

STATION TESTS REVEAL **EMERGENCY ROUGHAGES** OK FOR BREEDING EWES

Pricklypear, singed and chopped, and supplemented with alfalfa hay and cottonseed meal proved satisfactory as an emergency ration for ewes. This conclusion was reached by research workers of the Sonora Experiment Station after a 213-day drylot feeding trial beginning in September

1953 and ending in April 1954. One hundred Rambouillet ewes were divided into five equal lots for the trial. Other emergency roughage rations which also proved satisfactory, the ewes were bred and lambed successfully, included three parts ground cotton gin trash and two parts alfalfa hay and fed with molasses and supplemented with cottonseed meal or a combination of cotton-The Soil Conservation area of- seed meal and urea.
