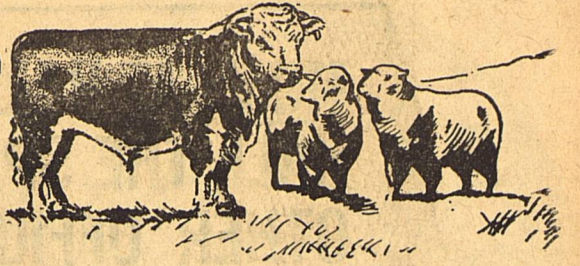

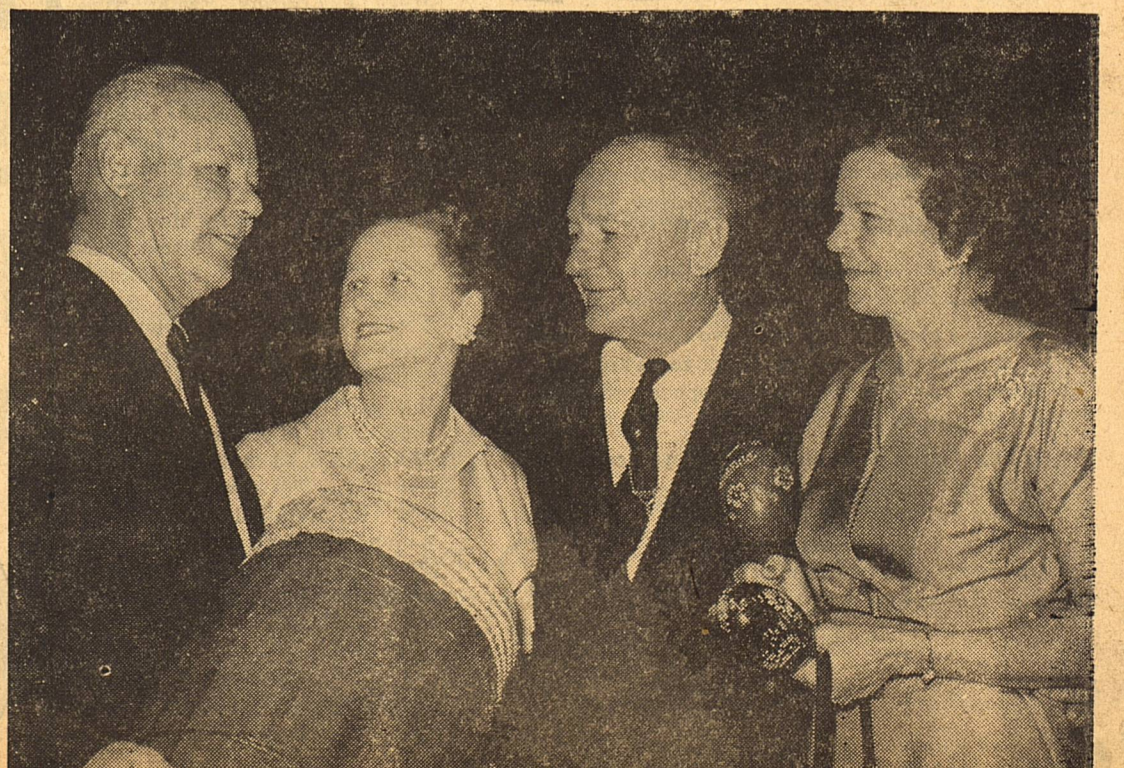

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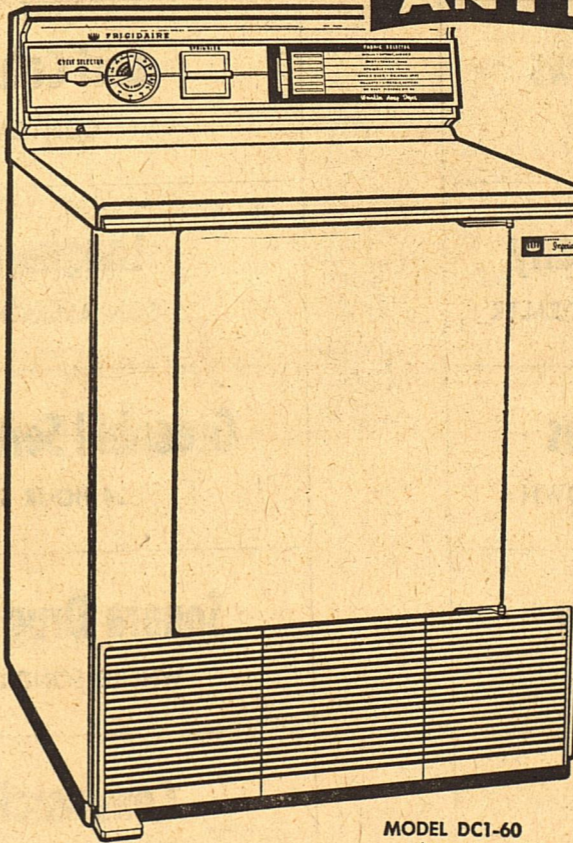

Traffic Deaths In This Area Down In October

