The Board of Education of the Sonora Independent School District met in its first regular session of the new fiscal year Monday afternoon, September 12. Reports were heard from principals of the schools comprising the district. Principals Doyle Morgan, Ralph Finklea, Frank Rholes and Clyde Greer all reported that the schools were in extremely good condition and expressed their anticipation of a good school year.

Head Coach Jerry Hopkins and Principal Morgan presented to the board a plan for changing the athletic award system for high school. Under the new system, which was approved by the board and which has been adopted almost all over Texas, jackets will be awarded only members of the varsity teams with other team members receiving certificates.

Superintendent Rex W. Lowe announced that a state accreditation team is slated to visit the local schools during the fall to check on standards and other accreditation items.

The board approved donation of \$300.00 toward the purchase of band uniforms. Members of the board present were Frank P. Bond, president, Armer Earwood, secretary and treasurer, R. S. Teaff, Mrs. Alice S. Jones and Harold Friess.

Sonora's Broncos, trailing San Felipe of Del Rio 14 to 6 at the end of the first half of play, came from behind to defeat the Mustangs 24 to 14 at Del Rio last Friday night.

San Felipe's Alfonso Ozuna returned a Bronco punt 66 yards to rack up the Mustangs' first score in the first period of play. In the same quarter, Amadeo Vilela of San Felipe ran 80 yards for a touchdown on a pass interception.

In the second quarter a pass from Lester Schmidt to Herman Moore saw the Broncos' first tally with the conversion attempt failing.

In the second half a San Felipe fumble on the 10 was recovered by Schmidt who scored on a run off tackle from the one. A pass interception by Moore on the 45 was run to the five and set a series of plays which saw Julio Samaniego scoring from the two. Another San Felipe fumble on

the 45 found the final tally for the Broncos when Primo Gonzales carried over from the one.

