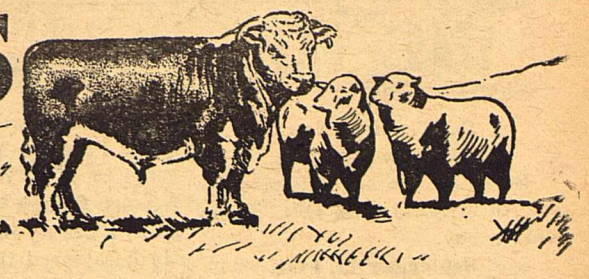

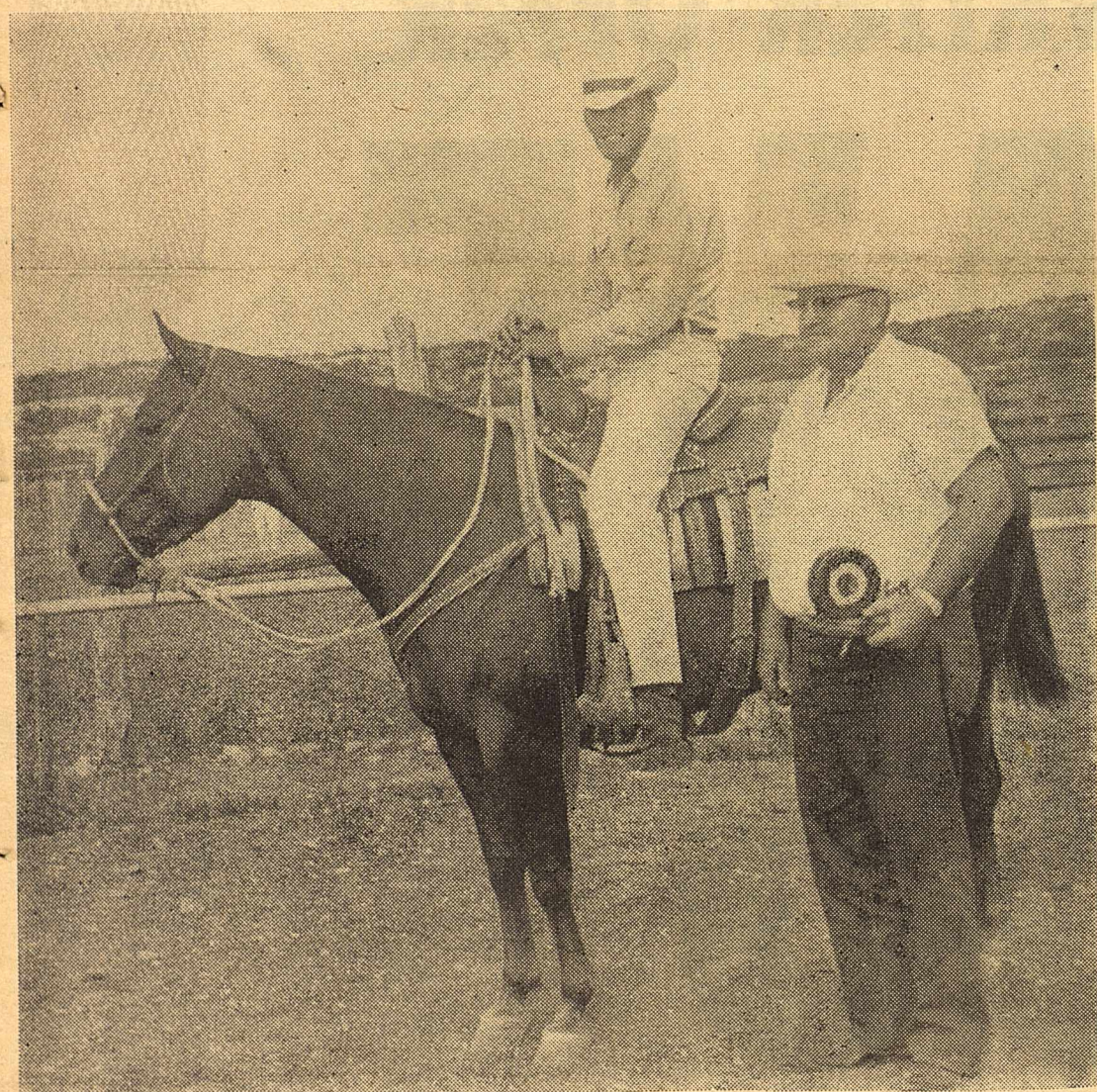

128 Entries In Horse Show Make Annual Event Success



Champion Horse of Show honors in last weekend's Second Annual Sonora Quarterhorse Show went to King's Frances, a mare owned by Jess Koy of Eldorado. The award was based on points at halter and on performance. Mounted in Dennis Funderburg.

A total of 128 entries coming from all parts of the state made the second annual Sonora Quarterhorse Show, sponsored by the Sonora Park and Horse Show Association, a big success.

Champion Horse of Show honors and trophy went to King's Frances, a mare owned by Jess Hankins of Rocksprings. Grand Champion Mare was Katy Taylor owned by Paul Jessee of Lanyon. Poco Stampede, owned by Mrs. G. F. Rhodes of Abilene, was Grand Champion Stallion. Peppy Jiggs, owned by John Dublin of Barnhart took the Grand Champion Gelding award.

Lions Hear Rundown On School Enrollment Reclassification As AA May Be In Offing

Principals of Sonora High, Central Elementary and L. W. Elliott Schools were guest speakers at Tuesday's meeting of the Lions Club at the First Methodist Church.

