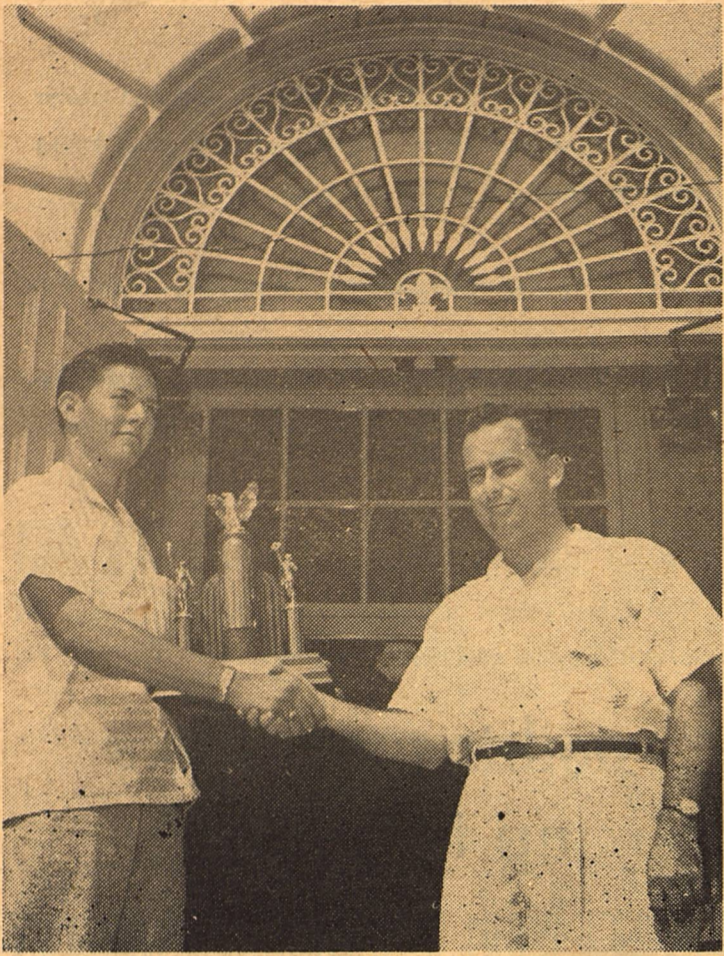


## FRANK JOE POTMESIL RECIPIENT OF SECOND ANNUAL LAMBERT AWARD

Torrential rains again pelted the Sonora area Sunday night, causing flash flooding in town and major damage to roads and fences.

Heavy rain, accompanied by a severe electrical storm, dropped from 3 to 4 inches of water from 7 to 8:30 p.m. Murphy Draw rose quickly to put water several inches deep in the Bill Cartwright home, and was at floor level at the Bill Barnes and adjacent homes. Water neared floor level at many homes on the Ft. McKavitt road. A small diversion terrace recently installed by the County and a new ditch completed by the City only last week helped materially in preventing major damage to several homes.

The Sonora fire department was called out to help in rescue work as water from a small draw temporarily threatened Zola's Courts. Floodwater entered several cabins.

Many residents of low areas spent the night away from their homes, as reports of heavy rains on both Lowrey Draw and Dry Devil's River were circulated. Lowrey Draw rose rapidly to a

new high mark for 1957 from 5.00 inches of rain on the W. A. Miers ranch and Murphy Draw, but fortunately rainfall was lighter on the major part of the watershed and no serious flooding developed. Joe Logan measured 2.80 inches, and the R. A. Halbert ranch reported 2.70 to 3.00 inches.

Dry Devil's River lacked about one foot reaching the May 12 stage when 22 homes were flooded. Rainfall on the watershed measured 4.03 inches at Mrs. R. M. McCarver's official gauge; 3.20 at the Tom Davis ranch; 2.50 at the Ed Shurley (Byrd ranch); and up to 3.00 inches at Eldorado.

Rains of major flood proportions were recorded in several parts of the Sonora area. Herbert Fields reported around 7.00 inches; Robert Pfluger had over 8:00 inches; and Mrs. E. E. Sawyer's Eagle Well ranch measured 6.90 inches. Ft. Terrett Draw was on the largest rise since 1949.

