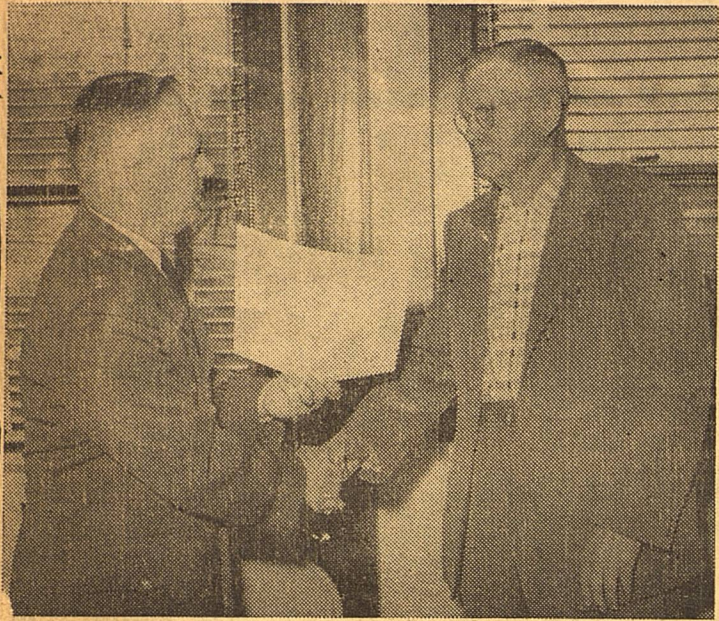

The schedule of events includes breeding sheep and angora goat judging 8:30 a.m., fat lamb judging 9:00 a.m., fat steer show 11:00 a.m., barbecue lunch 12:00 noon, commercial ewe lamb show 1:00 p.m., drawing for boots and sale 2:00 p.m. Presentation of awards after sale.

Vernon Jones, County Agent from Junction, will judge all the sheep and angora goat classes. Roy D. Siegmund, district extension agent from Fort Stockton, will judge fat steer and showmanship. Pete Jacoby, County Agent of Ozona, and Hayden Haby, County Agent of Rocksprings, will serve on the sifting committee.

The auctioneer will be Herbert Fields, assisted by H. V. (Buzzie) Stokes and others. The show committee includes W. B. McMillan, chairman; W. F. Berger, Herbert Fields, Preston Love, Harold Friess and Bill Morris.

Eighteen 4-H members exhibit 48 commercial ewe lambs; 28 4-H members will exhibit 102 muttons; 5 4-H members will exhibit 11 angora goats; 3 4-H members will exhibit 20 registered ram-bouillet sheep and 2 4-H members will exhibit 7 steers. Thirty lambs will be sold in the auction sale.

## Number Of Stores In Sutton County Up 19 Percent

Statistics released this week by Dun and Bradstreet, Inc., reflect the growth of business firms in Sutton County during the past year. Figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun and Bradstreet reference book for January 1959 totaled 81 manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers in this area as compared to 68 in January 1954, an increase of 19 percent for the period.

The book lists only manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers. It does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops and stock and real estate brokers. Thus, the figures for businesses in Sutton County would actually be higher than the 81 quoted.

During the past year 53 changes were made in the listings of Sutton County businesses, including names added, deleted, and changes in rating of continuing businesses.

## San Antonio Stock Show Caravan Stops Here Wednesday Morning

A goodwill group from the San Antonio Stock Show arrived in Sonora Wednesday to extend a personal invitation to the tenth anniversary Stock Show and Rodeo.

The group arrived by bus and presented a program of western entertainment by the Texas Top Hands and vocalist Pat Cornwell. Bill McReynolds, farm director of stations WOAI and WOAI-TV, San Antonio, was master of ceremonies and introduced members of the party which included representatives of the Stock Show Association, the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce and San Antonio businessmen.

## Safety Patrol Advocated By Safety Expert At Tuesday Night Meeting

Approximately 46 fathers attended a safety meeting at the high school cafeteria Tuesday night. Robert Hardgrave, chairman of the PTA safety committee, presided, introduced Ross Kemp, Texas State Highway Department safety officer of the 49 county Midland district.

