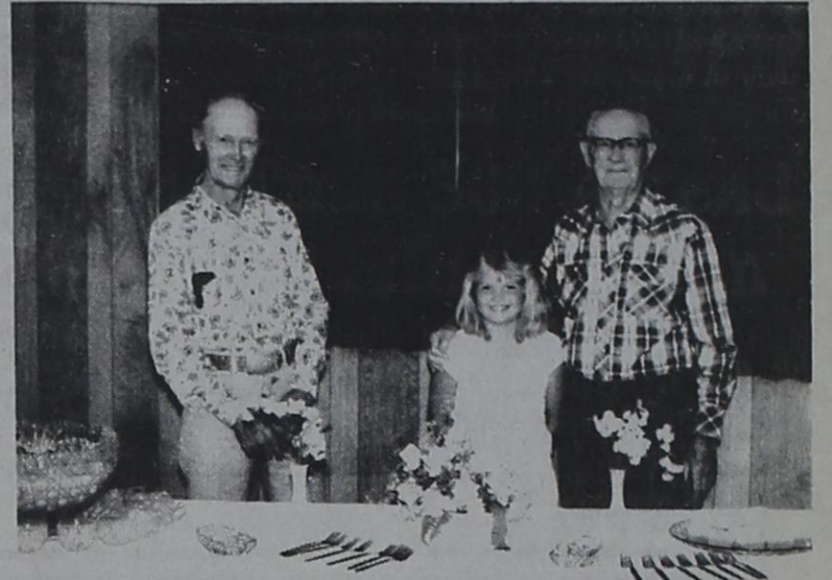

the Indians meaning great one-Mt. McKinley. Mt. McKinley is North America's highest peak, elevation 20,320 feet. The 3,000 square mile park is the largest protected wilderness area in the United States. There are 37 different mammals, including moose, dall sheep, caribou, grizzly bear, golden eagle, jaguar, hawks and ptarmigan (state bird). On their trip they saw several bears, eagles, dall marmots and one caribou. There are 430 species of flowering plants and among them, the look-alike Texas blue bonnet. That afternoon their tour continued over the George Parks Highway to Fairbanks, Alaska, the second largest city located in the heart of Alaska. There they spent the night at the Travelers Inn.

The next morning the group took a little time to do some shopping, trips to the beauty shop and even to the laundry room. That afternoon they took a historical tour of Fairbanks. Fairbanks calls itself the Golden Heart of Alaska and it was until the late 1930s when gold became scarce. Years later, the city again became the center of a new rush-black gold and so the city is again a boom town. Gold is making a slight comeback, working mines and giant dredges are in operation. That afternoon they visited one of these places and for \$5.00 one could try gold panning and kept all they found.

They visited the beautiful University of Alaska, which had lovely flowers and garden vegetables growing nearby. The temperature can drop to 60 degrees. Summer temperatures can climb to 90 degrees. Daylight hours are 21 hours in June and in July it never really gets dark.

They visited the Trans-Alaska pipeline, which was only a short distance from Fairbanks and it was explained that it was built to withstand often cruel Alaskan climate. Half of the 800 miles the pipeline travels is above ground on vertical supports. The line is heavily insulated to maintain a pumpable temperature. They claim the pipeline can withstand earthquake shock, registering 8.5 on the richterscale.

The next day, they traveled to the famed Alaskan Highway, formerly known as the Alcan Highway, crossing the international boundary into Beaver Creek, Yukon territory, Canada. The U.S. citizens had to carry identification, such as birth certificates or passports. They spent the night there.

On Sunday, July 20, they made a trip to Whitehorse, Capitol of the Yukon. Whitehorse is said to have gotten its name from prospectors, who landed there to dry out after running the Yukon River rapids. To them it looked like flying manes of horses. There the group enjoyed shopping and had fun at the Frantic Follies. They spent the night at the

Whitehorse Sheffield House.

The group continued to travel to the "Trail of the '98," over the Alpine White Pass to the Klondike Gold Rush, National Historical Park of Skagway. They spent the night at Klondike Skagway.