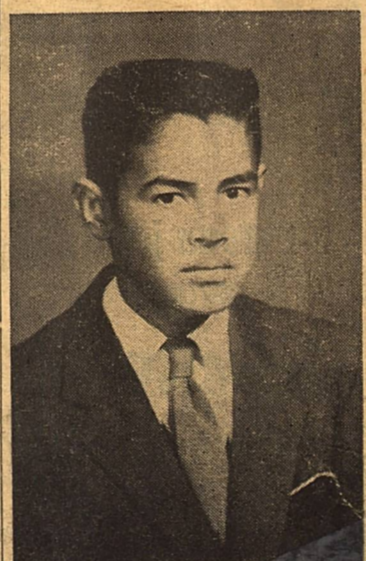

## NANCY HUNT TO ATTEND UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII

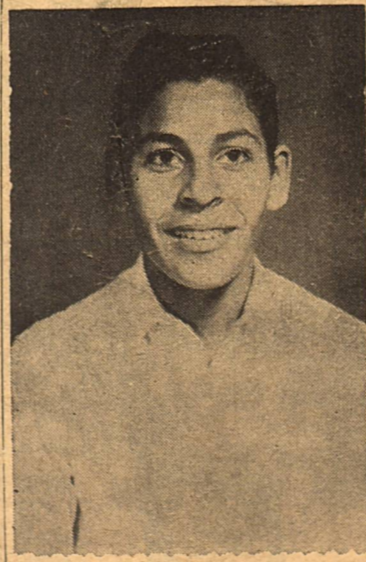

## Flood Dams Almost Assured Lone Star, Humble Indicate OK's

Substantial progress has been made in laying necessary groundwork for developing a flood prevention work plan on Lowrey Draw.

M. L. Byrd, vice-president of Lone Star Gas Co., Dallas, and three other company officials inspected proposed Site 2 for a dam location on the W. A. Miers ranch last week. Though Byrd is in charge of distribution for Lone Star, and could not make a definite commitment, he expressed keen interest in the project and assured local representatives of Lone Star's willingness to cooperate in solving mutual problems.

Accompanying Byrd were Rip Collins, company attorney; E. L. Buelow, area manager from Abilene, and S. H. King, district

supervisor from San Angelo. All officials were sympathetic with the project and agreed to call it to the immediate attention of gas transmission officials of the company.

H. H. Oliver, company engineer from Ranger, was here Wednesday and inspected the site to determine possible alternatives for rerouting some 3,960 feet of the Lone Star line.

The present location of the line is in the barrow area and crosses approximately under the center of the proposed structure. Rerouting of some three-fourths mile will be necessary to permit construction of the dam.

Before the \$15,000 local fund can be spent for developing a flood prevention work plan, Lone

Star is being asked for a commitment that they will reroute the line after the flood prevention project is definitely approved. The interest shown by the company officials indicates that the commitment will be given in time to prevent delay of the planning party scheduled for late July.

Two 10-inch Humble Oil Company lines also run under the end of the proposed structure. The Humble lines are not in the barrow area and will not have to be moved, but a commitment that Humble will grant an easement to permit construction of the dam is required. Humble officials have given verbal assurance that they will cooperate fully and a written commitment is expected shortly.

