City Hires Rate Expert

The Sonora City Commission, torney L. W. Elliott, voted at a special meeting Monday night to Begins Sunday employ Quentin Owsley, Houston telephone rate expert, to make an investigation of General Telephone Company's demand for increased rates in Sonora.

Owsley, who represented the City of Anson, and is at present representing San Angelo, charges \$100 per day for his services and estimates that about 15 days will be required for the Genreal Telephone Co. investigation.

The motion to employ Owsley was introduced by Commissioner Alton Hightower and seconded by Commissioner Artie Joy.

Following passage of the motion, Maylor Alfred Schwiening deferred action on the matter until the next regular commission meeting Monday, November 1. At that time the rate question will either be dealt with or deferred further depending on whether Owsley's investigation has been completed.

In recommending that the commission employ Owsley, Elliott stated that he did not feel the commission had at present enough facts to determine a fair rate and that additional facts should be se

"If we go into court now, we wouldn't have the facts," Elliott said, "and I don't want us to go into court unless we are loaded for bear."

Speaking for the telephone company Joseph A. McCrum stated that he considered the move a wise one and that "the company will cooperate with Mr. Owsley in every way possible."

Meanwhile local telephone subscribers were advised by the city to pay their bills under the OLD rate, since the commission has neither accepted nor rejected the company's demands. Bill adjustments can be made after the question is settled. (See city adver-

The trap was formerly a bedground and devoid vegetation. Today the trap contains a variety of 19 grasses, 1 woody plants, and 40 weeds. E B. Keng. area conservationist the Soil Conservation Service pointed out that pastures that had periodic rests improve more ra pidly than enclosures similar t this one that had not been graed in a long time.

Andy Truden, work unit con servationist, and Leo Merrill the Texas Experiment Station conducted a demonstration of the effect of raindrops striking bare soil. The test pointed out that uncontrolled raindrops rob the ranges. Beating against bare s i v close the door to their own entry. They break down soil structure, causing the soil to run together and form a seal that away detached soil particles.

Vegetative cover cushions the fall of the rain. The large drops break into a fine spray that settle harmlessly and trickles down the stems. Here it enters the soil to provide moisture for plant grow-

The effect of soil crusting and regetive cover on the infiltration water into the soil was shown. The group saw a lot of grass on the Turney ranch that was grown on 9.5 inches of rain. Andy Truden pointed out that Turney stocking at an average of 30 animal untis per section for the past 10 years coupled with short deferments left his grass in a good condition to start growth when the spring rains came.





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

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM

Q - - I am an ex-WAC, planing to attend school under the Korean GI Bill. My husband is working. Will VA pay me the added GI allowance for a veteran with dependents, even though he is working?

- No. You could claim the added allowance for your husband only if he were in fact dependent

upon you. Q - - As a member of the Reserves, I receive pay for attending weekly meetings and going on active duty two weeks each year. Will this pay be deducted from the monthly allowance I receive as a student in college under the Korean GI Bill?

A - _ No. Reserve pay will not be deducted from your GI allowance. Neither will any other outside earnings you may receive. Under the law, the monthly allowance for school-going veterans remains the same, regardless of outside income of any kind.

Q - - I have a permanent GI nsurance policy which lapsed several months ago. To reinstate, I understand I will have to pay all back premiums. Will I also be required to pay interest on the premiums?

A _ - Yes. You will be required to pay interest at the stipulated

rate for your type of policy. Q - - I am thinking about paying the additional premium on my insurance policy, so that if become totally disabled for six months or more I will receive a monthly payment from VA. If I should become disabled, would these payments I receive be deducted from the face amount of
