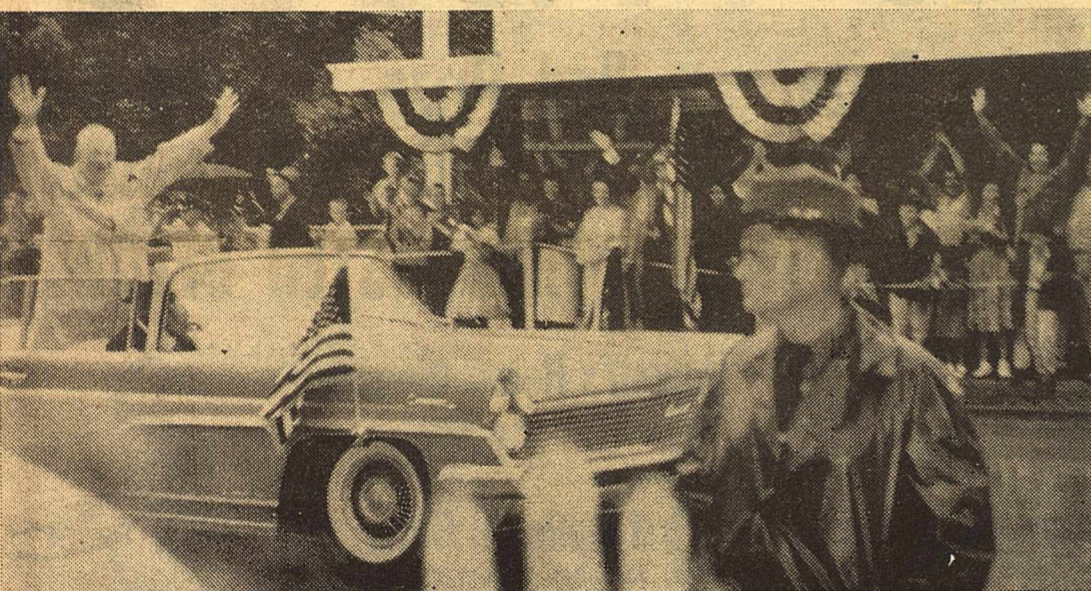

Broncos Squeeze By Junction 22-6 There Friday Night

The Sonora Broncos chalked up their second conference victory in as many tries this season as they defeated the Junction Eagles 22 to 6 in Junction Friday night. It was the Broncos' eighth win in a season which has, so far, seen no losses for the Sonora club. It was the Eagles' seventh loss this year.

First score of the evening came during the first quarter as Back Herman Moore returned an Eagle punt from the Bronco 30 yard-line for a thrilling 70 yards across the Eagle goalline. Quarterback Primo Gonzales scored the two bonus points on an end run.

The second quarter was scoreless and the Eagles' only tally of the night came in the third period of play as the result of a Sonora fumble. Eagle Back Kenny Neal went across the goal stripe for the needed inches. The conversion

attempt failed. Sonora's final 14 points were made in the final quarter. Gonzales racked up the first of the two touchdowns on a Quarterback keeper that was good for 15 yards. End David Archer's kick was good for the extra point. It was Moore again on the final touchdown in a 45 yard run off tackle. Archer's conversion kick again was a good one.

Elsewhere in District 8-A conference play, Ozona defeated Big Lake 37 to 6.

Sutton Bond Sales Reach 41.4% Quota

George H. Neill, chairman of the Sutton County Savings Bonds committee has released a report that Savings Bonds sales for September totaled \$9,446.00. Sales for the first nine months of 1960 were \$33,119 or 41.4% of the yearly goal of \$80,000.

The Sonora Broncos will meet the Eldorado Eagles in the most crucial game of the 1960 football season Friday night in Eldorado. Both teams are undefeated as they go into the game, Eldorado boasting seven wins out of seven tries and Sonora racking up eight out of eight.

In scoring, Eldorado has the Broncos bested with a total of 219 points scored this season to their opponents' 28. Sonora has totaled 183 points to their opponents' 52. In their 1960 season the Eagles have downed Wylie 27 to 0; Iraan 43 to 0; Rankin 27 to 14; Rocksprings 6 to 0; Eden 46 to 0; Robert Lee 28 to 0 and Junction 42 to 0.

Paths of the two teams have crossed four times. The Broncos have defeated Junction 22 to 6 as compared to the 42 to 14 Eldorado-Junction score. Rocksprings fell to Eldorado 6 to 0 and Sonora 20 to 0. Rankin lost to Sonora 31 to 6 and to Eldorado 27 to 14. Iraan fell to the Eagles 43 to 0 and to the Broncos 28 to 6.