The next day they took the MV Fairweather Cruise which lasted four and one-half hours on the Lynn Canal. Here they saw marine life, rugged forests, waterfalls and glaciers of the coastal range. This was a sixty mile cruise. They saw whales and many eagles. It is said that Alaska has more eagles than all the states combined. They had a good view here of the Eldred Light House and they were served lunch with a drink called Alaskan Yukon coffee, \$4.00 a cup and you keep the mug. The gift shops here featured swarovski, crystals from Austria (very expensive), ending this tour at Yankee Cover.

They visited Alaska's most visited glacier which is the Mendenhall Glacier and is a part of 1,500 mile square Juneau Ice Field, where the Mendenall and 35 other glaciers begin. That evening, they arrived in Juneau, Capitol of Alaska, transferred to the Holland American Nieuw Amsterdam. They sailed at midnight from Juneau.

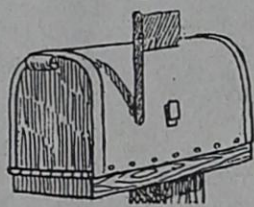
On Wednesday, July 23, they began a four day cruise on the beautiful Nieuw Amsterdam, which is a luxury ship of 33,930 tons, 704 feet long, nine passenger decks, seven passenger elevators, broaddecks for sports, elegant dining rooms, super lounges, staterooms, cardrooms, cafeteria or you can build your own hamburger, on deck. There's also a late night buffet, you can eat around the clock. All the meals are paid for in the package price. They also have casinos, bingo, shuffle boards, health spas and several swimming pools.

From their ship they saw glaciers that appeared royal blue and were 600 feet high. They also saw several calves, which are great slabs of ice breaking loose and falling into the seas. The sound is like thunder and causes a great wave in the ocean.

They arrived in Sitka, which is Alaska's most scenic historic city and looks out over the sea. Islands dot the harbor in this area.

On Saturday, their cruise came to an end as they sailed into Vancouver, British Columbia. They cleared customs and took a motorcoach to Gate 10. Vancouver Harbor is one of the most spectacular in the world and is in the same class with Hong Kong and Rio. Maesie said there were 1,300 people aboard ship and on their tour they met several retired school teachers, railroad men, housewives, ranchers and all phases of life.

The ladies certainly enjoyed their trip, but said they were happy to be back home, and arrived home on July 27.



## Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

Please post the following information for your patrons to read.

Postmaster General Albert V. Casey has asked the American public for assistance in helping to locate the senders of over 200 pieces of World War II Victory Mail (V-Mail) found in an attic in Raleigh, North Carolina.

The V-Mail was written between May 3-21, 1944 by airmen and soldiers aboard a cargo and troop transport Liberty Ship, the Caleb Strong, enroute from Newport News, Virginia to the Mediterranean port of Oran, Algeria. Ninety-three of the servicemen aboard the Caleb Strong wrote to 117 addresses in 34 states. A young man from Raleigh (now deceased) was to post the letters but, for an unknown reason, did not do so. Instead, he left an Army duffel bag full of the mail--and some old socks--in his aunt's attic.

Found by an exterminator, the mail, with the aunt's permission, was turned over to the Raleigh Postmaster in June.

He promised that the Postal Service would do its best to deliver or return the correspondence. Within a few days, one veteran was found and leads were developed on two others now living in Oklahoma and one living in West Virginia. The remainder of the letters were sent to Washington, D.C. where Postal Officials have begun a national search.

So far, 16 letters have been returned to four veterans and the son of a deceased veteran. With the cooperation of the Veterans Administration, the Postal Service is trying to locate the remaining veterans or their families.

"We appreciate the Veterans Administration's assistance on locating current addresses," said Casey. "Unfortunately, some of the addresses they have date back to 1950 and beyond, or there is no record or address at all. In addition, some of the veterans are deceased, and it is hard to trace widows or children who surely would like to have the letters."

