Devil's River Philosopher Finds New Financial Idea In Castro's Method Of Buying Land, Cattle

Editor's Note: The Devil's River Philosopher on his bitter-weed ranch on Devil's River discusses a big Cuban cattle deal this week.

Dear editar:
While I don't own any cattle in Cuba, a head or two of my livestock have been known to turn up on, while not exactly foreign soil, at least on soil not my own, as my neighbors have been quick to point out, still I have been very interested in what Dictator Fidel Castro has been doing to some American cattle he found over there.

As I understand it, some Americans own a big ranch and about 7,000 head of cattle in Cuba, and Senor Castro, now that he has won his revolution aad discovered keeping it won takes

a lot more money than mountain fighting did, has decided to appropriate the ranch.

Well, maybe appropriate isn't the right word. He's paying for the land and cattle, but not in cash, in bonds, the land to be paid off in the next 20 years, the cattle in the next 5, provided the Castro government survives.

I don't think the Americans who owned the ranch will like this; in the first place they probably weren't interested in selling at this time and in the second place if they had to sell nothing beats cash aad probably a lot of things beat Castro bonds, but Senor Castro's idea has great possibilities for this country.

For example, Senor Castro himself was in Washington not too long ago and he wasn't there for the social season. What Washington ought to do is tell him it has finally decided to make him a loan, but in lieu of cash we're sending over a large stack of Civil War Confederate currency. When that runs out, we'll send over a large stack of Russian bonds we've been holding for 30 or 40 years. If that isn't enough, I'm sure we have a good many old World War I notes put up by a wide assortment of European countries, and he can take his pick. Stuck away in the inactive files, Washington must have enough old notes to keep Castro in television time for years to come, if he can get the stations to accept them. If Washington runs out of old notes, I imagine private banks all over the country, including those around here, could dig up a few. Whose, I won't say.

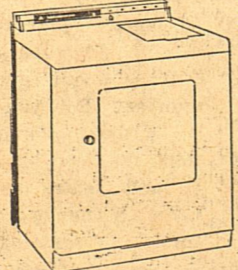

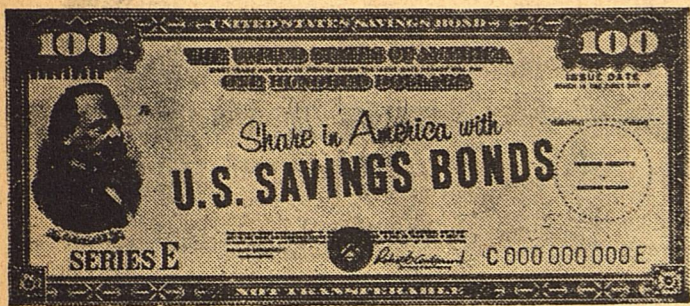

Deer Hunting Affected By 'Cool Weather

A change in weather had a hand in the total kill on opening day of the Texas deer season, according to the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

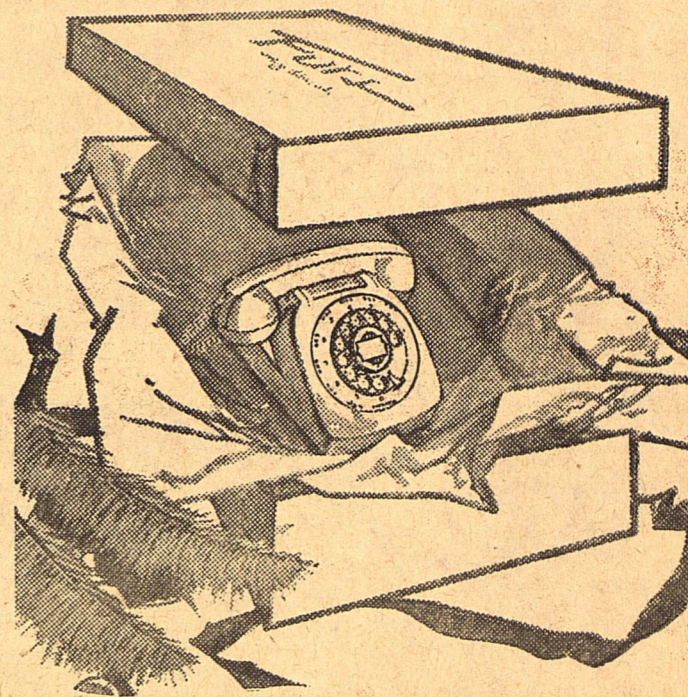
In some areas the big deer did a pretty good job of hiding out. In other areas the kill was reported to be "a slaughter."

The season began with the heaviest potential in years, the secretary said. There was an icy, wet weekend. Then on Monday, the opening day, the sun came out bright for most of the day.

Some hunters, expecting Monday to be bad, didn't go out until too late. The Monday evening another norther blew in and the deer went into the brush again.