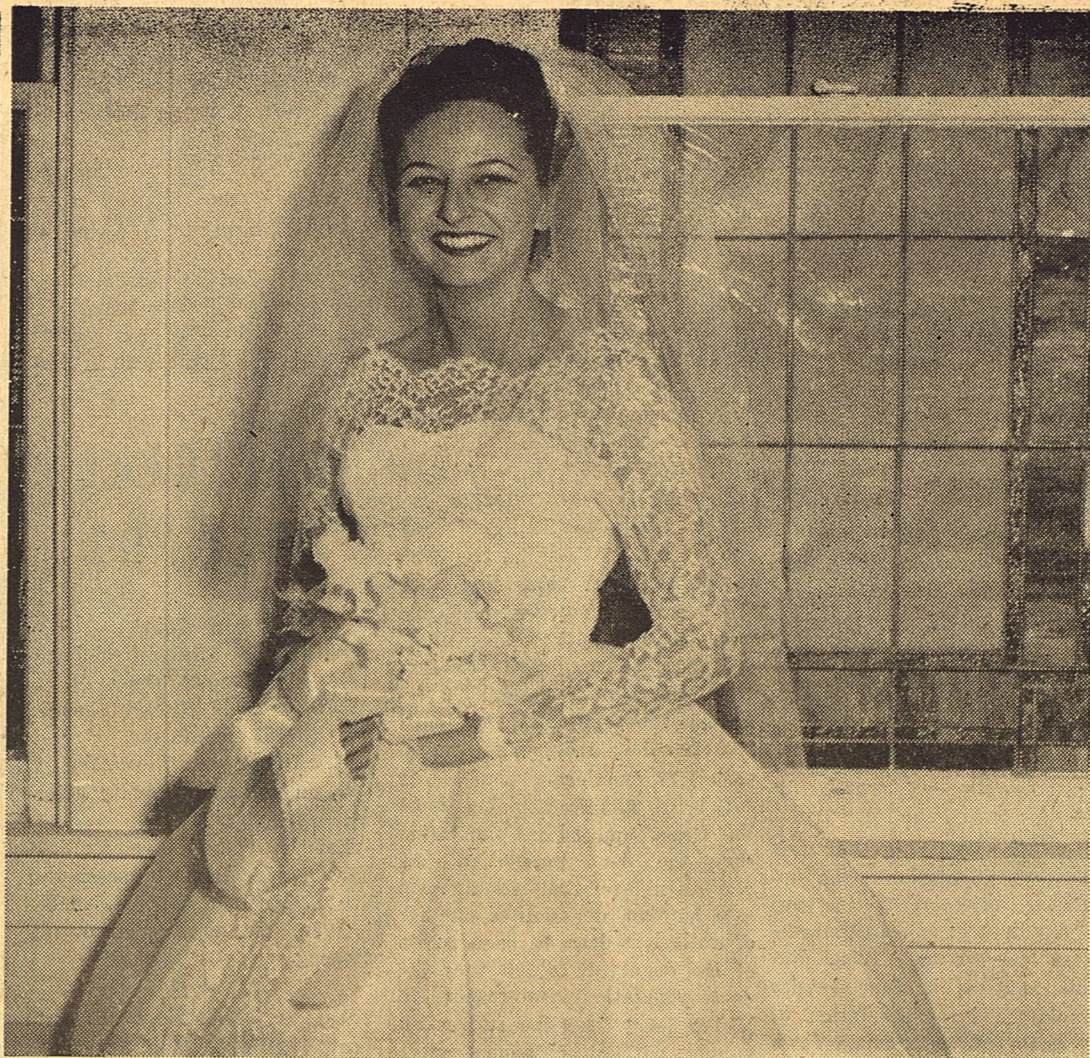
Lt. W. M. Howell of the San Angelo Sub-station of the Texas Highway Patrol has released the October rural traffic accident summary for this area.