Sgt. Kemp pointed to the alarming traffic death rate that took the lives of 2,539 Texans in 1958. Approximately 100,000 Texans as citizens were injured, with a \$277,000,000 economic loss sustained.

"Adults must set an example for 'safe driving,'" the speaker stated. He pointed out that any traffic problem can be approached from three points; education, engineering and enforcement. Weakness in any phase renders the other two ineffective.

"I strongly recommend that a school safety patrol system be set up at Sonora, under the direction of a faculty member,"

Sgt. Kemp stated. Safety patrols have reduced traffic problems around many schools in West Texas, he added.

The Texas death rate is 5.5 killed per 100 million miles traveled, and Texans traveled 42 billion miles in 1958. Approximately 80 per cent of fatal accidents occurred outside city limits.

The speaker conducted a lively question and answer period which lasted for two hours. Many local problems were discussed, with the general consensus of opinion pointing to better driver education to increase safety awareness as the primary answer to the traffic problem.

"Each person must accept his part of the responsibility for the traffic problem" Sgt. Kemp said. Pie and coffee were served prior to the meeting. The kindergarten class, taught by Mrs. Jack Thomas, won the attendance award in having the most fathers present.

## Beginners' Bands To Be Organized In Grade Schools

A. C. Hart, instrumental music teacher in the Sonora Public Schools, announced this week that he plans the organization of a beginners' band to be composed of fourth grade students at Central Elementary School and fifth and sixth grade students at L. W. Elliott School.

Hart and Lloyd Reitz, of the High School Music Service in San Antonio, will meet with students and parents Thursday afternoon to explain the new beginners' organization and discuss instruments.

On Friday afternoon and evening Hart and Reitz will be at Elliott School for similar meetings.

## Commissioners Name Jerry Shurley County Attorney

Jerry Shurley was appointed County Attorney for Sutton County by the Commissioners Court meeting in regular monthly session Monday, January 12. Shurley was named by the Court to fill the vacancy created by the election to the office of County Judge of former County Attorney J. W. (Web) Elliott. Shurley will serve as County Attorney until the next general election.

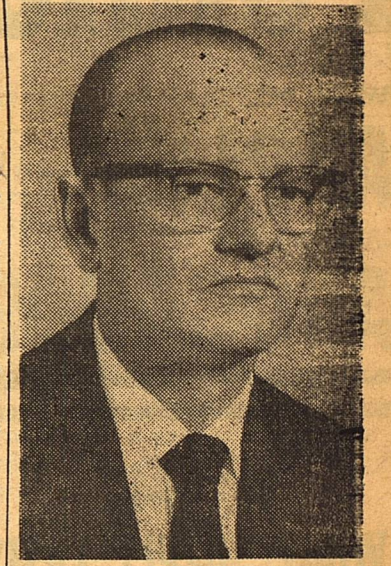
## Rev. Lea Roy Aldwell To Be Ordained To Priesthood In Eldorado Monday

