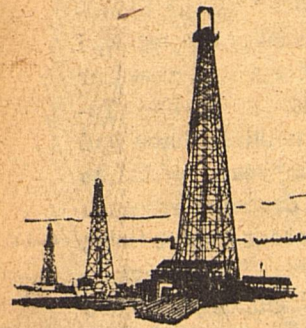

Randall Briscoe has had a colorful and productive Masonic career during his 25 years as a Mason. He has served as head of practically all of the Masonic bodies in both the York and Scottish Rite Orders of Masonry. He served 10 years as a member of the Grand Lodge Committee on Work. He received the coveted 33rd Degree in Masonry, which is an honorary degree conferred for outstanding Masonic accomplishment, on December 14, 1957.

Two Records Fall At Relays Ozona Takes Championship

Junction's Annual Easter Pageant Set For Saturday Night, March 28, At 10:00

Junction, Texas, March 22, 1959—Travelers passing through Junction by any route cannot but see the Everburning Cross that is placed on the top of Lovers Leap Mountain on the east bank of the South Llano River southeast of town.

In a picturesque natural amphitheatre that nestles in the rugged, rockstrewn hillside below the Everburning Cross, on the evening of Easter Sunday 2 hours before midnight on Saturday, March 28, 1959—more than one hundred men, women and children in costume will re-enact the story of Jesus Christ's last days on earth.

The presentation is in pantomime, supported by music and the voices of readers over broad-

casting system. A dozen stages have been arranged amidst the boulders of the hillside. Change of scene is effected by changing of lighting by flood and spot lights from one state to another. Generous parking area is provided at the foot of the hill that the spectators may view from the comfort of their cars.

Cost of this production has been provided by generous contributions. There is no admission fee. Parking and programs are free. Free coffee will be served after four p.m. throughout the evening around an old-time chuck wagon. The production is so timed that the final—the Scene of the Ascension—takes place shortly after midnight on Easter morning.

Dawson will discuss weather forecasting with special emphasis on predictions of storms and violent weather.

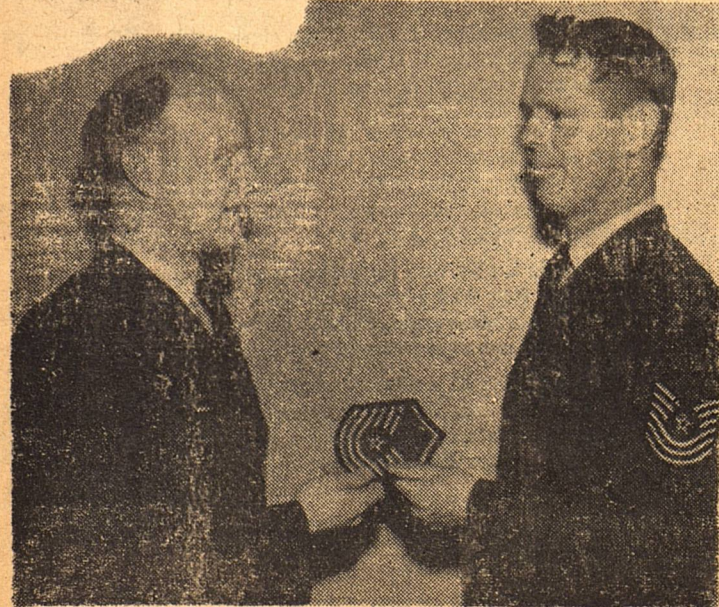
The club extends a special invitation to all men interested in weather forecasting to attend the meeting which will begin at 2:30.

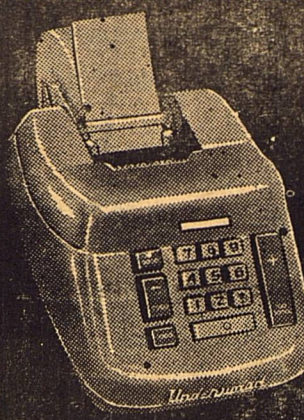
INFLATION: For the recent barbecue for the Speech Meet we needed Spanish kids. Several offered to buy one so we persuad-
