

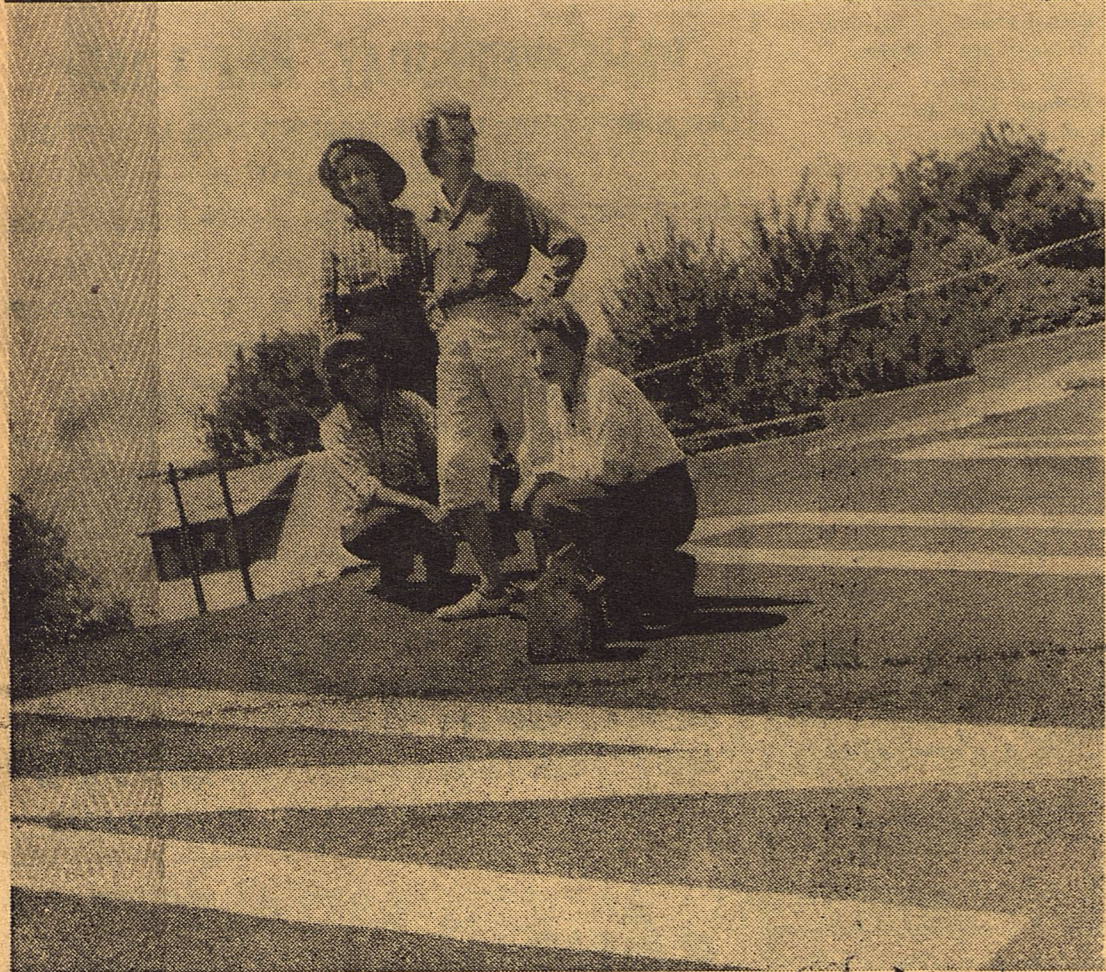

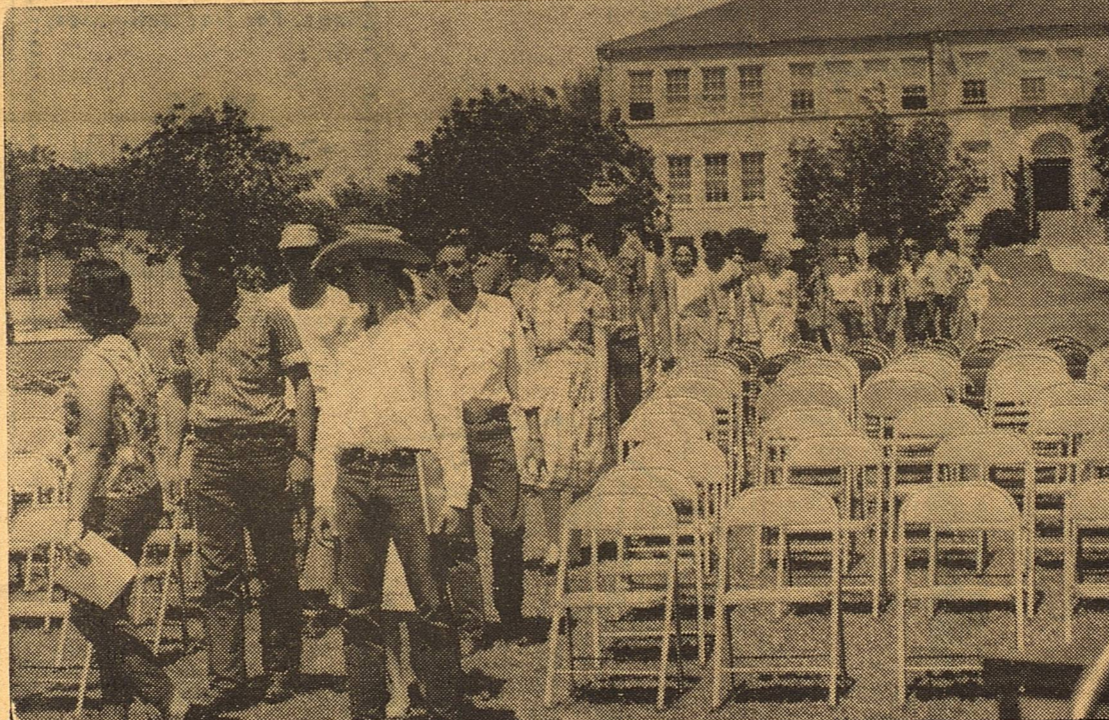

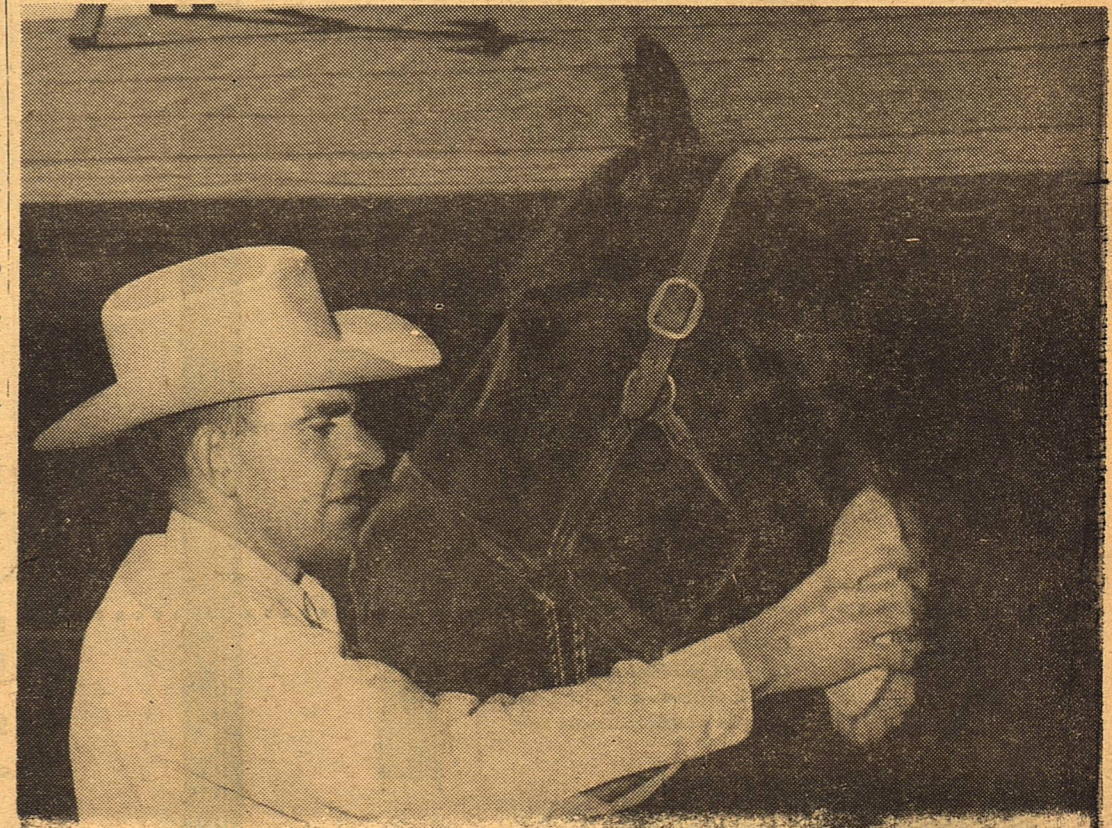
The reason for re-routing the road is that dam site 11 will block off the old section of the road.

Human problems of traffic control are the most difficult to solve because there are no technical answers. However, the Slow Down and Live Campaign is an attempt to make motorists more conscious of the inherent dangers of speed, especially excessive speed.

Of course signs and slogans alone won't do the job, but they do help create a climate of safety-awareness that is vital to any accident prevention program.