Doyle Morgan, principal of Sonora High School, reported a total of 210 students registered for the current year, 11 of these being boys. Breaking total enrollment into classes, Morgan cited 42 seniors, 46 juniors, 63 sophomores and 56 freshmen. He fur-

ther stated that the two-year average for the school years 1958-59 and 1959-60 had been 205 which will put the school into Class AA in Interscholastic League events unless there is a large drop-out before the year 1963.

Morgan also reported a total of 22 boys on the varsity football squad and 25 on the "B" team, with 47 high school students in the band. Thirteen teachers comprise the high school faculty with each teacher conducting five classes. Two-thirds of the students who are eligible are now taking advanced science or advanced mathematics, Morgan said. He listed as graduation requirements, three units of English, two of mathematics, two and a half of social studies, two of laboratory sciences, two of safety, health or physical education, and eight and one half of elective subjects.

Frank Rholes, principal of L. W. Elliott School, reported a total enrollment of 315 students with eleven teachers and one part-time teacher, instrumental music teacher J. L. Steed. Rholes described the school as probably the best Latin-American school in the state and credited the eight-week summer program of pre-first grade work with helping break the language barrier. He reported a total of 97 first graders and 55 seventh graders which will probably raise enrollment in Junior High to about 100 next year.

Central Elementary School Principal Ralph J. Finklea reported total enrollment of the school at 302 including 24 kindergarten pupils. Twelve teachers comprise the faculty with Mrs. J. L. Steed, who teaches kindergarten in the mornings, conducting eight sections of music in the afternoons.

Guests present included Sam Coleman of Junction, Judge Hart Johnson and District Attorney Connell Ashley of Fort Stockton, Bud Mason of McCamey and Jerry Johnson of San Angelo. Jack Wade was welcomed as a new member.

Davis To Head Bronco Booster Club Program Of Game Filming Planned

More than 50 men were present Tuesday night, September 6, to organize a Bronco Booster Club designed to promote athletics of all types in the local school.

Members named as their first president, Louis Davis. W. B. McMillan was elected vice-president and E. B. Keng, secretary and treasurer. A board of directors composed of John McClelland, Dr. J. F. Howell, Pat Brown and John Fields was selected by those present. Dues were received from 51 members attending the meeting and additional memberships have been received daily.

Head Football Coach Jerry Hopkins outlined the activities of the organization stating that its purpose should be to promote athletics in the school, to encourage the players and benefit the coaches. He cited as a pitfall of

this type club the possibility of its exerting undue pressure on coaches and on the school administration. "The action of any one member reflects on the whole club as the action of one athlete reflects on the team as a whole," Hopkins said.

All interested males in Sutton County are eligible for membership. Dues were set at an initial \$3.00 fee with monthly dues of from 50 cents to \$1.00 to be determined later. Dues will be payable only during the nine month school term.

The club hopes to be able to finance filming of games. Estimated cost of this program is \$50 per game.

Dues may be paid to any of the club's officers or directors, and membership cards will be furnished.

Broncos Down Angoras 20-0 At Rocksprings Friday Night

The Sonora Broncos topped the Rocksprings Angoras 20 to 0 in the first game of the 1960 football season Friday night on the Angoras' home field. Scoring came in the first, second and fourth periods of play with the Broncos chalking up a total of 285 yards gained on the ground against the larger Angoras.

Late in the first quarter Back Lester Schmidt galloped 39 yards

off tackle for the opening score. The attempt to convert failed. Julio Samaniego scored the second touchdown of the night about midway of the second period by dashing a long 80 yards down the middle of the field. The conversion try was no good.

Final score came on a push by Bobby Sosa from the two yard-line in the fourth quarter. Johnny Fields ran the conversion try for the two bonus points.

This was the Broncos first game working under the new Wing-T formation and fans were well pleased with team prospects. Defensive work was particularly good.

Elsewhere in District 8-A Junction fell to Eden 28 to 8; Big Lake took Rankin 34 to 14; Eldorado downed Iraan 43 to 0, and Ozona defeated Class AA McCamey 12 to 0.

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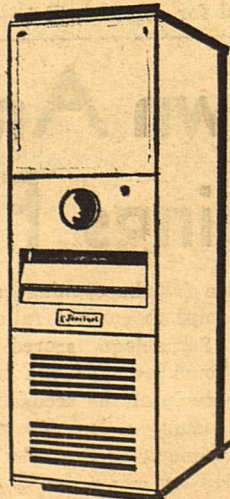

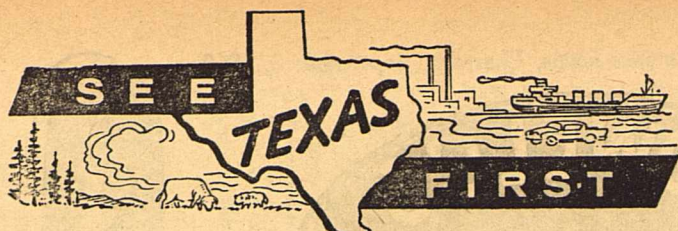

SEPTEMBER 20—State convention of Democratic Party. To announce platform of principles and party nominations for governor and other state officers.

OCTOBER 19-NOVEMBER 4—Absentee voting for general election. Persons may vote absentee at any time not more than 20 days nor less than three days prior to election.

NOVEMBER 3—Deadline for correcting poll tax receipt or certificate showing transfer to new precinct in city of 10,000 population, before general election.

NOVEMBER 8—General election first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

DECEMBER 19—Presidential electors convene in the capitol in Austin and vote for president and vice-president of the United States.
