Mrs. Ben Meckel, Pioneer Ranchwoman, Buried Here Thursday After Long Illness

Funeral services for Mrs. Ben F. Meckel were held in First Methodist Church Thursday at 3:30 p.m. with the Rev. W. L. Brown, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Doyle Morton, pastor of First Methodist Church. Burial was in Sonora Cemetery under direction of Ratliff-Kerbow Funeral Home.

Born February 22, 1887, in Burnett County, Myrtle Davis was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Davis. The family came to Sonora in 1890 and her father served as sheriff of Sutton County for ten years. She was married to Ben F. Meckel, in Sonora, July 19, 1909. She was a member of the Baptist Church, where she served as pianist for a number of years.

Mrs. Meckel died in Hudspeth Memorial Hospital early Wednesday, February 4, after an extended illness.

Survivors include her husband; one son, Lavelle Meckel of Eldorado; two daughters, Mrs. Jimmy West of Eldorado and Mrs. Bill Tittle of Sonora; two sisters, Mrs. Holly McGonigal of Dallas and Mrs. Mora C. Clark of Fort Worth; one brother, Ruby Davis of El Paso; eight grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren.

Five Sonora Boys To Take Part In Calf Scramble

Five Sonora boys will be among the 280 Texas FFA and 4-H Club boys who will scramble for calves during the World Championship Rodeo at San Antonio February 13 through 22.

Starting Friday evening, February 13, 20 boys at each rodeo performance will race for 10 calves and the lucky ones will struggle to win their livestock the hard but hilarious way.

According to the rules, the boys will carry a halter attached to a ten-foot rope and it will be their job to place the halter on a calf and drag it—vice versa—across the finish line without help of any kind. They can't use their ropes as lariats.

Prizes are purchase certificates for livestock ranging from the top reward of \$40 down to the sixth through tenth prizes of \$10.

1959 License Plates On Sale Here

New license plates for 1959 will go on sale in the Sutton County courthouse Monday, February 2. The plates will be the reverse of 1958's and will have black letters and numerals on a white background.

Numbers assigned to Sutton County for passenger vehicles will be from JL3025 to JL4274; those for farm trucks 5N5800 to 5N6049; those for commercial vehicles 2H975 to 2H1349.

Representing the city and company at this milestone were Alfred Schwiening, Mayor of Sonora, company representatives R. R. McCullough and Wayne King, and Byerl Dillard, local plantman who made the installation.

Mrs. Newton will receive a free long distance call to any point in the United States.

The Soil Conservation Service core drill party returned to Sonora this week to start core drilling on proposed structures on Dry Devil's River. Construction on Dry Devil's River was not originally planned for the first half of 1959. Sonora officials have now been offered an additional \$600,000 or more in construction funds, provided that easements on Dry Devil's River can be obtained within the next 30 days. The \$600,000 would build about 5 of the 8 dams planned on the 130,000 acre Dry Devil's River, and would give Sonora flood protection much sooner than was originally hoped for.

Plans are now in progress to obtain the few remaining easements, and it is hoped that all can be obtained in time to receive the additional funds.

Awarded Contract For Road Work

A contract for 2.2 miles of construction on U. S. Highway 277 in Sutton County has been awarded to a San Angelo firm, it was announced in Austin this week by Marshall Formby, Chairman of the State Highway Commission.

Strain Brothers, Inc. submitted the low bid of \$409,512.99 on the project. Formby stated that construction of grading structures, flexible base and rock asphalt pavement, located on sections between Sonora and the Edwards County Line is expected to take 230 working days.

"The awarding of the contract to this firm is subject to the concurrence of the Bureau of Public Roads. Robert A. McCulloch, Resident Engineer at Sonora will be in active charge of the project while under construction," Formby said.