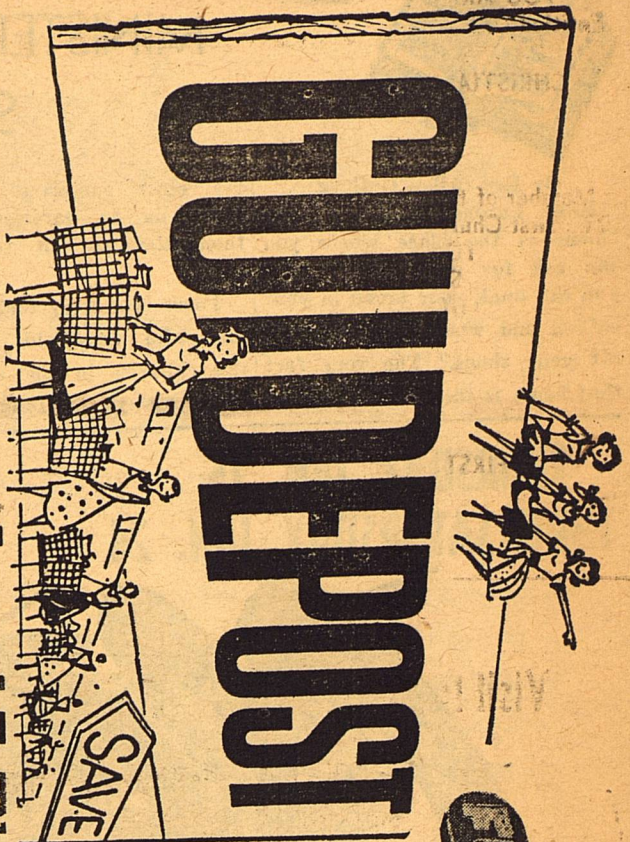

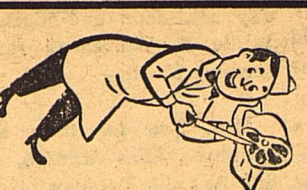

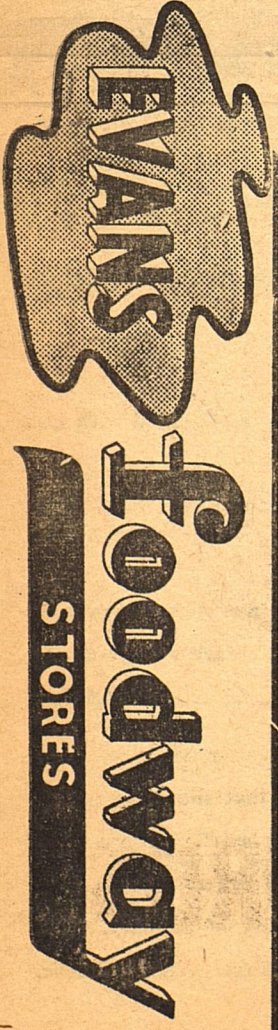

## Do Your Safety Shopping Early, Says State DPS

The Texas Department of Public Safety warns motorists of the inconveniences of a last-minute rush at safety inspection stations before the deadline, April 1st.

More than 3,000,000 of the 4,000,000 Texas motor vehicles have yet to receive their 1959 safety inspection sticker.

In urging motorists to "do their safety shopping early" and avoid the rush at the 4,400 inspection stations, the safety department warned that those who fail to do so will be subject to traffic summons after April 15. The average cost of the safety inspection since the program began six years ago is \$1.19 for needed repairs and \$1 for the inspection fee.

The inspection stations check items as brakes, lights, horns, mirrors and windshield wipers and have found that 39 per cent of the vehicles have needed some adjustment or repair.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the safety department, said this is an improvement over the general condition of motor vehicles six years ago when the inspection program began. At that time more than 50 percent needed repairs.

"We hope that owners of motor vehicles will take advantage of the inspection facilities now and avoid the inconveniences of waiting in line as the April 15 deadline approaches," Colonel Garrison said. "This safety factor is important to safe driving on our streets and highways—and that is our goal."

Rio Grande, extending roughly between Heath and Reagan Canyons.

The total area of the Black Gap property now is approximately 90,000 acres, extending from the eastern boundary of the Big Bend National Park to the Rio Grande in some of Texas' best mule deer country.

This property was purchased under the Pitman-Robertson program which provides 75 percent federal aid both in the acquisition and development of the area.

Although the land is used principally for management purposes, controlled hunting of game surpluses has been per-

mitted on the area during the Trans-Pecos open season, since 1955. Persons who are allowed to hunt are selected through a public drawing in Austin each October.

Sgt. Kemp reported that the traffic safety problem is more acute now than at any time in the past. The Department of Public Safety's annual Operation Deathwatch during the 1958 Christmas and New Year's holidays counted 63 killed in Texas.

The safety official stated that the Legislature is to consider Governor Price Daniel's official program for Traffic Safety in Texas:

1. Greater public realization of the danger existing on Texas highways and maximum public cooperation in safe driving and observance of traffic laws.
2. More rigid enforcement and more certainty of punishment under present traffic laws, especially those relating to speeding and driving while intoxicated.
3. Universal driver education in Texas public schools, supported by state aid.
4. A law permitting police to use medically-accepted chemical tests in drunk-driving cases.
5. Adoption of the Uniform Driver License Law.
6. A system of fair, respected traffic courts, with jurisdiction and authority to apply the law effectively.
7. Twice as many State Highway Patrolmen to meet minimum accepted police standards for Texas highway mileage and vehicle miles traveled.
