

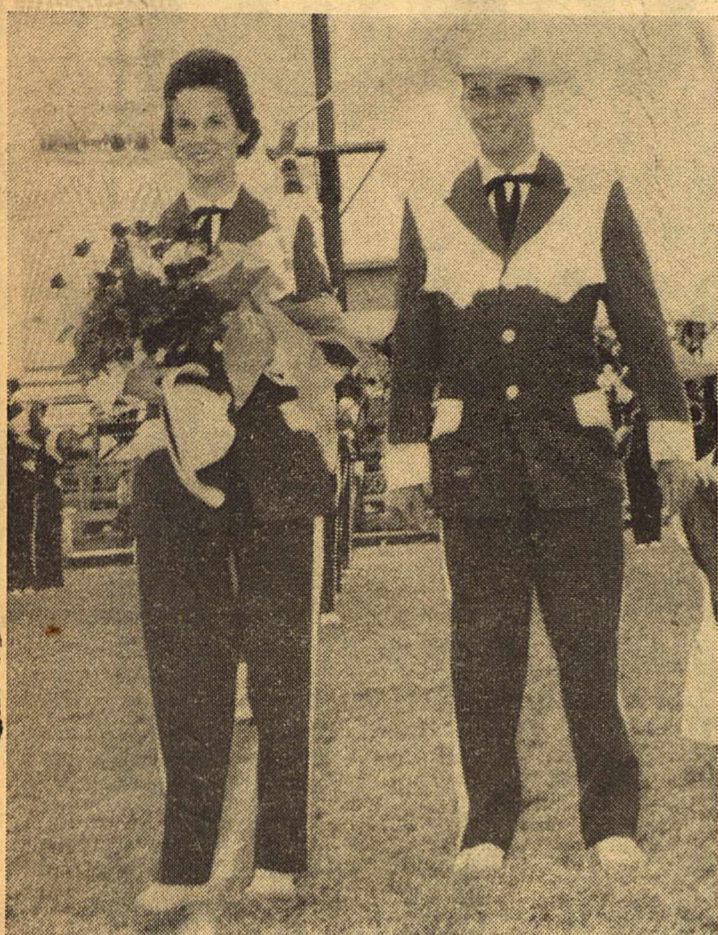

Funeral services for William Henry Queen, 60, of Nacogdoches were held Wednesday morning, November 16, at the First Methodist Church of Nacogdoches with the Rev. Charlie Lamb, pastor, officiating. Queen, brother-in-law of L. P. Lyles of Sonora and a former Sonora resident, died in a Nacogdoches hospital Tuesday morning, November 15.

Born April 25, 1900 in Springfield, Missouri, Queen was married to the former Miss Bonnie Lyles in 1931.

Sonora's conference scores have read Sonora 22, Junction 6; Sonora 25, Ozona 8; Sonora 0, Eldorado 2, and Sonora 35, Big Lake 12.

Wink has held their conference opponents to a total of 28 points to the Wildcats' total of 120. Sonora's opponents have scored 28 points to broncs' total of 82.

Coach Jerry Hopkins describes the Wink team as little and scrappy with plenty of speed. Among the top Wildcat scorers for the season are Robinson, Bates, Mills and Thomason.

The Broncos will be banking heavily on the "Horsethieves" to turn the Wink offensive tide. A

few minor injuries early in the week were showing signs of being healed up for Friday night.

Kick-off time is 7:30 and the winner will meet the victor of the Merkel-Plains game in regional competition.

Sonoran's Brother Named To Congress From California

John Rousselot of San Gabriel, California, brother of Norman W. Rousselot of Sonora, was elected to Congress from California's 25th Congressional District. Rousselot won by a margin of more than one million votes over the incumbent Democrat George Kassem.

D. B. Buffington of Mauriceville in deep southeast Texas, turned in the first deer of the 1960 season Wednesday morning when he brought in a 100-pound, 7-point buck to Sonora Food Locker. The deer was killed on the M. E. Joy ranch about 30 miles southeast of Sonora.

First turkey honors went to Curt Schwiening, Jr., Sonora High School senior, whose gobler, turned in at Lambert's Grocery, was killed early Wednesday morning on the Schwiening Ranch about eight miles east of town.

Largest deer killed on opening day was a 15-point buck killed by Mrs. Mack Cauthorn on the ranch about 17 miles south of town. It was shot early Wednesday morning but still topped the scales at 140 1/2 pounds Wednesday night. The deer with the largest number of points as of Thursday morning was a 16-point, 134-pound buck killed by Raymond York of San Angelo on the Shannon Clarkson ranch southeast of Sonora.

Thursday morning found more than 60 deer and around 40 turkeys in the storage houses.

Broncs Defeat Big Lake Owls 35-12 Here In Season Closer

The Sonora Broncos defeated the Big Lake Owls here Friday afternoon 35 to 12 to complete their 1960 season was a record of nine wins and one loss. The ninth win put the Broncos back in the running for championship honors and, with Ozona downing Eldorado 14 to 7, a three-way tie for top spot was settled when Sonora won the toss and is scheduled to meet Wink in bi-district play on Friday.