In the matter of size, the Eagles have a 13 pound per-man weight advantage with a team averaging 173 pounds to the Broncos' 160. The Eagle line will

average a hefty 180 to the Broncos 168 and their backfield goes a whopping 161 to the Sonora backs' 148.

Game time will be 7:30 and Sonora fans are to occupy the north grandstand. Parking space will be found in the roping arena adjacent to the field and spectators are to enter the stadium by way of the second open gate.

Louis Davis, president of the Bronco Booster Club, has requested that all members meet at the Sonora bus at the beginning of the second half so that they may cheer the boys onto the field.

Probable starters for the Eagles will be Jerry Johnson and John McGregor at ends, Mikel Jurecek and Dean Williams at tackles; Dennis Jurecek and Kenneth Hicks at guards; Pete Logan at center and Carl Parker, Donnie Holden, Jim Cheek and H. A. Belk in the backfield.

Starting lineup for Sonora will probably read: Charlie Howell and Augustin Chavez at ends; Steve Fish and Douglas Wood at tackles; Jimmy Cahill and Bob Neville at guards; Curt Schwiening, Jr., at center and Primo Gonzales, Lester Schmidt, Bobby Sosa and Johnny Fields in the backfield.

Odds And Ends

"Hey, Mr. President, we still like Ike!" An unidentified reporter called this greeting to President Eisenhower as he arrived at Laughlin Air Force Base near Del Rio Monday. The President laughed, waved and shouted "Thanks!"

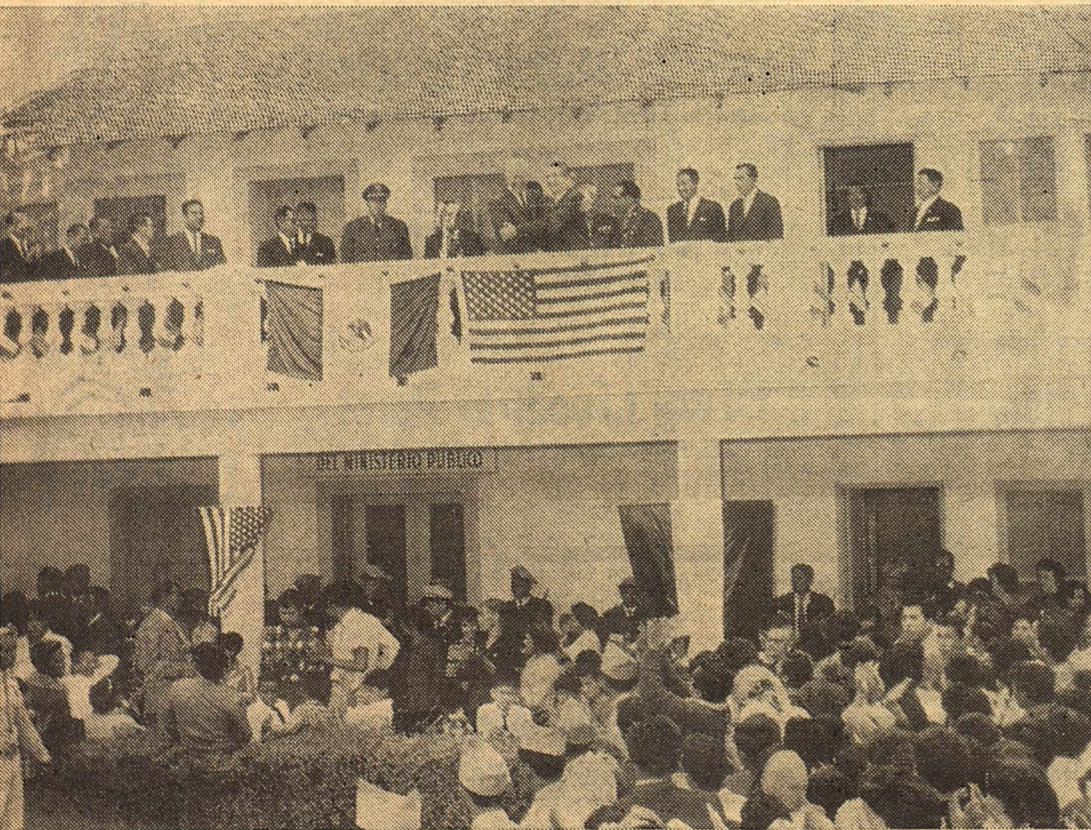
The incident was typical of the reception accorded both Eisenhower and his Mexican counterpart, Adolfo Lopez Mateos, at their historical meeting in Ciudad Acuna.

