Field Work Begins Tuesday, November 18 On 1959 Census Of Agriculture Here

Field work in the 1959 Census of Agriculture got underway locally on Wednesday, November 18, when a force of census takers began visiting every ranch in the area.

Agriculture census questionnaires have been mailed to all ranch operators. The census

takers will visit all local ranches to collect the questionnaires and, if necessary, assist the rancher in filling out the report form.

The 1959 Census of Agriculture is the 17th in a series of nationwide farm and ranch canvasses, the first of which was conducted in 1840. The Census of Agriculture is taken at five-year intervals to provide up-to-date statistical information about the nearly five million farms and ranches which supply food and raw materials for manufacture of goods used by the people of the United States, now numbering about 178 million. The current census will yield information on the number and size of farms and ranches, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock production and inventories, selected from facilities and equipment and selected expenditures.

The field director emphasizes that all information about individuals and their operations furnished to the Census Bureau is held in absolute confidence under Federal law. It is used only to provide summary figures such as totals, averages, and percentages. The information on an individual report cannot be furnished to any one other than sworn Census employees and thus cannot be used for investigation, taxation, or regulation.

Bids To Be Opened Tuesday On Dry Devil's Sites 5 & 6

Bids will be opened Tuesday, November 24, at 10:00 A. M., for the construction of flood prevention dams at Sites 5 and 6, Dry Devil's River. These structures, located on the ranch owned by Mrs. Pearl Martin, will control floodwater from 18,454 acres of rangeland.

This drainage area is known as the Meckel Draw it crosses Highway 277 north of Sonora. Before the present highway bridge was constructed, this draw frequently closed the road, resulting in mail delay and disruption of communications with San Angelo.

Site No. 5 will be a large structure, containing some 287,520 cubic yards of earth and rock fill. The dam will be 47 feet high, and will have a 400 foot rock emergency spillway. The principal spillway, or automatic drawdown tube through the dam will be 42 inches inside diameter. Both sides of the dam will be blanketed with rock.

The structure at Site 6 will be 37 feet high, and contain

123,110 cubic yards of fill. The rock emergency spillway will be 150 feet wide, and the automatic drawdown tube will have an inside diameter of 22 inches. The two structures, at emergency spillway level, will detain 6,504 acre feet of floodwater.

Jess Radle and Son of Waco, successful bidder on the construction of Sites 7 and 8, is expected to start operations in about 10 days. Bids for the construction of Sites 2 and 4 are expected to be opened in late December.

ASPC Sets Up New Wool Division To Promote Domestic Wool, Woolens

Lamb and wool produced in the United States will receive an added boost from promotion and advertising next year under a stepped up program by the American Sheep Producers Council.

The council's board of directors, all sheep owners representing every part of the country, authorized the accelerated program in its recent semi-annual meeting in Denver. Purpose of the increase in promotion and advertising effort will be to boost returns to sheep producers on both lamb and wool.

The directors authorized the organization of a wool division in

the ASPC headquarters to promote and advertise domestic wool and American made wool products.

Don Clyde, of Heber City, Utah, president of the ASPC, said the council will cooperate and coordinate its activities in wool advertising and promotion with other wool agencies.

The council's current budget for wool is \$974,000, and this figure may be increased slightly for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

For the lamb phase of the program, the directors called for an allied committee with representatives of all segments of the livestock and meat industry participating to discuss all problems of lamb production and marketing in an effort to bolster live market prices for lamb. President Clyde said there is no doubt that the ASPC has done a good job of increasing consumer demand for lamb in all of the 21 promotion cities in which it operates, but that there are basic problems which need to be solved before greater success can be attained. He pointed out that the retail price of lamb has held high and steady, but this favorable margin has not been reflected to live prices.

The Lamb promotion and advertising budget for the next fiscal year will be increased slightly from its current level of \$1,371,000.

LEE LABENSKES HONORED ON 61st ANNIVERSARY

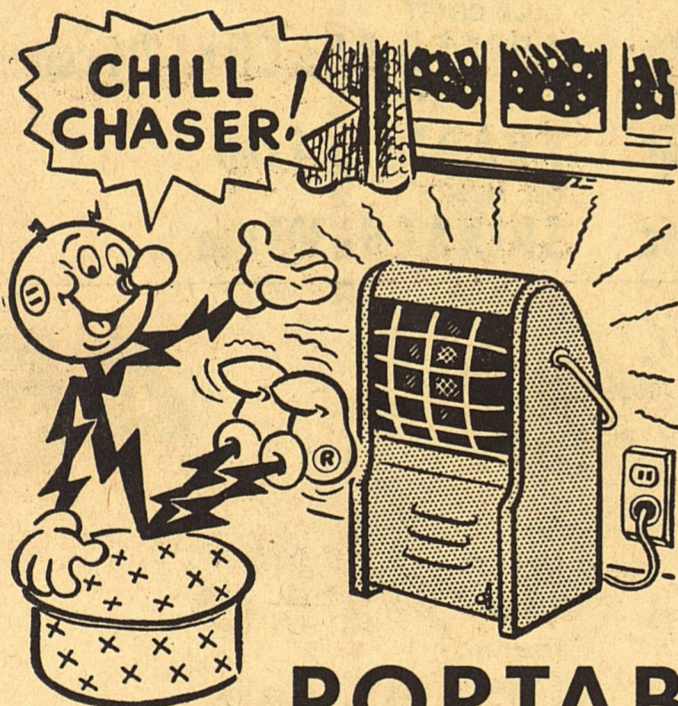
