



Lions Take 44-6 Win **Over Broncos Friday**

The game started off great for the Broncos, Ben Castillo took the ready to qualify for much more opening kickoff and raced 95 than a normal share of available vards for a touchdown. Everything would have been great but the Ozona Lions rallied and maneuvered three touchdowns before the first quarter was over and then went for another one in the second quarter, making the halftime score 26-6.

The Lions scored twice in the third quarter and once in the final quarter and left the game with a victorious 44-6 win over the Broncos.

Detailed engineering plans on flood prevention structures No. 5 and No. 6, located on the ranch owned by Mrs. Pearl Martin, were received this week by Judge J. W. Elliott. As soon as the bid specifications can be prepared by County Clerk F. L. McKinney and staff, prospective bidders will be notified. The bids will be opened in approximately 30 days.

Bids for construction of a dam at Site 7 on the Ben F. Meckel ranch, and at Site 8 on the G. H. Davis-E. M. deBerry ranches, will be opened November 4.

The contract for construction of a large dam on the Homer Byrd ranch and a small dam on the Ben Mittel ranch is expected to be awarded early in December.

Construction of these six dams on Dry Devil's River were made possible when all easements were obtained before June 30, 1959, and the Soil Conservation Service allocated an additional \$600,000 to the project. Completion of the six structures is therefore expected to be about two to four years ahead of the original sche-

The remaining two of eight structures planned on Dry Devil's River are expected to be contracted in May, 1960. These two conranch in Schleicher County and on the Ben Mittel ranch.

During the recent 5 to 7 inch rain at Ozona, Site 7 on Gurley Draw was credited with preventing considerable flood damage in south Ozona. The structure caught about 650 acre feet of floodwater, allowing it to drain slowly through the automatic drawdown tube.

Following a week of wet weather, construction work on flood prevention dams on Lowrey Draw was resumed. Ford Allen will practically complete Site 12 on the W. A. Miers ranch within 10 days of good weather, and will then resume operations on Site 13 near the hospital. Reg. McQuatters, superintendent for Cage Bros., should be nearing completion of Site 10 on the Ada Wynn ranch in 30 days, and Site 9 on the James and Nancy Hunt ranch is complete except for fenc-

The deep core trench on Site 11 on the W. A. Miers ranch has filled twice with runoff water in recent weeks and had to be pumped out and cleaned. Core filling operations should be resumed within the next day or so.

The original application for flood prevention work on Dry Devil's River and Lowrey Draw both Dry Devil's River and Lowrey Draw. After Frost Watch For Prussic Acid

Johnsongrass or sorghum after a frost is sometimes extremely County Judge, Sutton County, high in prussic acid content and is very dangerous to livestock, warns Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian.

Certain chemical changes sometimes occur in the plant and it develops a content of prussic acid, or hydrocyanic acid when wilted by frost or drouth, he explains. The poison acts quickly and can kill an animal within a short time after the damaged plant is eaten.

An appearance of nervousness, difficult breathing and difficulty in standing are symptoms of the poisoning. Whether a poisoned animal can be saved depends upon how quickly a veterinarian can get to it. Treatment involves injecting antidotes directly into the blood stream.

Young plants will develop more prussic acid after frost or drouth than those approaching maturity, points out the veterinarian. Their leaves will contain from 3 to 25 times more acid than leaves of plants in the boot stage. Also, upper, younger leaves will contain more acid than lower leaves.

Dr. Patterson cautions against grazing frosted Johnsongrass or sorghum before it is completely dry. If Johnsongrass or sorghum is ready to cut for hay before a frost, it may be cut the first day after the frost, if care is taken to see that it is completely cured before baling.

It may also be used for silage, he added. Generally, enough prussic acid is lost in gaseous from during the ensiling process and as the silage is removed and fed to make it safe for livestock. However, animals shouldn't be allowed to self-feed from a silo filled with frosted sudan or sorghum. If the silage is questionable it should be chemically tested by a local veterinarian or by letting one or two inferior animals eat it.



Site 11, on the W. A. Miers ranch 3 miles north of Sonora, showing the excavated core trench. This trench, dug 20 feet deep to insure a solid foundation for the dam and to reduce seepage, has filled twice from runoff water during the past 10 days. Three pumps can be seen draining the trench when the photo was taken. Site 11 will control floodwater from 17 sections of rangeland, and will detain 5,189 acre feet at emergency spillway level. The dam will be 47 feet high and contain 347,680 cubic yards of earth and rock fill. A 250 foot rock spillway can be seen in the background, and a 150 foot spillway will be constructed on the south end of the dam. Contract cost is \$226,200 and R. L. McQuatters is building the structure for Cage Bros.



Site 12, on the W. A. Miers ranch near the Texas New Mexico Pipeline Station, lacks approximately 10 feet of its 35 foot height. Controlling floodwater from 4.38 square miles, this dam will hold 1,157 acre feet at emergency spillway level. Both sides of the structure will be blanketed with rock from the 150 foot rock spillway. Ford Allen is building this dam, and the contract cost is \$73,664. It is expected to be completed in approximately two



Site 13, on land owned by Bryan Hunt and George H. Neill, is shown holding some water at this early stage of construction. Note hospital in background. Ford Allen is the contractor, and contract cost is \$45,206. Construction will be resumed in about two weeks, and the dam should be completed rapidly. Though Side 13 is on a small watershed (700 acres) a 10 to 20 inch rain could cause heavy damage to homes below. In addition, the construction of this dam helped get sufficient flood control to eliminate the necessity of widening Lowrey Draw through Sonora, which would have been much more expensive.


