ASPC Ad Budget Expanded For New Fiscal Year

Optimism for the future of the sheep industry in America was prevalent at the annual meeting of delegates of the American Sheep Producers Council in mid-March at Denver. Delegates, representing every major sheep producing area of the United States, attended the meeting to hear of past accomplishments and plans for the future in the self-help program of promotion and advertising conducted by the council for sheepmen.

With sheep numbers on the increase, the directors of the council boosted the budget for lamb and wool advertising and promotion. Wool advertising and promotion for the fiscal year beginning July 1, is set at \$900,000, compared to \$800,000, for the current fiscal year. The lamb budget was increased from the present \$1,153,000 to \$1,350,000, and includes the addition of four promotion areas to the present—Toledo, Minneapolis—St. Paul, New York City and expansion of the Southern California promotion to include the San Diego area.

While some emergency legislation is helpful, certainly the panic-approach should be avoided. Accelerated construction works on watershed and river harber projects, which are engineeringly sound, are being pushed in the Congress. But with scores of expensive remedies, with a dash of politics often added to the prescription, being proposed, it is a good time to remind ourselves that many sins are committed in the name of emergency.

Heavy Schedule For Game Group Quarterly Meet

There'll be a heavy schedule for the Game and Fish Commission at its next quarterly meeting in Austin Friday, April 25, according to the Executive Secretary who now is preparing the agenda.

One of the major items for discussion will be coastal fish passes. A report will be made on what already is being done at Rollover. Then the Commission will hear a report on research of the Cedar Bayou project. An engineering report now is being made ready, following a meeting earlier in the year with a group of coastal bend fishermen in Corpus Christi. Another coastal subject will be a report on the current program of building artificial oyster reefs and the proposal to provide

Can You Answer These Questions On Auto Emergencies?

Do you know: (1) how to tell whether or not you are over-driving your headlights? (2) if it is safe to hit a fixed object or roll your car over, at given speeds? (3) how to maintain control of your car when a tire blows out?

Knowing the answer to questions such as these and reacting correctly when confronted by such situations could save your life. It is all a part of learning to be a defensive driver—a driver who drives in such manner as to avoid accidents by expecting the unexpected.

The defensive driver realizes that in addition to turning in a safe driving himself, he also has a responsibility to make up for the shortcomings of others. Such an attitude comes naturally to persons accustomed to accepting their moral responsibilities in other areas of daily living.

However, other motorists and pedestrians are not the only hazards that may confront the defensive driver. He must also be alert to the dangers presented by the unexpected.

Here are the answers to the above questions:

1. When driving along a little-traveled road some night, and after making certain you will not interfere with traffic, look for hazards such as livestock along the shoulder. When you see such a hazard, bring your car to a stop. If your car does not stop before you reach the hazard, you certainly were overdriving your headlights, and you will be wise to alter your driving habits accordingly.
2. According to the Texas Department of Public Safety, "The energy of a moving car increases in proportion to the square of its speed. Between 35 and 40 miles per hour, this energy increases to such an extent to be extremely dangerous, while at lower speeds a car might be demolished yet the occupants may not be killed. Above this speed range however, it is believed that the

safest maneuver would be to sideswipe a fixed object or, if possible, miss the object by rolling the car over. In either case, always decelerate the car as much as possible.

3. The only thing you can do here is keep a firm grip, with both hands, on the steering wheel and try to hold a straight course. Use brakes cautiously and do not touch the clutch. Disengaging the clutch causes loss of traction, directional control and deceleration force of the car's motor.

Fishing, for the sport of it, is fine. However, in addition to the fun of fishing, most of us like to bring home a good string of edible fish.

If you really want fish to eat, right now is the time to take an off-shore excursion and bring back a tub full of red snapper. It is the real pan fish of the Gulf of Mexico.

However, fishing for red snapper is more work than sport. The first half-dozen give you a thrill. Thereafter it becomes a chore, especially if you are on a good boat over a hot spot. It is nothing unusual to catch a hundred pounds or more of red snapper, if your strength holds out that long.

