We don't think it's possible you haven't been entering up to now. There are some 130 contestants who have so great a lead on you now that it would be impossible to catch up with all of them. So just forget it. Don't try to win now . . . unless you need the weekly prize

There are eight weeks left in the contest. If you hit a perfect score all of those weeks you would come up with a total of 80. That won't, we venture to predict, be enough total points to win the expense paid trip for two to the Cotton Bowl.

Erith Hawkins, last year's winner, earned the trip with a score of 98, a percentage something over 75. That's pretty good over a 13-week period when you count ties wrong and still figure them in the percentage.

Professional predictors of football games throw ties out don't count them on their wonlost record. That helps their percentage. In the contest here, we don't give the contestant the benefit of tie games.

Reason we don't is that it's possible to pick a tie. If that happens, the particular contestant is entitled to that additional point, if he's right. Therefore, it has to be wrong if contestants pick a winner and the game ends in a tie.

Because five people are tied right now for the grand pirze, it's probably an opportune time for us to bring up how the winner is determined should the contest end in a dead ck.

THE TIEBREAKER SCORE WILL BE USED FOR ALL 13 WEEKS OF THE CONTEST. Some people have come up with the mistaken idea that duplicate prizes will be awarded. We can assure you that such will not be the case.

That, after all, is what the tiebreaker score is for, And if the tiebreaker score results still leaves two or more contestants tied for the grand prize. a coin will be flipped or straws drawn or cards cut or something will be done to determine

The five contestants who are tied for the lead are still running four points behind the pace that Hawkins was setting this time last year. At end of five weeks of play, Hawkins had a total of 44. Of course, he played pretty rough in last year's contest. A little rougher than really you're supposed to. There were fewer ties last year too.

Hawkins is using different strategy in his attempt to repeat as contest winner this year. He's of the opinion that there is too much pressure on the leader, especially if that contestant jumps out front early in the contest. He believes it's better to kinda pace yourself back in the background, let others have the glory of being in front, and then make your move late in the game.

That may be what he believes or he may be telling us that because he is presently four points off the pace. He says those four points back is just right. He hasn't told us when he plans to make his move for the front yet. However, we strongly suspect he will make said move, if at all, the first week he's lucky enough to pick more winners than anyone else.

One disadvantage to being in front, we'll admit, is that the leader is almost forced to go along with the favorites each week. Needless to say the favorites don't always win. When they don't, that gives the contestants who are a few points behind and shooting for the upsets an opportunity to catch up.

The contest can get real involved. At least one individual we know of has dropped out this year because, 'I'm going to quit worrying myself sick over something that doesn't mean

anymore than that does." We do hate to lose contestants because the contest is too good. But we guess there are disadvantages to almost all situations.

Friona has improved a great extent since the first game of the season, Coach Gee points out. "You can look at the outcome of the Chiefs' game with Happy and tell that," he says,







Bovina's Mustangs racked up their third win in five starts during 1962 season here Friday night as they took an easy 31-8 win over Meadow

Mustangs completely dominated the non-district clash, but it could prove to be a costly victory to them -- Star Halfback Jerry Frazi r, the team's leading scorer, suffered a shoulder separation midway through the third quarter and

Mustangs racked up 19 points in first half before the Bulldogs were able to push across their line TD, Bovina added two more six-pointers just for insurance in final quarter.

The maroon and white defense stubbornly held Meadow to a scant 23 yards rushing and allowed only 49 more passing to give the visitors a total yardage figure of 72. The Mustangs,

however, gobbled up 220 yards They covered the distance in six on the ground and added 81 more through the air for their 301 total as they accumulated their highest point total of the fivegame old season.








Halfback Jerry Frazier, No. 32, bounds across one would-be


High-Stepping Fullback Tally Kelso is shown gaining ground against a shattered Meadow defense, No. 60 at Kelso's left

The seedlings are sold only for windbreaks and prevention of soil erosion. No order for less than a total of 100 trees will be accepted.



This is a total of \$7,340.00 direct payment to the farmer of 1150 acres from the government, as you can see. This is very close to \$6.40 per acre for the entire farm, part of which is not being farmed.

Wedemeyer points out that this type of program puts the farmer more completely at the mercy of the government for his income. He also predicts that the 1964 referendum for wheat will be a choice between a complicated multiple price certificate plan or no program at all,


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

Do you approve of stretch sox ?

A whole size in sox or stockings is a whole inch so a half size is a half inch. That is not a very intelligent remark, but, I want to point out that a half size in sox is equal to 3 half sizes in shoes.

Mothers who would not dreum of allowing a child to wear shoes that are a size and a half short will continue to use sox after they are one size too small. (i.e. six half-sizes in shoe

The stretch sox that we sell are supposed to fit (in sox language) sizes 4-5 1/2, 6-7 1/2, 8-9 1/2. In shoe language, that would be 0-5 1/2. 6-11 1/2, 12-2 1/2.

I believe that stretch sox are safe if the child's feet are at the small end of the size range. If the child needs a 7 or 7 1/2 I would not buy a 6-7 1/2. In such cases 1 recommend cotton sox be used until the child can use the 8-9 1/2 size.

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
