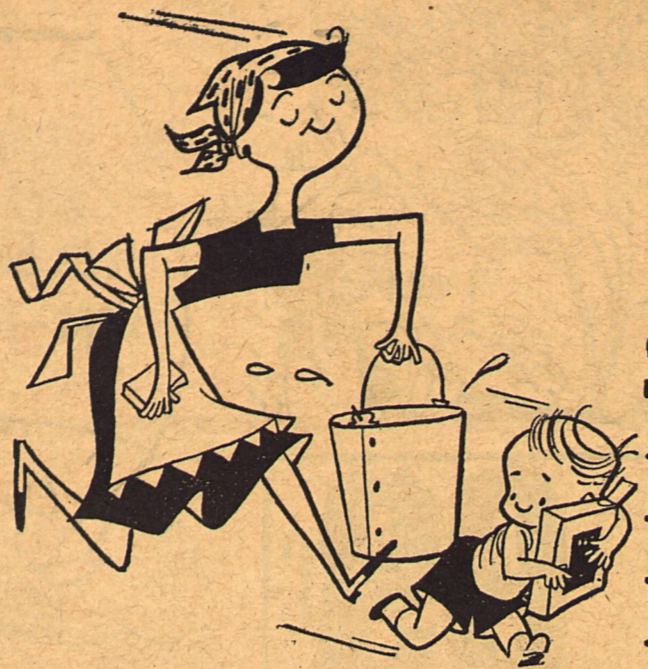

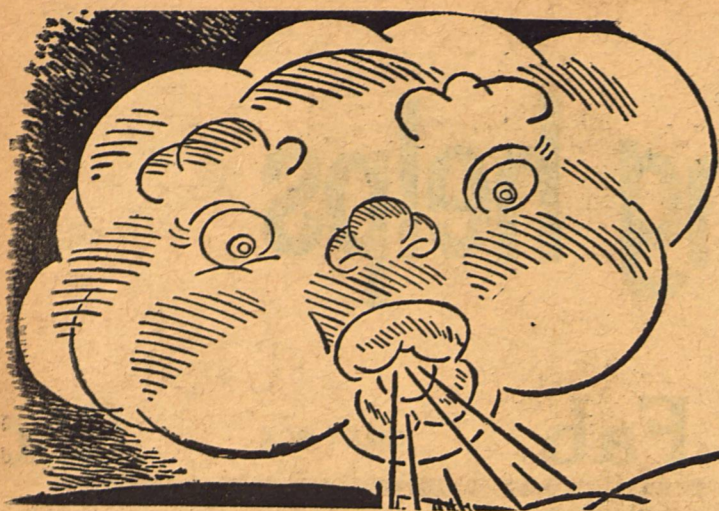

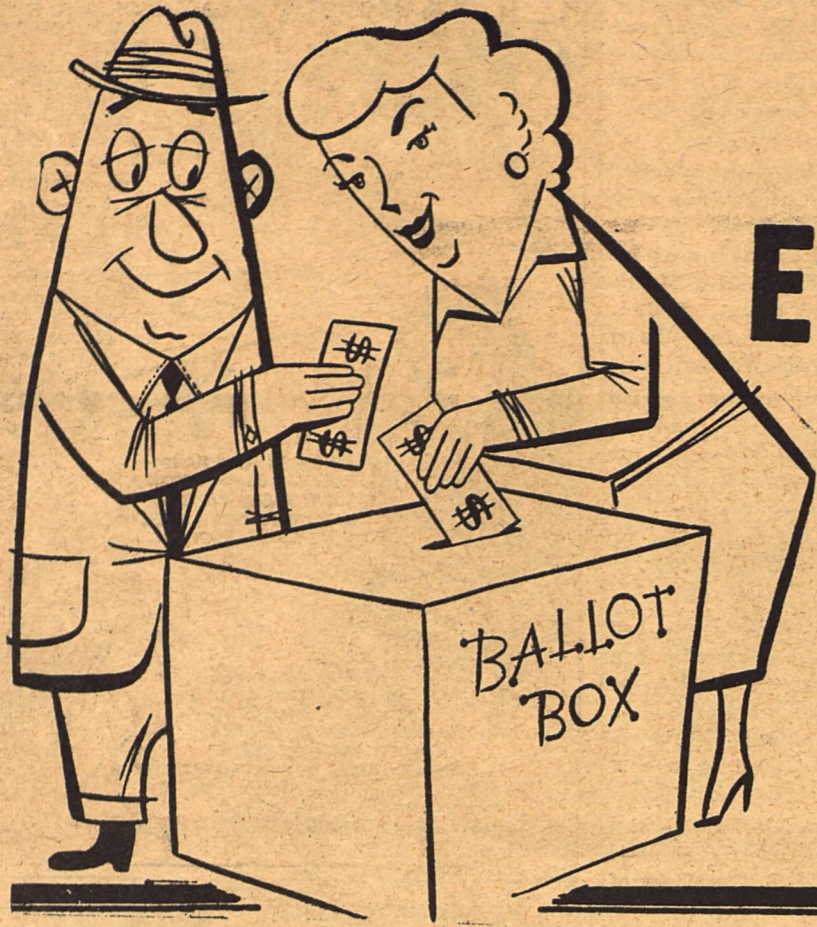

**Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District News**

Grass planting time is here, and as soon as water soaked fields dry up, planting is expected to get into full swing. Some 2,000 acres of soil bank fields will be planted to native grasses this spring.