Red snapper fishing is one of the favorites of the party boat. These boats operate out of most of the coastal cities of Texas. They take excursions out to the snapper banks in the Gulf. Most of the banks are at least 35 miles

out. Some are more than one hundred miles into the Gulf.

Actually, there is but one secret in getting all that is getting with a good party boat operator. If he has good equipment, which is more than just having a good boat, you are pretty sure to get all the fish you want, providing the weather is right. And a good operator won't take you out unless the weather is right.

A good party boat has to be one large enough to withstand about the roughest water that can be thrown at you in the Gulf of Mexico. Generally one of these boats won't get caught in bad weather, but sometimes they do.

Most important of all, the boat must have a good captain. He must know the Gulf and how to read the electronic instruments that tell when he is sitting over a reef.

Red snapper inhabit coral reefs on the bottom of the Gulf. These reefs have been built up through millions of years, and afford a fine breeding and hiding place for snapper, as well as groupers and some of the other large fish of the briny deep.

There are a few of these reefs at around 10 to 12 fathoms. (A fathom is approximately six feet.) Most of them are at 25 or 30 fathoms, some at from 30 to 50 fathoms.

You fish for red snapper with heavy equipment, such as a large Ocean City reel on a heavy rod with about 300 yards of good line of from 75 to 125 pound test. For a terminal equip it with a good Weller bottom rig leader, a couple of No. 6 hooks and a 16 ounce sinker.

Bait this terminal with squid, cut bait or frozen bait and let it to the bottom as fast as you can. And we do mean fast, otherwise, on the way down some smaller fish may take it and you'll lose your bait before it ever reaches bottom.

When your rig is on the bottom, fish is something like fishing for crappie. When a snapper gets on, it's up to you to crank him up as fast as you can. Occasionally if it is a small snapper, a big old amberjack or ling may come by and decide it's hungry. If that happens, then you have a real fight on your hands.

Incidentally, you don't have to buy your own red snapper fishing equipment. It can be rented from any party boat operator. Also he'll show you how to use it. He wants you to make a good catch. If you do you'll tell your friends and his business stays good.

