Superintendent E. A. Brodhead Dies, Burial Services Held Here Monday

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church here Monday afternoon, December 29, for E. A. Brodhead, superintendent of Sonora schools since 1950, who died Sunday at Hudspeth Memorial Hospital following a heart attack. The Rev. Doyle W. Morton, pastor, officiated.

Brodhead was born May 10, 1910, in Brush Valley, Pennsylvania, the son of a Methodist minister. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in mathematics, science and education from George Peabody College, Tennessee, and also held a Master of Arts degree in education from Southern Methodist University, Dallas. He has taken courses toward a doctorate from the University of Texas.

He had taught at Mexia and Overton before coming to Sonora

in 1950 as superintendent. An outstanding educator, Brodhead served as chairman of the district Superintendents' Association, on the program committee of the American Association of School Administrators, on the National Council for Educational Travel, and was a vice-president of the Texas Association of School Administrators.

Brodhead served the First Methodist Church as a member of its Board of Stewards. He was also a member of the Masonic Lodge, the Lions Club and the Chamber of Commerce.

Always active in Scouting, Brodhead was a member of the Executive Committee of the Concho Valley Boy Scout Council and last year received the Silver Beaver Award for outstanding service in Scouting.

Survivors include his wife, the former Audrey Posey, and a son, Gene, both of Sonora; his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Brodhead of Houston; a sister, Mrs. John Stephens of Akron, Ohio; and a half-sister, Mrs. John Traylor of Portales, New Mexico.

Burial was in Sonora Cemetery under the direction of Raliff-Kerbow Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Dr. W. T. Hardy, Edwin Sawyer, Bryan Hunt, J. M. Vander Stucken and Frank P. Bond, all of Sonora; John Ben Sheppard of Midland; E. D. Cleveland of Palestine, and D. L. Keoun of Overton.

300 West Texas Boys Have Benefited From Boys Ranch

Nearly 300 boys have benefited from training at Boys' Ranch of West Texas, located near Tansley. According to J. M. Vander Stucken, member of the Executive Board at the Ranch, a record high of 45 boys are now participating in the supervised education, work, and recreational program on the 960 acre tract. A well rounded program is being operated for this use.

Organized 11 years ago to serve West Texas boys, Boys' Ranch of West Texas is one method for West Texans to take care of their own. There, the boys live a normal, happy life making ranch hands the year around. Under close supervision, but not severe supervision, of adults, they grow up in mind and body amid the rustic surroundings of hard work, hard play, and a profound respect for those with whom they live.

A 44 county West Texas area is regarded by the Ranch as its operational area. At some time in the Ranch history it has served boys from most of the 44 counties. Presently one boy is being served from Sutton County.

More Americans Are Learning About Lamb

Americans are learning more about lamb, thanks to a program of advertising and promotion which the sheepmen of the United States are sponsoring with their own funds.

Many of the misconceptions about lamb are being disproved as lamb producers seek to build up the market for their products through their own promotional organization, the American Sheep

Producers Council.

G. N. Winder of Denver, Colorado, President of the Council, said much has been done to combat the false impressions many consumers have about lamb. He cited the mistaken impression that many veterans received overseas. "What they were eating was not lamb as it is produced in this country, but some kind of meat prepared under the worst possible conditions," Winder declared.

Another condition which the Council is attempting to correct is that almost 70 percent of the lamb consumed in his country is eaten in the New England states, New York, and California. "There are many areas of this

Aliens Register At Post Office During January

District Director Harlon B. Carter of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that the period within which aliens must report their address is almost at hand.

The month of January has been set for the address reporting period. All aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, must report their address to the Government during that period. Carter said that forms with which to make the report will be available to all post offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January.

Carter urges all aliens to comply with the reporting requirements, as willful failure to do so may lead to serious consequences.

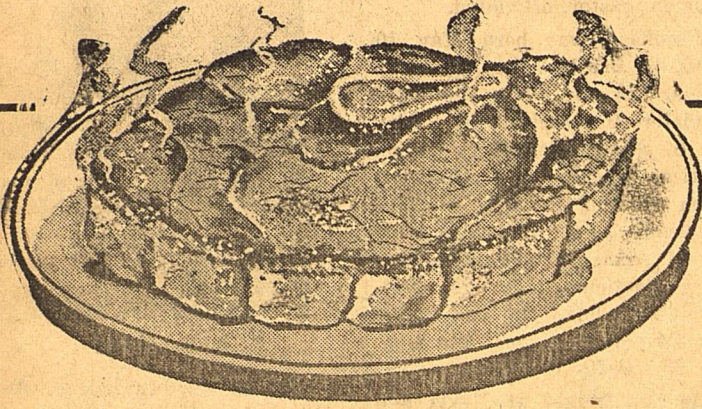