"The Veterans Administration is continuing to search, and the Postal Service is looking for individuals in specific cities. But we also are asking the media to publish the names and the public to let us know if a relative's name appears on the list," Casey said. "We want anyone who thinks one of the servicemen is a relative to supply the Postal Service with the man's military identification number as a way to check if it is the same serviceman."

"The veterans who have received their letters tell us they are of high personal value to them, rekindling memories of friendships and historic events of thousands of young men and their families," the

Postmaster General said.

## More Than 300 Attend Pleasant Hill Reunion

The Pleasant Hill Community Reunion festivities got underway August 6 with over 300 former residents, current residents, and former teachers and students of the now-defunct school system gathering from over 17 different states for the second old-fashioned reunion in eight years.

Graduates from 1917 to 1949 gathered for their individual class reunions, fellowship and the added festivities.

Howard Whitener of the Pleasant Hill community, was emcee. Following the buffet-style noon meal for all attendants, several presentations were made.

One of the honorees was Mrs. Grace Whitener, 91, of Cleveland, Texas. She was honored as the "oldest former resident" present.

Mrs. Whitener was also the oldest female teacher present that day. She taught music for one year in the Pleasant Hill School. After that, she taught school in her home. She studied music since she was five years old and finished her studies in Illinois before coming to Pleasant Hill to teach. At that time, she lived in the teacherage.

She married Noah Whitener August 19, 1916 in the home of Fred Hill of Pleasant Hill. They later moved to Espanola and she taught school there for one year.

After her husband died she moved to Albuquerque and went to work for the U.S. Forest Service. About a year and half later her health gave out and she moved to Houston. She worked there as a certified public accountant until she retired and moved to Cleveland.

Vondalee Page was recognized and honored with a plaque for "the person traveling the farthest distance" to attend the reunion. Page is from Wasilla, Alaska.

At one time, he was the superintendent of the largest school district in Alaska, the Matanuska-Susitna Borough School District, which covers 25,000 square miles and 13 schools. He served this district from 1962-1970. He was also superintendent at Dellingham, Alaska, a small fishing town and a principal of a school in the Santa Fe area. He retired from administration in 1970.

Roy Melugin was honored as the oldest teacher at the reunion. He was awarded a plaque for his

service. He served as superintendent of Pleasant Hill School from 1933-1937.

Roy Hungate of Clovis was recognized as being one of the "first graduates" of Pleasant Hill High School in 1917. There were only four members of that class. Roy is the only surviving member.

Roy's father, W.W. Hungate, was one of four other land owners to donate two acres of land for the Pleasant Hill Community development. On the portion of land he donated, the grocery store and stables were built.

Many former teachers at Pleasant Hill School were recognized and introduced. Also mentioned were those who traveled 1,000 miles or more.

Everyone registered at the beginning of the reunion and name tags were issued. Specially prepared Pleasant Hill community reunion booklets were available from the 1978 reunion. The booklets give a capsule size history of the community as well as listings of all the former students and the teachers. Another section is devoted to brief histories of former Pleasant Hill residents.

The building that is now the community center used to be the teacherage. The building was built in the early 1930's. It housed seven apartments, with the largest being the superintendent's quarters.

## Gollihugh Rites Held

Funeral services for Roy H. Gollihugh, 83, of Amarillo, were held Tuesday, August 19, in Central Church of the Nazarene. Burial was in Memorial Park Cemetery.

Gollihugh was born in Denison and had worked for Santa Fe Railroad for 33 years before his retirement in 1969. He was a member of Central Church of the Nazarene. He died Saturday, August 16.

Survivors include his wife, Bessie of the home in Amarillo; two sons, Otis of Phoenix, Arizona and T.R. of Jonesboro, Arkansas; a daughter, Dorothy Faye Gray of Midland; a sister, Minnie Kelso of Bovina; eight grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

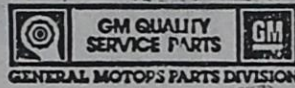

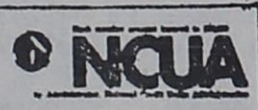
