Of course the real answer to only be accomplished with ample station, which he has leased. moisture. Ranchmen can, however, take steps to alleviate gully Big Bend Sentinel erosion before spring rains come. The best time to stop gully formation is in the early stages. Dead brush can be dragged into small gullies to help hold the soil and prevent cutting. Brush in roadside cuts will work wonders in reducing erosion. The entire length of the gully should be 🔳 well filled with brush, rather than placing piles of brush at intervals.




