An Open Letter To Our Sonora Customers

The changeover of Sonora rural lines from magneto to dial service is progressing on schedule. All company owned lines and the majority of customer owned facilities are completed and will be ready for dial service by May 1, 1961 deadline. Additional central office equipment has been installed in readiness for the new

New telephone directories will be distributed approximately June 5. Dial numbers for rural customers will be listed in the new directory. Only Sonora and Eldorado listings will be included in the new phone book. Eden, which has been part of the Sonora directory in the past will become part of the September 1961 San Angelo directory. in June, 1962, Sonora listings will be in the same directory with those of Eldorado, Ozona, Texon, Barnhart and Big

All Sonora customers will be provided with a list showing the change of number from the present rural numbering plan to dial numbers. This list is to be used until new directories are distribut-

On May 1, the Sonora traffic force will be relieved of duty as the manual switchboards are made inoperative. Some of the telephone operators will transfer to the San Angelo Traffic Department. Information service for rural numbers will be provided

Due to some delayed customer notification of plans to abandon customer owned facilities and gain service from company owned lines, several lines will require regrouping and number changes. Approximately 25 rural customers will thus have temporary dial numbers from May 1 until additional carrier equipment is received from the factory and installed.

We wish to express our appreciation for the cooperation displayed in making this dial modernization possible. It is sincerely hoped that all Sonora subscribers will benefit from and enjoy this improved service.