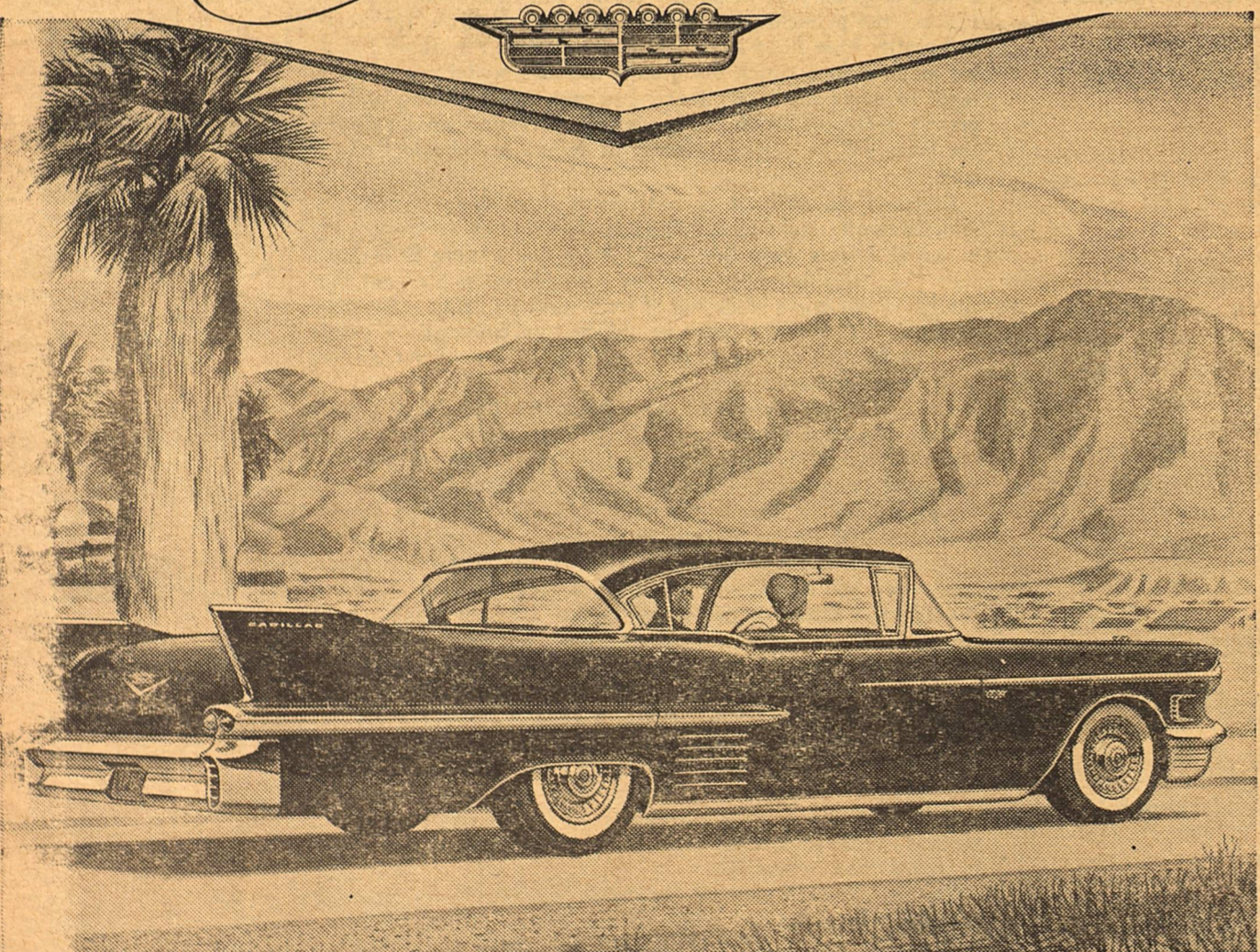
Party boats usually are pretty well dated up. It is a good idea to select one you want to use, early, and make a definite date. The boat usually leave the docks about 2 a.m. and returns about 6 p.m. with a load of fish and some pretty tired but happy fishermen.

These boats carry beverage boxes and most of them have lunches for sale. Some of them are equipped with ship-to-shore telephones, radio and other modern conveniences.

The trip will cost from \$10 to \$15 for your fare, plus your drinks, and a per-day rent on equipment. You'd better figure on spending about \$20 for the day, but if it's a good day you'll get more than your money's worth.

If you are interested in such a trip, write the Chamber of Commerce in the area where you'd like to embark from. They'll be glad to send you folders and the names and addresses of the party boat operators. Satisfy yourself you are getting the best one possible. He's the cheapest in the long run.