Science Classes Get Equipment From State

September 25, 1958—The science department of Sonora High School has received a grant from the State Division of Defense and Disaster Relief for training and educational purposes. Chemistry students will maintain and use the instruments furnished under the grant.

Included in the kit of radiological and detection devices instruments are the following items; Two radiological survey meters, Geiger Counters; Two additional radiological survey meters; Four self-reading radiological dosimeters; One radiological dosimeter charger; Two Comparison standard sources for food and water; One manual of instructions on instrument usage.

The grant is made subject to the following conditions: That these instruments will be used with appropriate emphases given to stimulating interest in civil defense and disaster relief, to insuring students throughout the country have adequate apparatus to enable them to learn the fundamentals of atomic energy and radiological defense, and to developing and maintaining a core of personnel who can be trained as radiological defense monitors.

That the instruments will be maintained in proper operating condition, including calibration, during the useful life of the instruments. And that the State Coordinator of Defense and Disaster Relief reserves the right to reclaim, at his discretion, any and all of such instruments during an emergency or disaster.

Fifth Sonora Relays Sees Two Records Broken March 21

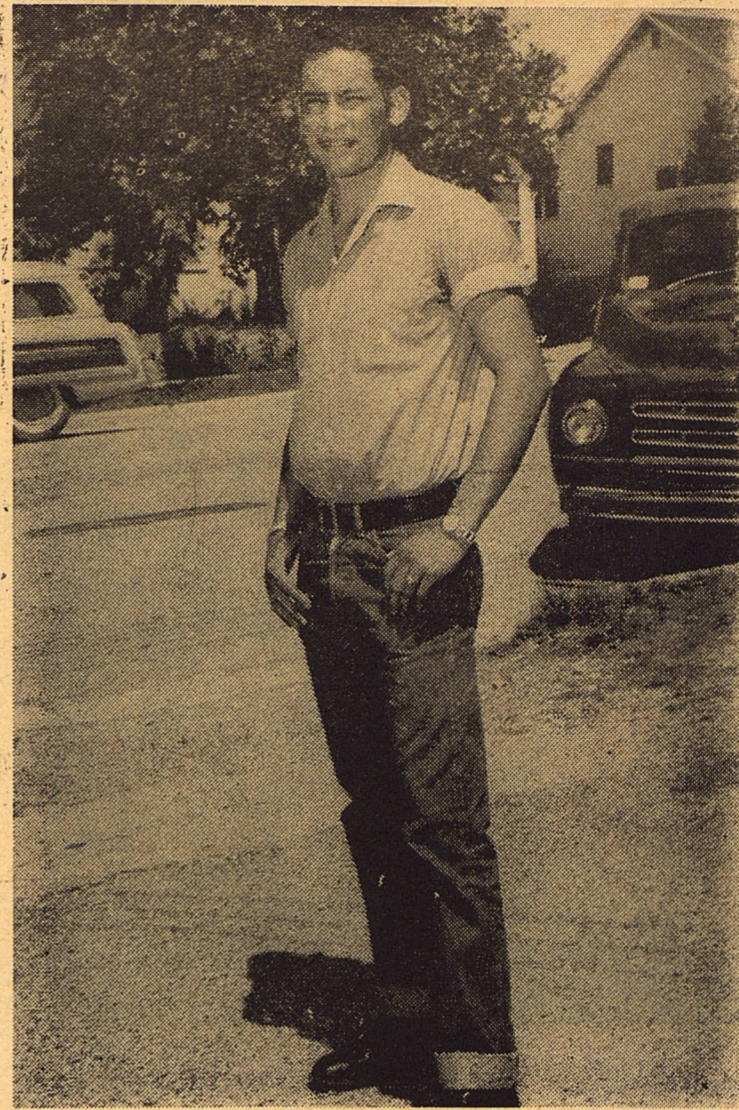
March 21, 1959.—The Fifth Annual Sonora Relays, one of the state's top "A" and "B" track meets, was held Saturday, March 21.

