Sonora Loses Second Game Friday As Mason Marches To 20-0 Victory





eligible. Teachers of driver education classes shall be added to the present categories for special service personnel.

The number of classroom teacher units required for allocating special service units shall be changed from 20 to 17, provided that one or more of the units selected under the 17 formuls must be driver education, and provided that if driver education is not selected, the quota shall be one to 20.

The formula for allocation of full-time principals shall be changed to provide one for 16 classroom teacher units and an additional such principal unit for each additional 24 classroom teacher units. In no event shall more than one full-time principal per campus unit be approved.

Special pre-school instructional units for non-English speaking children, who are at least five year of age and who are eligible to enter the first grade the ensuing year, shall be provided in accordance with a plan to be developed by the State Board of Education.

Ultimately, the State Board of Education shall require all teachers to teach in their major field. The allotment of state funds for services and operating costs shall be increased from \$350-\$400 to \$600 per teacher, and the \$100 per unit credit now provided in establishing the local fund assignment shall be abolished.

Each local school has the responsibility for establishing guidance services according to the plan approved by the State Board of Education.

The state salary schedule should provide a beginning salary of \$4,000 for the four-year college graduate based upon ten months of service. A minimum beginning salary of \$3,800 would be paid for nine and one-half months of service. Annual increments in the amount of \$100 for each year of teaching service should be added to the bachcelor degree base. The beginning minumum base for a master degree should be \$4,200. To this would be added \$100 per pear for each year of teaching service hrough the first 12 years and \$200 per year for each additional vear over 12.
