The progeny test is not a competitive test but is designed to aid participating sheepmen in breeding for improvement of weaknesses in their flocks.

The test gives an overall picture of weight gain, conformation, freedom from wrinkles, staple length and wool shrinkage. Speakers for the day were Dr. George Sidwell, Virgil Powell, Dr. W. T. Hardy, Morris Shelton, and Leo Merrill.



Welcome rain greeted many ranchmen in the Sonora area Tuesday morning when a cool front brought moisture varying from a trace to 2.40 inches. Most of Sutton County received from .50 to 1.00 inch of rain, but Sonora received only .22 and west, north, and northeast of Sonora ranchmen reported only light sprinkles or no rain. Junction reported 2.00 inches, Eldorado 1.60, and a good rain fell from Ozona to Sheffield.

"The rain was of the fast-falling, summer shower variety," said E. B. Keng, SCS technician. Ranchmen with old grass who received one half inch or more will get some new growth. Penetration checks on bare ranges receiving over an inch showed moisture penetrating only one to two inches deep.

Alvis Johnson and Gene Shurley held practically all of an inch rain on pitted land, soaking the moisture 8 to 16 inches deep under the pits. Penetration was less than two inches deep on unpitted bare land nearby.

The Edwards Plateau SCS Trial area received .74 inches. This will help insure success of grass seedlings which germinated two weeks ago on .84 inch of rain. Seed on some 1,500 acres of pitted land should germinate following this shower.





Wuest was born in Fredericksburg and received part of his education in the Fredericksburg schools before finishing high school in San Marcos.


He has for the past several

Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District News

The Edwards Plateau SCD, which includes all of Sutton and the northwest corner of Edwards County, now has developed conservation plans with 145 of the approximately 175 landowners or operators in the district. Seven ranchmen have become district cooperators since the first of this year: J. E. Benton, John Fish, Aldie Garrett, Clarence Valliant, Otto Thiers and J. E. Adams. It is hoped that the remaining 30 landowners and operators will become district cooperators, making the Edwards Plateau district the first in the United States to work with 100 per cent of the landowners in a soil conservation district.

Conservation plans developed with local ranchmen are completely voluntary, and may be terminated or changed at any time

by the ranchman. Becoming a district cooperator merely signifies that the ranchman is interested in taking care of his land, and in obtaining any assistance that might be beneficial in solving his conservation problems.

Soil Conservation Service personnel assist the five local ranchmen (District Supervisors) to carry out a conservation program, in much the same way that teachers assist a school board to carry out an education program. The district supervisors of the Edwards Plateau SCD are Joe B. Ross, Fred T. Earwood, Edwin Sawyer, Frank Bond and W. B. McMillan.
