### KEEP RECORDS TO SAVE TAX HEADACHES NEXT YEAR

There is no time like the present, while the great battle of Form 1040 is still fresh on your mind, to start a procedure that will aid you with next year's income tax calculations. That is to maintain a record of your income and outgo. Such a record can be simple and brief but it may save you tax dollars.

The average man who works for wage or salary doesn't have to concern himself about keeping books and records-at least so he thinks. His employer keeps a reliable record of his earnings and Uncle Sam looks primarily to the employer for information on his earnings and for the withholding of various taxes out of his wages.

But whether or not you run a business of your own, you have a partner who each year is claiming a substantial interest in your personal income. And the law requires that you keep books for him in case he ever asks for an accounting.

Perhaps you own your home or paying it out in installments. It's likely that some day you may sell that house. When you do you'll want to be able to prove whether you realized a gain or a loss on that sale. If a gain in capital resulted, it probably will add to your income tax. If a loss was suffered, it probably will reduce your income tax.

You may have made certain improvements on the house while you lived in it, but unless you can show what out-of-pocket expense you incurred while making them, you may not get credit for them

in your cost basis so as to prove that you had no capital gain or that you had a loss.

Or perhaps you received that little summer cottage on the lake as a gift from your father. If you ever sell it, you should be able to show Uncle Sam not only the cost of improvements you made in it while you owned it, but also what its fair market value was at the time Dad gave it to you.

It may be that you are receiving an annuity on an insurance policy. If so, do you know how much that policy costs you and how much of that cost you have recovered tax-free to date?

There are many kinds of transactions you enter into that may some day affect the computation of your personal income tax. The best proof of the cost of anything you've purchased is a receipted bill or canceled check. If one of these pieces of evidence relates to any transaction that may affect your income in later years, it's a good idea to keep it. Your "partner" may some day ask to see it.

### Your Health

"Hypervitaminosis is a long word meaning too many vitamins," says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The diseased condition probably was derived from the tendency of some persons to think that if a little bit does good a lot will do better. This is not the case in taking vitamins or medicines whether prescribed by a physician or taken on one's own initiative.

Millions of dollars are spent yearly in synthetic vitamin preparations by persons who mistakenly believe they will counteract careless eating habits or cure numerous ailments. Unless prescribed by a physician for a specific need, synthetic vitamin purchases are usually a waste of money.

Nutritionists have long urged that, except when prescribed by a physician, vitamins be secured from the grocery store in the form of green, leafy, and yellow vegetable and dairy products. This is the more beneficial and economical way of assuring an adequate intake of these necessary substances.

It has been established that Vitamin A and D taken in excessive amounts are harmful. Other excessive uses of vitamins have resulted in cases of vitamin toxicity. Excessive intake may be as dangerous as deficient intake. Take vitamins only when prescribed by a physician and only in

### Easy Does It—Again!

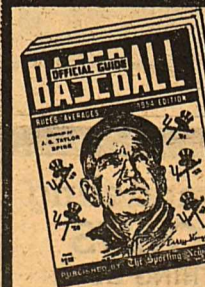

## Roy Priest In Race For Judge

Roy R. Priest, of Rankin, Texas former 83rd district attorney has announced he is a candidate for judge of the 112th Judicial District of Texas. The district is composed of Pecos, Upton, Crockett, Sutton and Kimble Counties.



Priest is 59 years of age. He was born March 24, 1895 on a black land farm near Lytton Springs in Caldwell County, Texas, the son of Jame T. and Virginia Lee Priest. He attended grade school and high school at Austin and received a B. A. degree from the University of Texas at Austin.

Priest left school to enter the U. S. Army. He served about twenty-two months in World War I.

Priest was married in August 1930 to the former Kathryn Lois Pettway of Austin, Texas. They had two sons, Roy R. Priest, Jr., of St. Louis Mo., who is a design engineer with McDonnell Aircraft Co., of St. Louis, maker of the "Banshee" and other jet planes for the U. S. Navy. Roy R. Priest, Jr., is married and has two small daughters.

Their other son Tommie Priest died at the age of nine with polio.

Mrs. Roy R. Priest died in 1951 after an extended illness.