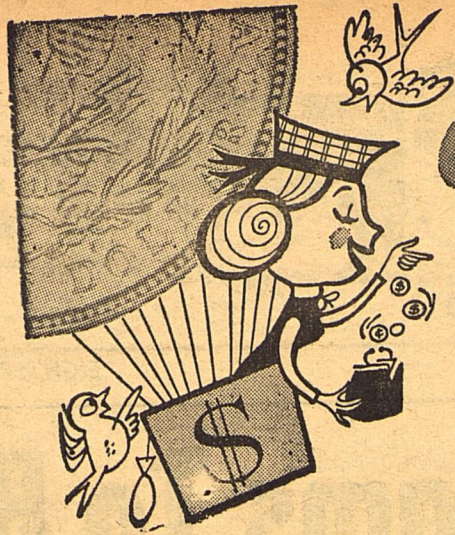

Sutton County Leads West Texas In Bond Sales

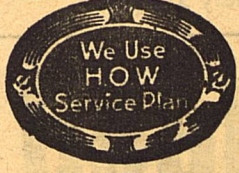

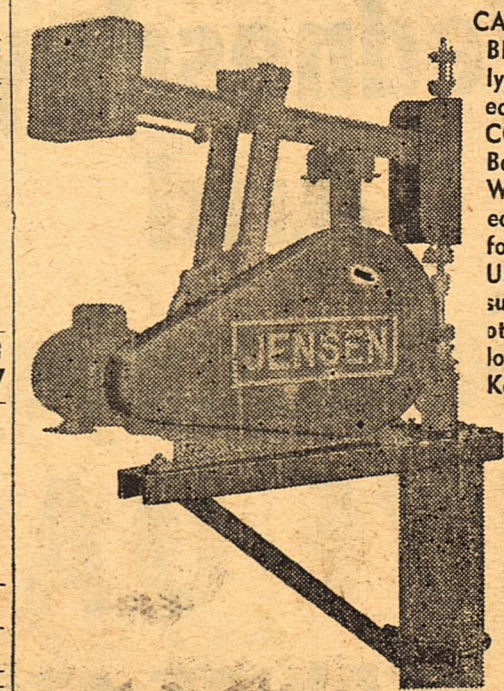
YOUR MINISTER SAYS

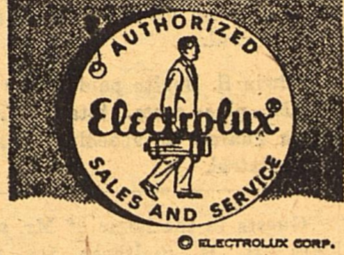

**TAX FACTS #1
Selecting The Proper Tax Form**

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

IF you are one of the millions of American taxpayers who spends the lion's share of his income feeding, clothing, housing and entertaining his family, chances are there is very little you can do to reduce your 1958 federal income tax bill - but you owe it to yourself to try.

First of all, decide which of the two individual tax forms you are going to use to report your income. If you choose the wrong one, you may automatically cut yourself off from a possible tax savings.

The easiest way to file is to use the simple 1040-A Form. It's about the size of a check, on which you answer a few simple questions and have the choice of either computing your own tax or letting the Government do it for you.

You are permitted to use the card form if your gross income consisted only of wages, dividends or interest totaling less than \$10,000, and if you did not have more than \$200 of gross income apart from that listed on your W-2 withholding slips.

Facts to Consider
Before deciding to use the card Form 1040-A, you should consider these facts:

1. Your tax will be figured from a table which allows you a deduction of about 10 per cent of your income instead of itemized deductions for contributions, taxes, interest paid, medical and dental expenses, etc.

2. There is no provision in this form for filing as the "head of household" as a "surviving spouse" or for claiming special credits for dividends and retirement income.

If you are sure that these two points would not cost you any tax savings, and your income is within the limits for filing a Form 1040-A, you might as well use this simple card form.

Whether to Itemize
When you elect to use the regular Form 1040, you still must

decide whether to itemize deductions or take the standard deduction which usually amounts to about 10 per cent of your income or \$1,000, whichever is less. Generally, you will save by itemizing deductions if you:

- (1) Own real estate
- (2) Had unusual medical expenses
- (3) Had deductible child-care expense
- (4) Suffered losses from fire, storm, accident or theft
- (5) Made fairly large charitable contributions

If you are supporting a dependent, although you are unmarried, you may be able to qualify as a "head of household" and figure your tax on a special table that gives you part of the advantage enjoyed by married couples filing joint returns.

You may qualify for a "head of household" status if you provide more than half the support of a parent, and more than half the cost of maintaining the parent's household even if the parent does not live with you. You cannot claim a "head of household" status if you file a Form 1040-A.

The 1040 Form is arranged again this year so that a taxpayer whose income was entirely from wages needs to use only the first one or two pages. Pages three and four are for other types of income and for computing the special credits for dividends and retirement income.

The instructions which come with your tax forms give further information on how to select the correct tax form. Help is also available from the Internal Revenue Service.

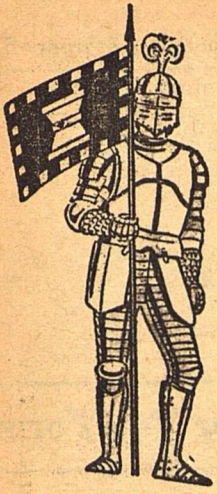