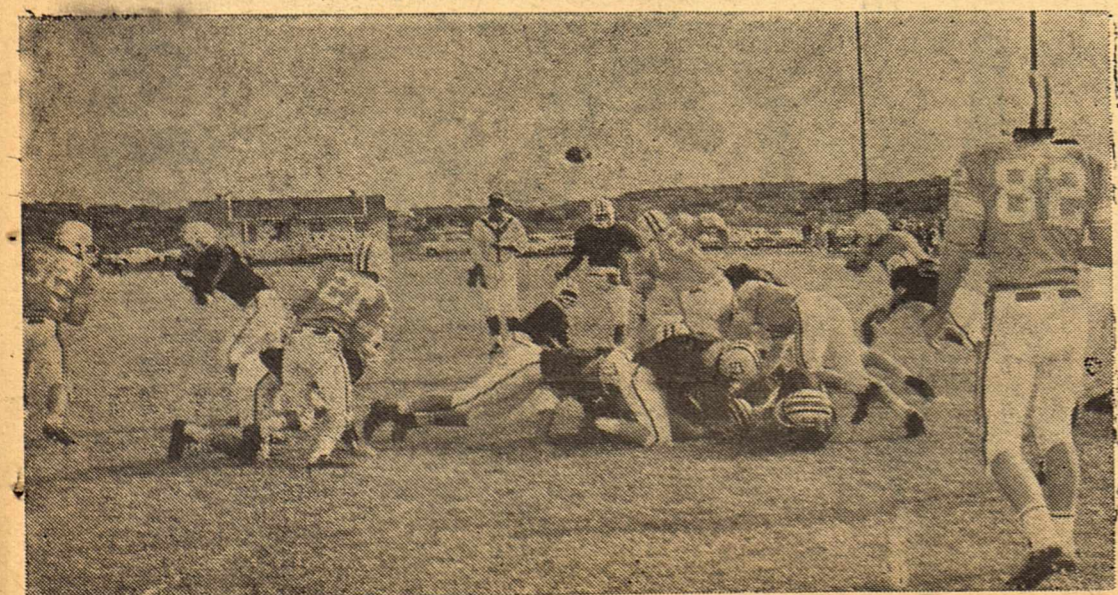
Sonora's first scoring tallies came in the opening quarter when Bobby Sosa set up the winning

series of downs with a long run from the Broncos' 40 to the Big Lake 5. Sosa carried around end from the four for the initial touchdown. The conversion try failed. Minutes later Quarterback Primo Gonzales scored from the six yardline on a keeper play. David Archer's kick was good for the bonus point. Still in the first period, Gonzales scored on a long, 60-yard run. End Charlie Howell caught the pass for the two extra points.

Big Lake's threat was made in the second quarter as they cross-

ed the Bronco goal line twice. Halfback Joe Agüero scored first on a 12-yard run off tackle but the Owls' conversion attempt was no good. It was Agüero again in the same period with an 11-yard run for the touchdown. The try for extra points failed.

The third period was scoreless but the 21-12 lead was increased by the Broncos in the final quarter with touchdowns by Johnny Fields and Herman Moore. Fields climaxed a 60-yard drive with a four-yard drive off tackle. The bonus pass to Archer was good. Moore's touchdown was on a five-yard plunge over tackle. The try for extra point failed.

City Commission Hears Audit Report Adopts Electrician License Ordinance

A complete audit of the books of the City of Sonora was presented to the City Commission at its monthly meeting Monday morning, November 14. John H. Sowell, Jr., of the firm of Rodgers, Chorpensing and Jungmann, Certified Public Accountants of San Antonio, presented the audit. Sowell reported a steady increase in output and revenue from the electric service department with a gross of \$59,000, or an increase of some \$11,000 over 1959.

Sowell said that in the opinion of the auditors City Secretary Mrs. Davie H. Taylor and her

staff are doing an excellent job and added that the City of Sonora has an exceptionally fine set of records.

The audit showed a total of 782 electricity customers using total of 5,179,394 kilowatt hrs. for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1960. A total of 989 customers used a total of 189,590,801 gallons of water. Total number of sewer connections is 602.

Other business transacted by the Commission included adoption of an ordinance requiring licensing of electricians working within the city. This licensing ordinance will protect citizens against

inferior workmanship and will cover both local electricians, who were among those requesting such an ordinance, and out of town electricians working here. Examinations will be given those who do not hold master or journeyman licenses at the time of application. Appointed to the examining board were R. M. McCarver, R. L. Hardgrave and John Eaton. McCarver was appointed inspector.

Bills in the amount of \$4,056.83 were approved for payment and the Commission voted to accept bids for repainting the City Hall.

Water Research Program Outlined For SCD Supervisors Tuesday

Ralph Baird, Agricultural Research Service, USDA, met Tuesday with supervisors of the Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation district to outline a proposed water research program on Lowrey Draw.

The project would be conducted over a 5 to 10 year period to study various phases of runoff and ground water. Water stage recorders would be installed at each of the five structures on Lowrey Draw and measurements made of runoff water received and passed through the principal spillway or drawdown tubes of the structures. The difference could be calculated into water seeping into the ground or lost to evaporation.

