## High School Science Dept. Receives Radiological Instruments For Studies

The science department of Sonora High School has received a grant from the State Division of Defense and Disaster Relief for training and educational purposes. Chemistry students will maintain and use the instruments furnished under the grant.

Included in the kit of radiological and detection devices instruments are the following items: Two Radiological survey meters, Geiger Counters; Two additional radiological survey meters; Four self-reading radiological dosimeters; One radiological dosimeter charger; Two Comparison standard sources for food and water; One manual of instructions on instrument usage. The grant is made subject to the following conditions: That these instruments will be used

with appropriate emphasis given to stimulating interest in civil defense and disaster relief, to insuring that students throughout the country have adequate apparatus available to enable them to learn the fundamentals of atomic energy and radiological defense, and to developing and maintaining a core of personnel who can be trained as radiological defense monitors. That the instruments will be maintained in proper operating condition, including calibration, during the useful life of the instruments. And that the State Coordinator of Defense and Disaster Relief reserves the right to reclaim, at his discretion, any and all of such instruments during an emergency or disaster.

## News From Yours ASC Office

The local ASC office has received additional funds to the county allocation for Agricultural Conservation practices. Any rancher who wishes to participate in the 1958 program year should fill out a Request for Federal Cost-Share. This work must be finished by the end of the program year December 31, 1958.

Mrs. Marie K. Ellis, office manager, also reminds ranchmen that October 1 is the last day for the beginning of deferred grazing period in the 1958 program year. October 1 to December 31, is the minimum three months grazing period for Sutton County. The payment rate is 21 cents per acre for a three months period. Applications for deferred grazing must be on file by October 1.

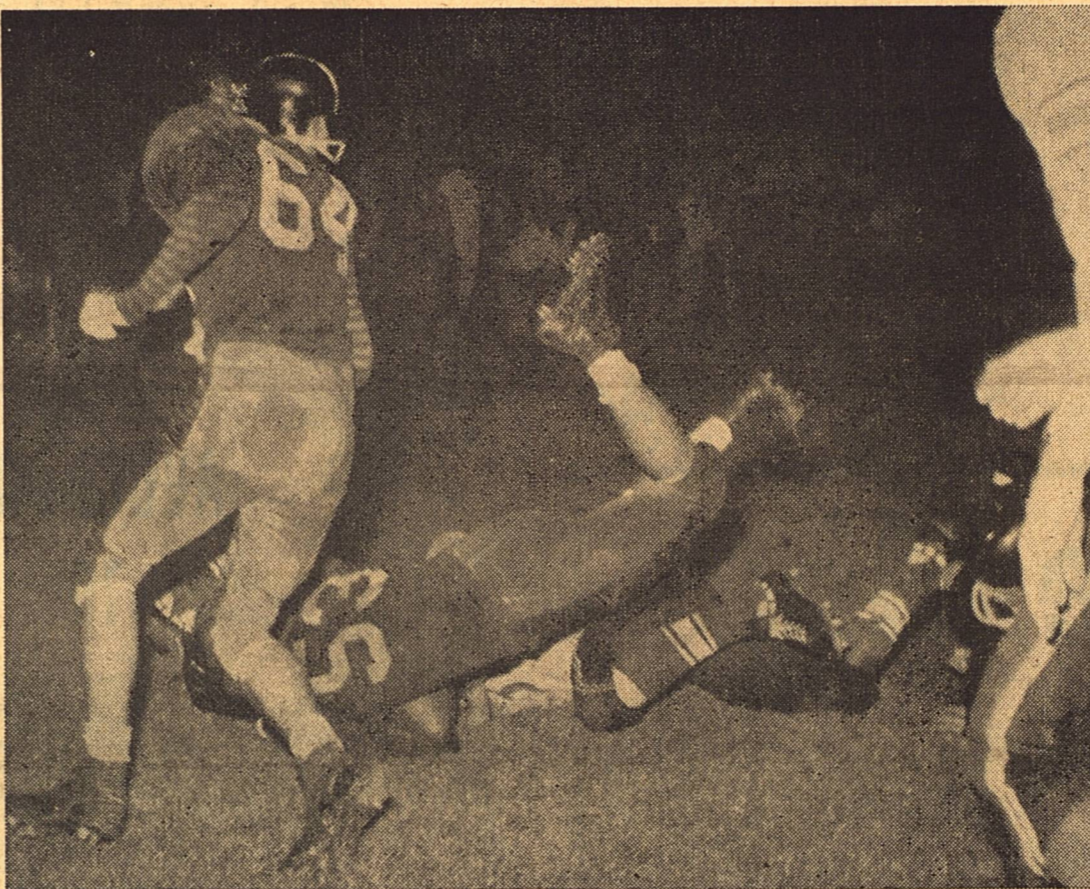
Another reminder from Mrs. Ellis: The final date for sign up for a request for establishment of maximum payment rates and application for contract under the Conservation Reserve program for 1959 is September 26.

Under the 1959 program, the county committee will set rates for each farm that requests it. The committee will set up a payment based on the productivity of the land with the average for the county being \$11.00 an acre. An additional ten percent if all land is put in. This only applies to the new land being put in for 1959 and ranchers will have until October 17 to request a contract after the payment rate is set up.

