Bids for the construction of flood prevention structures at Sites 7 and 8 on Dry Devil's River were opened Wednesday morning by Judge J. W. Elliott. Jess Radle and Son Construction Company of Waco, Texas was the apparent low bidder with a bid of \$161,428.95 for the two sites.

Site 7, located on the Ben F. Meckel ranch, drains 7,117 acres of rangeland. The dam will be 36 feet high, and contain approximately 200,000 cubic yards of earth and rock embankment. Rock from the 200 foot emergency spillway is expected to blanket both sides of the dam.

Site 8 on the G. H. Davis ranch drains 5,070 acres of land. The dam will be 38 feet high and will contain some 190,000 cubic yards of earth and rock fill. The dam will have a 100 foot rock emergency spillway on the north end and a 50 foot spillway on the south end.

Six bids were submitted for the contract on Sites 7 and 8, ranging from the low bid of \$161,428.95 to a high bid of \$220,493.50. The Soil Conservation Service engineer's estimate was \$184,740.16.

Sites 7 and 8 represent the first work on the 100,000 acre Dry Devil's River, and contracts to build four more structures will be awarded before January 1. Bids on sites 5 and 6, located on the ranch owned by Mrs. Pearl Martin, will be opened on November 24. Bids on Site 4 on the Ben Mittel ranch, and Site 2 on the Homer Byrd ranch will be opened in December.

At their regular Tuesday luncheon meeting at the Methodist Church this week, members of the Sonora Lions Club were shown a film on Texas.

Four persons were killed and five others injured Sunday afternoon in a grinding head-on crash of two automobiles on Highway 277 in the south edge of Sonora. The crash occurred about 3:15 p.m. when the 1955 Oldsmobile driven by Jerry R. Case, 20, of Anson was in collision with a 1951 Buick driven by Jesus Martinez, 35, of Sonora.

Martinez, his eight-year-old daughter Yolanda, and Case died of injuries Sunday afternoon. A fourth person, Gene Roy Green, 16, of Anson, a passenger in the Oldsmobile, died Tuesday morning at Hudspeth Memorial Hospital.

Injured were Martinez's wife, Elidia, 26, who received severe head and internal injuries, and their two daughters Marina, 12, and Lydia, 7; Wendell Lee Case, 23, brother of the driver, and Jesse Barton Green, 21, both passengers in the Case car.

Mrs. Martinez was taken by ambulance to San Angelo Sunday where she is hospitalized for treatment.

Brucellosis Petition Signatures Pass Two-Thirds Requisite Number

Seventy-six of the required 113 signatures of a petition designed to assure Sutton County's being designated as Brucellosis free have been obtained at press time this week.

Petitions are located at the First National Bank, the Sonora Wool and Mohair Co., and the office of the Chamber of Commerce. All ranchmen contacted have been eager to sign the petition, according to H. V. (Buzzie) Stokes who, with the Agricul-

tural Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, has been contacting county ranchmen.

Ranchmen are particularly anxious to obtain the required 113 signatures so that Sutton County may be included in an area of five or six counties which will receive necessary help from the Livestock Sanitary Commission at an early date. Menard and Schleicher Counties have already presented their petitions and Crockett and Edwards Counties are in

the process of obtaining signatures.

It is emphasized that the incidence of Brucellosis, a contagious disease of livestock and man, is extremely low in our area and that measures to be taken will serve only to upgrade beef cattle from this region in the eyes of buyers, particularly those in the corn belt which takes a large portion of our stock in the form of stockers and feeders.

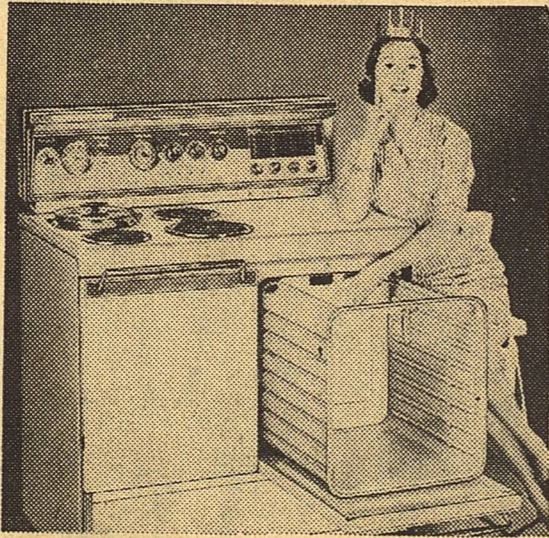

News From Sonora High Library Club

"A Journey to the Centre of the Earth" by Jules Verne is a particularly flawless specimen of his art. When the book appeared in 1864, it was the second novel of Verne's to be published and was inspired by one of his best ideas. At a dinner party, Verne met a scientist who had spent a year exploring the volcanic island of Stromboli, and who had risked a descent into the flaming crater during a lull in its activity. Verne's imagination did not stop there; would it be possible he asked himself, to go even further—to descend, in fact, to the very centre of the earth.

Verne's three heroes descend into the earth from a crater in Iceland. They go down many thousands of miles, and it would be unfair to tell how they come out again. The leading character, Professor Hardwigg, is one of Verne's most memorable creations, who is a determined individual who will let nothing-and nobody-stand in the way of his ambition. In this remarkable book, the contrast in characteris-
