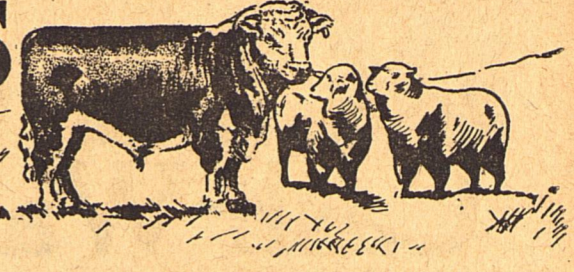

Water- the best fire insurance

an editorial

Do you want the assurance of ample fire protection for your home or business property? If so, you will have the opportunity to cast your vote for that plus a greater supply of water and greater water pressure at the polls on Saturday, September 20.

The City Commission has investigated the existing water system and on the basis of their findings have called a bond election to increase our facilities WITH NO ADDITIONAL TAXATION AND WITHOUT DIVERTING ANY CURRENT TAX REVENUE FOR THE PURPOSE.

As matters stand now the pump units at the waterworks just

manage to stay ahead of consumption, an additional pump would assure us of an adequate reserve. A new 375,000 gallon reservoir proposed for Clarkson Hill to care for needs of south Sonora, would guarantee an ample supply of ready water. Extended and enlarged mains would insure plenty of water at any part of town where an emergency might demand it.

The bonds are self-financing—they MUST be paid out of revenue from the water supply system—they CANNOT be paid out of taxation on the citizens.

Think over the proposed bond issue—and vote your conviction on September 20.

Friday, Sept. 26 Is Soil Bank Filing Deadline

Texas ranchers and farmers have until September 26 to file a request with their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee for a maximum rate for their farm under the 1959 conservation reserve phase of the Soil Bank program.

Then, after the maximum farm rate is determined, farmers have until October 17, 1958, to apply for a conservation reserve contract. It is emphasized that under present legislation, there will be no acreage reserve program in 1959, and farmers and ranchers are urged to become familiar with the conservation reserve.

County offices are ready to accept applications for establishing the maximum conservation reserve rates and rates in Texas will average \$12.00 per acre.

No Taxation Involved

WATER BOND VOTE CALLED TO ENLARGE FACILITIES

Sonorans will have the opportunity to vote a \$100,000 revenue bond issue for the purpose of enlarging water storage facilities, extending and enlarging mains and increasing pumping capacity.

The bond election was called for September 20, 1958 by City Commissioners A. B. Hightower and Gay Copeland and Mayor Alfred Schwiening in regular session Monday, September 2. This action was taken after city water reserves dropped to an all-time low of 150,000 gallons early in August.

Fire Chief Lee Patrick estimated that in the Hamilton fire in December 1945 more than

300,000 gallons of water were used before the fire was brought under control. Even a fire requiring one-third the amount of water could deplete reserves to a dangerously low point.

Under existing facilities, water pumps are run on a 24-hour schedule in order to build up, overnight, adequate reserves for our heavy daytime consumption. By the addition of one 800-gallon-per-minute pumping unit and one 375,000 gallon reservoir, present storage facilities would nearly be doubled to 775,000 gallons, assuring citizens of an ample water supply and safe reserve. This, with the addition of new mains plus enlargement of existing mains, should lead to the reduction of our key rate on fire insurance.

The necessity for increased facilities has arisen from population growth, increased business activity, new and greater sale of water to oil well drilling companies and the advisability of more adequate fire protection. In addition, Sonora will be called upon to sell water for construction and maintenance of flood control dams in the Lowrey Dray and Dry Devil's River watersheds.

It is emphasized that the bonds to be voted are revenue bonds and must be repaid out of revenue from the waterworks. They cannot be paid from existing taxes

Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District News

Several methods of planting root plowed land are being tried on the Mack Cauthorn ranch south of Sonora.

Jack Fletcher, Holt Equipment Company representative, and G. T. Rode, local contractor, have worked the past ten days on some ten different methods of planting.

For some unknown reason, seed planted on root plowed land in this area have been slow to germinate and grow—even when moisture is plentiful. Observations indicated good germination in equipment tracks and other areas where the ground was packed following plowing.

M. D. Bryant, San Angelo ranchman, pulled a heavy pipe drag over the root plowed land before seeding and obtained good results. The seeding trials made by Fletcher and Rode are based

on any additional taxation.

Citizens are urged to vote in this most important election. Polling place will be the City Hall.