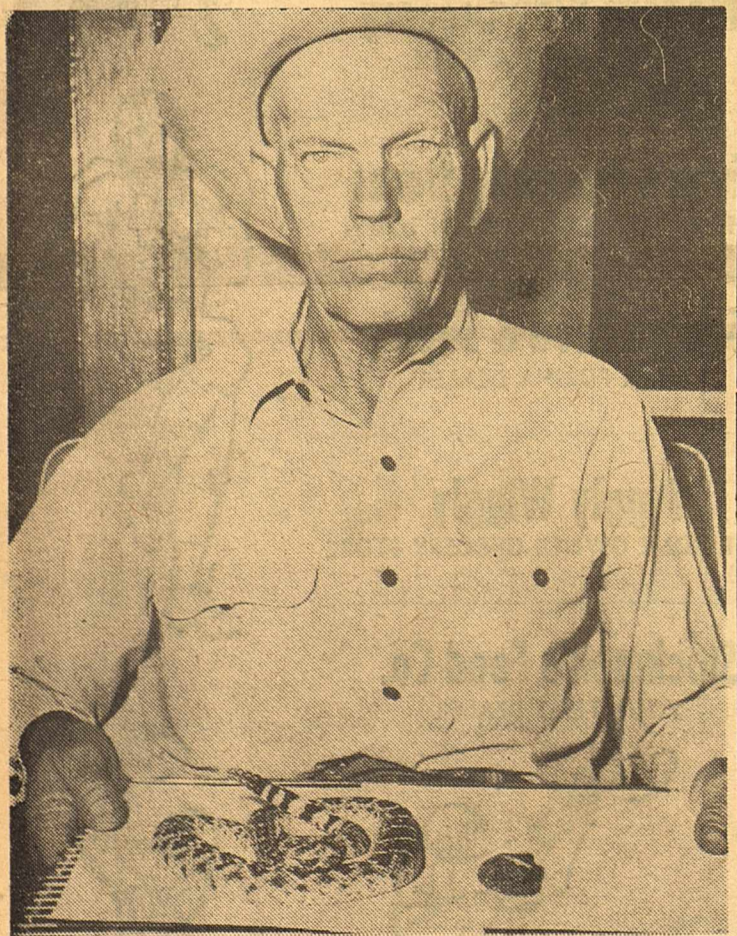

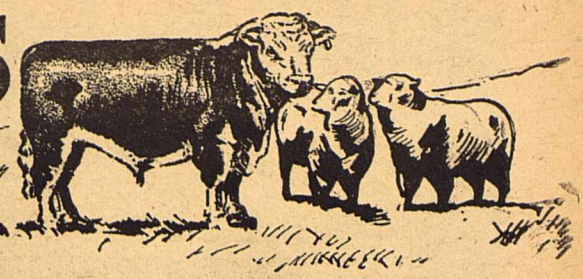

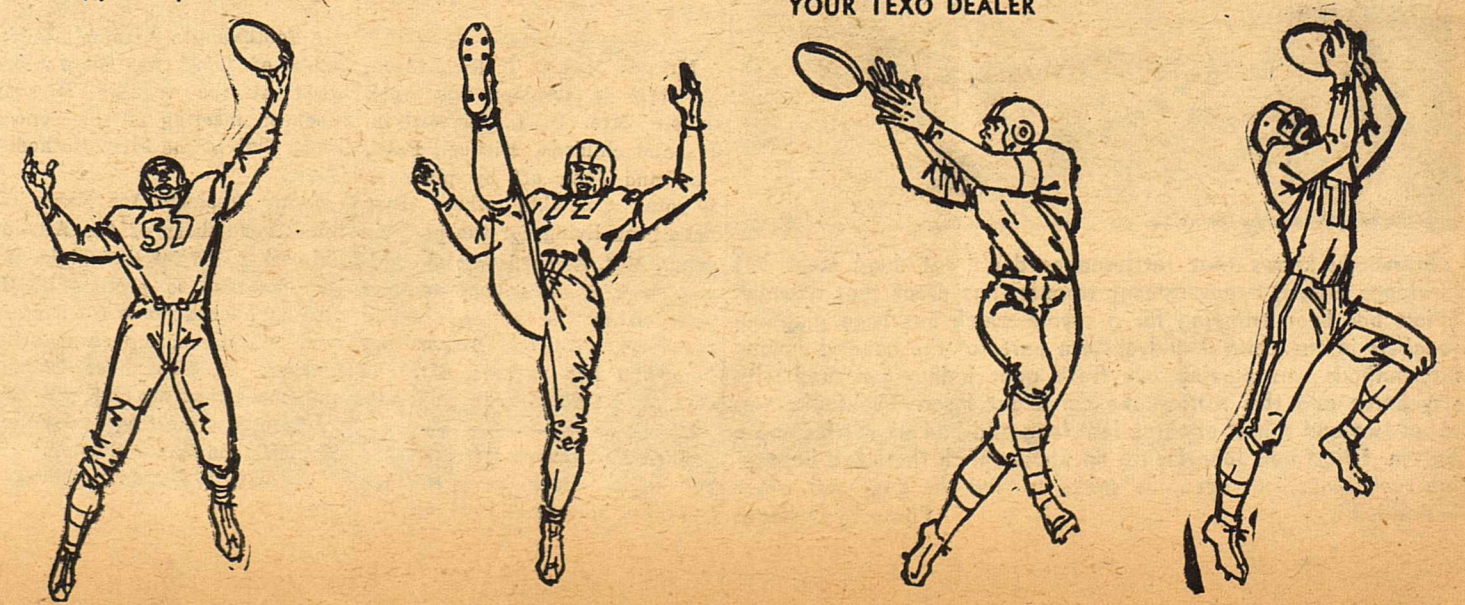

Texans have a big time. They also have a big timepiece. Fact of the matter is, it's the world's largest. It's the clock that's atop the 30-story Continental Bank Building in Fort Worth. Time is controlled by a micro-wave radio from the U. S. Observatory in Washington, D. C. The clock itself is five stories high. It weighs 77 tons and the numerals are so large-25 feet high and nine feet wide-that the clock can be read from a distance of five miles.

**Gonzales Honors Flag**  
 A plaque commemorating the making of the first battle flag of Texas hangs on the walls of the museum at Gonzales, in South Texas, the town where the flag was made.

It was the first flag on which the now famous "lone star" was used.

This flag carried the words "Come and Take It" in answer to the Mexican Army's demand for return of the Gonzales cannon. The cannon had been given to the Texans by the Mexicans for defense against the Indians.

**Good Enuf for Comstock**  
 Springs that provide 116,000,000 gallons of water per day should be good enough for anybody.

People in the Southwest Texas town of Comstock decided long ago that such springs were good enough for them, so they named them "Good Enough Springs."

The springs are located just south of Comstock, in Val Verde County, and their fine waters feed the Rio Grande River.

**Famous Tree Near Rockport**  
 You won't believe it until you see it yourself.

It's the largest live oak tree in the world, and it's located by Goose Island State Park near Rockport, in Aransas County, on the Gulf Coast.