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Game Survey Shows Deer Census Highest Here In Five Year Period

The Texas Game and Fish Commission has announced the results of the 1959 deer census conducted in Sutton County in September and October. It was also revealed that an antlerless deer season will be held in Sutton County during the 1959 hunting season.

This is the fifth annual deer census conducted in Sutton County since the Game and Fish Commission was given regulatory over the county's game and fish laws by the 1955 session of the state legislature.

The average population density for Sutton County has increased steadily since counts were started in 1955. This is revealed by examination of average density figures for the past five years: 1955, one deer to each 38.5 acres; 1956, one deer to each 37.7 acres; 1957, one deer to each 34 acres; 1958, one deer to each 21.8 acres; 1959, one deer to each 13.5 acres.

surviving into September and October compared in a ratio to adult does: 1955, one doe to each .39 fawns; 1956, one doe to each .29 fawns; 1957, one doe to each .86 fawns; 1958, one doe to each .93 fawns; 1959, one doe to each 1.069 fawns.

These fawn drop figures reflect the generally good range conditions prevalent since 1957 which resulted in early breeding, good nourishment, and, since fawn drops were early, minor losses to screwworms.

Sutton County has always been noted among hunters for its excellent buck-doe ratio. Census figures reflect this and the 1959 figure is better than any since the census was started: 1955, one male to each 2.44 females; 1956, one male to each 2.84 females; 1957, one male to each 2.50 females; 1958, one male to each 2.79 females; 1959, one male to each 1.77 females.

It is the feeling of biologists of the Game and Fish Commission that the deer population has reached a level that will allow a safe harvest of a limited number of antlerless deer. In some areas of the county it is felt that the deer population has reached a higher level than the range can support without subsequent range depletion and ultimate deer loss due to food shortage and associated factors.

These figures show that this year's deer population is an approximate 65 percent increase over 1955 and an approximate 38 percent increase over 1958.

This increase in deer density is explained by examination of data gathered on annual fawn crops which is defined as fawns

During the fall census numerous cases of "poor" deer were noted and several were taken to Extension Service veterinarians for autopsy. The results of these examinations showed that the deer were dying from heavy infestations of internal and external parasites. As stockmen know, parasitism problems are directly related to stocking rates; i.e., high stocking rates result in heavy parasitism and low stocking rates in low parasitism. All deer have parasites but usually do not suffer adverse effects until population pressures become intense.

Therefore, Game Commission biologists recommended an antlerless deer harvest for most of Sutton County. This recommendation was approved by the Texas Game and Fish Commission in their regularly scheduled quarterly meeting on October 22 in Austin.

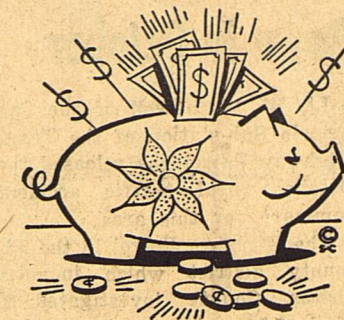