4. That he who contributes to the destruction of the soil sins against God and man.

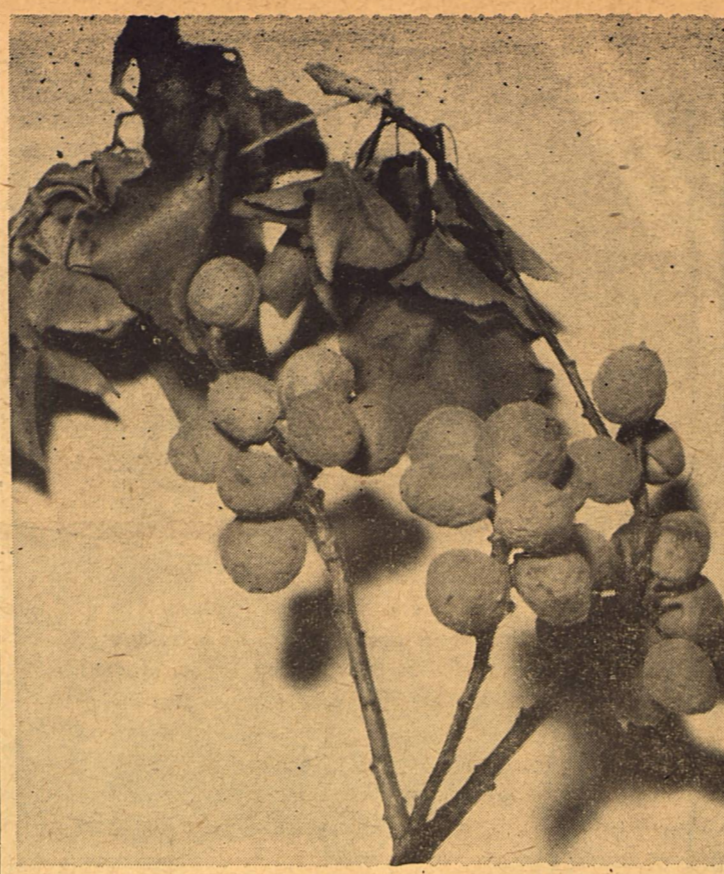

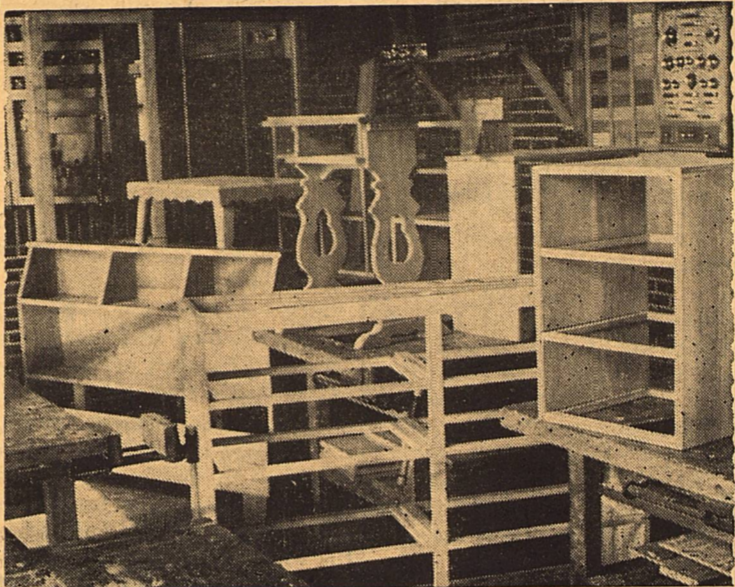

John Thomas (Jack) Ratliff, Jr., University of Texas student from Sonora, received the Convair Award as the outstanding senior planning to enter naval aviation.

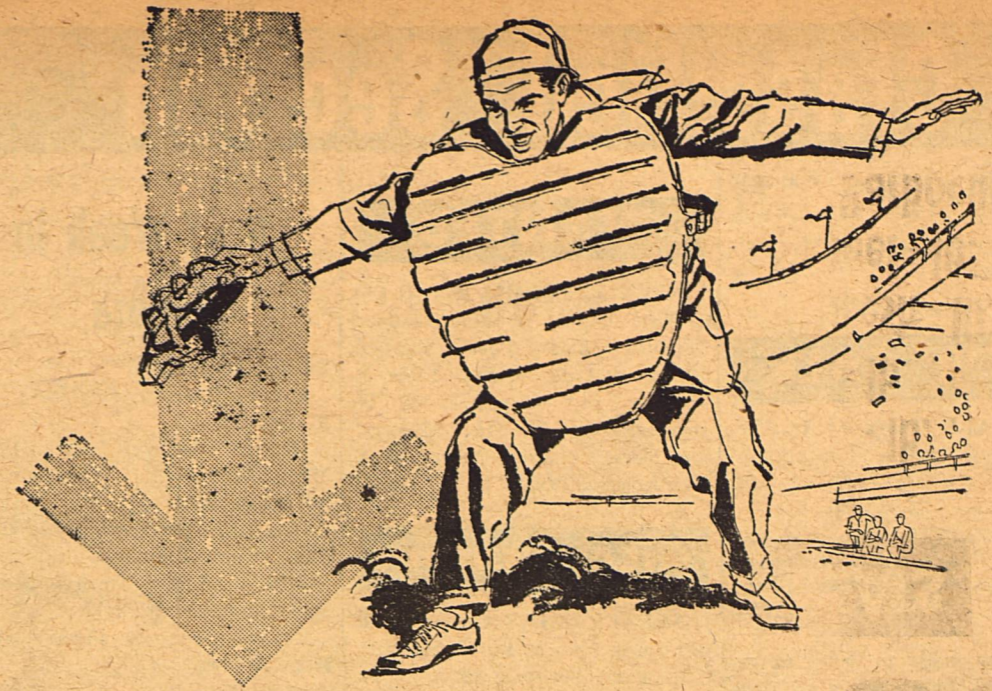

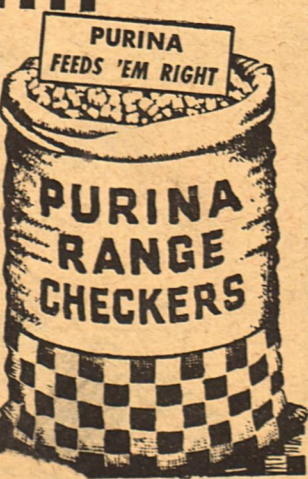