After World War I Priest entered the Merchant Service of the United States and sailed the high seas on tramp steamers for almost two years. Later he was office assistant to the operation's manager of the Washington, D. C. office of the Shipping Board.

Priest attended school at George Washington University, Washington, D. C., until he received his law degree, and supported himself and his family by various jobs while at George Washington University. Shortly after receiving his law degree he moved back to Texas and to San Angelo, where he worked in the law office of J. A. Thomas for almost two years.

Priest moved to Rankin, Texas in August, 1927 and has lived and resided there ever since, except for the thirty-eight months that he served in the U. S. Army in World War II.

Priest served eight and one-half years as district attorney of the 83rd Judicial District of Texas and voluntarily gave that office up. His friends and his record won for him hotly contested elections in the eight counties comprising that district until the 112th Judicial District was formed. He has heretofore been a candidate in four counties now comprising the 112th district, namely, Pecos, Upton, Crockett and Sutton Counties.

Priest is a member of the State Bar of Texas, and has been active in the practice of law at Rankin, ever since he gave up the office of district attorney, except for the time he spent in the Service. Priest says that he was not an applicant for the unexpired term of Judge Garland Casebier, Fort Stockton, whose resignation was effective March 1, 1954, but is a candidate for the post in the Democratic Primary.

Priest promises the voters of the 112th Judicial District that:

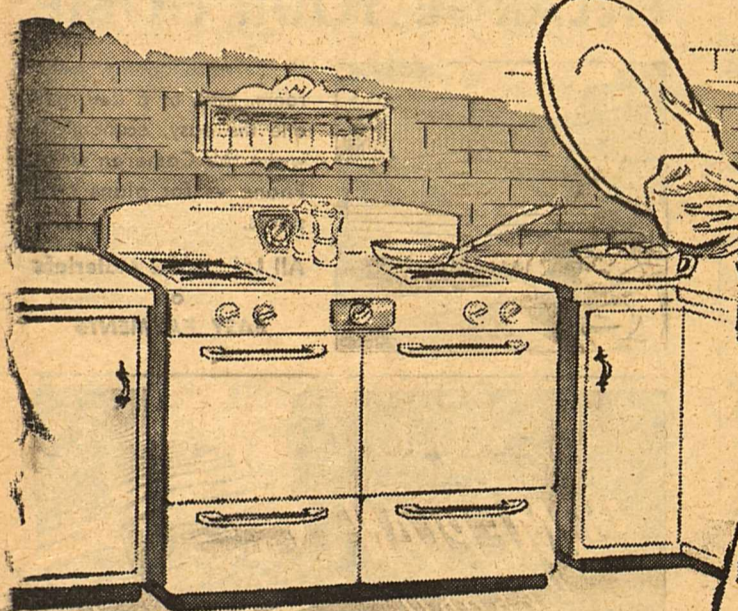

**VEESK'S L. A. MAJOR ROCKET SIZZLING**  
Bill Vecek, baseball's man in motion, is working slowly and quietly on a new and fabulous plan to bring major league ball to the Pacific Coast and specifically Los Angeles-by 1956 "and not later than 1957."

According to a story in The Sporting News, Vecek, it is said, will attempt to raise \$4,000,000 from the advance sale of parking space privileges and radio and television rights for Los Angeles games. This would enable him to "go into business" in buying out Wrigley's interest in the Pacific Coast League club and satisfy any claims against the territory, and also renovate the park and in ease the capacity to 55,000 by

the addition of 28,000 more seats. Vecek is reported to have received the assurance of the American League, possibly through the help of Del Webb of the Yankees, that two more clubs will be taken on, thus making it a ten-club circuit, if the A. L. agrees to place franchises in Los Angeles and San Francisco. This assurance is said to have come to The Sport Shirt, says The Sporting News, despite the fact that the American League was reported to have shelved a proposal, made during the Atlanta meetings, to expand to ten clubs. If the elaborate plan jells according to formula, Webb eventually would take over the Los Angeles holdings, once Vecek has developed the entire setup, and with funds derived from this sale, Bill would move on to San Francisco, where he would put into operation the tenth American League franchise to comply with the stipulation that the A. L. will go west only if two cities are thrown open to it.