As members of the presidential press party, we were privileged to be present at the landing of the Columbine III, presidential plane, to follow the President's car in the motorcade through Del Rio and across the international bridge, and to attend the official meeting of the two presidents.

We had no idea there were so many law enforcement officers! About 160 members of the Highway Patrol were stationed along the highway from Laughlin into Del Rio and throughout the city. Among these was Jake Price of Sonora whom we spotted at the air base. Border Patrol officers were present in force, too, as were Del Rio police, Val Verde County sheriff's department personnel. There were more than 400 officers and enlisted men from Laughlin and Secret Service men dotted the crowds on both sides of the Rio Grande.

It was a thrilling sight to watch the Columbine III come in for the landing, suddenly appearing beneath the heavy clouds which dropped a steady drizzle all day. It taxied up to the ramp, the heavy door bearing the seal of the President opened and Ike himself, looking healthy and vigorous in his dark blue suit and homburg, stepped out. The band broke into "Hail to the Chief" and the President had arrived in Texas.

Having our first contact with high government officials we were somewhat surprised to find them all smiling and jovial. Secretary of State Christian Herter was joking and laughing in spite of the arm crutches he used. Our Ambassador to Mexico, Robert Hill, stopped for conversation with acquaintances in the crowd. James Hagerty, presidential press secretary, his hair standing on end from the wind and rain, was all over the place. The cavalcade to Acuna left its impressions, too. The San

Felipe band playing and majorettes holding up a banner, "Welcome, Ike, to San Felipe Independent School District". Kids waving flags. And as we turned a corner there was another glimpse of the President, standing in the convertible, hatless in spite of the rain, always smiling.

In Acuna the reception given both president was tremendous. The popularity of the two men was evident in the shouts and applause each received. Eisenhower and Lopez Mateos were obviously pleased to see each other and their joint pledge of the construction of Amistad Dam was enthusiastically received. Flashbulbs were popping, TV cameras ground and reporters' pencils jotted notes.

At 3:05, the festivities drawing to a close, the President's helicopter landed back at Laughlin. He shook hands with the Laughlin officers, said goodbye to Herter and Hill, and mounted the ramp to his plane, pausing at the door to salute the flag. The door swung closed, and it was all over. The Air Force Major looked at his watch, "It's 3:15 and it all went off on schedule," he remarked, "but I'll never know how."

Absentee Voting Now Underway At Clerk's Office

Absentee voting for the November 8 general election is now underway at the office of County Clerk F. L. McKinney.

Persons who are physically unable to appear at the polls on election day may vote by mail. They should request applications for ballots from the clerk's office.

Persons who expect to be out of the county on the day of the election may vote in person at the clerk's office.

Persons now out of the county and who do not expect to return for election day may obtain absentee ballots by written request only, postmarked out of the county.

Friday, November 4 is the final day to obtain absentee ballots and all ballots mailed must be received in McKinney's office by one o'clock on the afternoon of the election.