This majestic symbol of the ages is more than 2,000 years old, having burst into life a hundred years before the birth of Christ. From its majestic trunk, branches spread forth 118 feet to

**Famous San Antonio Fort**  
 Teddy Roosevelt trained his famous Rough Riders in Texas in the same fort that housed such outstanding generals as Grant, Lee, Sheridan and Hood.

It's the 3,000 acre Fort Sam Houston, the greatest Army post in the United States. It is located within the confines of San Antonio.

Old "Fort Sam" dates back to the pre-Civil War days and still is active today. Much of the old atmosphere remains.

It's a sight to see, whether you're interested in the activities of today or of yesteryear.

**Texas Has Taj Mahal**  
 The Mission La Bahia del Espiritu Santo, located in Goliad, north of Corpus Christi, often is called the "Taj Mahal of Texas."

Established in 1849, the mission stands proudly today in a rare and enviable beauty-a reverent beauty that is only bestowed upon the great during the ages.

Near the mission is the site of the infamous massacre of General Fannin and his Texas soldiers by the troops of the Mexican General Santa Anna.

A horse which will stay anchored when the reins are dropped on the ground is said to be "tied to the ground." A horse so trained will stay in place as surely as if he were actually tied.

A trail cutter is a man employed to stop marching herds and inspect them for cattle which do not properly belong to them.

OCTOBER 8—Last day, before general election, for obtaining exemption certificates for voting in general election, by former minors and former non-residents now eligible.

OCTOBER 19-NOVEMBER 4—Absentee voting for general election. Persons may vote absentee at any time not more than 20 days nor less than three days prior to election.

NOVEMBER 3—Deadline for correcting poll tax receipt or certificate showing transfer to new precinct in city of 10,000 population, before general election.

NOVEMBER 8—General election first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

DECEMBER 19—Presidential electors convene in the capitol in Austin and vote for president and vice-president of the United States.

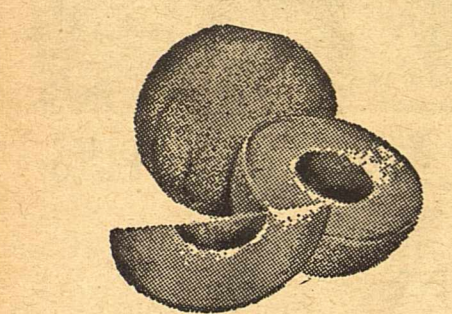



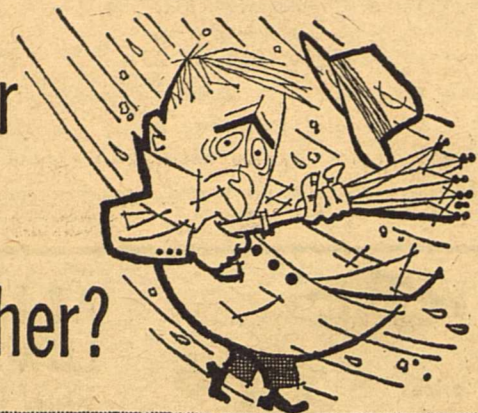

## Shooting Preserve Licenses Must Be Bought Now

Game Warden Nolan W. Johnson this week reminded ranchmen that if they plan to lease their property for hunting this season they must take out shooting preserve licenses. These licenses are available at the Chamber of Commerce office.

These licenses are compulsory under the state law which reads: "It is hereby declared unlawful for any person or persons, who may be acting as manager of any club, or the owner of any club, or shooting resort or shooting preserve, or lessor of premises leased for hunting purposes, to receive or accommodate as guest or member of such club, or shooting resort, or shooting preserve, or lessee of premises leased for

hunting purposes for pay, any person or persons engaged in hunting, before such manager of such club, shooting resort or shooting preserve, or premises leased for hunting purposes, shall have applied for and received a license from the Game and Fish Commission, or one of its authorized agents, granting him the right for the year beginning September 1 and ending August 31, following, to receive and accommodate any such person or persons at such club, shooting resort, shooting preserve, or premises leased for hunting purposes."

### WEIGHING, SHEARING DAYS SET FOR RAM PROGENY

A complete schedule of weighing and shearing dates in the annual Ram Progeny and Performance Test at the Experiment Station here has been announced.

Dates include initial shearing September 12 and 13; initial weighing on September 20 and 21; subsequent 28-day weigh periods on October 19, November 16, December 11 and February 8. Final weighing will be made on March 7 and 8, 1961 and final shearing is scheduled for March 9 and 10, 1961.