The Sporting News story states that even if Bill fails in his efforts to convince American League club owners to expand to ten clubs, The Sport Shirt reportedly believes that by that time he is ready to make the big move, there will be a possibility that one of the two current A. L. franchise owners, The Philadelphia Athletics and the Baltimore Orioles, will be willing to shift to the Coast.

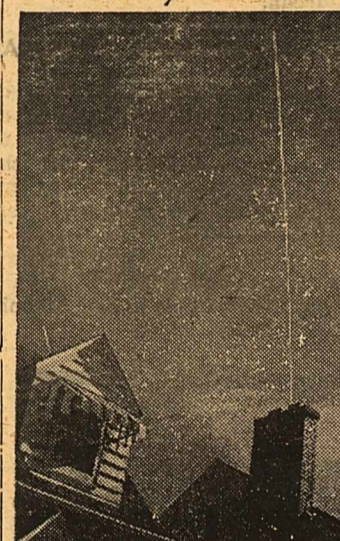

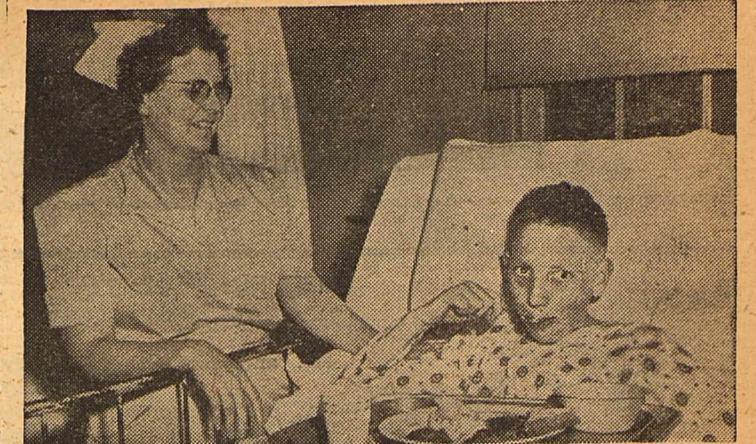

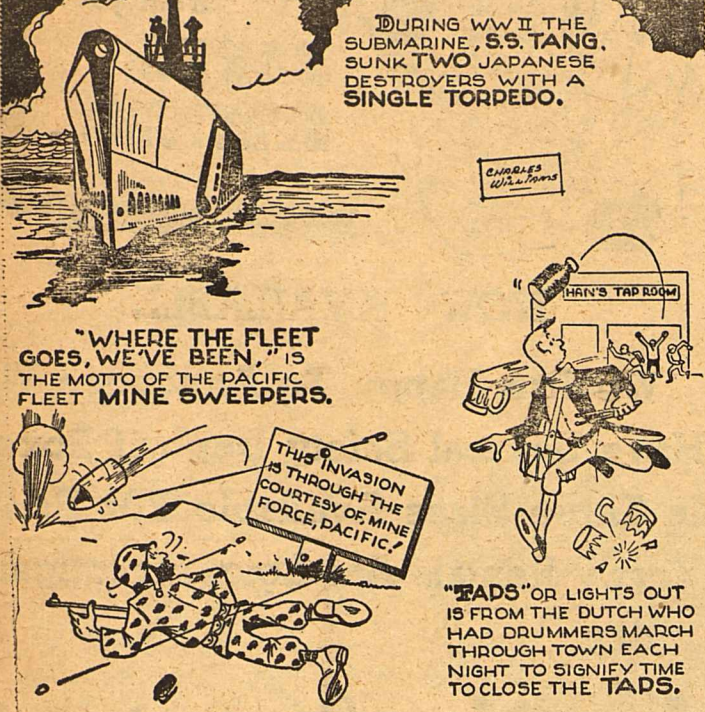

## QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

Q - - What is the status of a person who is killed in an accident while en route to report to his draft board for the first time. Is he covered by the Government's free \$10,000 indemnity?

A - - No. The law clearly states that only those draftees who are en route under orders from the draft board to an induction center are covered by the indemnity. In the case you cite, the person had not yet received orders to proceed from the draft board to an induction center.

