





Supervisors of the Edwards flood planning party it is evident Plateau SCD agreed Tuesday that planning can not be done on cation, if approved by the State Soil Conservation Board, will request the Soil Conservation Service to make a preliminary survey of Dry Devil's River above Sonora, including Lowrey Draw If the survey indicates that a flood prevention project above Sonora would be feasible-give at least \$1.00 worth of benefits for each \$1.00 construction cost-then work plan could be prepared.

The work plan would require several months of detailed watershed and economic surveys, selection of dam sites, sample core drilling on dam sites, preparation of structural designs, cost determinations, etc.

The completed flood prevention plan is then explained to local people for their acceptance or rejection. 

2-Did President Lincoln ever advocate Federal Aid to the States, or grants-in-aid to the states?

A-Lincoln advocated Federal Aid to States in principle, when on March 6, 1862, he recommended to Congress the adoption of a resolution which provided the United States give pecuniary aid to States which adopted gradual abolishment of slavery, such pecuniary aid "to be used by such State, in its discretion to compensate for inconveniences, public and private, produced by such change in system," Congress adopted the resolution on April 10, 1862, and on April 16, Congress passed an act abolishing slavery in the District of Columbia, providing for payment to former slave owners not to exceed \$300 for each slave so freed. In Sept., 1862, Lincoln again declared by proclamation compensation to loyal citizens for loss of slaves, calling for a maximum of \$400 for each slave freed. But Congress never carried out the pledge, although in 1864 Congress provided by statute a payment of not more than \$300 to loyal slave owners for each slave enrolled in the army. Lincoln suggested a draft law to the State of Delaware, calling for \$400 for each slave freed, but the Delaware legislature turned it down.

-What public offices did Lincoln hold before becoming President? A-Four terms in the Illinois legislature, one term in the House of Representatives. Fremont in 1856. Q-Did Lincoln have a majority of the popular vote when he was elected

A—No. Lincoln had 1,866,452 popular votes and 180 electoral votes; Douglas had 1,375,157 popular votes and 12 electoral votes; Breckenridge, had 847,953 popular votes and 72 electoral votes, and Bell had 590,631 popular and 39 electoral votes.