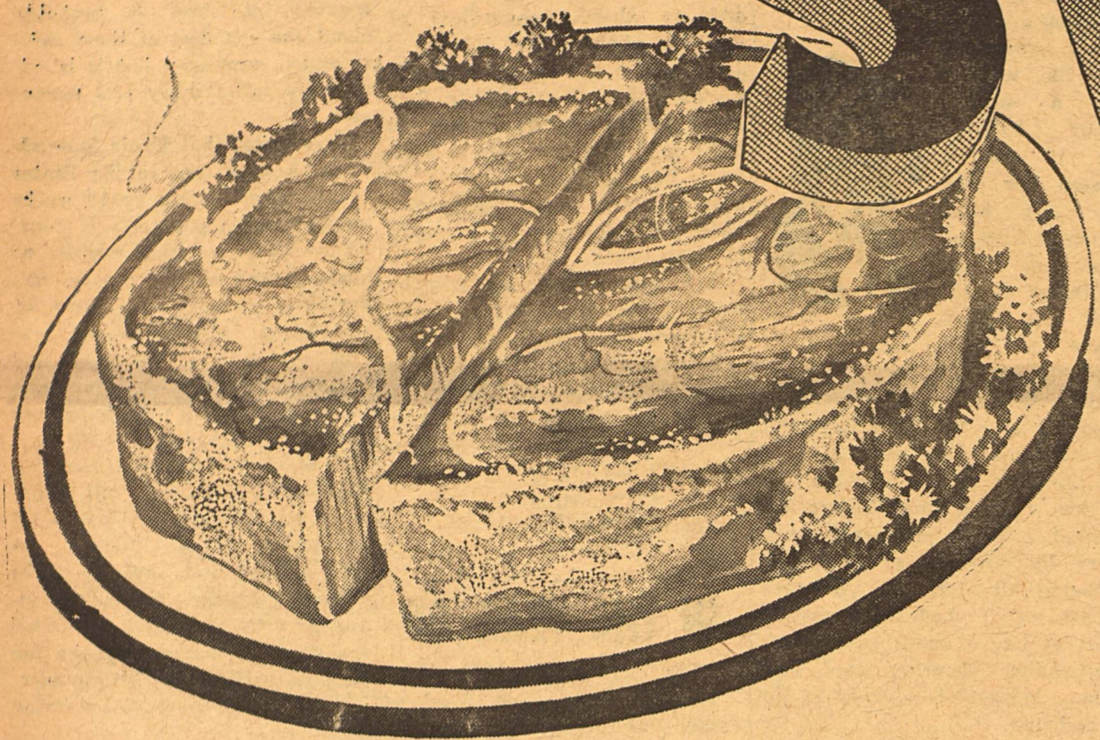

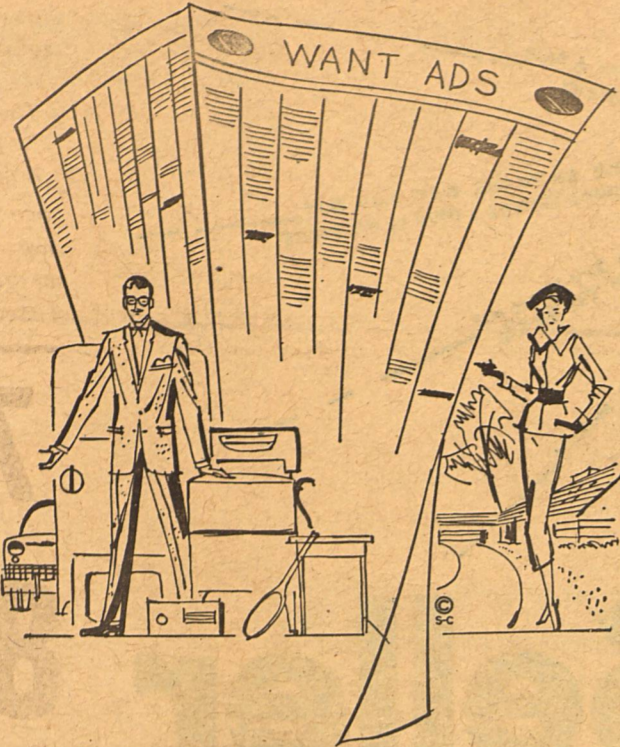

Christ and Simon Peter, and Christ was victorious in the life of this man.