Good grass seed is very scarce, but a good mixture of adapted seed can be purchased locally for soil bank fields. The recommended mixture consists of approximately one pound each of side-oats, blue grama and blue panic; one third pound of buffelgrass; and one fourth pound each of KR bluestem and sand dropseed per acre. This mixture should give a good stand of desirable grasses, and was also determined by scarcity and price of key

grasses. The above mixture will qualify under the soil bank program, with the ranchman paying approximately \$1.30 per acre and the cost-share amounting to some \$4.25 per acre. Ranchmen will also receive \$1.00 cost-share per acre for the seeding operation, plus an additional \$1.00 per acre where seedbed preparation is required.

Heavy rains in April and May delayed most soil bank plantings last year, and a 90 day midsummer dry period caused many failures. With the good soil moisture conditions present this spring ranchmen should have an excellent opportunity to establish good stands of grasses.

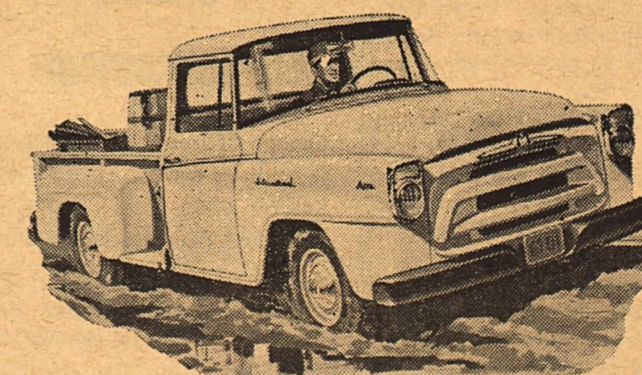

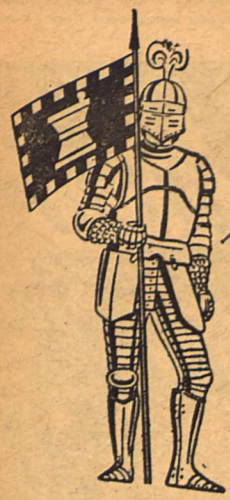

**WANTED BY THE FBI**



**GEORGE EDWARD COLE**

A complaint was filed before a United States Commissioner at San Francisco, Calif., on January 9, 1957, charging George Edward Cole with violation of the Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution Statute in that he fled from the State of California to avoid prosecution after allegedly murdering a police officer.

Cole is described as follows: Born, March 24, 1927, Philadelphia, Pa. Height, 6 feet 1 inch. Weight, 160 to 178 pounds. Build, medium. Hair, brown, receding. Eyes, brown. Complexion, medium. Race, white. Nationality, American. Occupations: bus driver, truck driver, typist. Scars and marks: pit scar on outside corner of right eye, small cut scar on inside of left wrist, appendectomy scar; tattoo, small heart and names "Mom" and "Dad" and letters "GP" or "SP" on left forearm; tattoo, 8-point star on back of left hand. He wears full upper denture.

Cole has previously been convicted of grand larceny and robbery. He reportedly has stated that he will shoot any police officer attempting to apprehend him. Cole is considered armed and dangerous.

Any person having information which might assist in locating this fugitive is requested to immediately notify the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, Washington 25, D. C., or the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest FBI Division, the telephone number of which appears on the first page of local telephone directories.

**What Shape  
Is A Stop Sign?**

What is the shape of the traffic STOP sign?

A surprising number of drivers do not know the answer to that question. Many drivers who have been driving for years don't know that traffic signs have easily identifiable shapes.

Some drivers memorize the shapes for their driving test, but soon forget their meaning, but a driver, as an added safety measure, should retain the ability to recognize the types of traffic signs by their shape.

The six basic shapes are: octagon, which means stop; round, first railroad crossing warning; white crossbuck, last railroad warning; diamond, warning of dangerous or unusual conditions ahead; triangle, yield right of way; and, rectangle, which states such laws as speed limits, passing regulations and similar laws.

We should all remember that traffic signs are designed to warn both motorists and pedestrians of traffic laws and of dangers that lie ahead. Thus, offering preventive measures for the protection of all.

Fish hatcheries of Texas now are ready to provide as many fish as will be needed to stock the new lakes that have become filled with fall and winter rains. There is a mistaken idea on the part of many people about these hatcheries. Because our hatcheries have done a great deal of stocking of some of our major lakes and streams in the past, there is a tendency on the part of many persons to think that this work is a continuing project.

