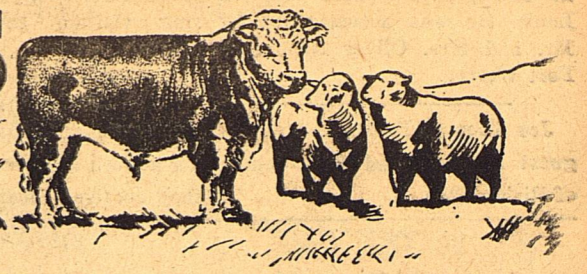

Sutton Sheepmen To Get \$754,953.76 Incentive

70.3% Payment Rate On '58 Wool Clip Announced Wednesday By USDA

With rains measuring up to 5.40 inches, a wool incentive payment of 70.3 percent, and the payment rate on unshorn lambs set at \$1.02 per hundred-weight, 1959 takes on a new look of prosperity for Sutton County ranchmen.

The announcement of payment rates was received Wednesday by the local ASC office which will begin mailing checks to ranchmen in the total amount of \$754,953.76 after July 1.

County payments on wool will total \$718,466.19. This figure is based on the 70.3 percent payment of 1958's wool clip sales of \$1,056,667.27 less the one cent per pound for product promotion.

Payments on unshorn lambs will amount to \$36,487.57, based on the \$1.02 per cwt payment on 3,765,487 pounds of lambs sold by county ranchmen in 1958, less five percent for product promotion or \$1,920.40.

No payment will be made on mohair this year.

Mrs. Marie K. Ellis, local ASC office manager, stated that checks will be mailed to ranchers after July 1 in accordance with instructions from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The local team was also first over-all team and First Best All-Round Club.

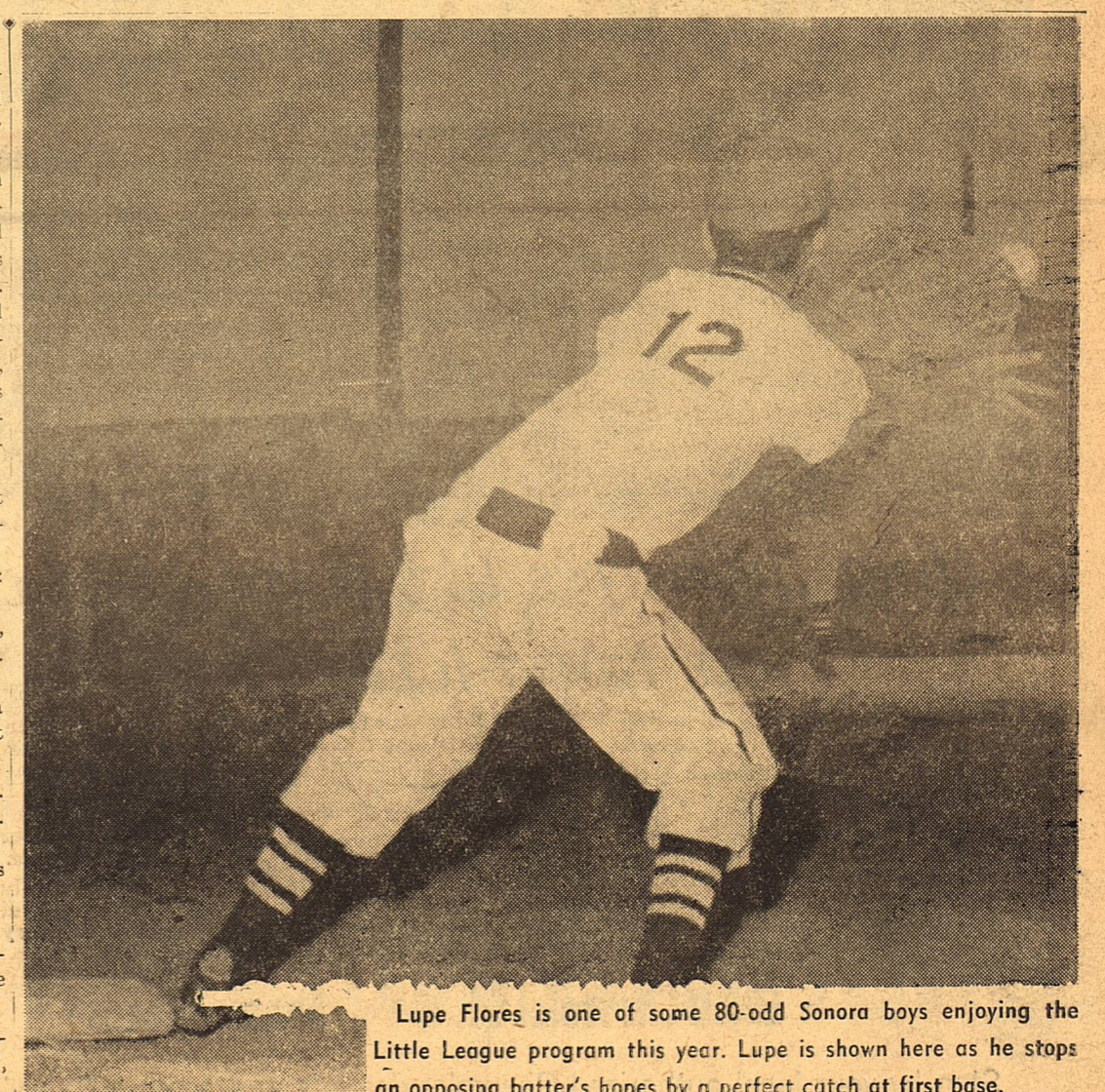
