## Little League All-Stars To Battle Ozona Monday Night

### Sonora's Famous Gridiron Georges Face Great Football Futures

#### GEORGE WRIGHT STARTS VARSITY GAMES THIS YEAR

George Wright, Sonora's football whirlwind of three years ago, is successfully combining scholarship with athletic excellence. An ankle injury, disqualifying Wright's playing football last year, makes him eligible to play three more years of football at the University of Tennessee where he will begin his junior year in September. He may be all the team needs to wrap up a Southeastern Conference victory this year. They came within a stone's throw last year when they lost the Sugar Bowl game to Baylor University, and they are picked to win the conference championship this year.

George plans to qualify for a Master of Science Degree in physical education in his last year. He shouldn't have any trouble making it because as a sophomore in 1956-57 he ranked second in his class among those who are candidates for a B.S. degree in a school of over eight thousand enrollment.

He is staying with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Right, who recently returned to Sonora from Rankin, and he is working on the surveying crew of the Pioneer Gathering Company.

Head Coach, Bowden Wyatt, expects him back on September 1 to begin practice for this year's activity.

He was then elected to the office and served in that capacity for 39 years. He was also in charge of the Sutton County Abstract office until a few years ago.

Mr. Lowrey is a member of the Sonora Lions Club, Shriners and Masonic Lodge. He served on the Sonora School Board and the board of Stewards in the First Methodist Church.

### AN EDITORIAL

#### What Price Our Future?

The effort to secure an airport for Sonora and Sutton County which has aroused so much enthusiasm, seems to have reached a standstill. There is still the enthusiasm on the part of many and continued work on the part of those who realize fully just what a landing field could contribute to further expansion and development of our resources. But any attempt to purchase a suitable sight meets with a brick wall of outright denial or a price out of all reason.

Civil Aeronautic Administration officials say that an airstrip for a city of our size must be within four miles of town. Oil and gas company executives are interested only in a location near the city. Other sources indicate that only an airport within a four mile radius of town is suitable and adequate for Sonora's needs. And there are unhappily few sights which meet the requirements of location, topography, and accessibility.

City officials have indicated a willingness to pay four or five times the grazing value of any such sight, allowing the owner to retain all mineral rights, and yet such an offer has not been considered high enough to purchase the very small acreage needed.

A landing field can be invaluable to us. Sonora and Sutton County are at a stage of development which few communities our size are fortunate enough to reach. Our assets are many-our potentials great. We have a wonderful hospital which can serve us even better if quick air service is available. We have oil and gas resources which will be infinitely more fully developed if the area is easily accessible by air. Our flood danger will be alleviated somewhat with the construction of watershed dams, but in the event of a disaster only quick aid-by-air-can be of any value.

We are at the crossroads, and Sonora, one of the few remaining ranchman's towns, has always come through. Its reputation for getting things done is unblemished to date, because in a time of crisis, the crisis is met and passed.

Never before has there been such an opportunity for an individual in this county to do so much for so many. Lives can be saved-resources developed-an entire community bettered for generations to come, through the sale of one small piece of land. What greater memorial can man wish?

**Invalids Can Soon Receive Checks Under State-Federal Program**

Complete and permanent invalids or persons in the community so mentally deranged that they require continuous oversight to keep from harming themselves or others may soon be able to receive small monthly checks from their state Department of Public Welfare through the new State-Federal program of Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled. The Constitutional Amendment, which was adopted by the voters in November, 1956, limiting the amount of money that can be appropriated for this program to 1.5 million dollars per year, makes aid possible only to those who are helpless and have no relatives able to support them.

Miss Betty Willis, Field Worker for this area, pointed out this is the only welfare program which requires consideration of the ability of relatives to support. This law defines "responsible relatives" as children, parents, stepchildren, step-parents, brothers and sisters.

The "permanency" and "totality" of the disability will be determined by a State Reviewing Physician after study of a complete physical or mental examination

by the person's own private physician. Complete helplessness from a medical standpoint, rather than inability to work, is the criteria. The state will pay the private physician for his examination.

Funds for assistance payments will not be available until September 1, 1957, but application will be taken after July 15. While the helpless individual will not be able to leave home, the persons responsible for his care may come to the County Judge's Office in Sonora and acquaint the Department with his situation. A Field Worker will then call, as soon as possible, at the home to take the application.