Despite the changeable weather, however, many hunters reported good luck. Some were in with their kills before 7 a.m. on the opening day. A few large bucks were hung in the ice house, but for the most part the luck was from the increase in young bucks. A number of doe permits also are being issued to land owners

this year, to kill off surplus does. In Llano county 183 ranchers got permits to remove 7,936 does; Mason county 149 ranchers got 1,664 permits; in Sutton county there were 552 permits still available for land owners this week. In addition, approximately 900 permits will be issued in Edwards county. Bandera ranchers got 105 permits.

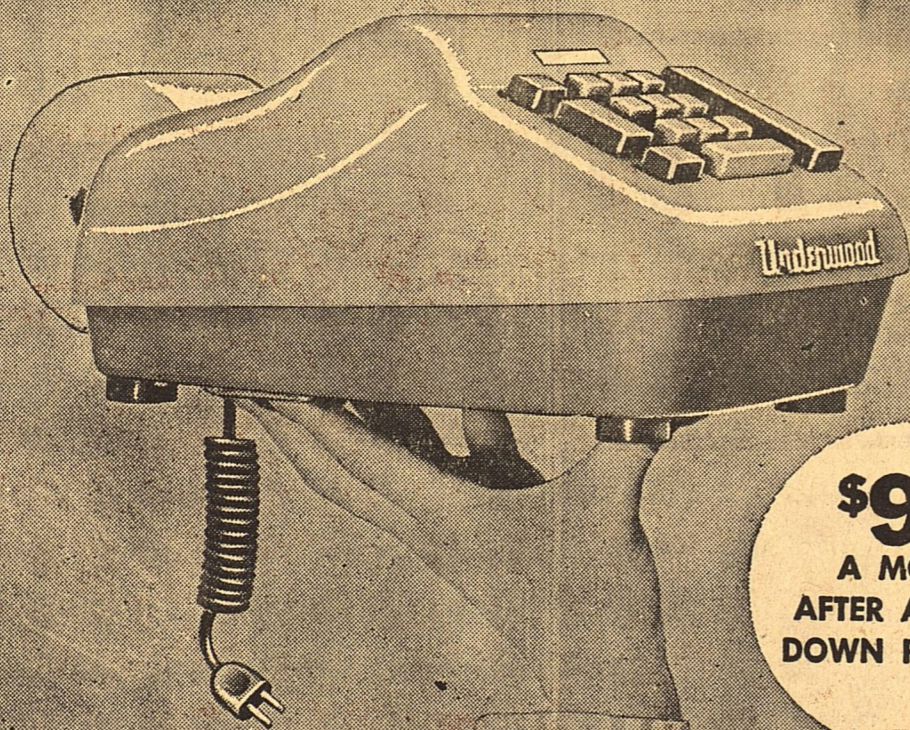

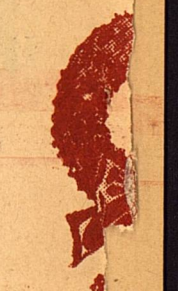

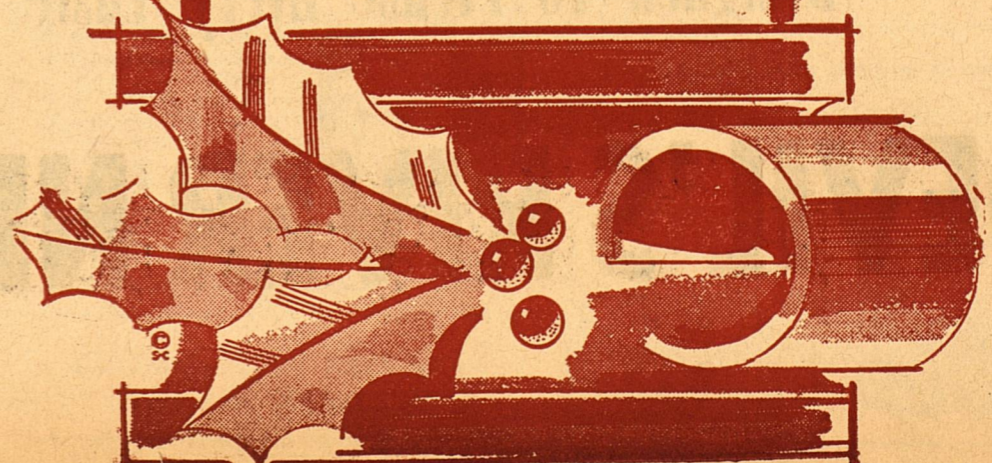

"Gods and Men" is a volume of narrative history and critical examination of the chief ideas that have gone into the making of our western civilization.

This book, subtitled "The Origins of Western Culture", deals with the Biblical and post-Biblical Hebrews, the Greeks of the Classical and Hellenistic periods, the Romans, and the founders and early developers of Christianity.