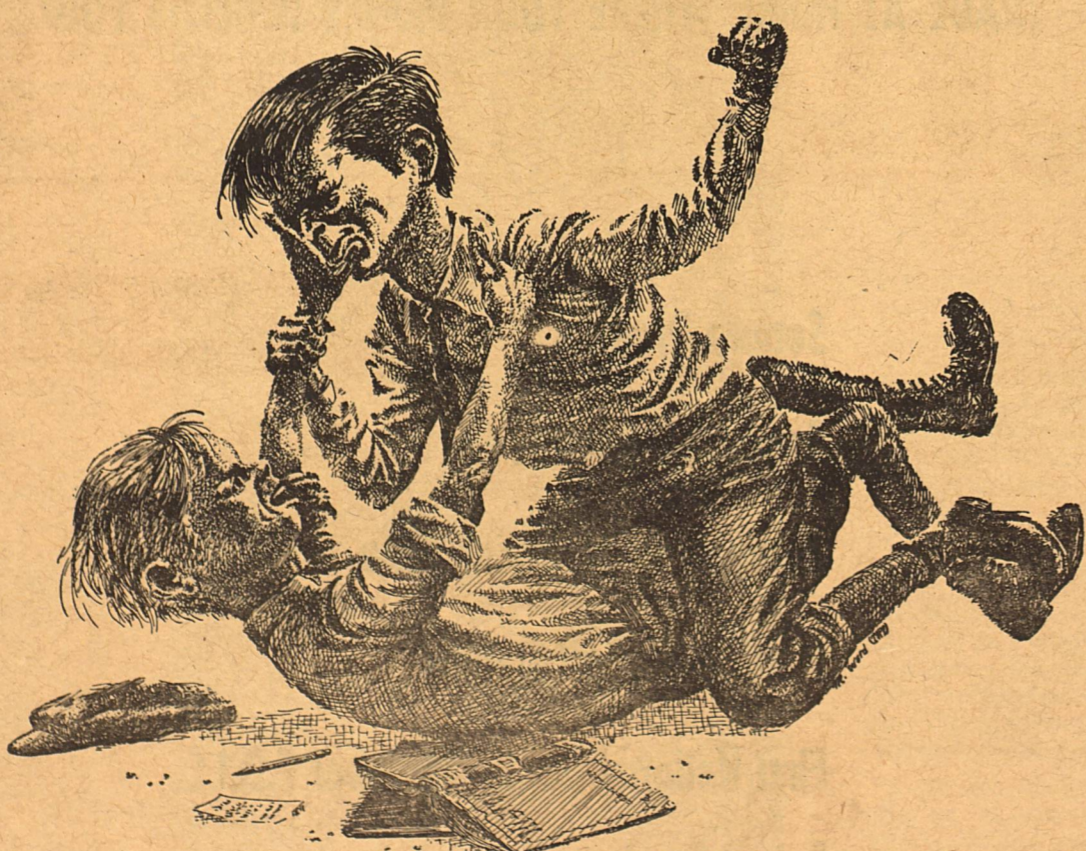

Entries Now Being Received in First Nation Wide Miss Wool Competition

San Angelo, Texas—In 1952, a Miss Wool Contest and Pageant started as a joint effort by the members of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and the San Angelo Board of City Development.

The sole purpose of this promotion was to secure publicity for the wool industry and to make the citizens of our state and area more conscious of the advantages of woolen goods. During the first year of the contest most of the entries were secured

from around this section of the state.

Due to the great amount of interest that was generated by the Pageant in 1952, state-wide participation was secured the following year and the Miss Wool Pageant has started on a steady program of growth and acceptance by fashion conscious people throughout the nation.

In 1957, this activity had reached a level of prestige in that it was one of the two contests that was recognized by some of the leading educational institutions of the state, and they in turn gave approval for their students to participate using the names of their universities.

During the past few years the winner of the Miss Wool Pageant had not only traveled extensively in Texas but was receiving growing recognition in style centers throughout the nation. She was securing much favorable publicity for the important wool industry.

Realizing the great potential of the contest and pageant, the members of the Miss Wool Committee recommended that in 1958 an invitation be extended to the twelve other wool producing states of the nation urging their participation in the contest.

On January 19, 1958, the Miss Wool Committee met with delegates to the National Wool Association Convention in Phoenix, Arizona to present their proposals and to invite the participation of the Association's representatives. The program was very well accepted resulting into a national contest. The participating states are Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Texas, Utah, Washington, South Dakota, Wyo-

ming, New Mexico. Throughout the entire state; however, all entries will be eliminated down to eleven. These eleven girls will be selected to serve as finalists in the Miss Wool of Texas Contest. 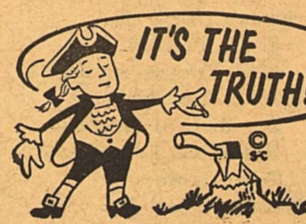