Adjacent, unused water wells would be checked regularly to determine any increase of groundwater following storms. Streams on Lowrey Draw would also be checked during major storms to determine the amount of surface runoff. A gage would also be installed in Lowrey Draw in Sonora to calculate the stream loss.

A series of 13 recording rain gages would be installed over the Lowrey Draw watershed to get an accurate picture of how much and how fast rain fell during each storm.

During the life of the project, studies would be made in the district to determine the amount of runoff water lost from ranges with various amounts of grass cover.

"A Bell for Adano", by John Hersey, is a novel but also the truth. It is a story of Americans in Italy at the end of World War II.

It tells of the Italian-American major who tried to rebuild an occupied town along the lines of his own good instincts and democratic upbringing. He understood the wonderful people of Adano—the fishermen, the officials, the cartmen, the children who ran in the streets shouting to the American soldiers to throw them caramels—and he knew how much they wanted to carry on the customs of their homeland, but also how much they wanted and needed a new freedom. He found that an ancient bell that the town had loved had been taken away by the Fascists to make gun barrels, and he did something about it. He and his new friends ran in to some crippling difficulties—red tape and prejudice. His story makes startlingly clear the fact that agreements are only as effective as the men who are sent to implement them.

"A Bell for Adano" was awarded the Pulitzer Prize in 1945.

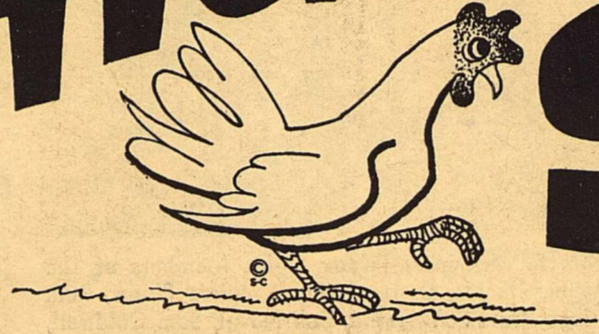

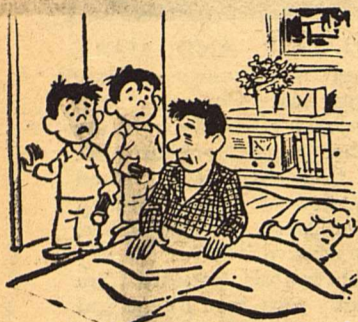

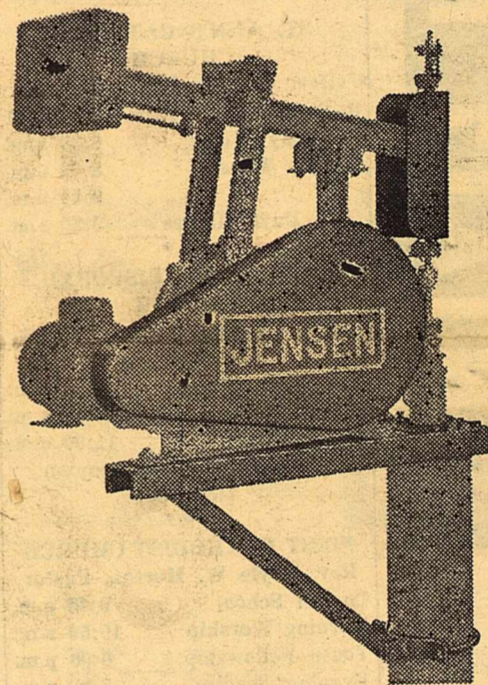

PUBLIC NOTICE

A total of 3,041 public hunt permits were drawn Nov. 1 at the Game and Fish Commission offices in Austin, according to the director of wildlife restoration. The permits are now being addressed and will be mailed out to the hunters whose names were picked at the public drawing.
By deadline time, 16,727 deer hunters and 685 duck hunters had mailed in their applications for a free hunt. These applications, in postcard size, were then dropped into a big barrel. As the barrel revolved, single cards were picked out. Only the cards for a particular area were placed in the barrel at any one time.

As it turned out, for the big Hill Bayou waterfowl hunt 602 names were drawn; 321 names for the Kerr Area deer hunt; 403 names for the Black Gap Area; 800 for Canyon; 81 for the Sierra Diablo Area; 153 for Engeling; and 681 for the Angelina Area.

The 1960 hunts will be conducted like last year's hunts, with hunters reporting to their desig-

nated area headquarters before the hunt. Each hunter will be given maps and other information necessary for a safe and successful hunt at these headquarters.

Each individual whose name was picked from the barrel in Austin can expect to be notified in time to make plans and prepare for the trip to his particular area, according to the director.

Easiest magazine article I ever wrote was about a Marine who had been wounded in Nicaragua during a revolution. He came into the Ranger Times office one night after supper and talked, and all I had to do was take down his words for he unfolded a vivid and exciting story. Blue Book brought it for its true adventure department.

Pet peeves of mine are radio and TV announcers who feel they must pronounce every letter in a word whereas in English, if spoken correctly, a letter is sometimes ignored or slurred. For example, there is no "tain" in captain or mountain (when