In the Preface, author Henry Bamford Parkes says: "I am concerned with the living past, not with the past as a whole. I have concentrated on describing those critical creations that still have power to shape our thinking and stir our emotions. Nor do I have any particular theory of historical development to state. I have written this book with certain definite convictions a sense of the importance of intellectual creation is what I hope to convey."

"Gods and Men" constitutes a major contribution to our understanding of the world and ourselves, for it allows us to take a sweeping view of history. The book is illustrated with examples of primitive, Egyptian, Greek Classical, Hellenistic, Roman Imperial, Late Roman and early Christian art.

After a wedding trip to Mexico, Mr. and Mrs. Pina will be at home in Eldorado.

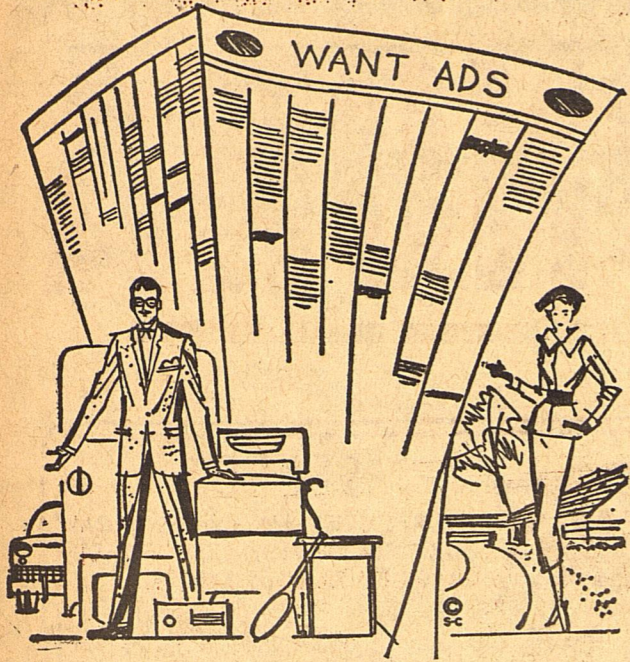



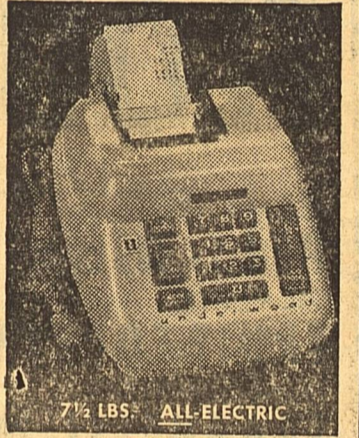

Mesquite Control

Subject New Publication

Mesquite is an aggressive, deep-rooted, undesirable woody, sprouting shrub that occurs on approximately 55 million acres of grazing lands in Texas. Where this pest thrives, no single method or practice will give effective and economical control under widely varying conditions.

Economical control of mesquite on grazing lands depends largely on selection of methods that will provide the greatest sustained benefits for the money expended. Good range and livestock management are essential to obtain maximum benefits from the control. The chief value of controlling mesquite is to increase the density, vigor and production of palatable range forage species.

"Control of Mesquite or Grazing Lands" is the title of a new bulletin released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Some of the factors influencing the effectiveness and cost of controlling individual plants, in thin, open stands by hand or power grubbing, oiling with kerosene and diesel fuel and basal application of 2, 4, 5-T and soil application of monuron are discussed in the bulletin.

Factors that influence the effectiveness and cost of controlling moderate to dense stands by chaining and cabling, use of heavy-duty brush cutters, root plowing and aerial application of 2, 4, 5-T are also discussed in detail.

The benefits of mesquite control include increased carrying capacity of grazing lands, reduced cost of handling livestock and more efficient use of other range improvement practices.

Record for the deer with greatest number of points is still held by George D. Wallace whose 19-point buck with a spread of 22 and one-eighth inches leads the field.

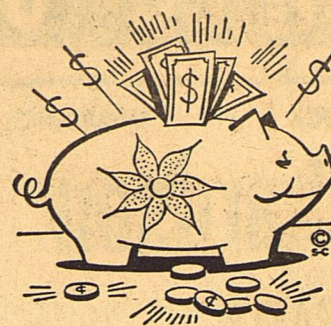

Due Extension

The Texas Highway Commission has taken the first step to inaugurate a new two-year Farm-to-Market Road Program for Texas. Money for this program is derived from the fund established by Senate Bill 287, 51st Legislature.

J. A. Snell, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at San Angelo, has announced that the following FM road in Sutton County is scheduled for work under this program:

From RM Road 864, 6.0 miles Southwest of Schleicher County Line, Southeast a distance of approximately 5.0 miles.

Snell stated that this year the Commission has authorized the development of some area roads which will serve the dual purpose of service to the adjacent land as well as aiding in the development of the entire area of the State.

It was announced that work will begin on this project just as soon as final planning is completed and right of way secured. Resident Engineer R. A. McCulloch of Sonora will be in charge of work in this county.
