



CLARA was built by Grace Line for commercial service carrying passengers and freight between the United States and South America.

A medium-sized luxury liner, she rapidly established a reputation for

service on the route. As a World War II transport, renamed SUSAN

B. ANTHONY, she saw service on virtually every sealane until it

came her time to play a part in the Normandie Invasion. Loaded with

2,000 troops she was approaching shore under a hail of enemy fire. Struck a crippling blow, her captain, who had got his training as an officer of the merchant marine, moved his troops from side to side to keep her on an even keel. She slowly sank while heroic British and American destroyers came alongside to take off her men. Had it not been for the captain's presence of mind, the liner might have keeled over and taken half her troops to the bottom with her. As it was, not a soul was lost.