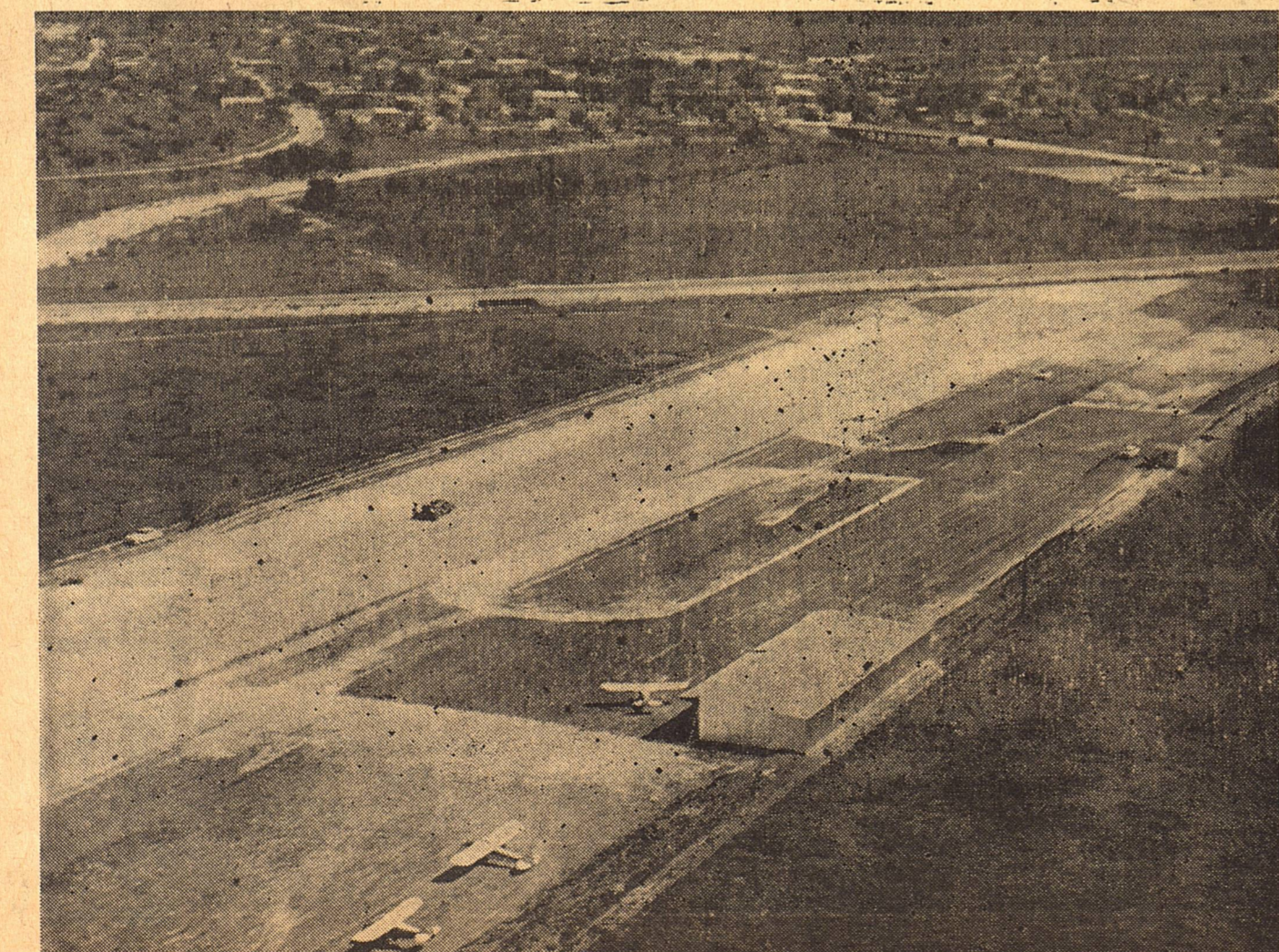
upon some type of packing before planting.

A sheep-foot packer, concrete roller, and a root rake have been used on the Cauthorn ranch. A small roller was used on root plowed land at the Experiment Station before the recent rain and Leo Merrill has reported a good stand of grass.

Several rates and types of seeding were made on the Mack Cauthorn ranch on deep soil areas in combination with the various types of packing. Plantings of oats, blue panicum and sorghum alum were made in mixtures and pure stands. The oats were used to provide winter competition for bitterweed.

Plantings on root plowed land in the Edwards Plateau SCD to date have been only partially successful. Drought was a major factor in failure of 1956 plantings, and 1957 and 1958 seedings have produced spotted results.

Sutton Traffic Toll Now 7 As Crash Tuesday Kills 3

Three persons lost their lives Tuesday in a grinding crash about 14 miles west of Sonora on U. S. Highway 290. Decried as one of the worst traffic accidents in recent years, the head-on crash resulted in the deaths of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Willis Atkins of Wichita Falls, Texas, and Frank

Gaines of Houston, Texas, and Ruston, Louisiana.

The collision occurred shortly after the Atkins car, traveling toward Sonora, had stopped for a roadblock on the highway which is undergoing repairs. Exact cause of the accident was not

known and both cars were completely demolished.

The bodies of Atkins and his wife were taken to Wichita Falls for burial and that of Gaines was flown to Shreveport, Louisiana.

The Sutton County traffic toll now stands at seven. The total for 1957 was one.