## Colored Rodeo Slated Here

An all-colored rodeo will be held at the fairgrounds here Saturday and Sunday, September 27 and 28, with events scheduled to begin at two o'clock each afternoon.

Events slated include calf roping, saddle bronc riding, wild mule races, bull riding, goat roping, bulldogging, hair pulling and goat hair pulling.

A determined Sonora eleven swamped the Iraan Braves here Friday night 36 to 6 for the third victory in as many games in the 1958 football season. Despite a steady show rain with hazardous footing, the Broncos outmarched the Braves all down the line.

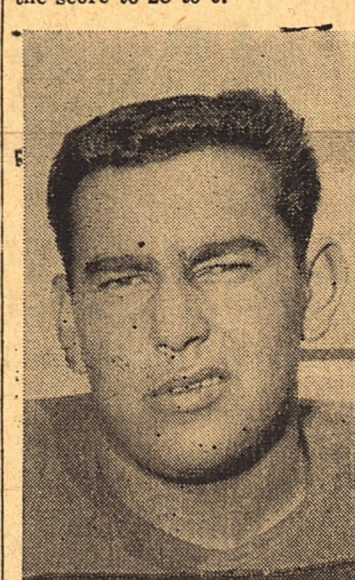
In the first quarter the Big Red defense pushed the Braves back to the two yardline from where they were forced to kick. Doroteo Castro effectively blocked the kick which was recovered by Jimmy Smith across the goal strip for the first Bronco touchdown. Alfred Sykes carried off tackle for the conversion and the score stood at 8 to 0.

The last minutes of the quarter a ground gain attack by Sykes, Galindo and Sosa started on the Broncos' 42 yardline and ended with Galindo going over from the four yardline. The quarter ended with the Broncos leading 14 to 0.

Most spectacular run of the game was a 65 yard run to pay dirt with Eddie Sosa taking a fourth down kick on the Sonora 35. Ben Castillo took out the first man with a beautiful block and Sykes took out another three to clear the way for Sosa's touchdown. Sykes carried for the conversion attempt and the half-time

score was 22 to 0.

After the half, Sonora took the ball on the kickoff with Sosa carrying to the 50 where he slipped on wet turf. Then a pass off the arm of Sosa to Brodhead was good for 20 yards to the 15. Sykes carried from this point to raise the score to 28 to 0.

Here Coach Joe Turner began to give his B squad a chance to chalk up some experience. An Iraan fumble on the 40 gave Jerry Baldwin and Bobby Sosa the honors with Sosa scoring on a three yard off-tackle play and Baldwin running the point for a 36 to 6 score.

The Braves' only touchdown came late in the fourth when Iraan's McKenzie intercepted a pass off Baldwin for a 57 yard run to the goal stripe.

## Slow Rains Soak County This Week Up To 7 Inches

Above normal rainfall continued to soak the Sonora area during the past week. Many ranchmen received from 5 to 7 inches of rain during the period, with most of it falling gently and producing very little runoff.

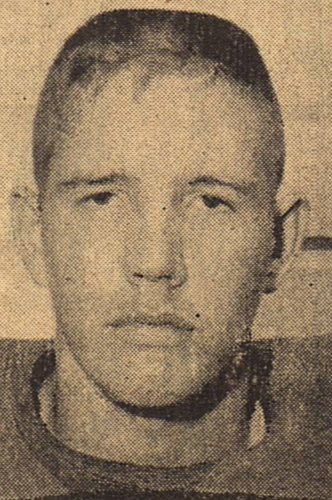
The grass covered hillsides are soaked to capacity, and small streams of clear water are trickling from each header. Torrential rains covered small areas of the Edwards Plateau SCD, but comparatively little water was lost.

Many ranchmen are approaching record totals for yearly rainfall, with some areas showing 25 inches thus far this year. Rainfall has been very spotted, but all areas have received more than the long time average of about 21 inches.

Representative total rainfall received to date in the Sonora area include 38 inches on the Lea Allison ranch; J. A. Cauthorn 36.50; Joe Logan 25.10; and Herbert Fields 23.22.

Flood producing rains have dotted the general area, but the 11 inch June rain in the Edwards Mayer-Ralph Jones area west of Sonora was the closest flood threat thus far.

With rangeland presently soaked to capacity, a 10 inch torrential storm on Dry Devils River and Lowrey Draw would produce serious flood damage in Sonora. The five dams planned for Lowrey Draw should be completed before this time next year, which will greatly lessen the flood threat.

A range conservation tour will be held at the Herbert Fields District trial area pasture on Tuesday, October 7, in connection with the election of a district supervisor for sub-division 5. The 367 acre pasture was leased from Fields in the fall of 1954, and vegetation has made remarkable improvement. Various range practices, including pitting with and without seeding, deferred grazing, root plowing, and wire diversions were used to hasten

recovery. Ranchmen can observe the results of each type of treatment, and make their own conclusions regarding the value of each practice. The pasture was stocked during the fall and winter of 1955 and again in 1957 with sheep, goats and cattle. No supplemental feed was provided and records of gains were kept. In conjunction with the tour, landowners in sub-division 5 will elect a district supervisor. Sub-
