Word's Biggest Stadium for Olympics



Australia is preparing for the 1956 Olympiad with many new construction projects, including the erection of a stadiun to seat 120,000 people. A \$5 million international village for visiting athletes and team officials is also part of the project

In what is expected to be the biggest Olympiad since the war, the people from "down under" are demonstrating hospitality of unequalled dimensions. They're building complete village of 788 brick

pr concrete houses in 2, 3, 4 or 6 dwelling groups. The village will have its own bank, post office, medical centers and other facilities for foreign athletes and their staffs.

The organizing committee, backed by the Government of Australia and local municipalities, are backing the project with typical Australian enthusiasm. Visitors can expect a roaring welcome from the home folks here.

Nearly 5,000 athletes and officials will take part in the games. The traditional Olympic flame will be flown from Dlympia to Cairns. Then, runners will carry the torch 2,750 niles to Melbourne. Queen Elitabeth is Patron-in-Chief of the 1956 games.

With Babies, a Yawn's Often Good for a Smile

The setting was arranged, but arranged natu-ally. Delicately balanced lighting made the baby's soft, chubby body "come alive."

Floodlights may be used with excellent results but, Holden points out, care should be taken not to keep them trained on the baby for too long a period. Dif-fusers should be used on the reflectors for two reasons: the softer light will flatter the baby's

softer light will flatter the baby's tender skin, and the reduction in glare will protect his eyes. Even so, the baby should be placed in position and focussing should be done under ordinary incandescent light. Haye someone snap on the floods just long enough for you to take the picture.

Finally, don't keep your young subject posing too long. In professional work, posing time limits for babies are strictly enforced. Follow this practice at home. 