This is not so. Today our fish-hatchery system works differently. There is a definite need for fish hatcheries in Texas. But except in unusual cases they do very little stocking of big lakes.

They have discovered that poor catches are, in many cases, the result of over-population of a lake. Restocking just adds to the seriousness of the situation.

On the other hand, Texas with its myriads of small lakes, created on farms and ranches and across dry creek beds, boasts numerous places for heavy hatchery production. Each time one of these small lakes is built, and fish are stocked, it provides fishing for a few more people.

These are private lakes, of course, but they furnish very fine fishing for those who are lucky enough to get permits to fish in them. In turn that takes the pressure off of public waters to a great degree.

Texas may be shy on public lands for hunting, but it certainly isn't shy on public waters for fishing. Except for far West Texas and the Panhandle there are fine lakes within a short drive for everyone. And Texans really are using them, too. Ditto for the Gulf Coast.

**A Tip On Minnows**  
A fish biologist has just reminded me that most of the rough fish which we have to fight in our new impoundments have been put there from minnow buckets. There is a tendency on the part of all of us to dump into the lake whatever minnows we have left when we are through fishing.

If you use pond raised minnows this isn't so bad. However many places sell minnows that have been seined from distant rivers, some as far away as Mexico, Oklahoma or Arkansas. Many of these are carp and gar minnows. As a result, we are infesting new lakes with rough fish which later must be cleaned out.

If you have home minnows left, give them to someone else or dump them out on dry land. Or, you might take them home, dip a hole in the garden and

pour them in. Then plant a squash or watermelon. They'll be well fertilized.

Rains of recent weeks should be beneficial to fresh water fishing, according to the Director of Inland Fisheries. The rains came before spawning season, and therefore had no harmful effect on the new crop of fish.

Some reports are coming in from fish kills on small ponds. For the most part, these are ponds that have considerable algae. Because of cloudy weather there has been insufficient oxygen, resulting in the fish kills.

These rains have put considerable new food in the water, washed down through the streams into the lakes. When the present rise of the lakes goes down and the water clears up we should have excellent fishing.

Right now most fishermen are getting ready for crappie. This wonderful pan fish is found abundantly in every major impoundment within the state. It won't be long until they'll be hitting in a big way.

Most crappie apparently are caught on minnows, although in some areas some big ones are landed on small spinners and with fly equipment.

Already some big catches have been reported from Texoma in night fishing. Some of the hotter spots in the state include the Highland lakes on the Colorado; Lakes Whitney and Belton on the Brazos and some especially heavy creels have been reported from Grapevine.

**Small Texas Cities  
Taking Advantage  
Of Housing Offer**

The State Department of Health has been engaged for many years in the promotion of housing hygiene because of the direct relationship between insanitary housing conditions and the spread of communicable diseases.

The Urban Renewal and Slum Clearance Act of 1949 (amended in 1954) provided a means for systematically attacking the problem. The 55th Texas Legislature provided the needed State legislation.

The State Department of Health was made the official planning agency by act of the Texas Legislature for city planning programs undertaken by cities with populations of less than 25,000 according to the 1950 census.

Since August 1957 (the effective date) 18 Texas cities have applied for planning assistance under the urban planning assistance program. They are Texas City, Rosenberg, La Marque, Brownwood, Irving, McAllen, Victoria, Edinburg, Mesquite Kleberg, Mission, Deer Park, Grand Prairie, Denton, Haltom City, Greenville, Richmond and Donna.

The total cost of the planning applied for is \$504,456.50, over \$242,000 of which will be Federal matching funds. The remainder of the planning funds will be raised by the cities.

All these cities had less than 25,000 population according to the 1950 census, which is one of the basic prerequisites under the program. However, seven of these cities—Texas City, Brownwood, Irving, McAllen, Victoria, Grand Prairie and Denton—have present populations in excess of this figure.

Indications are that there are other Texas cities now eligible on the basis of the 1950 census figure which will be ineligible for the planning assistance after 1960.

Cities contemplating participation in the program are Linden, Mineola, Quitman, and Panhandle, although they have initiated no active steps in that direction as yet. Other cities are working with a consultant, and their applications will be filed soon.

All cities with less than 25,000 population according to the 1950 census and who cannot financially bear the entire cost of planning are eligible to receive the aid offered by matching funds. The grant may not exceed 50 percent of the cost of the work for which they are made, local funds making up the rest.

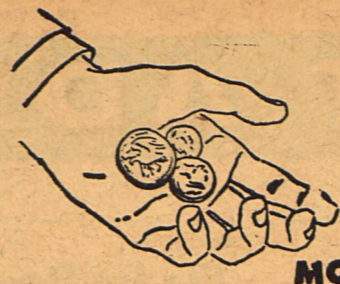