Q - - I have a \$10,000 GI life insurance policy on which I am paying premiums on a monthly basis. How do I go about changing my payments to an annual basis and where do I find out how much the annual payments will be?

A - - Write to the VA District Office to which you are paying premiums, asking what the annual premium on your policy would be and the earliest date you may start payments on an annual basis. That will give you the information you need to determine whether or not you wish to make the change.

Q - - I am a Korea veteran discharged before August 20, 1952, when the Korea GI Bill was enacted. I understand I have to be in school by August 20, 1954 if I wish to take advantage of the Korea GI Bill. If I enroll in a summer course this year and am in school by August 20, would that qualify me for further education under the GI Bill?

A - - Yes. Summer school courses are permitted under the Korea GI Bill, so if you are in a summer school before your deadline for starting education, you would be permitted to continue after that date under the Korea GI Bill.

Q - - I notice that you keep advising veterans to check all contracts before purchasing a home under the GI loan program. Does that include a deposit agreement, too, or do you mean just the GI loan contract itself?

A - - That means every contract or agreement you are requested to sign as a part of the deal. If you are in doubt about any agreement or contract, see your lawyer first before you sign.

Q - - I understand that after my starting cut-off date, I'll be allowed to suspend Korean GI training for periods up to 12 straight months. But what happens if I suspend training for longer than that?

A - - If you suspend for more than 12 months, you will be permitted to resume your Korean GI training only if you show VA that the suspension in excess of 12 months was for reasons beyond your control.

Q - - I'm a disabled Korean veteran, and I'm running a farm in partnership with another veteran-a fellow who took on the farm training under the World War II GI Bill. Would I be allowed to enroll in farm training under Public Law 16, even though the farm is not under my complete control?

A - - Yes, it might be possible for you to take institutional on-farm training under Public Law 16, provided that you meet the basic eligibility requirements of the law; and that your partner-

ship agreement calls for equal managerial authority, and that your farm is productive enough to provide a livelihood for both you and your partner. See your nearest VA office for details about your case.

Q - - I hold a permanent National Service Life Insurance policy, and I've just gone back on military duty. I want to surrender my policy for cash. What's the effective date it will be surrendered, if I make a request for surrender through military channels?

A - - The effective date your permanent GI policy will be considered surrendered will be the date your request is placed in military channels, and not the

Q - - Several years ago I went into business with the help of a GI business loan. Now I have the opportunity to sell my business at a nice profit. May I do so? And will I need VA's approval?

A - - You have the right to sell your business to anyone at all, and you do not need VA's approval to sell. Of course, though, you must pay off your GI business loan to end your liability under the VA guarantee.



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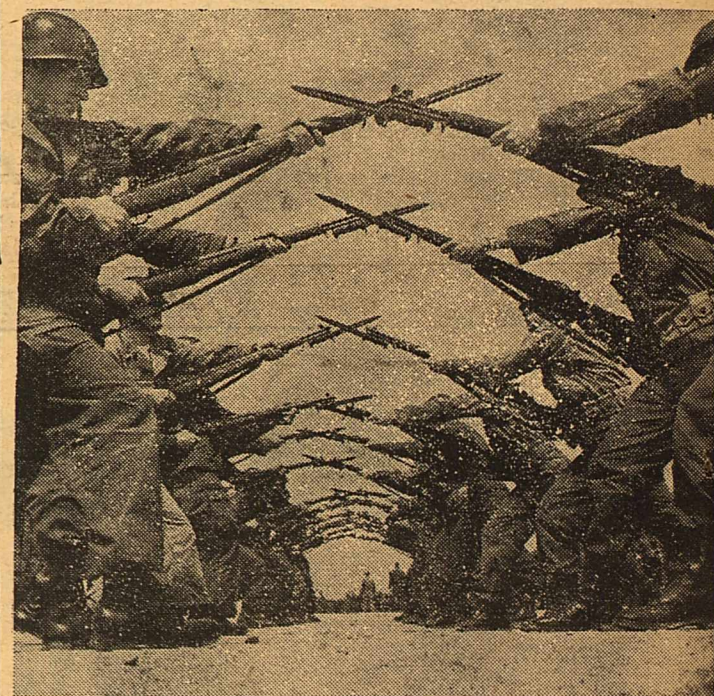
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