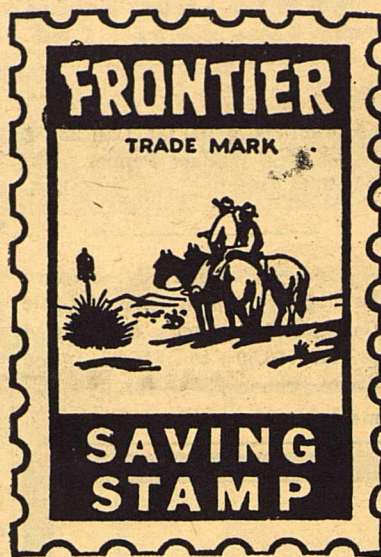

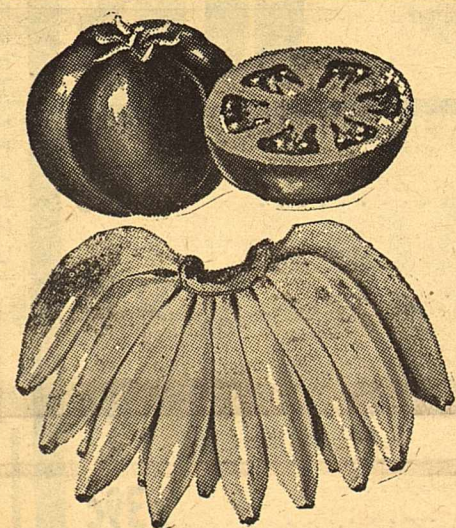

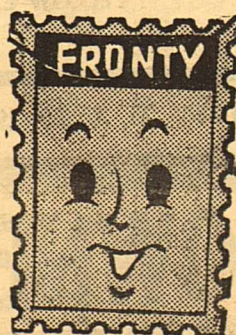

**Vote For The Man Of Your Choice
But Be Sure To Vote**

As election time draws nearer much more attention is being drawn to the candidates through the TV debates. However, besides just being able to look at the candidates and watch to see how they bait one another, let us examine very carefully what their answers are to the various questions and see if we are really getting some answers or just a lot of double talk.

One point which should be brought out, for example, is that on the question of medical care for the aged, Senator Kennedy repeatedly says he advocates putting it in the Social Security program and then the government doesn't have to pay for it. But he has very pointedly left out the fact that the Social Security program is financed by direct taxation and that at the present time it is hundreds of millions of dollars in the red. (In other words, it has paid out millions of dollars more than it has taken in.) Therefore, to put more burden on a program which is already so far in the hole would necessitate more taxes. Do you realize that Congress has already passed laws which require both employer and employee to pay 4.5% of their wages in Social Security taxes by 1968, a total of 9%? At present we are paying 3% each. If Senator Kennedy has his way it means more Social Security taxes for everyone.

On another question that was put forth in regard to the tremendous amount of money it would take to finance the Democratic Platform programs, Senator Kennedy most emphatically denied that it would take as much money as Mr. Nixon says it will. He presents no proof or facts of any kind for calling Mr. Nixon a liar; just says that "of course it won't take that much money". For some reason Mr. Kennedy seems to have convinced a lot of people with their hands out that if he is made President everyone will receive more benefits and no one will have to pay for it. This would be wonderful if it would just work. How many people recall that back in the depression when FDR promised everything, things didn't get a bit better until we got into a war? Is that what Senator Kennedy would resort to also? How can anyone recommend more welfare programs and more spending and then say it won't cost any more than fewer programs and less spending? And who, in the long run, pays for all of it? Not the government, but the people.

Another question which Senator Kennedy has really been blasting at is the question of our defense spending. Does he really have the American people scared into thinking we are "second rate"? He admits we are still the strongest nation but indicates we won't stay that way unless we elect him president. Let's look at the record. From 1946, after the war, until 1952 when President Eisenhower took office, Dr. Werner von Braun, head of our missile program, had repeatedly voiced our need of having a missile program developed. President Truman ignored him and that six-year lapse in our program was the reason the Russians put a satellite into orbit before we did. That six years can never be recovered. Since 1952 we have spent billions of dollars on our defense system and new developments in our space program. We have made tremendous strides, although six years behind, and Mr. Kennedy would have the American people believe that it is the fault of the Republicans. He has certainly twisted the facts to meet his own purpose.

Let's go on to another question Mr. Kennedy has tried to twist around, one that vitally affects the people of West Texas—the oil depletion allowance. Mr. Kennedy now claims that he did not specifically name the oil industry as his target for closing "loopholes" in tax laws when he referred to the depletion allowances. The fact is, however, that the oil depletion allowance represents about 80% of the depletion allowances, the other coming from other minerals. By doing away with the oil depletion allowance, most independent oil producers would be put out of business and the large companies would have to curtail their exploration and drilling activities. Why? Because the oil depletion allowance permits oil companies to exempt 27.5% of their taxes, not to exceed 50% of their gross income, thus providing them with the capital they need to continue their drilling and exploration activities. If they have to go borrow that money they will not spend as much on that necessary part of their operation and the net result would work all the way down to the last "roughneck"—less money and fewer jobs. To the ranchers and farmers in West Texas it means not only that taxes will be paid on oil leases and producing royalties, depriving them of a little more money to operate on, but the curtailing of oil leases will deprive them of additional income. In this what West Texas people want?

To sum it all up, Mr. Kennedy has definitely and irrevocably presented himself as the proponent of more government control, more spending, higher taxes and less individual freedom and enterprise. The great area of the United States called WEST TEXAS was built on individual freedom and free enterprise. Are we ready for WEST TEXAS to stop growing and let the government run our businesses and tell us how to live? If we are not, and I don't believe we are, then cast your vote AGAINST Kennedy-Johnson and FOR Vice President Richard Nixon and Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge as President and Vice President of these United States.
