If we fail here, we fail, no matter how loudly men shout "success."

It is the good life with changeless character that makes even

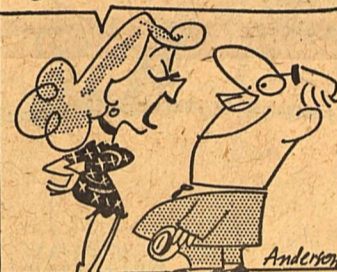
death incidental, and which causes others to say when we are gone, "There was a man, a woman-of-God!"

even more useful if you get an extra head to wipe down walls or to remove the mitt from the handle and use for dusting furniture.

Need short curtains? You can make them out of odd yards of cotton remnants. Use a print for the upper tier, a solid or white that harmonizes with the lower tier, then tie the two together with matching ruffling on both tiers. A piece of plywood to frame a window will require less material for covering than curtains.

When you're painting window frames, use masking tape around the inside edge to keep the paint off the window.

Disabled Minors Receive First Benefits In February

Some disabled children over age 18 received their first monthly social security benefits early in February. Recent legislation provided for these payments to start for the month of January 1957. A number of applications have already been filed, and more are being received.

Under the new provisions, children who are disabled may receive social security benefits after they reach age 18, if they were disabled before age 18, are unmarried and dependent upon a living parent who is drawing social security benefits, or were dependent upon a deceased insured parent. The term "parent" includes natural parent, and in many cases, a step-parent or adopting parent.

It is not necessary that the child himself have any record of work under the social security law to be eligible for benefits as a disabled child. However, he must have a disability severe enough to prevent him from engaging in any substantial gainful activity. The disability must be medically determinable.

Disabled children over 18 who believe they qualify, or persons

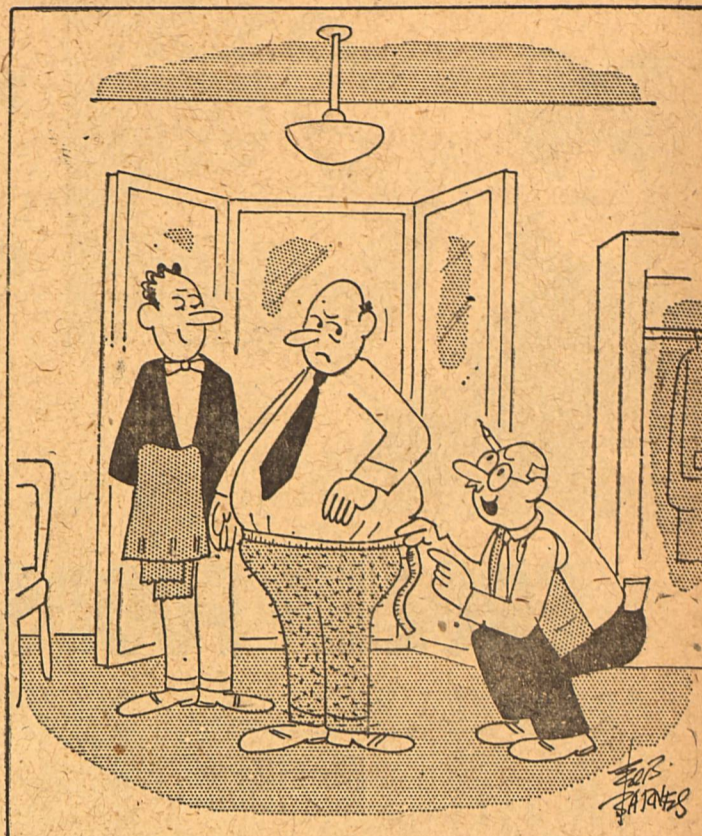

Saturday, March 21, 1896



R. W. Barton, the cattleman, returned from a visit to his family in San Antonio, Saturday. He was in Sonora Tuesday.

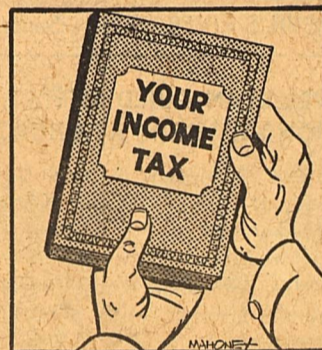

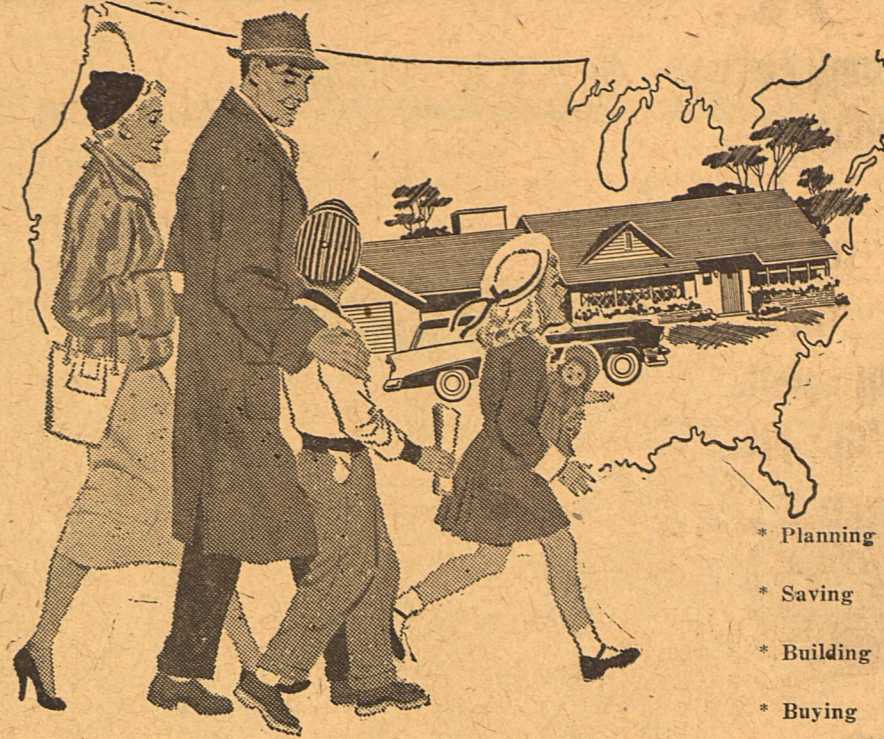

Eight high schools were represented at the tournament. Students were in attendance from Abilene, Alice, Austin, Eola, Midland, Menard, Denton and Sonora.

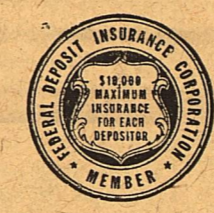