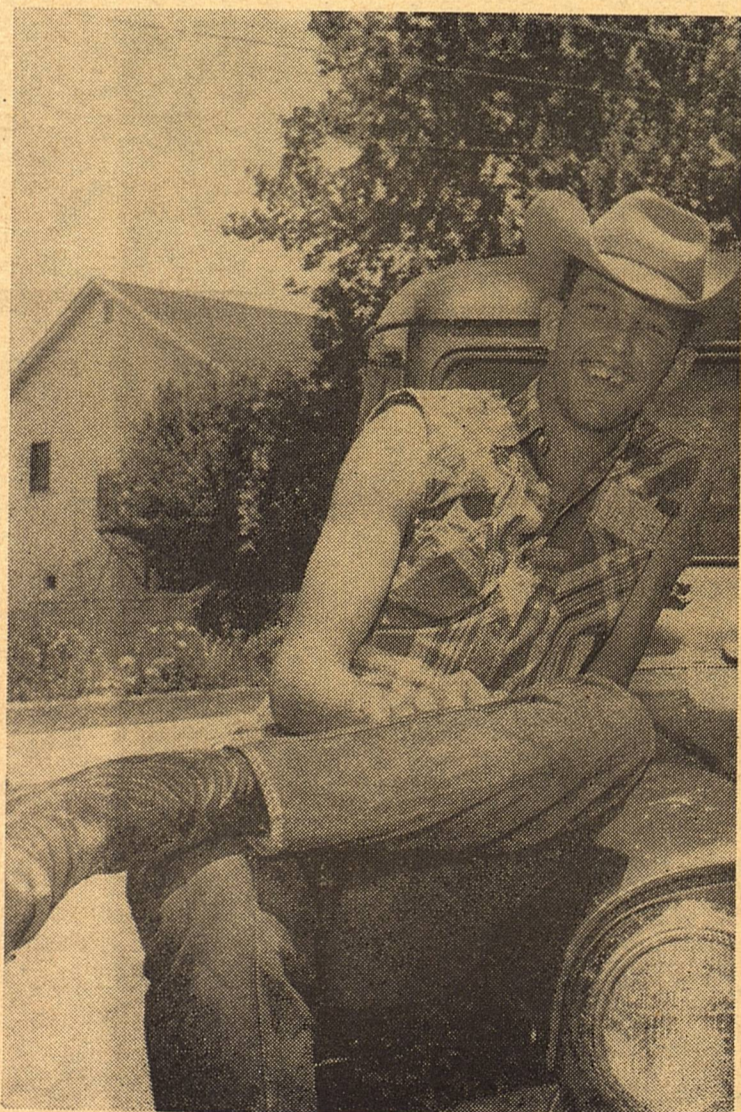

Lady Mary Wortley Montagu, the wife of a British ambassador, introduced the idea of inoculation against smallpox into England from Turkey in the 17th century.

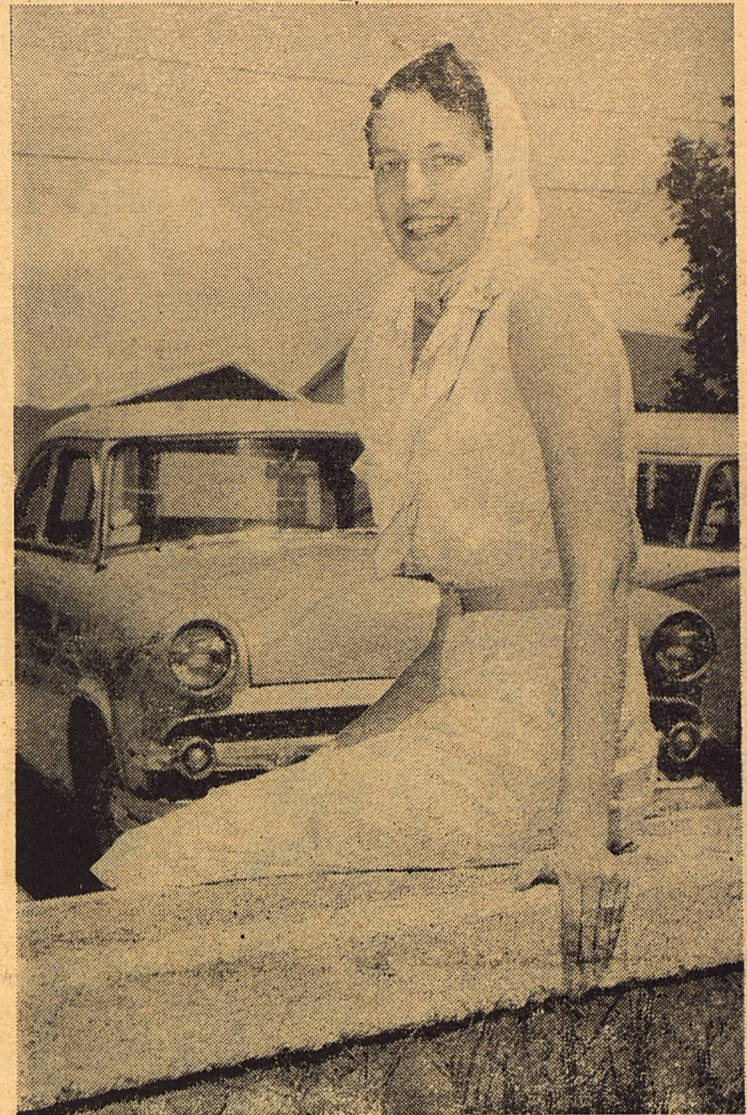
By frequently moving the areas in which cattle can procure salt, modern ranchers persuade their herds to graze where the grass is lushest, thus assuring proper feeding.
